THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Allenstown, in the County of Merrimack, in the said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the New Opera House in said Allenstown on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- ARTICLE 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same. Voted to raise \$6,250.00.
- ARTICLE 3. To bring in your votes for the election of Delegates-at-Large, Alternate Delegatesat-Large, District Delegates, Alternate District Delegates to the National Conventions of the Democratic and Republican parties, to be held for the purpose of nominating party candidates for President and Vice-President of the United States.
- ARTICLE 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy-five dollars for the purpose of securing the services of the Suncook Union Cornet Band for a series of free concerts. Adopted.

- ARTICLE 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five dollars for the observance of Memorial Day. Adopted.
- ARTICLE 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the necessary amount of money to secure State Aid for the permanent improvement of Main Highways. Adopted.
- ARTICLE 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars for the maintenance of State Highways. Adopted.
- ARTICLE 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven hundred dollars for the maintenance of State Highways, the same to be applied to trunk line maintenance. Adopted.
- ARTICLE 9. To see if the town will vote to build a sidewalk on Granite Street, extending from the residence of William Drought to that of John Martel, and raise and appropriate money therefor. Adopted. Voted to raise \$250.00.
- ARTICLE 10. To see if the town will accept the Reserve Street, so called, that leads from the South side of School street to Cross street in said town of Allenstown. Accepted.

- ARTICLE 11. To see if the town will vote to fix and determine the salaries of its officers. Voted to fix the salaries of the officers as follows: 1st Selectman, (Chairman) \$300.00; 2nd Selectman, (Commissioner of Charities) \$200.00; 3rd Selectman, (clerk) \$150.00; Tax Collector, \$250.00; Town Clerk, \$50.00; Town Treasurer, \$60.00
- ARTICLE 12. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- ARTICLE 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting. Ralph Hayes was re-elected for a term of three years, Trustee of the Cemetery Fund.

SCHOOL REPORT

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens:

I herewith submit my twelfth annual report of the schools of Allenstown.

There were maintained during the year three schools for a school year of 36 weeks with no change in the teaching force.

The school enrollment was 62, (32 boys and 30 girls) with a daily average attendance of 92.63 per cent, a small loss from last year's attendance.

The schools were in session on an average 344.66 halfdays, showing a loss from last year of 1.34 half-days.

The schools are in a wholesome condition being well supplied with text-books, scholars-supplies and other equipment.

Domestic Science and Manual Training

These branches of educational work have been well taught by Edna Benware as instructor of domestic science and Evelyn Blackwood as instructor of manual training. For detailed information of the work accomplished your attention is called to the reports which follow.

THE SCHOOL HOME

The school home is an important factor in the education of the child and should leave a lasting impression upon the mind for good character and citizenship.

The school building should be sanitary, comfortable, well lighted, ventilated and heated and located on a lot large enough to afford wholesome health exercises and games. To secure there benefits it is necessary to have the active cooperation of the citizens, especially at the annual district meeting when the appropriations are made.

The expenditures for the support and maintenance of schools have increased but in no greater ratio than personal, business and other public expenditures.

HEALTH INSPECTION

Health inspection has been conducted yearly, defects noted and cards sent to parents telling them of these defects and urging remedial treatment. A few of the parents have heeded this advice and had these defects corrected, benefiting the child both as to health and to learning ability. The greater number of parents apparently pay no attention to these cards as the pupils return with adenoids, decayed teeth and enlarged tonsils.

If the danger of these defects to the child's physical and mental welfare is understood by the parents, it would seem that they would seek proper medical treatment.

Adenoids and bad tonsils are sources of dangerous diseases and are directly responsible for the backwardness of many pupils.

Many children have defective vision, which the medical inspector notes on the cards. Parents should be anxious to provide properly fitted glasses for such, as eye-strain causes headaches and affects the nervous system and general health of the child.

Of 432,000 school children who were examined in one of the New England states more than one in five had defective vision.

TEACHERS' MEETINGS

The teachers' meetings held during the year have been well attended. At one meeting Commissioner E. W. Butterfield gave his interesting lecture on the Law of Heredity; at another Supt. Morris of Manchester and Assistant Supt. Walker of Concord talked on the Standardized Tests. Both speakers interested and instructed the teachers. Their talks were especially helpful at that time as the teachers were about to use the "Curtis Standard Practice Tests" in Arithmetic.

I have found the teachers industrious and working for the best interest of the pupils.

