

TOWN MEETING WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the town of Littleton, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall and Police Court Room in the Town Building, on the 13th day of March next, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for the term of three years, a Town Treasurer, an Auditor, a Collector of Taxes, an Overseer of the Poor, an Agent to prosecute violations of the liquor law, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library, each for the term of three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds, a Constable and two Highway Agents.

Article 2. To bring in your votes for the election of Delegates and Alternates to the Republican and Democratic National Conventions, to be held for the purpose of nominating party candidates for President and Vice President of the United States.

Article 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the laying out, construction and repairing of highways and bridges, for the payment of the town debt and interest, for the maintenance of the poor, for the public library, for the recreation commission, for free hospital beds, for observance of Memorial Day, towards the maintenance of a District Nurse, for band concerts, and for all other town charges. Article 4. To see what action the town will take for the purpose of securing State aid for trunk line construction of highways in this town under the provisions of an act to provide State aid and for the expenditure of other public moneys in the construction of main highways throughout the State in accordance with Chap. 84 of the Laws of New Hampshire.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to instruct its Selectmen to appoint an expert highway agent, who, under the direction of the Selectmen, shall have the same power and perform the same duties as a highway agent elected by the town, in accordance with Section 10, Chapter 80, of the Public Laws of New Hampshire.

Article 6. To see what action the town will take for the purpose of securing State aid for trunk line maintenance of highways in this town, in accordance with Chap. 84 of the Laws of New Hampshire.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money, and if so, how much, to be expended under the direction of the Selectmen, in cooperation with the State Forester, in the work of preventing the spread of the disease, commonly known as White Pine Blister Rust.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the town the sum of One Hundred Thousand (\$100,000.00) Dollars, or such part thereof as is necessary, to change, replace, reconstruct or repair its dams, reservoirs, intakes, dikes, canals, penstocks, waterwheels, equipment, and all other property and effects necessary to the maintenance and operation of its water and light system, and to issue and negotiate the notes or bonds of the town for the same, in conformity with the Statutes of New Hampshire, generally or particularly applicable thereto.

Article 9. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money from time to time during the current year, on the credit of the town, to pay current indebtedness, in anticipation of taxes.

Article 10. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to appoint an agent to act for the town in the transfer of real estate owned by the town.

Article 11. To see what action the town will take with reference to the matter of authorizing the Selectmen to give any druggist, doing business in this town, a prescription permit to sell pure spirituous and malt liquor for medicinal, sacramental, mechanical and scientific purposes, as provided in Chap. 147 of the Laws of the State of New Hampshire.

Article 12. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 13. To choose any other necessary town officers for the year ensuing, and to choose or elect any agents or committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under this warrant.

Article 14. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

To the Citizens of Littleton:

The School Board hereby presents a report of its stewardship of the schools of the town, submitted for your consideration and approval. Our aim has been, as in former years, to make our school system one of the most efficient in the state and to give to the youth of our town every advantage of modern method and equipment. To this end, we ask your continued cooperation and support. For details of educational work, we refer you to the special reports of Superintendent and Headmaster, under whose direct guidance, this is carried on.

We realize that much depends upon having a staff of experienced teachers, and we are trying each year to raise our salary schedule to a point where we get and retain teachers of this type.

Each year brings new and unexpected problems. To keep our school buildings in shape to give the best service possible, repairs must be made from time to time. This year attention must be given to the roof of the Apthorp school which will incur some considerable expense. One of the rural schools also needs shingling. Therefore, with our usual budget for school maintenance and our payments on the new building we ask an appropriation of \$66,000.00 that all obligations connected with the up-keep and management of our schools may be safely met.

HEADMASTER'S REPORT

To O. M. Holman, Superintendent of Schools:

I hereby submit my sixth annual report as Headmaster of Littleton High School. While I know that the financial report of the school will cover from July 1, 1926 to July 1, 1927, I assume that the townspeople will be more interested in the current year's work and consequently this will cover the period from February 1, 1927 to June 15, 1927, inclusive, and from September 6, 1927 to February 17, 1928, inclusive.

