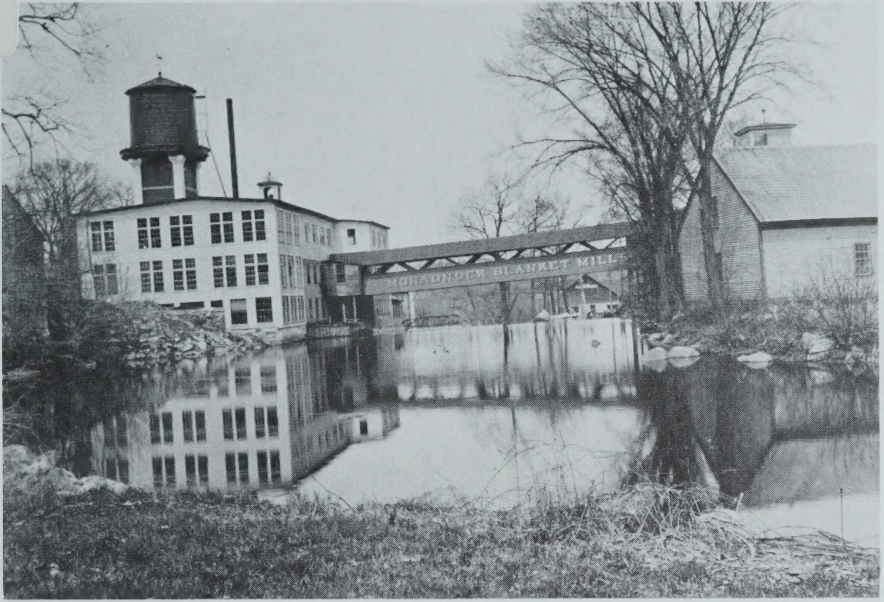

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## SELECTMEN'S FORWARD

As required by the laws of the State of New Hampshire, the Selectmen at this time would like to report on the past year's activities and matters that we feel are of great importance this year.

As we made known last year, the diminishing state and federal funds are still having an effect on our Town budget and consequently, the Town taxes that you are required to pay.

As required by law, the unpaid taxes for the 1981 tax year were sold at the tax sale to the Town for the sum of \$83,571. which is \$23,956. more than the previous year which seems to indicate that it is becoming more and more difficult for Marlborough's citizens to pay their taxes.

The policy of twice a year tax billing has proven to be a great help financially in that the Town did not have to borrow nearly as much money in anticipation of taxes and was able to invest money. Consequently, the interest we earned was more than the interest we had to pay on both long and short term notes.

The Selectmen instituted a new bookkeeping system this year that we believe to be much more efficient than the previous one. We also changed insurance companies with a resulting saving of premiums. Out of these savings we were able to provide a much better disability insurance for the Fire and Police Departments. Bills pertaining to the Water Department are now being paid through the Selectmen's books which reduces the number of accounting systems.

The Town entered into a co-operative fuel buying system which the Southwestern New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission is operating with a resulting saving of about twenty cents per gallon for all the Town buildings. In the future there will be other supplies purchased through this system which should help hold the line on Town costs.

A number of long term debts have been paid off this past year, and as a result, Town charges to be paid through taxation should decrease by about \$60,000 this year.

This last year, the Selectmen appointed Jr. John E. Lecraw to be our representative to the Ashuelot Valley Sewerage Agency and shortly after that, the sewerage business came back to life. We would like to thank John for the tremendous job he has been doing for us. His efforts have already saved the Town thousands of dollars with many more to come.

We will be asking the Town to vote for a bond issue to cover the construction of a municipal sewage system to be constructed in 1984. After many years of planning, it now looks as though a sewage system will become a reality. Due to Mr. Lecraw's persistence and knowledge of

these matters, he has been able to get a number of sewer lines changed from collectors to interceptors so that the Town only has to pay 5% of the cost of these lines instead of 100%. Through the results of the income survey conducted by the Southwestern Regional Planning Commission, we are now eligible for a 30 year loan from the Farm Home Administration at 7 3/8% interest and also an out right grant of a substantial amount of money.

This year will be the last year that we will be able to obtain 75% funding from the Federal Government for interceptor sewers. The next year Federal funding will drop to 55% which would make the cost of a sewerage project in the Town of Marlborough prohibitive. By the year 1988, the Town is required by Federal law to stop polluting any waterway so it would seem that now is the time to go ahead with the sewer project.

