

To the inhabitants of the Town of Clarksville in the County of Coos in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Clarksville on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

By Ballot or Major Vote-

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges in anticipation of taxes.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's deeds.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for construction of Secondary Highways, said aid to be expended on West Road so-called, from end of T. R. A. road completed in 1941 toward the Hollow Road and raise and appropriate, or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$784.50, or will accept State Aid

for construction of T. R. A. roads, so-called, and raise and appropriate or set aside the sum of \$191.45.

6. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Superintendent's Report

To the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of the Clarksville School District:

FOREWARD

This report is being made at a time when the world is engaged in a great struggle between the democracies and the totalitarian states in which the avowed purpose of the totalitarian governments is the complete annihilation of democracy and the democratic way of life.

We need not review the international situation leading to the bold attack upon the United States. Our nation is arming to defend itself.

America must be strong—strong to meet the thrust against her way of life from armed aggressors; strong to solve her own domestic problems by peaceful democratic means. To the building of a stronger America the schools of the Nation are dedicated. By patient processes of instruction and training they seek to develop in the youth of the land those essential knowledges and skills and that devotion to our democratic way of life which make for national strength and unity.

In this time of crisis the North Country stands ready—ready to give of its youth and resources and ready to do its part in training boys and girls to preserve for the world at least one nation where freedom and liberty for mankind survive.

Teachers

The Teachers this year are: Grammar Room, Ruth Robie; Primary Room, Ruth Weeks, and Music Marjorie Fitts.

Health

Now more than ever, due to war conditions and the impending food rationing, nutrition is all important to adults and children. Especially to children as their growth and development is so dependent upon well balanced meals. A child in good physical condition is less likely to develop defects than the one that is undernourished. The N. H. State Board of Health offers pamplhets on nutrition, planning well balanced meals, food purchases and the amounts and varieties needed for a family. These pamphlets are very helpful and free for the asking.

During the early summer the State Department of Child Health will sponsor an infant and preschool clinic. Parents are urged to bring their children for a thorough examination and Diphtheria Toxoid, if desired. This clinic is given free of charge and parents should avail themselves of this opportunity. Physical defects occurring in early life can be detected and corrected before the child reaches school age.

Notes on the Budget

The school board's total budget for 1942-43 is \$6,237.00 as compared with \$6,560.00 for last year. The budget is reduced by an estimated income of

\$922.27 so that the requested appropriation is \$5,314.73. This is a reduction of \$280.43.

To be able to ask for less money in view of the sharp increase in expenses is quite noteworthy.

Buildings and Equipment

The school building is in very good condition. In the basement the sills were boxed in, a ceiling installed on the girls' side and all the walls redecorated. The spring was completely rehoused. A new flag pole was erected in the school yard.

I hope that some day the voter will wish to provide some playground equipment.

Enrollment and Attendance

There are now 32 enrolled in the two rooms. This is six less than at this time a year ago and a drop of 16 over a two year period.

The series of epidemics is reflected in our percentage of attendance record. The percen for the building was 93.18. There were 26 cases of tardiness, 20 in the Grammar Room and 6 in the Primary.

Tuition

During the school year 1940-41 there were four pupils attending High School at Pittsburg. We now have twelve attending there. We have but one in the Senior Class and there are three in our eighth grade, so it is reasonable to expect that the number will be as large, if not larger, in the High School next year.

Conclusion

It is always gratifying to note the regard that individual citizens and local organizations have for their schools. Your interest in the well being of the entire school system, your support and your cooperation are most cheering.

I take this opportunity to again express my appreciation to the members of the school board, parents, teachers and friends for the interest and support they have given to the schools during the past year.
