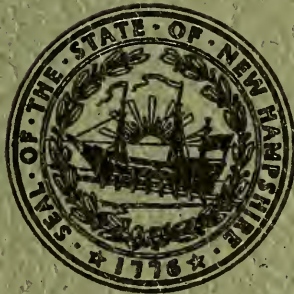


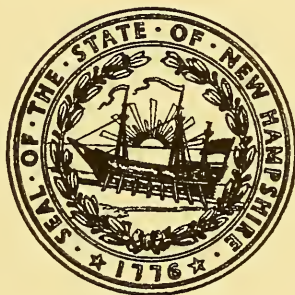

# TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE      CARROLL, SS.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Conway, County of  
Carroll, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House at  
Center Conway, New Hampshire, March 9, 1943, at nine  
o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

ART. 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers.

ART. 2. To see what sum of money the Town will vote  
to raise and appropriate for the following purposes:

*Section A* Town Officers' Salaries

B Town Officers' Expenses

C Election and Registration

D Municipal Court

E Town Hall and Office Expense

F Damage and Legal

G Police Department

H Fire Department

I Health Department

J Vital Statistics

K Town Maintenance of Highways (Summer)

L Town Maintenance of Highways (Winter)

M Libraries

N Town Poor

O Old Age Assistance

P Soldiers' Aid

Q Memorial Day

R Parks and Playgrounds

T Interest on Bonds and Temporary Loans

U County Tax

ART. 3 To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to distribute the blank inventories at the time they examine and appraise the property to be taxed.

ART. 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire upon the credit of the Town the sum of \$60,000.00 if needed.

ART. 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's Deeds during the present fiscal year.

ART. 6 To see if the Town will vote to increase the rate of wage \$.10 per hour for labor upon highways.

ART. 7. To see if the Town will vote to accept Town Road Aid and raise and appropriate the sum of \$899.08 for that purpose.

ART. 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to purchase additional land for the Green Hill Cemetery. Agreeable to a petition signed by Mabel H. Smith and others.

ART. 9. To see if the Town will vote to accept a gift of roadside trees on the Perkins Lot so-called, located on the White Mountain Highway between Conway and North Conway, provided the trees are acquired by the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire forests, and offered by the Society to the Town.

ART. 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for Civilian Defense, agreeable to a petition signed by George Knox, L. T. Savard and others.

ART. 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Promotional Publicity to be expended and accounted for by the Eastern Slope Region, Inc. Agreeable to a petition signed by Richard Church and others.



ART. 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to apply on the existing deficit.

ART. 13. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for a clerk for the Tax Collector.

ART. 14. To see what action the voters wish to take in regard to the adoption of the Town Manager form of government. Agreeable to a petition signed by Stetson Archibald and others.

ART. 15. To act upon any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## Forest Fire Warden's Report

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As the tempo of America's war effort mounts, demands upon its citizens for service become more numerous and exacting. To some comes the call to arms; others to public service and still others to defense industries and organizations. No one can possibly escape if he would. All must bear a proportionate share of the burden and the sacrifice. Strong first line fronts on land, sea and in the air are needed and can be developed and maintained only if there is unity of purpose and common determination behind the home front.

As men are drawn into service the burden of carrying on rests more heavily upon those forced to remain at home. Here, teamwork becomes increasingly important because of constantly diminishing manpower. A general breakdown in essential local activities and law observance can only be prevented by whole hearted coöperation between citizens and leaders.

There is no field of endeavor where coöperation and compliance with law and regulation are more needed than that of forest fire control. The most effective and economical effort in this field of activity is that of prevention. The old adage "an ounce of prevention being worth a pound of cure" was never more aptly applied than to forest fire control.

The forest fire warden is, by law, the designated local leader in forest fire matters. He exercises his prerogatives and discharges his duties as such under the direction of the State Forester. There was never a time when the warden needed each citizen's good will and coöperation more than he does now. With manpower waning, fire prevention, through efficient preparation, care with fire and compliance with necessary regulations becomes a vital duty of citizenship.

For years efforts have been made to improve the usual bad Spring and Fall fire record. It was not until this year

however, that this problem was, to a great extent, solved when permit burning was more rigidly restricted. Forest fire wardens were instructed not to issue permits except when it was raining and during the wet period immediately following rains. This plan worked out so well it has been decided to make it the established policy governing legal burning.

