SELECTMEN'S REPORT

The continuing practice of printing a Selectmen's Report each year, not only by the present board, but by future boards, also, would seem to be highly desirable, and, perhaps, enlightening in some respects. However, with little or no comment on previous reports, it is difficult to gauge the public interest in this particular report, as opposed to, for instance, our Vital Statistics report, which appears to be carefully scrutinized. Let us know how you feel about our continuing our Selectmen's report.

TOWN MEETING

The business portion of our Town Meeting at which we discuss and vote upon the various articles in the Warrant, will be held Wednesday, March 9, 1960, at 7:30 P.M. at the Town Hall. This is in accordance with the wishes of those who attended the 1959 town meeting. It should be fully realized that the policy and the spending of money in town business is determined by *you*, the voters of the town of Windham. Speak up at Town Meeting! This is your chance to let off steam. We hope for a much larger attendance at our 1960 Town Meeting.

ROADS

Slowly, but surely our dirt roads are disappearing. As more roads are tarred, this is reflected in higher costs in tar, but it is to be hoped that the cost of maintenance for dirt roads will decrease in the next few years. Frankly, we frown on the practice of so-called "Specials" in our Town Warrant which are an added burden to the taxpayer. In a matter of some four or five years, all dirt roads that are essential, and of any value to the town as a whole, will be widened and tarred under our T. R. A. program. Mother Nature alone determines our snow removal cost.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

Credit should be given the members of our Fire Department for the saving of much valuable property over the years. Percentage-wise, it is our belief that fire losses are much less in Windham than in some other towns and cities

that boast of more modern and costly equipment. An article in the Warrant asking that one thousand dollars (\$1,000) be set aside each year for the next four or five years to replace worn-out or obsolete equipment, should meet with your approval.

POLICE DEPARTMENT

Much criticism has come to the attention of your board of Selectmen regarding the cost and conduct of this vitally essential department. It is our hope that these complaints can be taken care of in an orderly manner and that a permanent solution can be arrived at, if not at the 1960 Town Meeting, then definitely at the 1961 Town Meeting. As our town grows, so do our police problems, and law enforcement has reached the full time stage in Windham. Personalities and pressure, political or otherwise, must not enter in the solution of this problem, which, in the final analysis, affects every taxpayer in our town.

PLANNING AND ZONING

Credit must also be given members of the Planning and Zoning Board who have given so much of their time in establishing regulations that insure proper growth and orderly procedure in our community. The cooperation of every land owner is vital and necessary to insure their success. As was pointed out in last year's report, a rapid residential growth reflects on our school system, which in turn reflects on our tax rate. Ordinances to be presented at this year's Town Meeting should meet with your approval.

TOWN DUMP

In an effort to purchase land on the Spear Hill Road for a new dump site, it was discovered a large tract of land had been sold that might well turn into a speculative development. The need of planning and zoning was clearly shown to us, and it has not come too early, but it still left us without a new dump site. Anyone interested in selling land where water is available for a dump site, should contact the Selectmen.

LIBRARY

It is gratifying to know that the facilities of our Library are being taken advantage of more than ever before. Our able

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Windham on Tuesday, the 8th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To bring in your votes for the election of delegates at large; one delegate to the Constitutional Convention; alternate delegates at large, District delegates, alternate District delegates to the National Convention of the Democratic and Republican Parties to be held for the purpose of nominating party candidates for President and Vice-President of the United States.
3. To hear the reports of Auditors, agents and other Committees heretofore chosen, and pass any votes relating thereto.
4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
5. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Tax Collector's Deed.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Town officers' salaries.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Town officers' expenses.
8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Election and Registration.
9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Dog Officer and Damage by Dogs.
10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to defray the costs of Vital Statistics.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Street Lighting.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to defray the costs of Damages and Legal Expenses.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to pay for interest owed by the Town.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for insurance.

15. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Building and Zoning Ordinance as follows:

Amend Article II Building Regulations Zone A by striking out Section 1 and making Section 1 read:

Section 1. Residential lots in Zone A shall contain at least 25,000 square feet with a width of at least 150 feet at the 30 foot setback line from the street.

