

TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Harrisville in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Eagle Hall in said Harrisville on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next at ninethirty of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

To bring in your votes for the election of Delegates-at-Large; Alternate Delegates-at-Large; District Delegates; Alternate District Delegates, to the national conventions of the Republican and Democratic parties to be held for the purpose of nominating candidates for President and Vice-President of the United States.

To elect a delegate to the State Constitutional Convention.

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$103.00 (1/100th of 1% of the valuation of the Town) to the Monadnock Region Association of Southern New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, and by other means calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, in co-operation with the other thirty-seven towns of the Monadnock Region.

- 4. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for two lighted Christmas trees for the villages of Chesham and Harrisville for the coming Christmas season.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money on the credit of the town in anticipation of taxes.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Chesham Church Pond as a gift from Mrs. Gertrude Russell, with the proviso that the dam be put in suitable condition and maintained for the purpose of fire protection and raise and appropriate for the same.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to observe Old Home Day and raise and appropriate for the same.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to make a reappraisal of the town and raise and appropriate for the same.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$408.79 for T.R.A. work if the state will contribute \$1,635.14.

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual audit of the accounts of the Town of Harrisville covering the fiscal year ended December 31, 1947, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the town.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk and Trustees of Trust Funds.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Balance Sheets—December 31, 1946—December 31, 1947: (Exhibit A)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1946 and December 31, 1947 are presented in Exhibit A. As indicated therein, the town started the year with a Surplus of \$1,380.12, and closed with a Net Debt of \$412.14, resulting in a change in financial condition of \$1,792.26.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures— Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits C & D)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1947, are presented in Exhibits C and D. As indicated by the budget summary, a net overdraft of appropriations of \$2,141.73, less a net revenue surplus of \$317.14, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$1,824.59.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit E)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1947, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts is included in Exhibit E.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1947, is indicated in Exhibit F.

TAX ACCOUNTS

Tax warrants for the levies of 1947, 1946, 1945, 1944, and tax sale accounts for the levies of 1946 and previous years were examined. Summary statements indicating the activity in these accounts for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1947, are presented in Exhibits G, H, I, J and K respectively. Verification of the uncollected tax accounts was made by mailing to taxpayers.

TOWN CLERK

The accounts and records of the town clerk were examined and audited. All funds received by the clerk on account of the

insurance of motor vehicle permits and dog licenses were accounted for through remittances to the treasurer and fees retained. (Exhibit L)

GENERAL COMMENTS

Capital Reserve Fund:

During 1947, \$250.00 was withdrawn from the Capital Reserve Fund which was established by the Town for School purposes. This payment was made directly by the Trustees of Trust Funds, custodians of the Fund, to the School District. This will explain the reduction in the principal of the Fund, as indicated in the balance sheet (Exhibit A) between December 31, 1946 and December 31, 1947.

Inasmuch as the law now provides that School Districts may establish Capital Reserve Funds, it is recommended that this Fund be transferred from the Town to the School District accounts. The accounting procedure would be as follows:

The Trustees of Trust Funds to turn the entire amount of the Fund over to the Town Treasurer. The Selectmen will then issue a voucher and check for this amount to the School District. The entries would be:

Receipts — Withdrawal from Capital Reserve Fund.

Payment -- Payment to School District.

The School District Treasurer will deposit the check and the School Board will issue a voucher and check for a similar amount payable to the Trustees of Trust Funds, thus transferring the School Fund back to the custody of the Trustees of Trust Funds. The entries in the School District accounts will be as follows:

Receipts — Other Receipts.

Payment — Payments into Capital Reserve Fund.

The Capital Reserve Fund will then appear in the School District balance sheet as both an asset and a liability item. It will consequently be dropped from the balance sheet of the Town.

Conclusion:

The accounts and records of all town officials were found in good condition, and the accounting procedure conformed to the uniform system prescribed by this Division.

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual town report.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Harrisville for their assistance during the course of the audit.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Harrisville:

I herein submit my fifth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

The general demand for better educational opportunities for the youth in our rural schools is indeed a serious problem at the present time. In order to meet the various needs of boys and girls and to prepare most of them to enter high school the modern elementary school has many new responsibilities. The development of the basic skills and abilities in reading, writing, and arithmetic are as essential as ever. More effective learning in the social studies with increased emphasis on democratic living is needed to develop better citizenship both within and outside the school. An adequate school program should also provide the opportunities for directed experiences in music, the fine arts, domestic and manual arts, general science, health and many social contacts. The facilities for these objectives will be limited in many schools during the present period of shortages and high costs.

The maintenance of well qualified teachers in our rural schools is almost an impossibility unless nearby resident teachers become available. At the present time 70,000 teaching jobs are vacant in the United States. More than 350,000 teachers have left our public schools since 1941. Over 2,000,000 schoolage children are not in school and millions of those in school are receiving inferior education due to the fact that 110,000 teachers, or one out of every eight, are serving on sub-standard permits. This problem is enhanced by increased enrollments in our schools and fewer students preparing to teach.

The Harrisville School District is maintaining a constructive program for the welfare of its youth. Many major improvements to meet the common needs of children will be provided for in the new school building. Recent changes to meet the immediate needs include the following:

- 1. An adequate supply of running water at the Chesham school.
- 2. Transportation of pupils to High School by the School District.
- 3. Improved instruction resulting from further revision in the textbooks, the employment of a music teacher and the best classroom teachers available.

