## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

### TOWN WARRANT

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To the inhabitants of the Town of Troy in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 12th day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a town clerk, one selectman for three years, and all other town officers.

Article 2. To see what action the town will take upon the recommended budget submitted by the budget committee.

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray the following town charges for the ensuing year:

- a. Town officers' salaries.
- b. Town officers expenses.
- c. Election and registration.
- d. Town hall and other buildings.
- e. Parks and playgrounds.
- f. Legal fees, vital statistics.
- g. Motor vehicle permit fees.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for snow removal and sanding.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for oiling and general maintenance of highways and bridges.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$309.91 to which the State will contribute \$2,066.09 if the amount is raised and it is voted to accept State aid for the maintenance and construction of Class 5 roads, and to see if the town will raise an additional \$1,000.00 to be used with the fore-going amounts for this work.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750.00 to defray the town's share of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age and Survivors Insurance), or take any action relating thereto.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the installation of three street lights on Thayer Ave.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for street lighting, with an amount to cover two lights on the east side of the common.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for repairs to sidewalks.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of the poor and old age assistance.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to discontinue any or all of the following highways as described or take any action relating thereto:

- a. East Hill Farm to Arne Jalava residence.
- b. Route 12 through underpass to site of steel bridge.
- c. Route 12, North end to so-called Whitcomb Farm site.
- d. J. Matson Farm to Richmond and Fitzwilliam lines, called Widow Gage road.
- e. J. Matson Farm to Richmond line, Old Richmond road to Liimatainen Farm.



- f. Maki Farm to Swanzey line.
- g. Ludwig Luopa residence to Marlboro line.
- h. Aldrich-Clark Farm corner to Fitzwilliam line.
- i. R. Laporte homestead to Fitzwilliam line known as Middle road, subject to gates and bars.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on all taxes excepting head and poll taxes, paid on or before dates designated at this meeting.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the maintenance of the fire department.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purchase of a piece of new fire apparatus.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the support of the police department.

Article 17. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for Civil Defense needs.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,400.00 for the maintenance and operation of the Water Works.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to accept amendments to the "House Bill No. 139" Legislative Acts of 1915 reading in part; An act to establish water-works in the Town of Troy, said amendments appearing on a printed ballot.

Article 20. To see if the town will appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 for the payment of water bonds at maturity, and the sum of \$1,575.00 interest for same.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the employment of a district nurse.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money toward the support of the Elliot Community Hospital.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care of the town dump.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the spraying of shade trees, removal of some, and replacement.

Article 25. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for Pine Blister Rust control.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the observance of Memorial Day.

Article 27. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the continuation of the War Memorial Program.

Article 28. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the support of the town library.

Article 29. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care and improvement of cemeteries.

Article 30. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$186.00 (1/100th of 1% of the valuation of the Town) to the Monadnock Region Association of Southern New Hampshire.

Article 31. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to borrow money to pay necessary town charges.

Article 32. To hear the reports of agents, officers, or committees, heretofore chosen, and take any action relating thereto.

Glasses were obtained for three children through the Lions Club of Keene. These children were transported twice by the nurse for examinations and fittings.

The Woman's Club with help from the State sponsored a Dental Clinic. Twenty-five needy school children were taken to Dr. W. J. Wilkins of East Jaffrey. Twelve trips were made by the nurse and averaging three hours per visit.

Four Polio Clinics have been held at the school auditorium. At the present time it is not known if the third inoculation will be given on a clinic basis.

## WAR MEMORIAL COMMITTEE REPORT

The 1956 season was the eighth year of activity at the Sand Dam area. Keene did not use our facilities this year. We miss the \$400 that was available for use on the Sand Dam property each of the past three years, but our own children are coming in such large numbers, 200 to 250 on warm afternoons, that we appreciate the extra room.

The bath house built last year is wearing well and was given another coat of creosote stain. New toilet facilities, with a cinder block foundation, were finally ready for use the last weeks of the program. Many thanks to those who helped on the foundation and special thanks to Mr. Bernier who did the building itself.

Other work done on the area:

1. Grading of beach.
2. Building and installation of a 60 foot long pier. Sections of 12 foot each can be taken in each winter. By using local materials and labor, total costs were about \$200. If bought completed it would have cost about \$750.00.
3. Tennis courts—patched and rolled to a fairly smooth finish and a new practice wall built.
4. Transplanting of 30 odd maple and oak trees from 6 to 15 feet tall. These donated by Walter Oman and work done by Boy Scouts and Junior Chamber of Commerce.
5. Purchase of two new rowboats. Fleet now consists of 5 rowboats and one canoe.