At this time, the Selectmen would like to thank the members of the various committees and boards and departments who have again contributed to the operation of the Town and it's services throughout the past year. As each year passes, the Town business becomes larger and more complex and it is now really a big business.

One last subject that we would like to broach at this time, is the fact that the amount of business that the Selectmen have to transact is getting overwhelming and we feel the Town ought to start thinking about the possibility of a part-time Town Manager, one who would be able to keep track of the Town finances and research the issues that come before the Selectmen.

## WARRANT

The Polls Will be Open From 10:00 A.M. to 9:00 P.M.

To the inhabitants of the Town of *Marlborough* in the County of *Cheshire* in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at *the School Gymnasium* in said *Marlborough* on **Tuesday the eighth day of March, next at 7:30 of the clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:**

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of Three Million Two Hundred Fifty-six Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$3,256,500) for the planning, acquisition and construction of certain sewerage system improvement, including a collector sewer and interceptor sewers, as more fully described in a plan entitled "Ashuelot Valley Sewage Agency Town of Marlborough, New Hampshire Sewerage Collector System Contract #15, Interceptor Sewers - Contract #12, Interceptor Sewers - Contract #13" (The "Project"), which will qualify the Town for Federal funds, such sum to be raised by the issuance of Serial bonds or notes not to exceed One Million Three Hundred Sixty-nine Thousand Dollars (\$1,369,000) under and in compliance with the provision of the Municipal Finance Act (N.H. R.S.A. 33:1 et seq., as amended) and to authorize the selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, and to take such other actions as may be necessary to effect the issuance, negotiation, sale and delivery of such bonds or notes as shall be in the best interests of the Town of Marlborough, and to allow the selectmen to negotiate contracts for and to accept and expend such monies as become available from the Federal Government with respect to the Project and pass any vote relating thereto, and in connection therewith to see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of Chapter 149-I of the New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated, as amended.
3. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue that portion of the Old Thatcher Hill Road, beginning on top of the hill where the Cheney, Towle and Keating property lines meet, down the hill through the property of Kenneth and Irene Keating, across the existing Webb Depot Road, then between the lands of Eugenie Fletcher and Michael and Lynne Keating, terminating at the Boston and Maine Railroad underpass on Webb Depot Road, or to act in any manner relating thereto. (By Petition)
4. Shall the citizens of Marlborough ask members of the New Hampshire Congressional delegation to support or co-sponsor a resolution in the U. S. Congress to: Request the President of the United States to propose to the Soviet Union that the United States and the Soviet Union adopt a mutual freeze on the testing, production and deployment of nuclear weapons and of missiles and new aircraft designed primarily to deliver nuclear weapons, with verification safeguards satisfactory to both countries, or to act in any manner relating thereto. (By Petition)

5. To see if the Town will vote to go on record in support of immediate actions by the Federal Government to control and reduce acid rain which is harmful to the environment and economy of Marlborough and to the health and welfare of the people of Marlborough. These actions shall include:

1. Reduce by at least half the major cause of acid rain, sulfur dioxide emissions by the year 1990.
2. Conclude negotiations and adopt a treaty with the government of Canada that will commit both nations to this same goal.

The record of the vote on this article shall be transmitted to the New Hampshire Congressional Delegation and to the President of the United States, or to act in any manner relating thereto. (By Petition)

6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Marlborough Fire Company to construct an addition to the rear of the present Municipal Building, or to act in any manner relating thereto. (By Petition)

7. To see if the Town is in favor of adopting the amendments to the Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board. (By Ballot)

8. To see if the Town is in favor of adopting the proposed ordinance relating to privately owned burglary and/or robbery alarm systems. (By Ballot)

9. To hear reports of Town Agents, Auditors and Committees.

10. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

10A. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund, established under provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, for use as setoffs against budgeted appropriations for the following specific purpose and in the amount indicated herewith or take any action thereon.

11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Home Health Care and Community Services, formerly the Marlborough Community Nursing Association, or act in any manner relating thereto.

