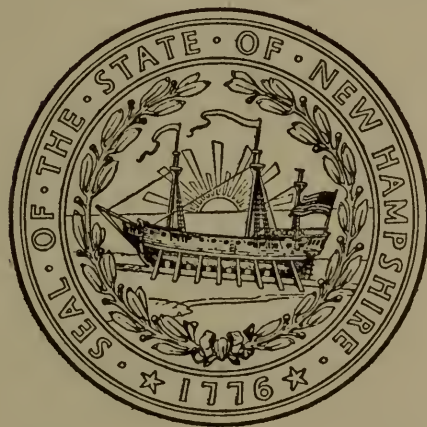

TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Lancaster qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on the second Tuesday of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Town Clerk, a Town Treasurer, one Selectman for three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds for three years, one Library Trustee for three years, three members of the Col. Town Spending Committee for three years and other necessary officers for the ensuing year.

2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for—

1. Town Officers' salaries
2. Town Officers' expenses
3. Election and registration expenses
4. Municipal court expenses
5. Expenses of Town Hall
6. Police Department
7. Fire Department
8. Health Department, including Dental clinic
9. Vital Statistics
10. Sewer Maintenance
11. Town Maintenance
12. Repairs to Town Garage
13. Appropriation for Sinclair Weeks road
14. Street lighting

15. Library
16. Town Poor
17. Old Age Assistance
18. Memorial Day
19. Parks including Band Concerts
20. Cemeteries
21. Damages and legal expenses
22. Civic & Trade Appropriation
23. Interest
24. State Aid Construction
25. Sidewalk Construction
26. New equipment
27. Payments on principal of town debt
28. Sewer construction

3. To direct how money raised for the above purposes be expended.

4. To see if the town will accept state aid for construction of the Class 2 road known as the "Lost Nation Road" and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$1700.25; or accept town aid assistance on Class 5 roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purposes the sum of \$597.13.

5. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money on temporary notes in anticipation of taxes, covering period from March 9, 1937 to the Annual meeting of 1938.

6. To see if the town will instruct the Town Treasurer where to deposit town funds.

7. To see if the town will vote to rescind the action taken under article 10 of the warrant for the Annual Meeting of 1936 relative to the Australian Ballot System of voting for all town officers.

8. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to expend for sidewalks the sidewalk appropriation of 1936.

9. To see if the town will approve the acquisition by the United States Government of approximately 1612 acres of land situated in the town, forming additional purchase units of the White Mountain National Forest.

10. To see what action the town will take in regard to building a cement sidewalk on Stevens Terrace.

11. To see if the town will vote to raise not exceeding \$400 to advertise the scenic beauty and accessibility of the Presidential Highway, provided adjoining towns will cooperate in raising proportional amounts.

12. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town thru Tax Collector's deeds.

13. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to distribute the blank inventories at the time they examine and appraise the property to be taxed.

14. To see what action the town will take in regard to purchasing and installing a new boiler for the Town & Masonic Building. And raise money for the same.

15. To see what action the town will take on the following question: Is it expedient to revise the constitution?

16. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

It is always disappointing where the funds available restrict the activities to a point where people are deprived of some of the things they want and should have.

For some time the Col. Town Fund income has been shrinking gradually. In 1936 it was felt that with a general improvement in business the bottom had been reached and the Committee could plan on a relatively definite income to carry on its work. Unfortunately, this was not the case. Bonds that were yielding 7 per cent were in many cases "called" by the bond holders, compelling the Trustees to re-invest this money at a much lower income rate, resulting in a continued decrease in the funds. It is hoped that 1936 has completed the reduction in income and that from now on we will have available for the Town of Lancaster as much or more than we have had during 1936.

Let the fund be little or much, the fact remains it is something and, although the Committee can not carry forth all the projects that it would desire or that residents of the town might desire, it does carry on a rather wide range of activities, some of which appeal to practically every resident in the town, and all of which, from the Committee's point of view, are worthwhile. One of the most gratifying and satisfying experiences in being a member of the Committee comes from explaining its purpose and displaying its physical properties to people in other towns. In every instance these people congratulate Lancaster in its good fortune in possessing such an income.

