### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Tamworth in the County of Carroll in said State qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Tamworth School House on Tuesday, March thirteenth (13) next. The meeting will be in two parts:

1. In order that all necessary town officers may be elected for the ensuing year, you are hereby notified that the polls will be open for this purpose from 2 P. M. of the clock on said Tuesday, the thirteenth of March until the close of part 2.

2. The meeting will reconvene at 7 P. M. in said School House to see what time to close the polls and to raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and to see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the following purposes:

Article 15. To see if the Town will sell to the Trustees of the Trust Funds a certain parcel of land for \$1.00 and other valuable considerations. Said parcel of land

contains approximately two acres and lies at the junction of Cleveland Hill and Hollow Hill Roads.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to establish a planning board of five (or seven) members with duties as set forth in Sections 1-15, Chapt. 36, RSA 1955, to make a study of the town's development, and report to the town appropriate recommendations for the promotion and maintenance of the town's best development. The Board shall consist of one Selectman and four (or six) other citizens, appointed by the Selectmen as provided in Chapt. 36, RSA 1955.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to establish the road running from Main Street at the Post Office to Charles Aspinall's driveway as a Town Road.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute inventory blanks on April 1st.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of any property acquired through tax collector's deeds.

Article 21. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

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### FOREST FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT

#### AN APPEAL FROM YOUR FOREST FIRE WARDEN

In these days of constantly rising taxes and wages, any unnecessary expense is an added burden on everyone's pocketbook—yours and mine. Forest fires cost money and damage our valuable woodlands. Lightning sets some forest fires, but we have no control of lightning. Children cause many fires. Ninety-eight percent of our forest fires result from human carelessness—our carelessness. This, we—you—and I can do something about.

When we require you to obtain a permit for out-of-doors burning or forbid you to burn on days of high fire danger or set up regulations—hours, etc., governing the use of the town dump we are simply protecting yours and the town's interests.

The ever present threat of forest fires is the con-

cern of all of us; the responsibility for preventing them is ours and the costs of extinguishing are ours. We can do something about this problem, by being aware of and alert to the danger and by cooperating with your warden.

Do the things that are required of you —

1. Follow the warden's directions.
2. Secure the required burning permit.
3. Keep your fires under control.
4. Completely extinguish your fires before leaving them.
5. See that your children are properly cautioned. Everyone will benefit by it.

To the Inhabitants of the School district in the town of Tamworth qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Tamworth School in said district on the 17th day of March 1962, at two o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and

the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$425.00 to purchase and install window screens for the school.

10. To see if the district will vote to recind the vote of April 5, 1958 adopting Article 13 of the school district warrant of that date, reading as follows:

“Article 13. To see if the school district will adopt as its school check-list the Town check-list, as provided in RSA 197:12a, as inserted by Laws of 1957, Chapter 57; this provision to be effective for the 1959 and subsequent annual district meetings.”

and return to the use of the school district check-list.

11. To see if the district will vote to authorize the School Board to make application for and accept in the name of the school district for educational purposes such funds or grants-in-aid as may be obtainable from the State or Federal Government or any department or agency thereof, or any other sources.

12. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Tamworth:

I submit my first report as Superintendent of Schools of Union No. 36. The following list indicates the administrative activities for the period from July 1, 1961 to December 1, 1961:

At the opening of school in September 1961, Miss Thompson was succeeded by Miss Julia Carlson. Miss

Carlson is a graduate of Keene Teachers College. Mrs. Young was succeeded by Mrs. Beatrice Wendell. Mrs. Wendell is a graduate of Gorham State Teachers College, Gorham, Me., and has taught several years. Mr. Jerry Poznak was succeeded by Mr. Clarence Blanchette. Mr. Blanchette is also a graduate of Keene Teachers College. All other members of the staff returned to their respective teaching positions in September. Mrs. Eleanor Tripp joined the staff as Music Supervisor. Mrs. Tripp is a graduate of the University of New Hampshire where she majored in music.

The school health program continues under the supervision of Mrs. Thelma Roberts, R. N., with the annual physical examinations by Dr. Edwin C. Remick.

The school lunch program continues to serve nourishing meals at the cost of fifteen cents per meal. Mrs. Jeffers is to be complimented on her competent serving of such meals.