12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for Old Home Day and Memorial Day, or act in any manner relating thereto.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$925 to support the services of the Community Mental Health Clinic of the Monadnock Family and Mental Health Service, or act in any manner relating thereto.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,723 as the Town's share for studies and operation of the Southwest Regional Planning Commission. These funds to be used for financing the staff, operation expenses, planning studies, technical assistance and other programs of the Commission. These funds may be used in conjunction with other State and Federal Funds available for planning purposes.
15. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Recreation Commission or act in any manner relating thereto.
16. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the operation of a Summer Program or act in any manner thereto.
17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150 for Monadnock Region Association or act in any manner relating thereto.
18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a new dump truck for the Highway Department, using the funds available in the Highway Department Capital Reserve Fund and to appropriate a sum not to exceed \$4000 for the balance, or to act in any manner relating thereto.
19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purchase a new pickup truck for the Highway Department, using not more than \$16,000 of the Highway Department Capital Reserve Fund, or to act in any manner relating thereto.
20. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Highway Department Capital Reserve Fund, or in any manner relating thereto.
22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 for the support of the Grand Monadnock Arts Council or act in any manner relating thereto.
23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from State, Federal or other Governmental unit or a private source which becomes available in RSA 31:95-b, or take any action relating thereto.
24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair of sidewalks during the ensuing year, or act in any manner relating thereto.
25. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the application of liquid asphalt or tar to the highways, or act in any manner relating thereto.

26. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repair, construction and maintenance of highways, both Summer and Winter maintenance, or act in any manner relating thereto.

27. To see if the Town will vote to change the term of office for Fire Wards to three years, beginning in 1984, at which time two would be elected to serve 1 year, two to serve 2 years and one to serve 3 years, and at every annual Town meeting thereafter, elect a Fire Ward to fill each term which is expiring, or to act in any manner relating thereto.

28. To see if the Town will vote to accept funds for perpetual care of cemetery lots or act in any manner relating thereto.

29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

30. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell property acquired by Tax Collector's Deeds and Gifts.

31. To transact any further business that may legally come before the meeting.

**AN ORDINANCE: RELATING TO, AND REGULATING THE USE OF, PRIVATELY OWNED BURGLARY AND/OR ROBBERY ALARM SYSTEMS.**

**Definitions:**

**Alarm or Alarm Systems** - Any telephone alarm (dialers), noisemakers or any other type of alarm, installed with the expectation of a Police Department response.

**Unlawful Acts** - It is unlawful for anyone to activate any robbery or burglary alarm for the purpose of summoning police except in the event of an actual or attempted burglary or robbery.

**False Alarm** - For the purpose of this ordinance, the term "false alarm" shall mean the activation of a burglary and/or robbery alarm by other than a forced entry or attempted forced entry to the premises and at a time when no burglary or robbery is being committed or attempted on the premises.

**Response** - Any action required by the Police Department in answering a reported activation of a burglary and/or robbery alarm.

1. For a police response to any false alarm, the Town of Marlborough shall charge or collect from the person, sole proprietor, partner, or corporation, having or maintaining such burglary and/or robbery alarm on premises owned or occupied by him or her, fees as follows
  - A. For a response to premises at which no other false alarm has occurred within the preceding six-month period, hereinafter referred to as a "first response", no fee shall be charged.
  - B. For a second response to premises within six (6) months after a first response, no fee shall be charged.
  - C. For a third response to premises within six (6) months after such second response, and for all succeeding responses within six (6) months of the last response, a fee of ten dollars (\$10.00) shall be charged.

## MARL-HARRIS FIRST AID AND EMERGENCY SQUAD INC. 1982 SERVICE REPORT

For the period Jan. 1 thru Dec. 31 Marl-Harris made 113 calls. Of these 72 were emergency, 23 were non-emergency or transfers. We responded to 11 highway accidents with 19 patients, there were 4 standbys and 3 no transports. We transported patients to Peterborough, Concord, Hanover and Westwood nursing home. 22 of the total runs were made to Harrisville.

Our ambulance is starting its third year and has 9000 miles on it. It has passed all inspections as has the equipment.

We wish to thank the police and fire departments for their help and cooperation, we sincerely appreciate it.

Your contributions and donations in memory of loved ones and friends are certainly appreciated and help us remain self supporting. During our 12 years of service we have not used any of your tax dollars.

