THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

*To the Inhabitants of the Town of Candia in the County of
Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town
Affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Candia on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for Memorial day.
4. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for the Smyth Public Library.
5. To see how much money the town will vote to raise for roads and bridges including snow removal and genenal expense.
6. To see if the town will vote to appropriate \$541.37 for the improvement of Class V roads, to which the state will contribute \$2,165.51 or, vote to appropriate \$864.00 for the construction of the Class II highway on the Chester Road to which the state will contribute \$1,728.00 and raise money for the one selected.
7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to spend the income from the Henry Moore Fund on

the Chester Road, until such time as it is accepted by the State Highway Department as a Class II or State Aid highway.

8. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of money sufficient to maintain the street lights for the ensuing year.

9. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen and treasurer to negotiate temporary loans in anticipation of taxes.

10. To see what action the town will take relative to renewing long term notes.

11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250.00) to be used for the maintenance of fire apparatus and equipment of the Candia Firemen's Association, Inc., the money to be expended under the direction of said Firemen's Association.

12. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax collector's deeds.

13. To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act.

14. To see if the town will vote to charge interest on poll taxes after October 1st.

15. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on early payment of taxes, and if so, to fix the time and rate.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise \$100.00 for white pine blister rust control as a relief measure to be spent in co-operation and under the supervision of the state forestry department.

17. To see if the town will vote to accept that portion of the budget not already acted upon, and appropriate money for the same.

18. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
