# Town Warrant for 1962

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## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of North Hampton in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the New School Building on Atlantic Avenue in said North Hampton on Tuesday, the Thirteenth day of March, 1962, at one o'clock in the afternoon; Business meeting to begin at 7:30 P.M.; Polls not to close before 7:30 P.M. To act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE I. To choose one Selectman for three years, one Town Clerk, one Town Treasurer, one Collector of Taxes, and all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE II. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

ARTICLE III. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE IV. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars as a capital reserve fund to be used for the construction of town buildings. (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)



ARTICLE V. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Ninety (\$390.00) Dollars to install fire hydrants on South Road, Walnut Avenue, and Stevens Road. (Total of Three.) (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE VI. On petition of Mrs. Irene A. Drake and twelve other legal voters to see if the town will vote to install a street light at, or near the residences of Mr. Allen Sawyer, and Mr. Leo Warring, on River Road, North Hampton. (Not recommended by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE VII. On petition of John Preston and twenty-one other legal voters to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty-four Dollars and Eighty-eight Cents (\$44.88) to install two street lights on Pine Road at regular intervals between the existing light at the edge of the Bixby property and Mill Road. (Recommended by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE VIII. To see if the Town will vote to finish off a room in the basement of the library for general use; and to appoint the Library Trustees a committee for such purpose; and to appropriate and use for such purpose the sum of Seven Hundred and Fifty (\$750.00) Dollars from the principal and accumulated interest of the Capital Reserve Funds appropriated in the years 1945 and 1946 for the construction and reconstruction of town buildings; and to authorize the Trustees of Trust Funds to make payments, approved by said committee, from said Capital Reserve Funds for such purpose. (Not recommended by the Budget Committee.)

ARTICLE IX. On petition of William P. Fowler and eleven other legal voters to see if the Town will vote discontinue the portion of the abandoned roadway,

shown as the "Old King's Highway" in dotted lines on the Town map, that crosses the land formerly of the late Felix Viano, in Little Boar's Head District, and the lands now owned by Alfred L. Viano, Lawrence F. Viano, Peter Swanson, Lillian L. Viano, and Agnes F. Viano, or any of them.

ARTICLE X. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint two additional members to the Planning Board, thereby increasing the total membership of appointed members from four to six.

ARTICLE XI. To see if the Town will vote to amend the North Hampton Zoning Ordinance as adopted on September 17, 1946 and amended on March 8, 1955; March 13, 1956; and March 14, 1961; by adding under Section IV, Paragraph "D", Prohibited Use; a new paragraph number six, which reads as follows:

6. A Public Tenting Area, defined as any land rented for tenting and camping area designed primarily for tourists, vacationers and travelers.

ARTICLE XII. To see if the Town will vote to amend the North Hampton Zoning Ordinance as adopted on September 17, 1946, and amended on March 8, 1955 and March 13, 1956, by striking out Section X, Lot Size, as now in affect, and by substituting therefor the following:

Section X. Lot Size. No dwelling, including its accessory buildings, shall hereafter be built or placed on any lot having less than 21,000 square feet of land and 135 feet of frontage reserved for the use of such dwelling, its accessory buildings and the occupants thereof, exclusive of land reserved or used for any building not accessory to such dwelling; provided that

one dwelling may be erected or placed on a lot containing less than 21,000 square feet of land, but not less than 15,000 square feet of land, or having a frontage of less than 135 feet but not less than 100 feet, if on or before March 13, 1962, there was no existing lawful building occupying over thirty percent of the said lot, and the said lot was then under single or joint ownership, or was then shown on a recorded plan of lots.

(Recommended by the Planning Board)

ARTICLE XIII. To transact any other business that may legally come before the said meeting.

**REPORT OF TOWN MEETING****March 13, 1962**

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A meeting of the Inhabitants of the Town of North Hampton qualified to vote in town affairs and holden in the School Building in said Town, the alphabetical list of voters having been posted and subscribed on the back thereof by the supervisors of the Checklist, was called to order at one o'clock in the afternoon by the Moderator, James F. Leavitt, who declared the Polls open for the election of Town Officers, the business meeting to be held at 7:30 P.M. It was voted that the Polls remain open long enough after the business meeting to give everyone an opportunity to vote.