Total expenditures were about \$200.00 over the appropriation. Some of this was due to \$50.00 paid to Jane

Fiske and Judith Cabot. The opportunity to have these two young women was too good to miss. The rest was due to the new pier and labor. Original plans were for one new 12 foot section a year. The pier added so much to the area that materials were then purchased for the complete project. Labor costs are a new item. Maintenance of equipment is now an appreciable chore and it is too big a task to be done on a volunteer basis. Mr. Harold Lang has agreed to store and maintain our equipment at a very reasonable rate.

A committee meeting was held January 27, 1957 and plans were made for the coming season.

1. Ralph Staples to be in charge. Michael Dunn, assistant. Subcommittee of Calvin Cumings and Edward Lang to pick another Red Cross Life Saving Instructor. Walter Oman for craft work.

2. Out of town people—use of area. Specific recommendations for charges, swimming instruction and use of facilities to be drawn up by subcommittee of Maurice Clark and Henry Swiatek.

3. To have Ralph Staples appointed a special police officer for Sand Dam area.

4. To plan for new building next to tennis courts to replace present deteriorating "shack".

\$277.00 is available in the special account for this purpose. Mr. Waino Heinonen has donated several hundred feet of lumber for the new building which will be 24x32 feet. It will be used for storage of equipment and will have room enough for a snack bar if personnel are available. A shaded porch area will have tables for craft work.

5. To purchase an aluminum canoe and a small sail boat to add to present fleet.

### TROY WAR MEMORIAL SUMMER PROGRAM REPORT

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The 1956 summer recreational program at the Sand Dam completed a successful ten week program. The total attendance each year has been increasing significantly. The 1956 attendance figured on a cumulative basis was six thousand children-days from Troy. This figure amounts to 20c per child day.

This summer we were fortunate in having Miss Judy Cabot and Miss Jane Fiske with us. They did an outstand-

ing job in craft work and in the organization of games for the young age group.

The swimming program, through its Red Cross courses, gave instruction to 130 children in regular scheduled classes. 40 Red Cross beginner, 20 intermediate, 8 swimmer, 3 Jr. Life, and 3 Senior Life saving cards were awarded to the children that earned them. These achievements represent a considerable amount of work by the boys and girls of Troy.

A new dock was constructed which helped greatly in the life guard work. It also provided a place to tie up our expanding fleet of boats, which now make five in number.

The results of a survey conducted at school to evaluate our swimming program, show that in grade 1, 70% of students are non swimmers; grade 3, 40% now are non swimmers; grade 6, two are non swimmers; grade 8, one is a non swimmer; high school, two are non swimmers.

Several special events were held during the summer. Among these were a track and field day, treasure hunts, swimming meet, carnivals and water polo. Special games and peanut hunts were organized for the younger age group.

The athletic program consisted of sports and individual activities. Baseball and volleyball were played with Marlboro. Tennis instructions were given by Mrs. Pat Conway. Other individual activities such as horseshoes, boating, and canoeing proved to be very popular.

This summer the summer program worked in cooperation with the local Scout Troup. The following merit badges were passed; 6 in boating, 8 in swimming, 4 in canoeing, and 4 in life saving.

The staff wishes to express its thanks to all the people who contributed to the success of the program.

3. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

4. To choose agents, auditors and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

5. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers, auditors and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of any sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund, together with other income, the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

6. To see if the district will vote to accept any funds

which may become available through Federal school building aid.

7. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,750 to provide for necessary motorized valves for zoning the heating system in the older part of the school plant, to replace radiator valves, etc. and to correct the heating system at the Ripley Memorial Building.

## REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL OF THE TROY HIGH SCHOOL

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To the Superintendent of Schools:

In submitting my sixth report as principal of the Troy School System, I shall attempt to include some of the important developments and events during the past year. I am purposely making most phases of my report brief with the desire to devote more space to a specific area of school life, giving detailed information about one phase each year.

### General Report

The most important factor in any school program is the teaching staff, and I am happy to report that we continue to have highly qualified personnel in our system.