With the continual emphasis on accidental and motor vehicle accidents, we have purchased new extraction devices for use on neck and spinal injuries, and the necessary sizes of cervical collars for these injuries.

These pieces of equipment as well as a new portable suction unit, will enable us to provide better patient care.

Any resident of Marlborough or Harrisville interested in becoming a member of the ambulance squad is invited to attend a squad meeting on the first Wednesday of the month, or contact a squad member, so first aid training can be arranged.

We again remind all residents of Marlborough and Harrisville to call 352 - 1100 if they need emergency service of any kind.

This report is compiled for the officers and directors of the Marl-Harris ambulance squad.

## REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDENS AND STATE FOREST RANGER

Forest fire prevention, our business, your business, good business! This slogan has been the motto of the N.H. Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Fire Service since 1909 when the first forest fire laws were passed by the Legislature.

These laws set in place a cooperative forest fire protection program of State and local forest fire personnel that has, in the past 75 years, established New Hampshire as a leader in forest fire prevention and control. Our annual acreage loss to forest fires of one-half acre per fire is the best in the nation. This fire record has become about through the cooperative efforts of our state/town forest fire protection program. The state provides detection of fires, training for local forest fire wardens, low cost forest fire suppression equipment to local fire departments, and technical advice at the fire ground. Local governments provide the volunteer fire fighters who are appointed as wardens and deputy wardens and who respond quickly to suppress reported forest fires.

This program has resulted in a steady decline in annual acres lost to forest fires since 1910 when the average fire burned 33 acres compared to the modern day loss of one-half acre per fire.

Only by the continued cooperation of the State/town and our entire citizenry can this record be maintained.

1982 was most productive and rewarding for this writer and the entire staff of the Marlborough Police Department. It was a good year by police standards with the motor vehicle accident and property damage far below normal, which, I hope is an indication that our roadways are relatively safe.

With 104 case reports registered to date, an overall 76% cleared ratio has been achieved, including 100% of 5 burglaries and 60% of 25 thefts. Between \$18,000 and \$20,000 worth of stolen property was recovered and returned to its rightful owners. Also, we were directly responsible for solving other area crimes, including many in Harrisville and in Keene.

I'm proud of these statistics and proud of each and every member of the Marlborough Police Department, who spend endless hours tracing leads, gathering evidence, and writing reports which all lead to the end results. This Chief salutes Lt. David Cheney and Sgt. Lee LaChance, whose expertise and devotion to the job was the direct result of many of this years achievements. These men take a back seat to no other investigators in this area.

In conclusion, thanks to the Marl-Harris Ambulance Squad and the Marlborough Fire Department for your tremendous assistance at accident scenes, and I hope for continued support from you, the taxpayers of the Town of Marlborough.

## FROST FREE LIBRARY

The first of 1982 saw many physical improvements to the Frost Free Library. As soon as the snow was off the roof, Ken Clark was on it, installing new shingles and gutters on the new addition. Because the roof had leaked so badly in January and February, it was then necessary to do some facelifting inside. Fortunately, the library was well covered by insurance and we were able to reinsulate and paint the ceilings. Next a new coat of cheerful yellow paint was applied to the walls of the new addition. Finally, insurance covered the cost of all the carpeting being professionally cleaned. With our inside looking so spiffy, the Board of Trustees took a critical look at the outside of the building and the results were a Paint Bee spearheaded by Elizabeth Richards. In just a few hours, on May 22, a crew of a dozen or so volunteers, under the direction of Karl Robinson, had repainted the entire new addition. We are indeed, fortunate in Marlborough, to have so many citizens so generous with their time.

In May the library was notified by Dr. Chafetz that the Marlborough School Board had voted to transfer on long term loan, any and all senior high level books that we felt would compliment our collection. Consequently, 1000 or more books have been placed on our shelves. In order to accomplish this Gargantuan task by September 1, the Board hired Mrs. Eleanor Hoff on a part time basis to assist the Librarian. Although this was money unplanned for in the 1982 budget the Board of Directors felt it was a very worthwhile expense. Many of our young people, now at Keene High School, are making use of these books evenings at the library.