Everyone is well acquainted with the several civilian defense groups. Many of our fellow townsmen are serving in one or other of them. It is only recently, however, that the Office of Civilian Defense, recognizing the threat forest fires are to our timber facilities and resources and the possible disruption of war activities in critical areas, established the "Forest Fire Fighters Service." Its purpose is to provide fire fighters, equipped and trained, to strengthen the hand of the local forest fire warden; to acquaint the people in the area with their responsibility in fire prevention and suppression and to provide an opportunity for people in and near forested areas to participate in the war effort. The State Forester is the State Coördinator; the District Fire Chiefs are District Coördinators and the Warden is the Local Coördinator. The Forest Fire Fighters Service personnel will be registered under the direction of the Office of Civilian Defense; it will be trained by the local warden and his assistants, aided by the District Chief. Individual citizens are urged to join this service group by applying to their local forest fire warden. By becoming a part of this organization locally, individuals can contribute their share toward the protection of our forest resources which are so vital to the war job.

During this critical period it is more than ever the part of good and prudent citizenship to remember

1. That permission to burn in or near woodland or where fire may be communicated to woodland must be secured from the forest fire warden when the ground is not covered with snow.

2. To be careful when smoking in or near the woods and not to throw lighted cigars, cigarettes or matches from moving vehicles.
3. To notify your local warden promptly of any fires you see.
4. That fire prevention is the best and cheapest fire insurance.
5. To be fire-minded; be careful; be coöperative and thus help your warden to prevent forest fires. This is patriotism at work.

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**Report of Superintendent**  
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*To the School Board and Citizens of Conway:*

I have been in your midst but six busy weeks. Everywhere I have been met with the utmost courtesy and with a spirit of friendliness and sympathetic coöperation. After such a brief period of service I cannot reasonably be expected to make a full and complete report on the conditions of your schools. I think, however, I may be permitted to make a few observations and take up a little space in your report that for many years has reflected the brilliant mind and rare educational leadership of your Superintendent Mr. John H. Fuller, who I am proud to say has a place in my book of friendship.

I suppose the chief interest of the average citizen is concerned with the School Board's budget. Mr. Fuller referred to the stabilization of the budget over a period of years. In times like these only necessary repairs can be made. Costs will increase and materials of all kinds will be scarce. We shall have to economize in the use of all kinds of materials and possible be forced to get along without some things we have been used to, in school as well as in the home. Mr. Fuller also referred to the teacher shortage. This shortage will be even more acute next year. In some fields it will be practically impossible to find teachers if we lose those that we now have. The budget calls for a slight increase due in part to the cost of the well at Center Conway, which was by vote made a mandate upon the School Board. The total estimated cost is not materially greater than the average for the last two years, though the distribution of the funds differs somewhat from last year.

I have been very favorably impressed by the efficiency and coöperation of the teachers, by the friendliness and morale of the pupils.

The overall picture of your schools compares favorably with schools in other sections of the state. This condition reflects great credit upon the educational leadership of your Superintendent Mr. Fuller. But such results can be achieved only by the loyalty of the teaching staff, backed up by the coöperation of an interested and intelligent School Board, behind whom stands an enlightened citizenry.

I share with you the hope that Mr. Fuller may soon return to you renewed in mind and body and carry on the splendid service he has rendered all these years.

## Report of Headmaster

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February 6, 1943

*Dear Sir:*

In response to your request, I submit the following brief report of Kennett High School for the past year.

Last June we graduated a class of 49 pupils, the largest in our history. These graduates are distributed as follows, according to my latest information: 8 are in the armed forces; 2 at the University of New Hampshire; 2 at Bowdoin College; 1 at Columbia University; 1 at Plymouth Teachers College; 1 student enrolled at Dartmouth College, but because of probable service call left in December; 5 are in schools of commerce; 2 in Defense Schools; 1 in Nurses' Training School; 1 in a school of fine arts; 16 are employed in industry; 8 are at home. Our graduates away at school do about the same quality of work they did in high school, with a few exceptions.

The registration this year as of February 1st, is 192, distributed as follows: 18 boys and 21 girls in a class of 39 Seniors; 15 boys and 21 girls in a class of 36 Juniors; 29 boys and 23 girls in a class of 52 Sophomores; and 32 boys and 33 girls in a class of 65 Freshmen. There are 94 boys and 98 girls included in this number.

Eleven boys and 4 girls have left school since September; 1 to enlist in the Marine Corps, 5 because of lack of interest in school work, 3 have moved out of town, 3 have found employment; 1 has left because of changed family conditions, and 2 because of inability to compete with other boys and girls of the same age at high school level. This record is about average for the school, but is very disturbing in times



of national emergency when each of us should do his utmost at the job at hand. For boys and girls of high school age this job is to fit themselves as well as their opportunities permit for the most important and responsible job or position they are capable of filling in after-school life, wherever that life may be.