In Zone A the Recreational Zone, lots for summer camps in all subdivisions shall contain at least 15,000 square feet and a frontage of at least 100 feet. Such subdivisions shall have adequate access to the shore of a lake or pond in the form of a right of way with a shore frontage of two feet per lot in such subdivision.

and by striking out Section 2 and making Section 2 read:

Section 2. All buildings will be set back a minimum of 15 feet from side lot lines and 25 feet from front line or from shore of pond for shore lots, but the Building Inspector may allow variances of these setbacks when small lots are involved.

and by striking out Sections 4-5-6-7-8-9-10 in entirety and by adding a new Section 4 to read as follows:

Section 4. In Zone A a building may be erected, altered or used, and a lot may be used or occupied, only for the following purposes and in accordance with the following provisions:

a. Lodging houses, apartment houses, hotels, inns, motels, tourist courts, cabins, including such retail business within these permitted buildings as is conducted for the convenience of the residents or guests, shall be permitted.

b. Business and professional offices.

c. Other recreational activities, but these other recreational activities only under a special permit by the Board of Adjustment, which Board may refuse a permit if said activity is not in the best interests of the Town.

and by renumbering Sections 11-12-13 as 5-6-7.

Amend Article III Zone B by striking out Section 1 and inserting a new Section 1:

Section 1. a. All lots intended for residential purposes shall be at least 25,000 square feet in area for each family unit and shall have a minimum width of 150 feet at the 30 foot setback line.

b. All buildings will be set back a minimum of 15 feet from side lot lines and 30 feet from front line of lot.

c. No owner or occupant of land shall permit fire or other ruins to be left, but shall remove the same within one year.

and new Section 5:

Section 5. Nothing in this ordinance shall be construed to prevent the continuance of any existing use of land or buildings.

Amend Article IIIA The Limited Rural Zone by striking out Section 1 and inserting the following new Section 1:

Section 1. a. All lots intended for residential purposes shall be at least 25,000 square feet in area for each family unit and shall have a minimum width of 150 feet at the 30 foot setback line.

b. All buildings will be set back a minimum of 15 feet from side lot lines and 30 feet from front of lot.

c. No owner or occupant of land shall permit fire or other ruins to be left, but shall remove the same within one year.

and new Section 3:

Section 3. Nothing in this ordinance shall be construed to prevent the continuance of any existing use of land or buildings.

Delete Article IV entirely due to Subdivision Control.

Re-designate Article IIIA as Article IV.

Amend Article V Section 2 by adding the words: No permit will be issued however if in the opinion of the Board of Adjustment such a sign will be contrary to the best interests of the Town.

Amend Article V by adding new sections, as follows:

Section 4. There will be only one residential building per lot.

Section 5. Any lot in Zones B and C intended for a purpose other than residential must have the approval of the Planning Board as to Size of Lot, Parking Space available, and Setback Distance from front line. Farm Buildings are excluded from these restrictions.

Amend Article VII Enforcement, by striking out Sections 3-4-5-6 and inserting a new Section 3:

Section 3. After passage of this ordinance it shall be unlawful to erect, alter the bulk of, or relocate any dwelling, commercial building, trailer or mobile home, in any Zone, without first obtaining a building permit from the Board of Selectmen. Permits will also be required for small accessory buildings in Zone A, Recreational Zone. No permit for dwelling, commercial building, trailer or mobilehome shall be issued unless the plans and specifications are in accordance with State Laws and Regulations of the New Hampshire State Department of Health, and Town Ordinances and Regulations.

and inserting a new Section 4:

Section 4. A permit for a new structure will cost \$5.00. A permit for an addition or an alteration to an existing structure will cost \$3.00. All monies paid for building permits will be deposited in the Town Treasury.

Re-designate Section 7 as Section 5.

Amend Procedure Article by deleting Section 2 and inserting a new Section 2:

Section 2. The application properly filled out will be submitted to the Selectmen for approval.

and by deleting Section 3 and inserting a new Section 3:

Section 3. If an objection is raised the application must be submitted to the Planning Board for approval or rejection. If a variance is required the application must be sent to the Board of Adjustment for action.