Some of the important developments, during the past year, which should be mentioned are: (a) Formation of a Troy Parent Teachers Association lead by President John Callahan. (b) Continued increase in enrollment, even above our estimates, which required help once more in grade one. (Enrollment of forty-three pupils.) (c) Increased enrollment of Fitzwilliam students in our high school making our student body larger. (d) Use of Audubon Society Program for the study of wildlife and conservation in grade six. (e) Program directed toward sending grade six pupils to Camp Sargent for a week of outdoor education. (f) Establishment of a school library with planned improvements. (g) Publication of monthly school paper by the Journalism class. (h) Continuation and improvement of our Halloween Festival. (i) Chartering of the Trojan Chapter of the National Honor Society. (j) Inclusion of five educational assemblies through School Assembly Service.

## SPECIAL READING

Special Reading began in Troy in 1951. The program was established to try to provide more individual help to pupils of grades 3-8. The present supervisor, Mrs. Elva Rawding, took over the program in 1952 and she has developed the program as outlined in the following paragraphs.

Factors considered in choosing pupils to be included in the program are: (a) results of standardized reading tests given to all pupils in grades 3-8. (b) results of group intelligence tests given to each. (c) physical factors such as eyes, hearing, speech, general health. (d) emotional and social life of each individual.

Once included in the program, each pupil is studied as an individual and measures taken to correct problems of reading. Sounds may be missing and they are corrected with drill and quick recognition. Common, much used

words may not have been mastered. Speech difficulties may need attention. Word beginning and word endings may not be known. Comprehension of what is being read may be lacking or it might be a problem pronunciation, reading phrases, or learning to follow punctuations.

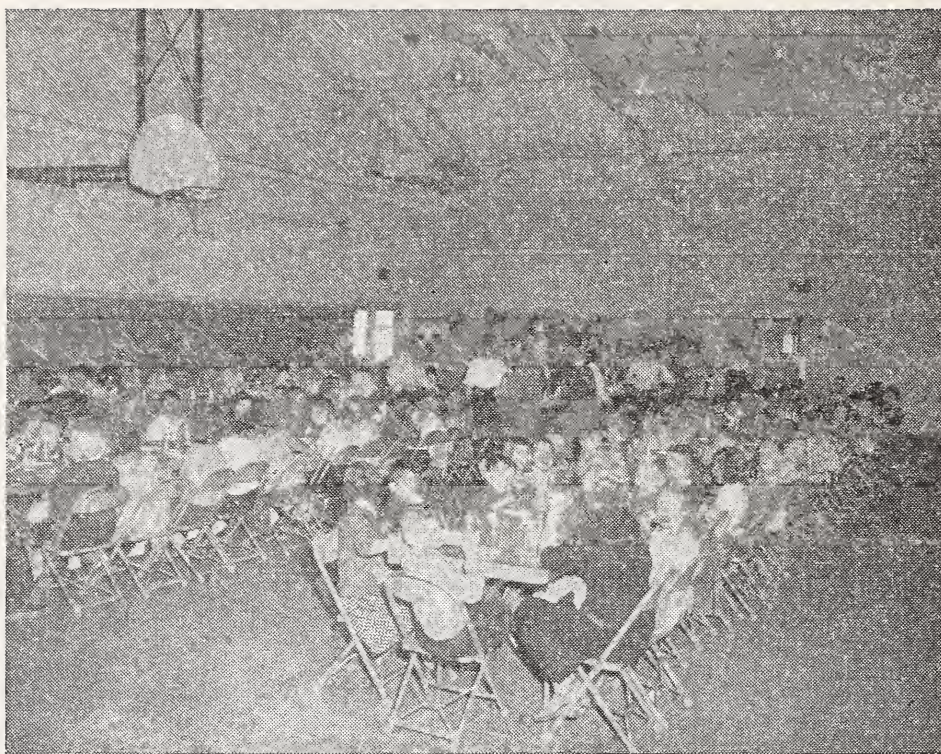
All children receive audience reading and a little choral reading. Reading is a skill and like any skill is developed only through continual practice. The best reader can improve. Children need advice, guidance, practice, and encouragement with their reading and this can be provided by both teacher and parent. Parents can help by listening with full attention a few minutes every day, allowing the child to "dig" at new words.

In Troy many parents report that children are reading on their own initiative. Regular teachers report that Special Reading pupils volunteer to read aloud in their classes.

Each Spring, all special reading students are retested with a different form of the reading test administered in the fall. Progress is measured in terms of years and months of reading. The average gain at Troy for 1955-56 was **one year and four months**. Some individuals improved much more than this average and some improved less.

At present there are sixty-eight pupils in this program with three Austrian boys who joined the class in the late fall. As refugees these boys have the personal problem of learning how to talk, read, and speak the English language. Mrs. Rawding, fortunately, is familiar with their language and has been working each day with them. Within three weeks each of these boys was able to read close to his own grade level.