BUILDING

This being the second year that Littleton High School has occupied the new building, I am glad to report, as last year, that the plans and arrangements of the building are working out wonderfully well. Of course, the need for one or two minor adjustments and changes have come about. The spirit manifested by the school in the care of the building has continued as last year, to be on the whole wonderfully fine. It would seem, as time goes on, that the care of this large high school building, combined with the care of the Kilburn building is too much to expect of one man. I would urge that if the new building is to be kept in the condition that we would all like to have it kept, adequate assistance for the present janitor is needed. In this connection, also, it would seem to me that a small yearly appropriation for repairs such as painting, varnishing, etc., would be advisable in order that this fine plant might be kept at all times in the best possible condition.

TEACHERS

I am glad to report that there has been but one change in our teaching staff since last year. Mr. Plimpton, a graduate of Wesleyan taking the place of Mr. Hicks, a graduate of Dartmouth who went \cdot to Manchester. The following gives the names of our present teaching staff, colleges or school graduated from with the subjects and number of periods they teach per week.

Joseph D. Vaughan, Bates, Harvard, physics, mathematics, 17 periods.

Doreen Gale, Plymouth Normal, stenography, typewriting, bookkeeping, arithmetic, 39 periods.

*Mildred Doherty, University of New Hampshire, domestic arts, 19 periods.

Dorothy Ricker, Bates, Latin, French, 30 periods.

George L. Plimpton, Wesleyan, English 1, 2, 3, 4, 30 periods.

George R. Hutchinson, Bates, commercial geography, history, economics, 30 periods.

Harold J. Cooney, University of Maine, chemistry, geometry, salesmanship, general mathematics, 26 periods.

Wallace Welch, Gorham Normal, manual arts, 31 periods.

ADMINISTRATION

The class of last June being the second class to graduate that had for their full four years, benefit of the revised course of study, has again demonstrated the value of that revision. The work of this class in college and normal school this past fall has been very creditable. This year as usual, achievement tests have been given which prove our work to be on a par with other schools in our state and the nation.

The finances of the high school have been placed upon a much better basis than in previous years. A high school treasurer has been appointed and a complete set of books for each of the school organizations has been set up, so that all the monies passing through the hands of children are carefully safeguarded and checked. These books of this treasurer are kept, in rotation, by members of the Senior commercial class and are proving to be a practical benefit here. Something over Two Thousand Dollars has already passed through or is in the hands of Miss Craigie, the high school treasurer.

SPECIAL ACTIVITIES

The work in the athletic department has been, as heretofore, carried on by Mr. Cooney in a very able manner. The control is still, as formerly, in the hands of an Athletic Advisory Board.

The work in debating has created a reasonable amount of interest and has been ably handled by Mr. Hutchinson. There have been two debates with Lancaster and two with Groveton, to date, Littleton winning two and losing two.

PRIZES, GIFTS, ETC.

The annual prize offered by the American Legion and the Auxiliary for leadership to the boy and girl in the graduating class went to Florence LaVoie and Clarence Allard. The Andrew Bingham, Jr. cup went to Reginald Colby and the Lincoln medal to Nellie Veazie. We are again glad to report the gift of money and materials for the fine tennis court which was completed this year by the boys of the manual training class. We would also like to record the gift of a fine picture by the class of 1927.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board of Littleton:

I have the honor to submit a few suggestions gathered from my observation of the school year 1926-1927.

Our schools are maintained for 36 weeks in all the grades and for 38 weeks in the senior high school. Six days were lost this year owing to holidays, storms, conventions and Carnival. This represents a little more than one full week of school time, and is a large loss. I hardly know how to avoid it. The only holidays observed are Thanksgiving and Memorial Day. Teachers' conventions are arranged by the State and by the Ammonoosuc Valley Teachers' Association to stimulate teaching ability. Occasionally we run a single session when the weather and travel conditions seem to make it the only wise course to pursue. If Carnival came when schools were not in session it would mean the absence of a number of teachers who annually participate in the theatre programs and in the decorating of five or six "floats" for the parade.

