REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD.

The School Board of the Bow School District herewith submit for your consideration their report for the school year 1892.

We have endeavored to give the condition of our schools in the plainest manner possible, avoiding all needless suggestions. We think our teachers have been faithful, conscientious, and generally efficient. We have endeavored to secure the services of teachers of experience as far as practicable, and to retain those whose services we considered beneficial. It would be gratifying to report better progress in the art of reading. Good readers are still the exception. Indistinct, feeble tones, improper position, inflection, and emphasis continue to characterize too many readers, although there are exceptions worthy of mention.

The teaching of mental arithmetic does not receive the attention it deserves. It should be thoroughly taught to the older as well as to the younger pupils.

Increased attention should be given to the study of physiology, especially in reference to the effects of narcotics and stimulants. This instruction, which may be oral, has not, we think, been taught by some of our teachers sufficiently to meet the requirements of our school laws.

The evil of irregular attendance continues to a needless extent, and serves to impair the usefulness of our schools. It is a source of vexation to our teachers, and to those scholars who desire to progress in their studies. The conduct of parents who allow children to remain at home on the slightest pretext cannot be too severely condemned. This evil cannot be remedied by the school board without the hearty co-operation of parents.

The school-house at South Bow has been completed. It

is a substantial, well-built house. The builder, Mr. Robert M. Ordway, deserves great credit for the manner in which he has performed his contract. New outbuildings have been erected at South Bow, at the Bog, and also at the White school. The school-house at North Bow is old, dilapidated, and unfit for use. It is not worth repairing. We urgently recommend that a sufficient sum be raised, with which to build a new house in that vicinity. The Bog school-house has been moved to a central location, and has been repaired as much as the amount of the appropriation would allow. As a matter of economy we recommend that it be painted, and some inexpensive repairs be made on several other houses.

The unoccupied school-house known as the "Upper Bog," and the Baker school-house, have been sold; and we would recommend that the District No. 2 school-house, which it is evident will never be available for school purposes, be sold, and also the old house at North Bow, as soon as a new one can be supplied in place of it.

The money which was due District No. 2 at the time of the adoption of the town system, and which has laid in the town treasury several years, has been expended by having a school at the town house in the early part of winter, thus giving an opportunity for the children in what was formerly District No. 2 a chance to benefit by it.

It having come to the knowledge of the school board that a sum of money which was in the possession of what was formerly District No. 6 at the time of the adoption of the town system of school had not been paid over to the proper authority, an inquiry was made, and it was found that District No. 6 had not expended the literary fund that was formerly divided among the several districts, but had allowed it to accumulate by investing it in notes and mortgages, in direct violation of the law, and that it is now in the possession of Cyrus Colby, where it was placed by vote of the district. Mr. Colby expresses a desire to pay the money whenever he is satisfied as to who is the proper person to receive it. We had hoped to have settled the matter before the annual school-meeting.

BOW MILLS.

Spring and Fall terms were taught by Evelyn B. Burroughs. This is a school requiring a great deal of hard work, and we think Miss Burroughs proved her ability to do it, and do it well.

NORTH BOW.

Spring term, Myra L. Page, teacher.

This was her first attempt at teaching. She worked hard for the success of her school. Good improvement was made.

Fall term, Clara M. Eaton, teacher.

During this term a lot of new scholars came in, which made it more interesting. Good order prevailed, and the school closed showing that good results had been accomplished.

WHITE SCHOOL.

Spring and Fall terms were taught by Eva M. Colby.

In this school the teacher was on the most pleasant terms with her scholars. The school was orderly, and marked progress was made, particularly by the younger pupils. The prevalence of diphtheria in one family, and the death of one of the pupils, had a tendency to somewhat impair the usefulness of the fall term.

RIVER ROAD.

Spring and Fall terms taught by Winnie E. Davis, of Hooksett. Miss Davis labored earnestly for the advancement of her pupils and with good success. The examination at the close of each term showed a thoroughness and familiarity with the lessons taught seldom seen in our small schools.

BOG.

Spring and Fall schools were in charge of Lizzie A. Hammond, of Bow. Miss Hammond preserved excellent order, and we think labored for the best interests of her pupils; but irregular attendance greatly hindered her efforts in their behalf. Many parents neglect to send their children constantly, the only way to make our schools the success they should be.

SOUTH BOW.

Spring term, Clara M. Eaton, teacher. Good improvement was made this term and good order prevailed.

Fall term, Ida L. Lake, teacher. Miss Lake brought a good deal of enthusiasm into the school. She soon gained the good will of the scholars and parents. The examination was exceptionally good. It seemed impossible that so much could be accomplished in thirteen weeks. Miss Lake is a fine teacher.

BROWN HILL.

Emma Putney, teacher of spring and fall terms. Good order was maintained, and the school showed at the close of the terms that both teacher and scholars had done their work well.

WOOD HILL.

Spring and Fall terms taught by Edwin A. Colby. of this town. Mr. Colby is well known as a teacher, and is qualified to teach a good school. We have no hesitation in pronouncing this school as much of a success as was possible, where the scholars were so few in number, and the attendance so irregular.

BOW CENTER.

A winter term of seven weeks was taught by Emma Putney, in order to expend a sum of money that was in the treasury of the old school district. The parents in this vicinity showed their appreciation of Miss Putney's ability as a teacher by causing their children to attend at a considerable inconvenience to themselves, and we think they were well paid for their efforts.