At 7:30 P.M. Moderator James F. Leavitt declared the meeting open and announced that the Polls would remain open long enough after the close of the business meeting to give everyone an opportunity to vote.

Moderator Leavitt asked Reverend Martin Johnson to say a prayer, after which Moderator Leavitt read the Town Warrant for 1962.

Article 1. Officers elected from the floor.

Assessors of Taxes.

Moderator Leavitt stated that by State law the Selectmen are automatically Assessors of Taxes. No action was taken.

Overseers of the Poor.

George G. Carter moved and it was so voted that the Selectmen act as such.

Fence Viewer.

William P. Fowler moved and it was so voted that Raymond O. Hobbs serve as Fence Viewer for the ensuing year.

Sealer of Weights and Measures.

William P. Fowler moved and it was so voted that D. Morris Lamprey serve as such for the ensuing year.

Public Weighers.

On motion of William P. Fowler it was voted that Warren Lamprey and D. Morris Lamprey serve as such, Surveyors of Wood and Lumber.

On motion of George G. Carter it was voted that Raymond O. Hobbs, Richard T. Goss, and Forrest E. Knowles, Sr. serve in this capacity.

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Article 2. Percy C. Rogers moved that action on this article be postponed until all other articles had been given consideration. It was a vote.



Article 3. William P. Fowler moved that this article be passed as read. It was a vote.

Article 4. Maurice E. Kierstead, Selectman, stated that if this article were passed, this \$5,000.00 would be the first deposit in a new Capital Reserve Fund solely for the purpose of new construction of town buildings in which town offices and the fire department would be housed. He said he had no idea what the final cost might be but estimated between \$35,000 and \$40,000. He stated that no plans have been drawn, everything is in preliminary stages and being handled by the Planning Board. He said it was the general idea to budget an amount of money each year until such time enough has accumulated in this Capital Reserve Fund to build new town buildings. This Capital Reserve Fund would be invested, would earn interest, and eliminate the borrowing of a large sum of money to erect these buildings. This article was voted by ballot. Total votes cast: 239; Yes 194, No 45. It was a vote.

Moderator Leavitt appointed Richard A. Nelson and Edgar N. Hobby, Jr. as tellers for the evening.

Article 5. Selectman Kierstead stated that since the article had been inserted in the Warrant it had been brought to his attention that there was only a two-inch water line running from Mill Road up South Road and in order for a hydrant to be installed, this line would have to be changed to a minimum of six inches, possibly eight inches; consequently, the South Road hydrant would have to be deleted from Article 5. It was moved and voted to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Sixty (\$260.00) Dollars to install fire hydrants on Walnut Avenue and Stevens Road. (Total of Two.)

Article 6. Gordon S. Dow moved and it was so voted that as soon as River Road was brought up to town specifications and accepted as a Town Road that considera-

tion be given by the Zoning Inspectors to the installation of street lights on that road.

Article 7. John Preston moved and it was so voted that this article be passed as read.

Article 8. Dorothy E. Hobbs moved that this article be passed as read. This article was voted by ballot. Total votes cast: 205; Yes 110, No. 95. It was a vote.

Article 9. William P. Fowler stated that "Old King's Highway" was a right of way given to the Town many years ago and that it had not been used as a roadway since 1890 or 1892. Mr. Fowler moved and it was voted that this article be passed as read.

Article 10. Gordon S. Dow moved and it was voted that this article be passed as read.

Article 11. Raymond O. Hobbs stated that if this article were passed, it would not prevent the present two Public Tenting Areas, namely Frederick Robinson's and Chauncey M. Smith, Jr.'s, both on Lafayette Road, from continuing as long as they adhered to the regulations set by the Zoning Inspectors but it would prohibit the establishment of any more public tenting areas in town. It was moved that this article be passed as read. Voted by a show of hands. Yes 91, No 114. It was not a vote.

