REPORT OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS.

In obedience to the laws of the State, the County Commissioners of Hillsborough County make the following report of all the expenditures of the County over which they have any control, for the year ending Dec. 31, 1873.

The number of inmates supported at the County Almshouse at Wilton, for the year past, is 306, which is 52 more than last year. Average weekly number $133\frac{38}{52}$, 15 more than last year. Number at Almshouse January 1, 1874, 163, 48 of which are insane or partially so, and 12 are idiotic. Of the whole number, 81 are males, and 82 females. Forty-four males and forty-four females are unable to perform any labor, but need constant looking after by others. There are also 19 under ten years of age. See table of statistics of inmates for further particulars.

The sanitary condition of the institution has been good. The attending physician, Doct. J. Fleeman, has been prompt and attentive in caring for the sick, thus preventing serious mortality among the inmates. But eight deaths have occurred during the year. It will be remembered that we dispensed with selling milk from the farm, April 1, 1872, and we feel well satisfied with the change. The butter made, as well as the milk, is now used by the inmates, conducing to their comfort and health.

REPAIRS.

In the last year's report, we spoke of making arrangements to establish a school at the farm, which has now been carried out, and a good school-room with single seats, has

been well fitted up, and will accommodate twenty-five scholars. Early last spring we employed Mr. Joseph Eddy as teacher of twenty children. Mr. Eddy performed his work well, but was obliged to leave in consequence of poor health. Miss Bragg was employed to take his place, giving good satisfaction. The school is now under the charge of Mrs. Susan P. Hunkins, and is in a prosperous condition. We are satisfied that having a school at the farm is of great benefit to the children of the institution.

There has been expended \$111.16 in repairs upon the barn; also \$86.62 in fitting up the school-room. The brick reservoir failed and could not be repaired, and proved inadequate to furnish the large amount of water required for the inmates, stock, and steam boilers. A new one has been built of large capacity, at an expense of \$466.32. The whole expense of repairs, including barn, school-room and reservoir, was \$664.10, which is charged in the general expenses of the year, instead of adding to the cost of the farm.

About 10 o'clock in the evening of November 17, 1873, a fire was discovered in the basement of the house occupied by the paupers, which was subdued after the greatest exertions by the Superintendent, assisted by the employed help and sentenced men. These sentenced men worked with a will, and had it not been for their help, nearly all of the buildings at the farm would have been destroyed. The loss was \$743.84, which was covered by insurance.

Religious exercises have been held by Rev. S. C. Fletcher up to last May, when he resigned, and Rev. I. S. Lincoln was appointed to take his place, and holds services once a month.

The farm has been well managed, and the crops have been very satisfactory. You are referred to another part of this report for a detailed account of the products raised on the farm the past year.

REFORM SCHOOL.

Fifty-seven are supported at the Reform School at a cost of \$4,881.08, which is an increase over last year of nine in number, and in cost \$563.54.

INSANE ASYLUM.

Three have been sent to the Asylum during the year, and one discharged. \$483.34 has been paid for their support.

By the Treasurer's report it will be seen that the debt has been increased \$4,074.30 during the past year. This may be accounted for by the increased expenses of the courts, Reform School, interest on money borrowed to pay the Wilton debt, pauper expenses occasioned by the large number of persons thrown out of employment during the fall and winter, many having been assisted temporarily by the county.

Mr. G. G. Bumpus as Superintendent and Mrs. Bumpus as matron have faithfully and efficiently performed their duty to the many persons placed under their charge, and to the entire satisfaction of the Commissioners. We cheerfully return our thanks to the assistants for the manner in which they have performed their duties.

PHYSICIAN'S REPORT.

TO THE COMMISSIONERS OF HILLSBOROUGH COUNTY:

Gentlemen:—I have the honor to make to you my second annual report of the sanitary condition of the Hillsborough County almshouse. The whole number who have been cared for during the past year has been one hundred and sixty-five. Most of them, as usual, are unable to support themselves from misfortune, sickness, insanity, intemperance and vice. The health of the inmates during the past year has been remarkably good, although considerable sickness, of course, but no serious disease has invaded the institution. Cleanliness, good order and kind attention has no doubt much to do in averting disease from the institution. I am under great obligation to the Superintendent and Matron, for their untiring attention and kindness to the sick inmates of the institution. There have been quite a number of serious accidents happened to some of the inmates in trying to escape, all attended with broken bones, but they are all recovering and able to be about. The sanitary condition of the insane inmates is about the same as last year. A larger building is much needed for their accommodation. I wish to express much respect to the Commissioners for the zeal they manifest for the prosperity of the institution. They are gentlemen worthy of their trust. The number of deaths during the past year has been eight, (see table below) all from incurable diseases. There have been five births within the year.

CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

TO THE COMMISSIONERS OF HILLSBOROUGH COUNTY:

Gentlemen.:—I have the honor to report that since the resignation of the Rev. S. C. Fletcher, and my appointment in his place last May, to the office of Chaplain at the County Farm, I have preached there once each month since, with one exception, caused by the fire. During the three years previous, I occasionally preached there. Whenever requested, I have officiated at funerals. Two Methodist clergymen, brothers J. Spaulding and Geo. W. Rowland, from abroad, have each very kindly given a single service of preaching in addition to my own. In several instances, by invitation, my choir of singers have been present and imparted much interest to the customary religious services. At these services, the officers, assistants and inmates have been present, and have manifested a very commendable interest.

A day school for the instruction of the children has been in the institution since early last spring, in charge of Mr. Eddy, Miss Bragg, and Mrs. Hunkins. Such a school is very desirable, and it is hoped that it will continue to exist and be productive of much good. So far as I have had opportunities for observation, I should judge that the institution is under good supervision, and is productive of as much good as could be reasonably expected under the cir-

cumstances. It is obviously no easy task to manage successfully an establishment like this, with its three departments, pauper, criminal and insane,—three hard, sad aspects of human nature. How important that all suitable means which Christian intelligence can suggest, should be employed to abate these evils, and to bring those suffering from them into a better physical, moral or mental condition. These classes may be greatly benefited by the preaching of the gospel to them, especially the two first, and even some who are insane are not beyond its divine comforting influence, for the gospel is the most purifying, uplifting-hope and joy-inspiring of all forms of truth and moral influence. In every heart it purifies, it inspires a most glorious hope, founded on divine promises, that looks above and beyond all existing evils, to a condition of un-mixed and endless good. Therefore I am full of hope in preaching the blessed gospel of the Son of God to all classes. “For it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth.”