As in the past, the library in 1982 continued to function as a center for the town; with concerts, classes, crafts, blood pressure clinics, art shows, movies, storytimes, etc. Our display cases were constantly full of collections and crafts by local people. The Mabel Page Cultural Arts Room was used frequently by townspeople and remains available to any group interested, by merely contacting the librarian in advance.

We urge townspeople to look for our monthly bookmark listing programs at your library and/or just to come in to browse or visit. Many services are available such as; delivery to shut-ins, Large Print Books, cassettes and records for the visually impaired, book searches and more. We will happily do whatever we can to accommodate you.

We hope to see you all in the Library in 1983!!!!

Members of the board feel the need for better enforcement and have agreed that, if the selectmen do not have the time to act as the enforcement agents, a committee should be formed to do this. We see the need for more industry and construction but feel that any new developement of any kind, should not infringe on anyone or be counter to our town plan for growth.

**SCHOOL WARRANT**

To the inhabitants of the school district in the Town of Marlborough qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Marlborough Elementary School in said District on the 7 day of March, 1983, at 7:30 p.m., to act upon the following subjects:

**Article 1.** To see if the District will raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 28,500 or any other sum for the reconstruction of a portion of the Marlborough School roof and to determine whether any funds shall be raised by taxation, by transfer from available funds, by borrowing, or by any combination of these methods, or to take any other action relating thereto.

**Article 2.** To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.

**Article 3.** To see if the District will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept and use in the name of the District, such advances, grants-in aid, or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any department or agency thereof or any federal, state, or private agency.

**Article 4.** To see if the District will vote to authorize the school board to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the School District Meeting, money from state, federal, or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the 1983-1984 school fiscal year provided that such expenditure be made for purposes for which a school district may appropriate money, and that such expenditure not require the expenditure of other school district funds. Further, that the school board shall hold a public hearing prior to accepting and spending such money.

**Article 5.** To see if the District will authorize the Marlborough School Board to apply, accept, and expend any funds received from the Bureau of Outdoor Recreation under the Land and Water Conservation Fund Act of 1965 (Public Law 88-578), and any amendments thereto.

**Article 6.** To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 28,500 or any other sum, for the reconstruction and/or repair to the Marlborough School roof, or to take any other action relating thereto.

**Article 7.** To see what sum the District will vote to raise and appropriate for energy conservation purposes at the Marlborough Elementary School.

**Article 8.** To see what sum of money the District will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries for the school District officers and agents, and for payment of statutory obligations of the District.

**Article 9.** To see if the District will vote to authorize the school board to take such action on behalf of the District as may be required to continue as a party in the third year of a suit against the State of New Hampshire to provide funds to the school districts for the purpose of more nearly equalizing the opportunities for the children to receive a basic education and to see what sum the district will raise and appropriate for this purpose.

**Article 10.** To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

## PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

During this transition year a tremendous effort has been put forth by the faculty and administration to prepare the school. The maintenance staff is to be complimented for moving all the equipment from the old elementary building and preparing the new one for its new uses. The ease with which school opened this fall is a tribute to the hard work and dedication of the faculty. Endless hours were put in by the faculty during the summer vacation, making ready their classrooms.

Numerous physical changes were made to the building in anticipation of the fall opening. The kindergarten, music and hearing impaired rooms were carpeted, a new front entrance was constructed and a new oil tank was installed. All of these changes contribute to creating an excellent educational facility in Marlborough.

In conjunction with the physical changes the faculty has directed much of its energy toward providing an excellent academic program. Particular attention has been given to math. Four teachers volunteered to pilot a new math program called systematic Teaching and Measuring Mathematics. This program provides a systematic method of teaching basic mathematical concepts, using manipulatives as learning tools. It is our goal to strengthen the students' conceptual understanding of mathematics.

A concentrated effort is also being made to improve the students' writing abilities. Junior high students are expected to complete different types of writing assignments ranging from personal journals to essays, poems and eventually research papers. A small sample of the students' writing has been recently published in our newsletter.

A third area in the curriculum receiving considerable attention is that of computers. All junior high students have the option of learning the computer language called BASIC. Learning BASIC provides students with the ability to write their own computer programs and to improve their skill in logic and reasoning.

This has been a successful year for the Marlborough School. Contributing to this success is the ability of the community to put aside the problems of the past. Everyone has been affected by the confusion and turmoil over the school issue. It is a tribute to the residents of Marlborough that they have risen above past difficulties and personal differences, allowing the students and faculty a peaceful year. Everyone has needed a tranquil year when fences could be mended and the school could carry on with the task of educating young people.

**MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL SCHOOL DISTRICT MEETING  
OF THE MARLBOROUGH SCHOOL DISTRICT HELD ON  
MARCH 2, 1982**

Meeting called to order at 7:20 P.M. prevailing time, on March 2, 1982 by District Clerk Oliver F. Derby. The meeting opened with the salute to the flag and the National Anthem sung by the High School chorus. A short meditation and prayer was given by the district clerk. The clerk declared that the first order of business would be to elect a moderator pro tempore to conduct the meeting due to the resignation of the moderator.

Voted favorably on the motion of Manfredo Torelli, supported by Joseph Puleo, that Patricia Derby cast one ballot for Irvin H. Gordon to serve as moderator pro tempore for this meeting. The clerk asked if there was any objection to this form of ballot. No objection was voiced and Irvin H. Gordon was duly elected and qualified by the clerk.

The moderator pro tempore then stated the rules under which the meeting would be conducted and read the warrant for the meeting.

**Article 1.** A motion was presented by John F. Fletcher, supported by Manfredo Torelli, that the district appropriate \$78,986 for the purpose of reconstruction, alterations and enlargements of the Marlborough High School and for the purchase of departmental equipment of a lasting character in connection herewith; to authorize the school board to borrow \$78,986 on the credit of the District and to issue notes or bonds for the term and in the denominations that they feel is in the best interest of the District; further, to authorize the school district to augment the building fund with any monies that may be derived from the sale or investment of the bond receipts.

Statements were offered by James Ross and David Cheney in regard to the article.

Voted favorably on the motion of Charles Lockhart, supported by Robert Dion to end debate on the article.

A ballot vote was taken on the article and the moderator pro tempore publicly announced the results of the vote as follows:

Opposed to the article	302

The moderator pro tempore declared that by their vote, the district had rejected the article and that the bond had failed.

**Article 2.** Voted favorably on the motion of Joseph Puleo, supported by Manfredo Torelli, that the District accept and place on file reports of agents, and auditors as published in the Marlborough Town Report.

**Article 3.** A motion by Oliver Derby, supported by Manfredo Torelli, that in relation to Article 14 embraced in this warrant, that the moderator be empowered to appoint a committee to determine whether the sun is going to continue to rise in the East and set in the West.

**Article 4.** Voted favorably on the motion of Manfredo Torelli, supported by Oliver F. Derby, that the District vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept and use in the name of the District, such advances, grants-in-aid or other funds for educational purposes as may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the United States Government, the State of New Hampshire, or any department or agency thereof or any federal, state or private agency.

**Article 5.** Voted favorably on the motion of John F. Fletcher, supported by Joseph Puleo, that the District vote to authorize the School Board to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the School District Meeting, money from the state, federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the 1982-83 school fiscal year provided that such expenditures not require the expenditure of other School District funds. Further, that the School Board hold a public hearing prior to accepting and spending such money.

**Article 6.** A motion was presented by David E. Cheney, supported by Judith Langley, that action on Article 6 be deferred until action had been taken on Article 7 and Article 8.

After a short period of discussion, it was voted favorably on the motion of John Manning, supported by David E. Cheney, we end debate on the article.

Voted favorably on the original motion on a voice vote.

**Article 7.** A motion was presented by David J. Keenan, supported by Edwin Wheeler, that the District grant to the Marlborough School Board the power and authority to negotiate a contract with the Keene School Board for the education of Marlborough High School students and further, to authorize the school board to enter into said contract on behalf of the Marlborough School District. Further, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$238,698 to effectuate the purpose of this article.

Seven voters having requested it, a ballot vote was taken and the moderator publicly announced the results of the vote as follows:

Opposed to the article	239

The moderator pro tempore declared that by their vote, the district had defeated the motion and the article.

**Article 8.** A motion was presented by David J. Keenan, supported by William F. Cumings, that the District grant to the Marlborough School Board the power and authority to negotiate a contract with the Monadnock Regional School Board for the education of Marlborough High School students and further, to authorize the school board to enter into said contract on behalf of the Marlborough School District. Further, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$168,922 to effectuate the purpose of this article.