Educational research indicates that a percentage of our school population will normally fall within the category of special reading problems, and that help will be needed from a program such as our "Special Reading" is trying to provide.

### **SCHOOL SAFETY PATROL**

During the 1955-56 school year the Troy School System was awarded a certificate of recognition by the State Department of Education for continued accident-free school days. This record has been maintained because of the School Safety Patrol which is organized under the direction of Mrs. Catherine Glenday. Members from the fifth and sixth grades receive lessons in safety and responsibility through this activity. Pupils assigned to the patrol are chosen for their leadership ability and sense of responsibility toward others. The school patrol has members on the playground, in the lunchroom and in the hallways. They also lead the pupils of grades one and two up through the town. It is the responsibility of the patrol to see that all pupils cross the streets safely, especially where traffic is known to be heavy. We certainly hope that our record will continue to be as good.

### **TROY SCHOOL ATHLETIC PROGRAM**

**1955-56**

Troy High School carries on a varsity sports program in track, cross country, basketball, and baseball, for the boys. The girls participate only in basketball, but do play volleyball as an intermural sport. It is significant to realize that 25 of 55 boys in high school actively participated in varsity and junior varsity basketball. These figures are gratifying evidence that in a small school such as ours, athletics is not confined to a select minority.

The 1955-56 boys basketball season turned out to be

the most successful ever. Troy won 16 regular season games, losing only 3. At the University of New Hampshire the Trojan played fine basketball, earning the right to play in the final where they bowed to Henniker by a 51-49 score.



**High School Boys' Physical Education Class held twice each week for each pupil. Mr. Silander head of department.**

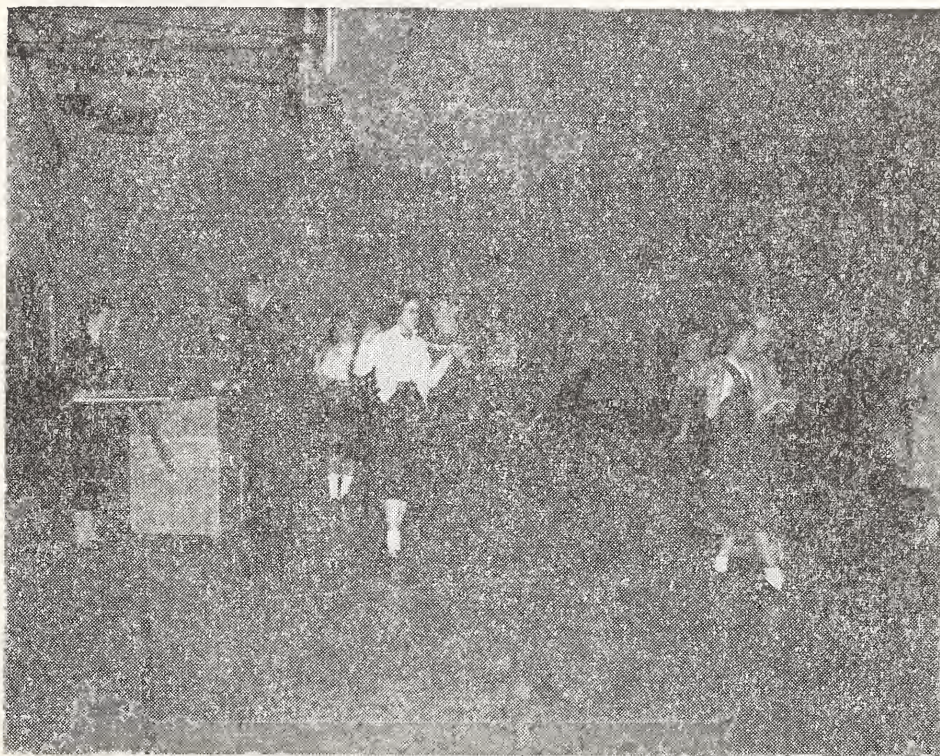
The baseball season proved even more successful. The Trojan qualified for the state championship playoffs and won the Class S championship by defeating Enfield, Andover, and Lisbon.

Interest in running which has sprung to life at Troy mainly because of the sensational high school running of the Johnsons, continues to be high as demonstrated by a turn out of twenty candidates for the X-country team. Many larger schools have had difficulty fielding a team.

