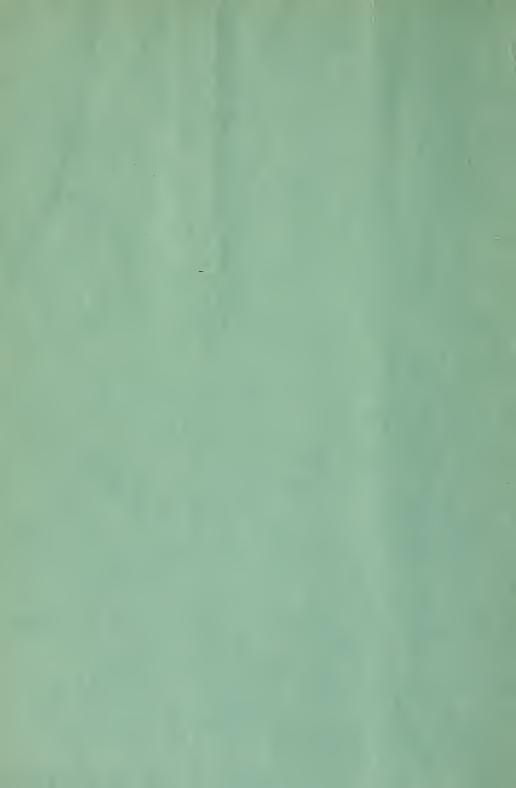

TOWN WARRANT

(L. S.) THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Croydon, in the County of Sullivan, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Croydon on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:

- Art. 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- Art. 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- Art. 3. To see if the town will vote to accept State aid for construction of Class II roads, to be expended on the Four Corners road easterly from the Croydon Turnpike, and raise and appropriate, or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$601.50, the State to pay \$1,202.00, or will accept State aid for construction of Class V roads, and raise and appropriate the sum of \$328.40, the State to pay \$1,313.60.
- Art. 4. To see what sums of money the town will raise for General Expense of the Highway Department.
- Art. 5. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for the repairs of highways and bridges.
- Art. 6. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for keeping the roads open during the winter.
- Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire all necessary sums of money for its use during the year in anticipation of taxes.

- Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to buy a truck plow and raise and appropriate money for same.
- Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to raise \$400.00 for White Pine Blister Rust Control to be spent in cooperation with the State Forestry Department.
- Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to have one Road Agent take care of the town roads.
- Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for improvement of the East Village Cemetery.
- Art. 13. To see what the town will vote to do regarding holding Old Home Day in celebration of one hundred and seventy-fifth anniversary of the town, and what money the town will raise and appropriate for same.
- Art. 14. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Our community has been very fortunate during the past year in having no fires but we feel the danger of the coming season will be even greater than the past year, and that we should exercise the greatest care possible in the prevention and removal of Fire hazards.

In this connection I wish to emphasize the importance of obtaining permits for all burning and also call attention to Provisions of the Law relative to personal liability for damage caused by starting fires unlawfully, as well as liability to court action.

I wish to express sincere appreciation for cooperation of Town officers, citizens, deputy wardens and crews of the Forest Fire Service and urge continuation of this cooperation in fire and consequent expense during the coming year.

In cooperation with the State Forestry Department we have secured equipment for fire fighting. This with other equipment is stored at your Warden's home and always ready for immediate use.

Following is a list of equipment and an additional list recommended to bring our forest fire equipment up to minimum requirement. As these tools can be purchased from the State on a 50-50 basis, it is recommended that the town raise the required amount for tool purchase.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Croydon School Board:

I hereby submit my third annual report as your superintendent of schools.

Mrs. Ruth D. Fisher continues in the position of teacher at the East Village School. Mrs. Charlotte Keysar, an experienced teacher and a Normal graduate has been hired for the position at the Flat School.

On my visits I have found the pupils orderly and interested in their work, the teachers with their work well prepared, and the rooms neat.

It is rather expensive to furnish the pupils with helps in the form of papers, new books, workbooks, etc. However, the state allows enough to cover all of the real needs, and if they are not provided the funds thus saved are for the most part deducted the following year, on adjustments, from the state check.

One of the most important items for us to study is the problem of state aid. The state allows certain sums for teachers' salaries, books, supplies, etc. From this sum certain deductions are made. The last few years a new deduction has appeared because of the lack of funds furnished by the legislature. Although the costs of governmental activities have jumped by leaps and bounds during the last decade, the state has not increased the part of the funds it uses to educate her youth, in fact, some years she has reduced them.

The taxpayers in the smaller towns should consider this matter well, as any lack of funds is deducted from their checks.

I wish to thank Mr. Gross and other school officials as well as the teachers for their cooperation and kindnesses.

NOTICE TO DOG OWNERS

Chapter 150, Laws of New Hampshire

Section 6—Every owner or keeper of a dog three months old or over shall annually on or before April 30 cause it to be registered, numbered, described and licensed for one year from the first day of the ensuing May, in the office of the clerk of the city or town wherein said dog is kept, and shall cause it to wear around its neck a collar distinctly marked with its owner's name, and bearing attached to said collar a metal tag distinctly marked with its registered number. Said tag shall be furnished by the clerk at the expense of the city or town from the amount received from dog license fees.

Section 18—The mayor of each city and the selectmen of each town shall annually within ten days from May first issue a warrant to one or more police officers or constables directing them to proceed forthwith either to kill or cause to be killed all dogs within such city or town not licensed and collared according to the provision of this chapter, and to enter complaint against the owners or keepers thereof; and any person may, and every police officer and constable shall kill or cause to be killed all such dogs, whenever and wherever found.