The general morale of the schools would be greatly improved if parents exerted a stronger influence on their children. Cooperative attitudes of obedience and respect for authority should start in the home. The mutual help of parents and teachers is needed by all youth at the present time.

REPORT OF THE MUSIC SUPERVISOR

Mr. John H. Frye, Superintendent of Schools, Marlboro, N. H.

I herein submit my report as Supervisor of Music in the Harrisville schools:

We have in our local schools a basic music textbook for ungraded schools known effectively as "On Wings of Song" published by Ginn & Company. Its fundamental purpose is to instill in the hearts and minds of our boys and girls the musical heritage of our America. Public school music educators are realizing more and more that the songs and musical games should be a vital part of our educational system, since they are living examples of their ancestors. These songs integrated into the whole curriculum make a more vivid picture in the minds of our youngsters. Through the singing of these songs, our students capture the dynamic spirit that must have been in the hearts of those who built this country. Many times the teachers tell stories of historical and geographical significance, and present records made by great artists to enhance the information given in the books.

The music course discussed above is all found in one carefully written book beautifully presented in a very unique manner combining the art of attractive sketches with musical form. The songs might be classified as follows: Patriotic, Traditional, Children's Songs and Games, Sea Chanties, Songs of the Cowboy,

Indian Songs, Spirituals and Plantation Songs and Religious Songs.

It is difficult to bring the child's singing voice up to the point of complete satisfaction in a few months, but this is the objective which the teachers and I hope to reach in due time. The musical experience of the boys and girls is not wholly confined to singing, but to the study of rhythm and music appreciation as well. Ear training, both through tonal and verbal dictation is strongly stressed together with mode discrimination.

In conclusion, let me thank the Superintendent of Schools, the Board of Education and the teachers for their efforts in carrying out the designated program.

REPORT OF HARRISVILLE SCHOOL BUILDING COMMITTEE

Feb. 9, 1948.

Your School Building Committee begs to report that, due to conditions familiar to all and far beyond our control, only slight progress has been made during the past year toward our goal of delivering to the town a completed consolidated school building.

Such progress as could be made may be briefly noted as follows: some necessary clearing of the purchased Johnson pasture land was done and the barn was moved off the land as per agreement by the former owners. Also much new information was gathered by all members of the committee as to new methods, materials, and equipment which will eventually be incorporated into the new building.

At the final meeting of the year at which all of the committee were present and in conference with the architect, Mr. Randlett, it was unanimously agreed that due to the ex-

tremely high cost of building at the present time it would be absolutely unwise and impossible to start construction in the Spring of 1948 as had been hoped.

Since only a definite sum of money is available for the purposes of the new school, and since building costs have practically doubled since this money was raised, it seemed to the Committee unfair to the taxpayers of Harrisville and to the donors of gifts either to ask for further funds or to proceed with a building which would only halfway fill the needs of the community.

This unpleasant decision is in agreement with the State Tax Commission's present stand and with the decisions of other towns comparable to Harrisville, all of which, except in cases of extreme emergency, have postponed their building plans until they can proceed under conditions more favorable for building.







FOREST FIRE PROBLEM SERIOUS

The year 1947 was one of the worst periods of drouth and forest fire occurence in eastern United States history. Lack of water ruined crops lowered water levels and dried up brooks everywhere. Three months of deficient rainfall and abnormally high temperatures resulted in many fires which were mostly well controlled and kept within bounds. Only the high winds beginning on October 23rd caused a few fires to escape beyond immediate control. These few fires resulted in burning some 15,000 acres and the loss of 63 or more buildings in four New Hampshire towns.

All October fires were costly. They burned deeply in the ground and required day and night patrol of large crews of men until the rains came late in October. Towns which escaped from serious fires might easily have been in the midst of the most serious conflagration we had.

Governor Dale closed the woods effective at midnight of October 15th. With the blow-up of October 23rd, a second proclamation closed all back roads and authorized towns to inaugurate patrol. The effect of this was to cut down subsequent fires for the rest of the dry period.

Local fire warden forces performed an admirable job to hold the more than 200 fires that occurred during this October period. Many men were taxed to the utmost as the emergency continued. To them and all those who did their work, the people of New Hampshire owe a debt of gratitude. The state forest fire control agency based on local town wardens and town crews wherever adequately equipped rose to the occasion and met the test in whatever town their services were needed.

It is now time to take stock everywhere of our fire fighting facilities for the season ahead and to make them adequate where necessary. To this end town fire plans and training programs for wardens, deputies and other key men in each district are being arranged or in progress. If equipment and tools are insufficient to properly equip the available man power in each community with the right tools for the job, they should be provided for at once. The yearly addition of fire tools to the town supply will generally need to be built up. The state sells tools to the towns and shares one-half their cost. Good equipment is important and can help greatly to keep both damage and fire costs at a minimum.

For many years we have requested our wardens not to issue burning permits except on rainy days. This regulation will be in effect again this year as it is one of the best means of assuring such fires from getting out of control. Nine out of every ten fires can be prevented, 98 percent of all fires being due to human carelessness. Be sure to get a permit for any fire in or near woodland when the ground is free from snow. Be sure your fires are always out before you leave them. Help us in getting the travelling public to keep from throwing out lighted matches or cigarettes. Be careful of all fires in or near woodland,