As important as our varsity athletics at Troy is our Physical Education Program which now includes all boys and girls of grades 7-12. Each has the opportunity of participating twice each week. One extra period in the junior



high is devoted to co-educational physical education. The main objectives of our physical education program is the development of the individual (a) emotionally (b) physically (c) mentally (d) socially.

A highlight of the program has been the introduction of Folk Dancing which has become very popular due mainly to the leadership of Mr. Silander and Mrs. Whitham. Not only does this activity offer real growth and development, but it provides carry over values into adult life. Especially at the junior high school level it provides (a) healthy and social activities (b) co-ordination skills (c) social and emotional behavior in heterogeneous group. (d) better understanding of our own culture (e) better understanding of the peoples of other lands.

In closing I would like to express my frank opinion that Troy is continuing to improve as an educational institution mainly because of the attitude of cooperation in seeking the needs of our youth. Cooperation on the part

of the staff, the Troy School Board, you our superintendent, and the parents of our community, is the key to progress in education.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

---

The elementary school population of Troy has been growing rapidly for the past seven years, with grade enrollments approaching 40 pupils each year. Inevitably, this elementary growth will effect high school enrollments, and this year finds grade 9 of the high school with an enrollment of 36 pupils. Total high school enrollment in the coming year will exceed 100 pupils and will probably increase by at least 15 pupils each year. This growth means that attention must soon be given to the construction of two additional rooms for high school use.

Additional construction should not materially increase local tax costs, since Troy is now receiving through state building aid and tuition fees more money than the cost of the recent addition and the interest on the loan. The Troy district might well expect to be asked to consider the construction of two additional classrooms in the near future.

A major problem facing most school districts is that related to the retention of its teaching staff. As the supply of teachers decreases and the demand increases, out of state salary offers will attract our capable teachers unless steps are taken to provide a realistic salary schedule and improved policies in teacher employment. The school board is carefully considering the necessary steps to be taken to insure that Troy pupils have capable teachers.

One of the most promising developments in Troy's educational picture, is the rapid growth of the Troy Parent-Teacher Association and the helpful interest shown by this group in school affairs. The last school year has been a good one in the community. The pupils have shown good progress and are profiting from the enrichment of the educational program made possible by the enlarged school plant. Citizens of Troy owe a debt of gratitude to the entire

staff of the school and the local school board for their devotion to their jobs.

The motion was carried in the affirmative.

### Article 2

To determine and appoint the salaries of School Board Members and the truant officer, and to fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.

A motion by Mr. Fuller Ripley, a Member of the School Board, supported by Mr. Ernest Woodbury Jr., Member of the School Board, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$227.00 for Article 2.

The motion was carried in the affirmative.

## Article 3

A motion by Mr. Ernest Woodbury Jr., Member of the School Board, supported by Mr. George K. Ripley:

To accept the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen, as printed in the School District Report.

## Article 4

A motion by Mr. Fuller Ripley, Member of the School Board, supported by Mr. Calvin Cumings, Selectman, to pass over Article 4.

To choose agents, auditors and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

The motion was carried in the affirmative.

## Article 5

Mr. Roger Smith, Member of the School Board, explained the school budget. Mr. Calvin Cumings stated that it should be \$10.00 more on account of auditors.

Mr. George K. Ripley asked a question in regard to responsibility of the Reed children at Westmoreland.

Mr. Roger Smith, Member of the School Board, answered yes.

## Article 5

To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization funds together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

The above article has been revied by the State Tax Commission and meet the requirements of local school districts in securing the necessary appropriations of school district funds at the annual meeting.

## *Use it freely*

## *Care for it*

Your town dump has been set up for your personal convenience. It provides a suitable place where you can dispose of the large amounts of dangerous, inflammable waste material and other useless items which accumulate around your household and local stores, brush, etc., cut on your property. The town dump has become a valuable and indispensable asset in modern community life.

The most successful town dumps are supervised-regular days for their use and inflammable material consistently burned. The town dump which receives no attention, where waste material is scattered about without supervision of any description, soon becomes a community menace and a liability rather than an asset.

Many people still burn debris around their homes. A large number of such fires get out of control causing unnecessary damage and expense to the burner. Why burn at home? Make use of your dump and eliminate the hazard of burning. It will be easier for you—personally and financially.

If, however, you do burn on your premises

1. Secure a permit from your local forest fire warden—the law requires it. The warden won't refuse you if conditions are safe.
  2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning. Don't leave it.
  3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.
- Save yourself much possible difficulty.
