## TOWN WARRANT.

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### STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Salisbury in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Salisbury on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriations for same.
3. To elect one selectman for three years.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate one half of one percent of its assessed valuation for Town Maintenance of highways, reserving the sum of one thousand dollars for winter use.
5. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for scraping road from Franklin town line through south road village to Heights.
6. To see what the Town will do about building state road from south road to Franklin town line after present road now under construction is completed.
7. To raise and appropriate such sum of money as the law requires for State Aid Maintenance.
8. To raise and appropriate such sum of money as the law requires for State Aid Construction.
9. To see how much money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to light the roads or streets of Salisbury,

and to authorize the selectmen to enter into a contract for street lighting in said town for such period and such price and upon such other terms as they may consider proper, but not to call for an annual expenditure above the amount raised. This article to be open to amendments.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$400 for Town charges.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$150 for Memorial and Old Home Day exercises.

12. To see if the selectmen shall be authorized to appoint a budget committee or elected by ballot.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate one thousand dollars or more to apply to debt.

14. To see what the Town will vote to do about changing their present system of ten surveyors back to five surveyors.

15. To elect one library trustee for three years.

16. To elect one trustee of trust funds for three years.

17. To hear reports of agents, auditors and officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