That we are a favored group by this very generous bequest on the part of Col. Town who could have easily left the entire amount in Texas or to some educational institution or other spot besides the Town of Lancaster, is apparently realized by the residents of the town who have co-operated whole-heartedly in accepting the decreases in income and have evidenced a real appreciation for any appropriation that has been made, even though the appropriation is small. This same spirit has evidently prevailed with the residents of the town in their charitable attitude towards various appropriations, part of which may have been made for projects which they personally did not believe in. That they have tried to co-operate with the Committee in this connection and apparently have sensed the Committee's effort to make the fund available to every group and person in the town as far as possible, is evidenced by the small amount of personal criticism which has been tendered to the Committee by local residents. Co-operation of this character by our fellow citizens has made the work of the Committee much easier and more pleasant. The Committee wishes to express to the residents of the Town of Lancaster their most hearty appreciation for this charitable spirit.

SECRETARY'S REPORT

The Col. Town Spending Committee is composed of nine members, three of whom are elected each year for a period of three years. The Committee now is composed of Carroll Stoughton, Rev. R. P. McClintock and Mrs. Katherine Lane, whose term of office expires in 1939; Evelyn Moyle, Enos G. Fay and Daniel A. O'Brien, whose term of office terminates 1938; Dr. W. M. Bronson, L. E. Bragg and Mrs. Ethel M. McCarten, whose term of office expires in 1937.

The officers for 1936 were: D. A. O'Brien, Chairman; Miss Evelyn Moyle, Secretary; and Enos G. Fay, Treasurer. Various committees appointed for the year of 1936 to administer more effectively the funds and activities of the Committee were appointed. Members of the various sub-committees were: House Committee—Dr. W. M. Bronson, Chairman, Rev. R. P. McClintock and Miss Evelyn Moyle; Community Field Committee—Carroll Stoughton, Chairman, L. E. Bragg and Enos Fay; Scholarship Committee—D. M. White, Chairman, Mrs. Ethel McCarten and Carroll Stoughton; Camp Committee—D. A. O'Brien, Chairman, Rev. R. P. McClintock and Mrs. Katherine Lane.

The function of the Spending Committee is to spend the income received from the Col. Town estate for the benefit of the residents of the Town of Lancaster. Detailed reports in connection with these various appropriations of the Committee and amounts granted each can be found under Report of Treasurer Enos G. Fay. A slight elaboration on some of the appropriations may be instructive to the people of the town.

Complying with the stipulations as set forth in the Col. Town will, three appropriations were made, namely: keeping flowers on the Colonel's grave during the year; maintaining the school prizes in various scholastic contests and in prize speaking, established by the Colonel himself; and the support of the Boy Scouts in town, as stipulated by his will. Other appropriations made during the year supported projects including transportation of high-school pupils from rural areas in the town, maintenance of a scholarship fund, support to Juvenile Library, assistance to the Golf Club, assistance to the Hospital Auxiliary, skating rink, maintenance and operation of the tennis courts, Community Camp, the Community House and Community Field. All of these appropriations have been the result of requests and have been supported

to just as liberal an extent as the income would permit. Transportation for rural high school students is not provided for by the state and would necessarily have had to be carried by the parents if assistance from the fund was not available. Transportation is not given any pupil living within the two-mile radius of the high school building and is available to only residents of the town. The scholarship fund is available to any eligible and worthy boy or girl in the town and has been participated in by both village and rural students. It includes training in college, normal schools, business colleges and training schools for nurses. This appropriation is a loan, not a grant. Loans made previous to 1936 to aspiring students have been returned in part by the students and to an extent where \$700 came back to be available again for future candidates. Nine local young people are receiving aid through this medium at the present time.

The Juvenile Department in the Library is an innovation established by the Spending Committee where a trained leader is available to assist the younger children in the community in better reading. Golf appropriations were made on the basis of one free day a week golfing other than Saturday, Sunday and holidays. The Hospital appropriations were given to relieve women in the community from conducting public parties and social functions to raise funds for the various sundries necessary to maintain the hospital. The skating rink was partly supported by the fund to guarantee free skating for any student in high school or grammar school. The Community Camp, maintained in the East part of the town has proven more popular each year. The cabins have been altered with partitions, running water and stoves, and are comfortable quarters for families to use for a vacation. Nineteen thirty-six found them so popular that a waiting list always prevailed for their use and a time limit was placed so that no party could occupy them for longer than a two-week period. Picnic parties of

small groups of families as well as large groups of organizations utilized the facilities of the camp. Nearly 10,000 people spent some time at the camp during 1936.

The tennis court has apparently filled a much desired need in the community and again a regular system of booking has been necessary. No group can occupy the courts for more than one hour and a definite system of booking is carried on by the Superintendent of the House. The court is booked by matches and not by individuals. A fee for those from outside the town who desire to use the courts was charged in order that local people might have first preference and an opportunity to use it as much as possible.