After a period of debate, it was voted favorably on the motion of David E. Cheney, supported by David J. Keenan, that debate be ended on this article.

Seven voters requested it, a ballot vote was taken and the moderator pro tempore announced the result of the vote as follows:

The moderator pro tempore declared that by their vote, the district had approved the motion and the article.

David E. Cheney, supported by Peter Von Sneidern, moved that the District reconsider the vote that had just been taken. Mr. Cheney stated that only one reconsideration of the vote could be made at this meeting and that this action was being taken to forestall the article being taken up at any other time during the meeting. He urged that reconsideration be defeated.

A voice vote was inconclusive and the moderator pro tempore called for a standing division of the house. He announced the result of his tally as follows:

The moderator pro tempore declared that by their vote, the district had defeated the motion and that reconsideration of Article 6 could not be made at this meeting.

The moderator pro tempore then returned the meeting to Article 6.

**Article 6.** A motion was presented by Manfredo Torelli, supported by Joseph Puleo, that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$797,766 for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents and for payment of statutory obligations of the District.

An amendment was offered to the original motion by John Manning, supported by David J. Keenan as follows, "We propose an amendment to the motion, to amend the appropriated figure to read \$726,238."

The amendment was voted favorably on a voice vote and then the original motion as amended was voted favorably on a voice vote.

**Article 9.** A motion was presented by John F. Fletcher, supported by Gary Langley, to authorize and empower the Marlborough School Board to sell on behalf of the District the property known as the Elementary School; (including land and buildings) and to authorize the documents in connection therewith, including but not being limited to, deeds; the proceeds of such sale to be used for renovation and repairs to the building known as the Marlborough High School.

Mr. Robert Dion stated that he felt that it might be advisable to retain a portion of the land.

Mr. Fletcher then withdrew his original motion and Mr. Langley his support of the original motion.

Mr. Fletcher, supported by Mr. Langley, then moved to authorize and empower the Marlborough School Board to sell on behalf of the District the property known as the Elementary School; (including so much land as the school board deems appropriate, and the building) and to authorize the documents in connection therewith, including but not limited to, deeds; the proceeds of such sale to be used for renovation and repairs to the building known as Marlborough High School.

**Article 10.** A motion was presented by Manfredo Torelli, supported by John F. Fletcher, that the District establish a capital reserve fund under the provisions of Chapter 35 of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated and that the proceeds of said Capital Reserve Fund be used for the purpose of installing or constructing access between floors of the Marlborough High School, such access being required by PL-504 of the

Federal Law and further, moved that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be placed in the above mentioned capital reserve fund.

The motion and the Article were defeated on a voice vote.

**Article 11.** Voted favorably on the motion of Edwin Wheeler, supported by William F. Cumings, that we pass over this article.

**Article 12.** Voted favorably on the motion of William F. Cumings, supported by Edwin Wheeler, that we pass over this article.

**Article 13.** Voted favorably on the motion of Joseph Puleo, supported by Manfredo Torelli, that the District accept the sum of \$2,100 plus interest remaining in the Roof Bond account and to apply such monies as a revenue for the 1982-83 school year.

**Article 14.** Voted favorably on the motion of Joseph Puleo, supported by Manfredo Torelli, that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,800 for the purpose of conducting an energy conservation audit at the Marlborough High School.

**Article 15.** Voted favorably on the motion of John F. Fletcher, supported by Oliver F. Derby, that the District authorize the School Board to take such action on behalf of the District as may be required to continue as a party in the second year of a suit against the State of New Hampshire and proper officials thereof to compel the State to provide funds to the school districts for the purpose of more equalizing the opportunities for the children to receive a basic education and further, that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$420 to effectuate the purpose of this article.

**Article 16.** Vote in the affirmative by acclamation on the motion of David J. Keenan, supported by Peter Von Sneidern, that the meeting be adjourned. The meeting was adjourned at 0150 hours on March 3, 1982.