Report Cards

I would urge the parents to examine carefully the report cards brought home by their children and to confer with the teacher upon any item on the card not understood. These cards are a record of the child's attendance, conduct, effort and scholarship.

Parents and citizens are cordially invited to visit the schools frequently that they may get an accurate knowledge of the work of the school room.

In conclusion I express my appreciation for your cooperation and assistance.

DOMESTIC SCIENCE

MR. HENRY S. ROBERTS, Superintendent of Schools:

The work in the Domestic Science course for the year from September, 1923, to June, 1924, was fairly successful. As the girls were undertaking something new to them, the classes were a little slow at the beginning, but as their enthusiasm grew I found that we were getting much better results.

Thanks to the hearty co-operation of the parents in providing working materials for the pupils, we had no delays on that account.

We began the year with twelve pupils, but as two of the girls soon became sixteen years old, we had, most of the time ten girls in the two classes of cooking and sewing.

In cooking we began with the fundamental principles of mixing ingredients. I based the work on practicability without much theory. The girls worked on the standpoint of using knowledge gained in lessons in their home-work. In fact I gave them credit for cooking and sewing done at home.

We cooked dishes used for breakfast and supper, having for our viewpoint the method of serving the most delicious and wholesome foods at lowest cost. During the cold winter months the girls cooked recipes that could be served to those children who have to bring cold dinners to school. They made corn chowder, tomato bisque, cocoa, vegetable stews and others of the like nature.

Grouping the cooking lessons around some particular meal, at the last year, the girls served to each other an entire meal. Two were host and hostess, two cooks, two waitresses, two housekeepers, and two second girls. We had drills on table setting, serving of food and care of the kitchen.

For outside work, the pupils read articles on housekeeping, Indian, Colonial, and modern methods of cookery. Also, they drew a plan of their ideal kitchen with the best "routing lines." Afterwards these plans were discussed in class.

In sewing we began with simple stitches, such as basting, running, over hand and darning stitches. The girls made a few samples but most of the work was done on their every day clothes or articles practical to use, as button bags. For samples to hand in they made a darned patch, an over-hand patch, a flat seam, and a button hole. For projects they made cooking caps and aprons using flat or French seams and the over-hand and running sitches. Toward Christmas they made a few Christmas presents, mostly in the line of bags. Later they worked on undergarments, each girl choosing the garment she desired to make. All patterns were simple. Each pupil had to cut, baste, and sew her own project. Also, mending and remodeling of clothes, especially underwear this year, was a part of the course. Another year I hope to do more in the line of outside garments but this year I felt it necessary that the pupils learn through practice to sew even stitches and straight seams.

It is my desire at this time to thank all the parents, the School Board and the Superintendent for their interest and assistance.

Classes in Manual Training were not started until November. These classes consisted of boys from the sixth, seventh, and eighth grades. Two-hour periods each week were given over to the manual work.

The first few weeks oral lectures were given, explaining the use and care of the different tools which were to be used during the year. Before starting any projects the boys practiced using these tools.

The first project to be made were the shelf, including the wooden braces. Next the class made small tables and plant boxes. Baseball bats, bird houses, checker boards, magazine stand, medicine cabinet, coat rack and coat hangers were other projects made during the school year.

During the year that ended in June, 1924, your music supervisor feels that a higher standard was reached than ever before. In every class the pupils seemed to appreciate the better class of music and in every grade from the third through the eighth a test in musical memory was given, the selections in nearly every case being a classic. At the graduation, Sullivan's "The Lost Chord," Beethoven's "The Heavens Resound," Offenbach's "Barcarolle" from "The Tales of Hoffman," the Russian folksong "A Vesper Hymn," were rendered in a manner that showed that the singers appreciated the best things in music.

An operetta, "Twilight Alley," was given during National Music Week, and an opportunity was afforded the participants to display their musical and dramatic ability not only, but their executive as well in stage management and in making stage properties and costumes. Miss Blackwood's class contributed much enjoyment to the entertainment with their toy orchestra selections and folk dances. The operetta was given by the pupils of Mrs. Wattles and Mrs. Benware and to these teachers as well as to Miss Blackwood, I am indebted for the success of this occasion and truly appreciate the fact that I have had the co-operation of a very efficient, music-loving corps of teachers during the past year.

Through the spring months all of the classes have occasionally written couplets appropriate to the several months and have then set them to original music. So we have tried to train the eye to read, the ear to hear, the voice to sing, the mind to understand, the heart to love, the hand to write and even the feet to march and dance to good music.