The Community Field is rapidly gaining in usefulness and is the center of all high school athletic encounters as well as several athletic contests of various groups and organizations during the summer months.

The Committee has been extremely happy at the responses of the people in the community in their use of the Community House and Community Hall. Beginning with small children in the community who bowl and play basketball and covering all the different stages of ages, the House is the scene of a great deal of activity. It is not unusual to have four or five events going on in the House at one time. It is used freely by the schools, is the much used place for organizations that do not have halls, a popular center for parties and a common spot for various committees to hold their meetings. It has been used as a community center at such occasions as snow-train visits and is rapidly becoming a real necessity to the community.

The Committee wishes to publicly acknowledge the effective manner in which the Superintendent and Matron have supervised the House and the personal interest they have taken in it. The Superintendent's diligent attention to small details in making minor repairs has saved the fund many dollars in more serious

repairs had they been neglected. Their gracious manner with guests and their supervision of the tennis court and field has contributed much to the success of the Community House and plant.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

To the Honorable School Board and Citizens of the
Lancaster Town District:

General Conditions

No changes occurred in our teaching staff this past year. The attendance up to the time of writing this report has been excellent. The largest enrollment is at Gore where 28 pupils are registered, and the smallest at Grange where there are only six.

Enrollment

At the present time eight teachers are required to instruct some 107 pupils, or an average of about 13 pupils per teacher. In a graded system, four teachers

could instruct this number and probably do better work, since their effort would not be scattered over so many grades.

Repairs

The chimney at Great Rock which has been giving trouble for several years, was relaid, and new cement steps built at the Gore school. Several schools were repainted. The east side of No. 5 was newly shingled.

Health

The excellent health program under the direction of Dr. Bronson and Mrs. Carey has reaped a rich reward in better health among the individual children, and the almost total absence of contagious disease.

Hot lunches have been served at No. 9, our largest school.

Conclusion

The Superintendent wishes to express his appreciation of the cooperation he has received from parents, children, teachers, and school board, in making the year a success.

Librarian's Annual Report

The circulation for the past year was 14,263 books, which means that the adult department gave out an average of 46 books per day.

One hundred and twenty-seven books have been added; 91 of these were brought by the Library, and 36 were gifts. Of the latter group, 23 were books which were put into circulation directly from the second-hand book sale held by the Unity Club in the Spring, four were brought by the Unity Club committee with money from the sale, and presented to the Library by Unity Club, and the remaining nine books were gifts from individuals. We greatly appreciate the generosity of Unity Club and the individual donors. Four magazines have been added to the reading rooms, two of them bought by the Library, and two were welcome gifts.

A guest book was started during the summer, in which distinguished and interesting visitors were asked to write their names.

The reading room has been greatly improved by the removal of the old table lamps and the addition of four modern ones.

The Library has cooperated with the schools in aiding the students with additional material to supplement their school work. Reference books have been in steady demand during the school year. This year for the first time one of the teachers has asked for a shelf on which could be grouped all books for outside reading in Latin and French classes. This method is much easier for both student and librarian.

There has been an unusual demand for books on specified subjects, and these have been borrowed from the State Library for a month.

Sixty dollars has been received from fines.

Juvenile Library Report

Having a very small amount of money to spend for new books, the Juvenile Department has taken advantage of all available means to supplement their book stock. The Public Library Commission, located in Concord, loans collections of books to small libraries needing a larger choice, for a period of three months. Several such collections have been borrowed during the year.

Not only the girls and boys of the village benefit by the Juvenile books, but the children who attend the district schools as well, for a number of books are loaned the individual teachers, at a time, to supplement their supply. Thus all Lancaster children are given an equal chance to broaden their education by reading.

Much time and thought is put into the selection of books. Only the best are chosen for the girls and boys, from carefully selected lists. The children who read many and varied books are usually the ones to have good marks in school, because all reading helps to enlarge one's sphere of knowledge.

In September the Juvenile librarian attended a meeting of the New Hampshire Library Association in

New London. Special conferences with expert advisers in many lines of library work were held.

Book Week activities were prominent again this year, the Grammar grades uniting in reading contests and an entertainment which was held at the end of the week. The interest and cooperation of townspeople and teachers made this celebration a success.

Two new magazines were added to the Juvenile room—"Stamps" and "Wee Wisdom." Number of books added—88, of these 23 were gifts. Total circulation of books—4,831. Gifts include 13 books given by Unity Club.