Section 4 remains the same as the former Section 3.

Section 4. If approved, the application must be posted in two public places for a period of five days.

Section 5 takes the place of the former Section 4.

Section 5. If no complaint is heard, the permit will then be granted.

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual examination and audit of the accounts of the Town of Windham for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1959, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the Town. Exhibits as hereafter listed are included as part of the report.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk and Trustees of Trust Funds.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Comparative Balance Sheets—December 31, 1958-December 31, 1959: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1958 and December 31, 1959, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein, the Surplus increased by \$5,137.66 in 1959.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibit A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition of the Town during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein. These were as follows:

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures—Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 & A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1959, are presented

in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a revenue surplus of \$2,576.30, plus a net unexpended balance of appropriations of \$591.63, resulted in a net budget surplus of \$3,167.93.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1959, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1959, is indicated in Exhibit B-2.

Statement of Long Term Indebtedness: (Exhibit F)

A statement of outstanding long term indebtedness as of December 31, 1959, showing annual debt service requirements, is contained in Exhibit F.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depository banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the Collector's records. The amounts of uncollected and unredeemed taxes as indicated in this report are therefore subject to any changes which may be necessitated by the return of verification notices.

GENERAL COMMENTS

Current Surplus:

The current surplus (excess of total assets over current liabilities) increased by \$3,137.66, from \$10,364.72 to \$13,502.38 during 1959, as shown herewith:

Town Treasurer's Surety Bond:

It is recommended that the surety bond of the Town Treasurer be increased from \$10,000.00 to \$15,000.00, in order that the amount of the bond may be more commensurate with the amount of funds in the custody of the Treasurer.

The provisions of Chapter 184 of the Laws of 1955, require that this report of the summary of findings and recommendations (letter of transmittal) shall be published in the next annual report of the Town.

FIRE WARDEN'S REPORT

PREVENTION IS EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS

The year 1959 was fortunate from a forest fire standpoint. New Hampshire had the best record in the nation. Fewer acres were burned, suppression costs were substantially reduced and damage to woodlands held to a minimum. The record resulted from a combination of favorable weather conditions, an alert warden service and a cooperating public.

Yet, despite all this, there still persists a disturbing note. 58%, or 6 out of every 10 fires in 1959 were caused by careless smokers and debris burners; 10%, or one out of every 9 fires was caused by children.

Careless, indifferent, thoughtless and independent-minded individuals and failure of parents to properly supervise children and keep matches out of their reach, annually cause these unnecessary fires which cost large sums to extinguish and cause extensive damage. The elimination of these three causes of fires would radically change this picture. The rules are simple:

1. Before burning, secure a permit from your local forest fire warden—the law requires it.
2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning.
3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.
4. Don't throw lighted matches, cigars and cigarettes from moving vehicles—use your ash tray.
5. Don't burn at home—use your town dump and save yourself much possible difficulty, both personal and financial.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the school district in the town of Windham, N. H. qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 5th day of March, 1960 at 1:00 o'clock in the afternoon until 3 o'clock in the afternoon, and as much longer thereafter as the School District, at the opening of the meeting may vote.

1. To choose a Moderator for the ensuing year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a member of the school board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
6. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
7. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate to paint the exterior of Searles School and pass any vote relating thereto.
8. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate to provide hot water at the lavatories and pass any vote relating thereto.
9. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate, said sum to be placed with the trustees of trust funds until sufficient monies are accumulated to repaint the Tower section of the Searles School and pass any vote relating thereto.

10. To see if the district will authorize the school board to enter into contractual agreements with other schools and/or school districts to provide for the secondary education of Windham pupils and pass any vote relating thereto.

11. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept on behalf of the district any or all grants or other funds for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government or from the State of New Hampshire.

12. To see if the district will authorize the appointment of a committee to study the elementary housing in the district and report back to an adjourned meeting to be held in the fall.

13. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate to build an addition to the Center School and in order to raise this sum to authorize the school board to issue bonds or notes upon the credit of the district in accord with the Municipal Finance Act and special acts governing the issuing of bonds or notes and to further authorize the school board to fix the time and place of payment of such bonds and notes, the rate of interest thereon and to provide for the sale thereof and pass any vote relating thereto.

14. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

ENROLLMENT

The average enrollment per grade is 24. The average class size is 32 per teacher. The elementary enrollment has increased 22 since 1957. The secondary enrollment has increased by 17.

Articles in the warrant provide an opportunity to meet the enrollment problem which seems to be imminent. Availability of land will certainly result in a population surge in the near future.

There were two changes in personnel. Mrs. Marion Kezer and Mr. John Bone resigned for professional advancement. Although it is regrettable to lose capable people, we also are pleased to have had the services of these teachers over the period they served the children of Windham. We were fortunately able to secure experienced replacements for both. The pressure of higher salaries elsewhere is beginning to be felt in our area. Our proximity to the Massachusetts border with minimums established by statute creates serious competition for teacher services.

The Conant report for secondary schools has made an impact on, and a contribution to, education. It is interesting to know that present plans contemplate similar studies at junior high and elementary level. The criteria developed as

a result of these studies will enable the district to gain an objective measurement of the educational program.

The teachers continue to indicate a desire to improve themselves and the service they can render to children. Two are currently enrolled in an extension course at Derry concerned with the teaching of science in the elementary school. Others enrolled in summer school programs. The teachers also were able to attend a music workshop held at Derry. All of these activities tend to increase the value of teacher services to children.

The same special educational services were continued. The Rinehart handwriting system under the guidance of a specially trained handwriting supervisor is advantageous to all of the children. Musical instruction under the capable direction of Mrs. Kelley provides an activity that may have vocational value but quite definitely has great avocational value.

The science kits purchased for both schools will, with the assistance of the science course, prove to be of great value at all levels. The wise expenditure of National Defense Funds can make the science program much more valuable. The use of the funds is not limited too strictly and a science library of some extent can be one of the outcomes of this program.

There is an increase of approximately \$4,000 in the operational budget. Two items, teachers salaries and transportation, account for by far the major portion of the increase. The transportation increase is due to greater expense than anticipated in providing high school transportation. The teachers salary item is almost self explanatory. The competition for the services of qualified teachers makes it necessary to have salaries that will attract and hold personnel of high quality.

There are several articles that involve special monies to accomplish special purposes. These improvements are submitted in this way so that the district itself can express its views in regard to the suggested improvements.

The attitude of all concerned with the educational welfare of children in the district is conducive to an all out

effort on the part of the professional staff. Teachers and administrators welcome the opportunity to work with and for boys and girls in such a climate.

REPORT OF THE HELPING TEACHER

Curriculum development and classroom visits are two of the areas of the work for the helping teacher. Both areas are attempts to help the pupils obtain a better education and that is the general aim of the position. These are the only areas to be discussed in this report.

CURRICULUM — Classroom observations and the study of standardized test results are made each year along with a study of the needs of the youngsters. The results show the areas of study in which we must strive for improvements. We determined that certain basic minimum standards should be met in each subject and issued copies of these standards to all teachers. These may be revised after working with them for a year. Curriculum bulletins, notes, or units were developed for English in grades 7 and 8, history and geography in grades 4, 5, and 8 and grade 6 nutrition. Film-strips and films are available on loan, and monthly bulletins are issued to all teachers. Science guides were distributed to building principals in an effort to eliminate some duplication in science demonstrations and to help develop a stronger program in the basic units.

CLASSROOM VISITS — As in previous years, most of the school day is spent in the various classrooms of the supervisory union. All classrooms are visited, but those with teachers who are new to the system or in grades in which special curriculum work is being attempted, and those with special problems receive a greater number of visits. Visits to classrooms are made primarily to be of service to the teacher by helping her in her program, lesson plans, methods, curriculum problems, enrichment materials, special problems, demonstration lessons, and testing. Though they

serve several purposes, the visits are made with the aim of the position in mind. I do not wish to imply that the work in the classroom is poorly done. One way of judging the results is with standardized tests and the average of class media in our schools has been better than the standards set for national norms, and the teachers have been handicapped with double grades.