One method to avoid this loss is to hire for a definite number of complete days of school over and above all interruptions. This eliminates school loss. But it is not an honorable procedure to do this without making a suitable increase in the compensation of the teachers to allow them to meet the necessary expenses of upkeep for the extra time they are obliged to put into their school year, in which, owing to local demands and programs, they are not allowed to work.

We have had a daily attendance of 508 children, a daily absence of 29 and a per cent attendance of 94.6. This record is good.

TEACHERS

Our teachers, I believe, are a credit to their profession. Seventeen held the highest credentials given by our state. None held the lowest. It was gratifying that not a single change occurred in the teaching staff during the year. Two teachers completed successfully all state examinations for life certification.

I am concerned over the rather low wage limit which we offer in our elementary schools. The decision of the Board to allow a Fifty Dollar increase in wages to all teachers who wished to attend summer school was a decided move in the right direction. The best of our younger teachers and those who will hereafter be recruited are saying and will say "What is there to stay for when we reach the Thousand Dollar limit?" This is really happening. I hope that it may be possible to raise this limit and not pay the higher price caused by transient and experimental service. This department is mentioned, not for a desire to increase expense, but from a knowledge of the waste of inexperience and change. From actual facts 107 school districts in N. H. pay less on each \$1,000 of equalized valuation, and 141 school districts in the State pay more on each \$1,000 of equalized valuation, than does Littleton. We are yet in the first half, so far as school expense is concerned. In high school our average cost per pupil for the year of this report was \$76.44. The average cost throughout the State for the same period was \$101.98. We are therefore well down the list in taxation and way below the average pupil cost in secondary education.

SCHOOL BUILDINGS

Our school property is in a very commendable condition. There are minor needs in our smaller buildings and constant repairs and adjustments called for in our larger plants. We have never kept a good record of the actual service rendered us by Mr. Welch and his Manual Training department. It it had been recorded it would amaze all of us to know the amount of money saved by labor given to school repairs and improvements.

During the year, the new high school building constantly grew upon us in its completeness and wide range of service. It has made a more vital school. It centralizes and controls the social activities of school. It gives a remarkable tribute to those who instigated it, who promoted it, who built it. The adjustments usually found necessary after the completion of a project of such magnitude are remarkably few.

HEALTH

A special word of credit should be given to Dr. Page and Miss Borg for the zeal and attention they give to the work of promoting health. The children in the public and parochial schools were all examined. Of the 550 children in the public schools, 267 defects were recorded and notices sent to the homes. A large part of these defects were defective teeth, tonsils and enlarged glands. Eighty-seven children had secured treatment since the previous examination. The outstanding feature of this work of our health officers was securing the services of Dr. Gile for a series of dental clinics. Some 30 children from the first and second grades, including public and parochial were examined. Probably these children would not have secured this great benefit any other way. Dr. Gile generously donated his services. The Red Cross donated materials.

The year was marked by good teaching, by conscientious service in both school and community. It was marked by many acts of helpful loyalty. I want to express deepest appreciation to the Woman's Farm and Home League, to the American Legion and Auxiliary, to James Bingham and to a host of other contributing agencies for helpful encouragement and assistance. Just as earnestly do I write my commendation of my immediate co-laborers. Headmaster Vaughan and his associates, the loval corps of teachers, Mr. West and Mr. Clark both helpful and efficient, of Miss Craigie, Clerk and Treasurer, whose assistance and accuracy are invaluable, of the friendship and occasional companionship of several hundred attractive and stimulating girls and boys who create the joy and challenge of life. Especially do I express to the Board of Education my personal. grateful acknowledgment for their helpful counsel, and earnest purpose to administer harmoniously, and wisely the varied problems incident to the work of the year.
