TOWN WARRANT

State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hillsborough, County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in Child's Opera House in said town on Tuesday, the Twelfth day of March next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose one Selectman for three years, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Highway Agent, Town Clerk and Chief of Police for one year, Trustee of the Fuller Public Library for two years, Trustee of Trust Funds for three years and all other necessary town officers or agents for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the town officers to the auditors, the reports of the auditors, agents, committees or other town officers heretofore chosen or appointed and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for town officers' salaries, town officers' expenses, Community Building, appropriations for street lights and all current expenses of the town and such amounts as may be necessary to apply upon the principal and interest of the town debt.

- Article 4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the building and repairing of highways, bridges and culverts.
- Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for Memorial Day purposes.
- Article 6. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for the permanent improvement of highways.
- Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750 to be applied upon the salary of the District Nurse.
- Article 8. To see if the town will vote to instruct and empower the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet current expenses of the town and in anticipation of taxes.
- Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the support of band concerts for the coming season.
- Article 10. To see if the town will raise and approriate the sum of \$400.00 for the purpose of co-operating with the State and Federal governments in the control of the White Pine Blister Rust or act in relation thereto.
- Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$174.00 for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, in co-operation with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region, said appropriation to be disbursed by the selectmen.

Article 12. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$65.18 to defray the expenses of float entered in the sesquicentennial parade at Concord in 1938.

Article 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.
