

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Kingston in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Kingston on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2.500.00 for tarvia.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$301.84 and the State will contribute \$1.205.37 under the provision of the T. R. A. so-called.
- 5. On petition of Onias Boucher, C. Herbert Spaulding and others to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$275.00 for the construction of a fire well on the land of Onias J. Boucher, on the Newton Junction road. Mr. Boucher agrees to give the land to the town.
- 6. On petition of John D. Goodwin and Florence George and others to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$275.00 for a fire well in the field

opposite John Goodwin's house. Mr. Goodwin will give the land to the town, and Ira Meeks will give a day's work with truck.

- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 to provide for additional fire protection due to the war emergency.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the division of municipal accounting and to make appropriation to cover expense of such audit.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the use of the Town Health Officer and Board of Health due to the war emergency.
- 10. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF TOWN MEETING, MARCH 11, 1941

Meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Edward B. Clark.

Warrant was read by the Moderator.

Voted to keep polls open until 7 P. M.

Proceeded to ballot for Town officers.

Polls closed at 7 P. M.

Town meeting called to order at 8:15 P. M.

Article 2. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,145.00 to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.

Article 3. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,600.00 for Tarvia.

Article 4. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$308.44 and the State to contribute \$1,233.76 to be used on class 5 roads.

Article 5. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to repair and tarvia Little River Road.

Article 6. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$275.00 to dig a fire well on the West Kingston Road between Eugene Mason's and Walter Chubbuck's, they agreeing to give the land to the Town.

Article 7. Voted that the Town install a light on the curve between Chas. Jasper's and Leon Collins' on the West Kingston Road and raise and appropriate money for the same.

Article 8. Voted to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$1,200.00 to purchase a new dump truck. Amendment voted that the old truck be traded in toward the new one.

Article 9. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for Memorial Day and that the Moderator appoint a veteran as chairman of that committee.

Article 10. Voted that we pass over this article without action.

Article 11. Voted that the Town raise and appropriate the sum not to exceed \$250.00 to paint the Town Hall.

Article 12. Voted that the Selectmen be authorized to borrow a sum not to exceed \$16,000.00 in anticipation of taxes.

Article 13. Voted that the Selectmen be authorized to move a building on Grape Island. Voted that this building be offered to competitive bids.

Voted that the Town close Fry Road and the Jonathan French Mill Pond Road.

Voted that the Town Clerk write a note of thanks to Andrew Christie for the various articles he has donated to the Town.

Voted that any Public buildings be sold at auction.

Voted that the Selectmen and Road Agent be authorized to purchase the Town truck.

Voted that the Selectmen be authorized to borrow a sum not to exceed \$500.00 to match the State's proposition to build the road on the west side of the Plains.

Voted to return to Article 1 at 9:35 P. M.

SYNOPSIS OF FOREST FIRE SERVICE STATE LAWS

Penalty for kindling a fire without a permit, \$200, or imprisonment not more than thirty days.

Penalty for kindling a fire wilfully, or in a careless or imprudent manner, \$500, or imprisonment not more than one year.

No person shall kindle a fire upon the land of another without permission from the owner, agent or caretaker thereof.

No person shall kindle a fire or burn any material in or near woodlands, pasture, brush, sprout, waste or cut-over lands, except when the ground is covered with snow, without the written permission of the Forest Fire Warden or the presence of the warden or person designated to superintend such burning.

Any person, firm or corporation causing or kindling a fire without a permit, when a permit is required, and also any person, by whose negligence or the negligence of his agents any fire shall be caused, is liable to the town for all expenses incurred in attending or extinguishing such fire.

Incinerators conforming to law of same may be maintained at locations passed by the warden.

Said incinerator to have openings no larger than (4) four openings by (4) to the inch, with tight cover or cover of mesh as stated.

Permits for operation of same will be void in case of Ban declared by the Governor or the State Forester, as per Chapter 191, Sect. 34 of Public Laws.

Report of School Board

To the Citizens of Kingston:

It seemed fitting that in this significant year of 1942 your School Board should review the events leading up to the building of the new Daniel J. Bakie school, and put down on paper some of its hopes for future years.

For many years the advantages of a Central School for Kingston became more and more evident. The sectionalism of each small district was a narrowing influence on the lives of our Boys and Girls who so quickly become our Men and Women. The facilities in the different schools, in spite of some improvements, were hardly adequate to carry on a Modern Educational program. The buildings were showing their age and becoming increasingly expensive to keep up and harder to heat.

After an unsuccessful attempt was made in 1933 to obtain a Central School the dream persisted and its desirability became ever clearer until the far seeing and generous Daniel J. Bakie made it a possibility by a gift left in his will.

This gift of \$15,000.00 and a \$5,000.00 fund, the interest to be used for maintainance, put the issue squarely up to the people of Kingston; namely, to build a Central School or replace the Plains and Pattern. The issue was met and your decision registered in favor of a new Central School.

The Building Committee composed of Mr. F. S. Nichols, Mr. Andrew Christie, Mr. G. Austin Kemp, Mrs. Gladys Merrick, and Mr. Warren Bakie, secured the services of Mr. Irving W. Hersey as architect. Plans were drawn, land acquired opposite Sanborn Seminary, contracts let, and Mr. Paul Currier of Amesbury proceeded to build the new school.