This registration of 192 compared with a total of last year of 226 shows a loss of 34 pupils. This loss is explained in part by the large graduating class of last year and the normal entering class of last fall. Families with pupils of school age have left town because of employment opportunities in other towns. I expect the enrollment to continue to drop during the war years, although not at the rate of the past year. Following the war, and with the return of normal living conditions, as employment in industrial centers becomes less attractive and our tourist business revives, I expect enrollment to jump to new high levels.

The distribution of pupils by subject matter is as follows: 193 in English; 49 in Latin; 1 in French, which had no beginning course this year; 22 in Spanish; 72 in shop; 50 in home economics; 136 in science; 113 in history and social sciences; 116 in mathematics; 98 in commerce. The schools of the country are being urged to concentrate on science, mathematics and shop, with commerce and home economics added for the girls. I believe our boys and girls should be encouraged to spend their maximum efforts in the fields of their major interests, and to make heavy elective choice in these government-urged specialties.

At mid-years 54 pupils had earned average grades of 85% or more in three or more courses each. These pupils had earned these grades in 212 different courses, an average of nearly 4 courses each. At the same time, 35 pupils were failing 55 courses, an average of  $1\frac{1}{2}$  courses each. If these figures mean anything, it seems to me to be that, though a large majority of our pupils are doing fair to excellent work, there

are many who have yet to learn that school is a real job, and that their probable success in out-of-school life depends not perhaps on grades, but the habits of work, regularity, promptness, honesty and loyalty which they are now forming.

Our attendance record for the first half-year has been unsatisfactory. There have been 795 cases of absence and 250 of tardiness. Our attendance has been 95.4%, compared to a state average for last year of over 96%. Several reasons or excuses could be offered for this poor record, such as the early hours of opening, bad weather, transportation troubles, etc. None of these seem to me to be real justification for absence or tardiness. We have had considerable sickness.

The following reports from our courses in Home Economics and Industrial Arts as to activities in those fields have been given me by Miss Foster and Mr. Berry.

## INDUSTRIAL ARTS REPORT

This school year the industrial arts department put much emphasis on metal work and welding, except for the Freshmen.

The Freshmen have completed colonial footstools, five weeks of mechanical drawing, and are now on model airplanes for the Navy.

The Sophomores take up many different subjects with

emphasis on metal work. Much interest is shown in gas and electric welding and machine shop work.

The Juniors have had six weeks of machine drawing, and are now working on various class projects as well as individual projects.

The Seniors are working on some woodworking vises, some bench wood lathes, and other projects. There is also much interest in welding in the junior and senior classes. Two of our seniors are now in the armed services.

The war conditions have an influence, especially in the Junior and Senior students, who want to learn those trades that demand workers for war production. We feel that we are making a contribution to the war effort in this way, as well as in many other ways.

The boys have made games for the men in service, have drawn templates for bandage work, and many more things for the war effort. Last year we made stretchers and splints for the Red Cross. We are proud to be able to serve the country we love and to see that the school shop in Conway is an important part of the scheme of things.

We wish to thank the people of Conway for their interest and support in our effort.

There is a War Production Training program now in session in the school shop, meeting Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 7 to 12 P.M. Mr. Randolph Seavey is teaching the gas and electric welding; Alan Nickerson is helping in the machine shop; and Bruce Cass is teaching the blacksmithing and forging. Much thanks must go to Alan and Bruce for putting in their time without payment. There are 19 people enrolled in this course, 4 of whom are women. The course will last until March 26th.

BYRON BERRY

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Our largest loss and failure this year has been in the field

of physical education. We lost two outstanding men and one woman in this work last spring, and they have not been replaced, although Miss Tourville has done considerable work with girls' athletics. Football was carried on by outside coaching. The coaches and boys did a good job. The field of physical education is of utmost importance at this time, and I hope we may make every effort to fill this need before another year opens.

I should like to make public acknowledgment of the unselfish and loyal coöperation of the teachers in high school, in their school work and the added tasks made necessary by a war economy. I know of no single instance where a teacher has failed to give more in service than was contemplated when engaged to teach. This has always been true in our high school, but has been more evident these past two years.

May I also express my appreciation of your friendly and helpful attitude in a situation that could have offered very serious problems as you took over the work of our mutual friend, Supt. Fuller.
