The undersigned, the Committee on Finance of the City Council of said City, certify, that in accordance with the provisions of an Ordnance of said City, we have this day examined the foregoing account of John G. Kimball, City Treasurer, and find the same to be correctly cast and each payment properly vouched by a Treasury Order for the same corresponding in amount with the vouchers in the hands of the City Clerk.

We have also examined the sources from which the income of the past year has been derived, and are satisfied that he has charged himself with the whole amount paid into the Treasury.

We find that the total receipts into the Treasury during the past year including thirteen thousand eight hundred and forty dollars and eighty-eight cents, (\$13,840 88), on hand at the commencement, have been two hundred and seventeen thousand two hundred and thirty-two dollars and sixty-six cents, (\$217,232 66). The total payments during the same time have been one hundred ninety-six thousand seven hundred and forty dollars and sixty cents, (\$196,740 60,) leaving balance in the Treasury this day, twenty thousand four hundred ninety-two dollars and six cents (\$20,492 06,) which has been shown and counted this day.

# REPORT

#### OF THE

CHIEF ENGINEER OF FIRE DEPARTMENT.

CITY OF NASHUA, FIRE DEPARTMENT, FEB. 25, 1865. To the Honorable Board of Mayor and Aldermen:

In conformity with section 6 of an ordinance relating to the Fire Department, I herewith transmit to you my annual report of the Fire Department.

The machines and apparatus belonging to the City, and in use for the extinguishment of Fires are in good order and condition for the purposes intended.

The loss by Fire has been about \$13,400. The Department has been called out by alarms of fire five times.

There have been 1000 feet of leading hose purchased and a new roof put upon Engine House No. 1, without any additional appropriation than that made last year, which was \$5000, and which was \$1000 less than it should have been, without any extra expenditures, which will account for the overdraw of the appropriation.

I return my thanks to the Officers and Members of the Fire Department for the faithful discharge of their duty at all times in cases of fire.