The approach of World War 2 slowed construction somewhat, but in the middle of January 1942, the pupils and teachers moved in, and on January 26, 1942 the Parent Teacher Association held their first meeting in the new school.

The building is, we think, a fine Grammar School Plant, and we have high hopes of working out a program which will develop the whole child. A program which will develop the body and the mind, bring out and cultivate the social abilities and personality of the child, and help him develop in whatever degree possible those creative talents possessed in varying degrees by every child. In short, to produce well rounded citizens.

Specifically the advantages we sought when we advantage a Central School for Kingston were:

- 1. The social advantage of mixing with a larger group.
- 2. To have as few grades as possible under one teacher.
- 3. Good ventilation, even heat and the best lighting possible.
- 4. Better playgrounds and a real Physical Education Program. The advantage of learning team work and cooperation through games that call for larger numbers than are found in one room schools.
- 5. The advantage of having the teachers in the upper grades teach the subjects in which they are best prepared and most interested.
- 6. The advantage of a Physical Plant with a modern well equipped kitchen which would permit the gradual development of a seventh and eighth grade domestic science program and a modified lunch program, as well as a handicraft program for the boys.
- 7. A stage to help in developing personality through recitations, debates and plays.

These advantages were the foundation of the dream and are the hopes which your School Board has for the future of the Daniel J. Bakie School.

We are most grateful for your support and help in the past, and hope that you will help us make a reality out of this dream for the better education of your Boys and Girls.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board and Citizens of Kingston:

I herewith submit my third annual report as Superintendent of Schools:

The facts and figures herein presented are for the school year 1940-41, but I shall discuss events which have happened since July 1941 as well as before.

At the time of writing this report, February 1942, our Country for the second time in a generation, is engaged in a great war. This war is unlike the first war of 1914-18, which was a war of aggression on the part of a militaristic European nation, involving a number of countries before the Armistice was signed. World War 2 is a world revolution with the major "HAVE NOT" nations, "have not" in the terms of material resources, combined to overpower all the "HAVE" nations, for the purpose of looting and for political domination.

The question arises in our minds, how could a group of nations which were lacking in resources before 1918, and completely disarmed in 1918, ever rise to a position of such tremendous military power in the space of a few short years? The answer is EDUCATION.

A people were sold on an idea that the one way out of their economic want and political instability was through complete subjection to one leader. This is known as the Leader Principle, or the Totalitarian State. Let me urge all of you to read in the February issue of the Reader's Digest, the article entitled, "Educating for Death", by Gregor Ziemer. In which the picture of how the Nazis have been able to build up and maintain their power is ably portrayed.

The above is simply a brief summary pointing to the importance of Education. There are many trite, but true, sayings which have pointed out this truth for many years,

such as, "As the twig is bent, so is the tree inclined", etc., but we must not fail to heed the lesson which we find in the article "Educating for Death", and reversing the ugly purposes, but adopting some of the earnestness of the method, start educating our boys and girls for life in a Democracy.

What I am trying to say is that we must inculcate by precept and example and all of the modern teaching skills available, a real enthusiasm for the Democratic Way of Life; a deep and burning patriotism and an undying determination that the basic principles of freedom of speech; freedom of worship; freedom of the press, and the equal rights of all before the law, shall be defended unto death.

This type of education can only be done by those who are themselves imbued with a deep feeling for the democratic way of life. This means men and women with character. Hence, it is of tremendous importance that in the stress and strain of fighting this war of wars, we do not lose sight of the importance of the educative process and its meaning in terms of men and women (who are boys and girls today) who will carry on the democracy of tomorrow. We must be careful even if it involves sacrifices on our part, not to lessen the efficiency and effectiveness of our schools. This year the underlying theme of all of the teachers in this Union has been Educating for Democracy, and the devices that have been used by the different teachers in doing this have been many and very interesting. The morning exercises have taken on a new meaning; the pledge of allegiance to the Flag is given with a new reverence; the Star Spangled Banner is being sung with a renewed enthusiasm; plays have been given; pieces have been spoken; and in countless ways the meaning of democracy, its great privilege and burdensome responsibilities have been taught. OLD GLORY IS SHINING WITH A RENEWED BRIGHTNESS.

The people of Kingston may be justly proud of the new Daniel J. Bakie School. It is an honor to the memory and generosity of Daniel J. Bakie, and a credit to the people of Kingston. The Building Committee, including the School Board, gave hours of their time and some of their treasure to make this dream of long years standing, become a reality.

There are many things yet to be done, but the school is built and functioning most efficiently. The teachers deserve credit for the effort they are putting forth to make this the finest grammar school in the State. Not only is it a splendid building, but a splendid program is being carried on which will give results, in terms of learning and citizenship training, of a high order.

In closing, I wish to thank the School Board for their help and interest in the planning and execution of the school program of the past year; the teachers for their loyal cooperation in handling the problems of instruction and leadership which make up our interesting responsibilities, and the people of Kingston for their whole hearted support and interest in the schools of their community.