During the past summer a new storage and maintenance building was erected in back of the school. This building and the grading and seeding of the play area are due to the continued efforts of the Tamworth Foundation, to whom we are most appreciative and grateful.

The Advisory Committee finished the bus turn around at the south end of the school. This project had been started by a previous Advisory Committee.

The heating problem in grades 1 and 4 has been corrected. The ceiling of the school was insulated, four classrooms were painted, and a new floor was laid in the auditorium during the summer recess.

## **Guidance**

The objective of a guidance program cannot be satisfactorily achieved unless all teachers are conscious of those objectives and strive toward that end. The role of the classroom teacher in the guidance program is an indispensable one. In every subject there are common and unique possibilities for contributing to the objectives of the guidance program. Guidance should be an outcome of all teaching activities.

### **Cumulative Records**

The Guidance Program is dependent upon an adequate knowledge of the individual. In our schools there is a Cumulative Record for each pupil. Guidance information is entered under the following headings:

1. Personal data
2. Family and community background
3. Scholastic record
4. Health Record
5. Objective test results
6. Character ratings
7. School activities and interests
8. Entrance and withdrawal record

The objective is to construct a growing, permanent record of valid information which will accompany each child throughout his school life.

The cumulative record kept up to date furnishes information which will be invaluable in making pupil adjustments. Principals and teachers find its greatest value in determining status and growth in the child's general and specific area development, in planning **new programs** and grade placement.

The task facing the leaders of education is to so **organize and administer** our educational institutions

that the best interest of every individual will be served and that this process will, at the same time, contribute to the fundamental quality of our culture and add strength to our national character. We must make sure that the maximum cultivation of the individual's intellectual, moral, artistic, and spiritual capacity that makes of him a free person, yields also the protection and perpetuation of those institutions that are essential to a free society.

Like so many other departments of our society and culture, our educational establishment at many points is comfortable and soft. At times we have been far too willing to entertain and to tolerate when we should have disciplined, directed, and inspired—inspired by great teaching of the type that moves the mind to a love of knowledge and to an insatiable demand to possess and create it, directed by wisdom that grasps the proper ends of learning; and disciplined by that internal discipline whereby a moral person orders his life, determines the means appropriate to his ends, and achieves a proper integration of his intellect and affections.

The schools of Tamworth are an investment in people and represent a significant part of our vast heritage which we Americans enjoy. One of the fundamental and most vital parts of our governmental structure is the guarantee of free, public and universal education locally administered. It is my sincere hope that the citizens of Tamworth will continue their support of this created obligation.

Realizing the many challenges with which the American people are faced today, I would like to urge the citizens of Tamworth to keep working hard to improve their school system, because I think that we all



must realize more than ever before that the foundation of our democratic society is built upon the education of its children.

I feel that the year which has elapsed has been one of progress. Whatever gains have been made have been the result of the cooperation of members of the School Board, school personnel and parents. For this cooperation I wish to express sincere acknowledgement.

## TAMWORTH SCHOOL LIBRARY

In May 1956 the Tamworth School Library opened with a small collection of good books. From this modest beginning it has grown steadily and has become increasingly a more vital part of the school. We now own 1,150 books and in addition to this have the use of books from the Tamworth Public Library and the Bookmobile.

Friends of the school have donated subscriptions to Audubon Magazine, Popular Science, Field and Stream, Children's Activities, Popular Mechanics, National Geographic, and Seventeen. Mr. Theodore Johnson has subscribed to the Best in Children's Books for several years. Mrs. Lawrence Scudder has given us several fine books and the Tamworth Foundation again made a generous donation.

Our librarians, Mrs. Myrick Crane and Mrs. Harry Damon, assisted by Mrs. Rolf Spicer, Mrs. Bernard Jennings and Mrs. Hazel Greene are at school every Thursday from 8:00 A. M. until 2:00 P. M. They spend many additional hours selecting, ordering, cataloging new books, mending books, preparing for the arrival of the Bookmobile and selecting books from it. They work closely with the teachers, ordering new books which will enrich the curriculum and requisitioning books on special subjects from the State Library. The school and community are greatly indebted to these loyal and devoted volunteers.

Junior librarians this year are Marshall Corkum and Timothy Goodson who help by opening and closing the book cases, and Charlotte Jeffers who with her

committee arrange in alphabetical order all books when they are returned.
