4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for removal of snow.
5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of Evergreen Cemetery.
6. To see if the town will accept State aid for Class V roads and raise and appropriate money for same.
7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary in anticipation of taxes.
8. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for State Aid roads and raise and appropriate money for same.

9. To see if the town will vote to buy 500 feet of 1½ inch hose and raise and appropriate money for same.

10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the control of White Pine Blister Rust.

11. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road leading from the Francestown Road to the Collins place, known as the Collins road.

12. To see what action the town will take in regard to voting for all Town Officers under the Australian Ballot System.

13. To see how much money the town will raise for statutory requirements and to carry the articles and the appropriations of the school district into effect.

#### General Discussion

Last June nine boys and girls were promoted from the eighth grade to the high school. Five boys and girls completed the tenth grade of the local high school. Closing exercises were held in the town hall by the boys and girls of the eighth grade under direction of the teachers and the music supervisor. The exercises consisted of musical numbers, class parts, an address by the superintendent of schools, and the presentation of diplomas by Mr. Philip Knowles, chairman of the school board.

Every member of last year's eighth grade is in high school, and four of the five who finished the tenth grade entered the upper grades at Peterboro and Hillsboro high schools.

This year we observed National Education Week for the first time. The occasion was observed before a large audience in the town hall, with an exhibit of school work in which every grade of the elementary and high schools took part. The superintendent of schools gave the history of this national institution, and also spoke of the necessity of further broadening the opportunities for a greater measure of educational advantages for all types of children.

Midyear examinations have been given in the elementary schools. It is gratifying to be able to report that the results are most satisfactory. The teachers and the superintendent would be pleased to talk over the results of the tests with any interested parents. Similar examinations will be given in the high school soon.

A number of Bennington children attend high school at Hillsboro where they have advantages of Home Economics, Commerce, Industrial Arts, as well as the traditional courses, all of which departments are equipped with abundant modern equipment. The fact that Bennington is in the same supervisory union as Hillsboro gives the superintendent an opportunity to better understand the children's abilities and interests, and thus cater to their needs.

The superintendent has given a substantial amount of time to the schools of Bennington as well as to those

of seven other school districts in our supervisory union, by public addresses, by frequent school visits, by attendance at monthly board meetings, by securing the necessary text books and supplies, and by holding teachers' meetings. The work of our teachers is commendable. The schools are running smoothly and efficiently. The thanks of all are due the school board who have left no stone unturned to provide elementary and secondary education for the children of the school district economically and at the same time on progressive principles.

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### BENNINGTON SCHOOL NURSE'S REPORT

The routine inspection of each pupil began with the opening of the school year for detection of skin and scalp diseases, defective teeth and vision, diseased tonsils, posture and general hygiene.

Sixty-eight school visits were made since the last report. Five treatments were made in school for sores and minor injuries. Forty-two home visits were made following up defects, explaining how to care for and treat communicable diseases, and encouraging parents to take advantage of the clinics to have their children's defects corrected.

The Tuberculosis Association now conducts skin testing clinics, for diagnostic purposes, in a limited number of

high schools each year. It involves a great deal of work; however, if a sufficient number of pupils apply for the test, we are in hopes that Bennington will be included in this year's list.

The Cod Liver Oil and the milk provided for the better nutrition of the children by the federal administration is no longer available. However, it is hoped that some Cod Liver Oil will be provided by the community.

It is also very important that the children have an adequate supply of milk to drink and parents are urged to make every effort to see that 4 glasses be allowed each child daily. Besides Calcium for the growth and development of teeth and bone, milk supplies many other elements of a healthful diet. It is always a good investment when very little money can be spent for food. A glass of milk with each meal, a serving of fruit daily, a variety of vegetable, dark and white bread with butter, eggs, two or three a week, and some light dessert furnishes the constituents for a fairly well balanced diet for young children. Where children are not making normal gain in weight, more nourishing food may be advisable, also more rest. The advice of your physician should be obtained.

If enough people want dental work done to have a dentist come to the school we may decide to have a clinic as usual.

I wish to thank the teachers and school officials, parents and pupils for the interest and co-operation they have shown in the health work.