## MINUTES OF THE SPECIAL MEETING OF THE MARLBOROUGH SCHOOL DISTRICT HELD ON MAY 15, 1982

Meeting called to order at 1305 hours, prevailing time, on May 15, 1982 by Moderator Irvin H. Gordon. Mr. Manfredo Torelli explained the reports which were handed to voters as they entered the hall. Mr. Edwin Wheeler read the following resolution:

"Resolved by the members of the Marlborough, New Hampshire Taxpayers Association that we commend the members of the Marlborough School Board for their continuing commitment to provide the students of Marlborough the best possible educational opportunity and for their personal commitment of time, energy and talent to the elected office which they hold. During a most difficult and frustrating period in school history, you have continued to hold to your basic beliefs and given of your personal time far beyond the usual expected of a School Board member. We also take this opportunity to recognize and thank your families for their long enduring forbearance and for their constant moral support. Let the record show that we support you as our elected officials in your continued effort in the democratic process of school supervision."

The moderator then read the decree of the Cheshire County Superior Court authorizing a special meeting of the Marlborough School District on this date and the warrant for this meeting. The moderator then declared the meeting open for action under Article 1.

**Article 1.** Voted favorably by acclamation on the motion of John Fletcher, supported by Manfredo Torelli, that the district rescind the authority granted to the School Board to enter into a contract with the Monadnock Regional School District for the education of Marlborough students at Monadnock Regional High School; not, however, to rescind the appropriation made under Article 8 of the 1982 Annual School District Meeting Warrant.

A motion was introduced by David Keenan, supported by John Manning, that we take up Article 3 next and then go back to Article 2.

A question arose regarding the number of votes necessary to approve this motion. The moderator ruled that a simple majority was all that was required. The moderator's ruling was challenged by Russell Walton. The moderator asked for a voice vote in support of his ruling and the vote was unclear. The voters were then asked to rise, stand, and be counted and the moderator's ruling was supported by a vote of 288 in favor to 111 opposed.

David Keenan's motion to take up Article 3 before Article 2 was then defeated by a voice vote.

**Article 2.** A motion was introduced by Joseph Puleo, supported by Manfredo Torelli, that the District ratify and approve the May 13, 1982 contract with the Keene School District for the education of Marlborough's high school students; further, that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$69,776. over and above the money appropriated at the 1982 Annual School District Meeting.

Voters speaking on the article were Karen Marotte, David Cheney, Russell Walton, Peter Von Sneidern, William Cleary, James Metcalf, Robert O'Brien, Emma Lougee, Manfredo Torelli, and Norman Russell. Larry Garnett, a student, was allowed to speak after a poll of voters.

Voted favorably on the motion of Richard Hutchins, supported by Judy Langley that we move to the question.

The moderator declared the polls open for balloting on the motion to ratify and approve the contract with the Keene School district. After all had voted who wished, the polls were closed and the ballots were counted by the voting officials, in the presence of the moderator, and tallied by the deputy district clerk. When the counting was completed, the result of the balloting was declared and publicly announced by the moderator as follows:

Total number of votes cast	513

Opposed to contract approval	236

The moderator declared that by their vote, the voters had ratified and approved the May 13, 1982 contract with the Keene School District for the education of Marlborough's high school students and had approved raising the sum of \$69,776 over and above the money appropriated at the 1982 Annual School District Meeting.

**Article 3.** Voted favorably by acclamation on the motion of Edward Goodrich, Jr., supported by Gary Langley, that we pass over Article 3.

**Article 4.** A motion was introduced by Manfredo Torelli, supported by Joseph Puleo, that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$71,528 over and above the amount appropriated at the 1982 Annual School District Meeting in order to provide for an approved Marlborough Junior High School.

Speaking on this Article were Joseph Puleo, Dr. Melvin Chafetz, Dr. Bernard Ellis. There was considerable further discussion.

Voted favorably by acclamation on the motion of Karen Marotte, supported by Brian Christo, that we move to the question.



The motion that the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$71,528 over and above the amount appropriated at the 1982 Annual School District Meeting in order to provide for an approved Marlborough Junior High School was then passed by acclamation.

**Article 5.** Voted favorably by acclamation on the motion of John Fletcher supported by Manfredo Torelli, that we pass over Article 5.

**Article 6.** Voted favorably by acclamation on the motion of John Fletcher, supported by Manfredo Torelli, that we pass over Article 6.

Voted favorably by acclamation on the motion Manfredo Torelli, supported by John Manning, that the meeting be adjourned. The meeting was adjourned at 1700 hours.
