

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Springfield in the County of Sullivan in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Springfield on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the voters of the Town will accept the Selectmen's estimate of expenditures for the year ensuing and act thereon.
- 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the maintenance of highways and bridges and make appropriations for the same.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$646.50 for State Aid Construction provided the State furnishes the sum of \$1292.00.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the necessary money needed for oiling of the road in Springfield village.
- 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Library purposes, in addition to the amount by law.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for observance of Memorial Day.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$50.00 for hydrant service at Twin Lake Villa.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000.00 for the salary of District Nurse.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for Cemetery work.

- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$35.00 for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to grant a discount on taxes paid in full before October 1.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to borrow money on the notes of the Town in anticipation of taxes.
- 15. To see what action the Town will take in regard to purchasing forest fire equipment on a 50-50 basis with the Forestry Department and make appropriation for the same.
- 16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Blister Rust Control.
- 17. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Springfield School Board:

I herewith submit the annual report of the Superintendent of Schools.

At the Center School it seemed wise this year to apportion the grades a little differently between the two rooms, since the primary room had more pupils than the grammar room. The fourth grade, therefore, was placed in Mrs. Howard's room. It happens that there is no seventh grade this year. There are now 16 pupils in the primary room and 17 in the other room.

We are again fortunate in having the same successful teachers, although one of them appears now under a new name. Miss Edna D. Hazen was married to Mr. Samuel J. Howard during the summer.

Teachers and pupils appreciate the new series of arithmetics placed in the schools this year. The old books, besides being out-of-date, did not contain enough drill material.

The only pupil to graduate from the eighth grade last June, Cleo Eastman, is now attending the Sunapee High School, where her sister Isabel is a senior. At Newport High School there are: Senior Class, Frances Metcalf; Junior Class, Edward Smith; Sophomore Class, Wayne Bailey, Louise Brunell, Margaret Gardner, Lloyd Heath, Helen Patten, Doris Philbrick, and Laura Smith. It is interesting to note that all of our high school pupils who completed last year's work are still in school.

We wish to express our appreciation of the interesting books which have been presented to the Center School by Mr. and Mrs. Fairfax D. Downey in memory of their son, Fairfax Davis Downey, Jr., who loved West Springfield and Adamsfort. In 1937 the gift books were "The Stars for Sam," by W. Maxwell Reed, and "Wild Flowers," by Homer D. House. This year the school received a copy of "Disaster Fighters," by Fairfax D. Downey.

The Morgan School, or District No. 9 School, has been sold for \$100.00. The Sanborn Hill School, which was sold to

Mr. Leon Cote, has now been deeded to him upon completion of the payment of the purchase price (\$150.00).

The emphasis this year in the elementary teachers' professional study has been put on instruction in reading. The teachers' meetings instead of being general for the entire staff have consisted of groups of teachers interested in particular phases of reading instruction.

The efficient work of the community nurse has been very valuable in promoting good health among the pupils. She keeps in constant touch with the schools, does follow-up work in the homes, and arranges treatments by physicians.

I want to add a word of appreciation for the kindly attitude and helpful cooperation of school board, teachers, and all others connected with our school, without which it would be impossible for the school to operate so effectively.