Article 12. George G. Carter moved and it was voted that this article be passed as read.

Article 13. William P. Fowler moved that the Town allow a five per cent discount on taxes paid on or before a certain date designated by the Selectmen. Voted by a show of hands. Yes 97, No 108. It was not a vote.

Jan Staalenburg moved and it was voted to transfer town owned recreation equipment, originally bought for the summer recreation program and now held in storage, to the school.

William P. Fowler moved and it was unanimously voted to send a letter of best wishes to Fred C. Leavitt who for the first time in 68 years had missed attending an annual North Hampton Town Meeting.

William P. Fowler moved that the Selectmen have a list of all 1962 town assessments printed and distributed to the voters and taxpayers of the town. Mr. Fowler accepted Raymond J. Schmitt's amendment to the effect that the Selectmen have a list of all 1961 and 1962 individual property assessments published in the 1962 town report and published every three years thereafter, this to be paid for out of the general expenses allowed the Selectmen in the annual budget. It was a vote.

Article 2. Chairman Barbara G. Luther presented the 1962 Budget as prepared by the Municipal Budget Committee including the additional sums voted in Articles 4, 5 and 7.

Police Chief Francis W. Harney, Jr. moved that the town increase the Police Department appropriation by \$1,000.00 to enable a second full-time officer to be hired. This was voted by ballot. Total votes cast: 180; Yes 124, No 56. It was a vote.

George G. Carter moved that the town raise sums of money as set forth in the 1962 Town Budget as presented by the Budget Committee, \$89,628.18, plus the increase of \$5,304.88 voted in Articles 4, 5, and 7, and the \$1,000.00 increase in the Police Department, making a total of \$95,933.06. It was a vote.

The report of the five-man Industrial Development Committee appointed by the Selectmen as a result of a vote in the 1961 Town Meeting was read by Laurence A. Martin, Chairman.

It was moved and unanimously supported that Raymond O. Hobbs be given a round of applause by the

town's people for the many, many hours of work and information which he has so generously contributed toward the reassessment of town property and for his diligence in keeping the Town Map so accurate and up to date.

William P. Fowler moved that the meeting be adjourned and it was so voted.

The meeting adjourned at 10:10 p.m.

The polls closed at 10:20 p.m.

## REPORT OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT

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To the citizens of North Hampton:

During the year of 1962, forty-three calls were received for assistance. The most common causes were children playing with matches, outside incinerators, and grass and brush fires caused by careless disposal of cigarettes. The fire losses for 1962 amounted to several thousand dollars. Good house keeping means good fire protection. The department was called out 8 times through the Mutual Aid System. Hampton 3, Brentwood 1, Stratham 2, Rye 1, and Hampton Falls 1.

There were 8 members of this department who attended the Meadowood Fire Training School at Troy, N. H., which is sponsored by the N. H. Fire Chief's Club. Very much valuable information was gained at this school in extinguishing fires.

During Fire Prevention Week in October a fire drill and inspection was held at the school which was very successful. A program with SMOKEY the bear was put on which the children enjoyed very much.

This past fall Captain Donald Lane of the Portsmouth Fire Dept., an instructor on Fire Fighting sponsored by the State Board of Education, conducted a six week course at the fire station on smoke masks, resuscitators and their uses on life saving. There were 15 firemen who attended these classes and gained valuable information which will help them when they are called on for emergency assistance.

I want to extend my thanks to the fine group of firemen for their cooperation in attending meetings, fire drills and their help in fighting fires.

At this time I would like to bring your attention to the fact that the New Hampshire Board of Fire Underwriters have an age limit of 20 years dependability on fire equipment. At the present time the Seagraves 500 gallon pumper is 5 years over limit and the Ford combination will expire in 1967. If we are to maintain our present Insurance rates I suggest that some future planning be initiated this year.

# Town Warrant for 1963

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## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of North Hampton in the County of Rockingham, in said State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the New School Building on Atlantic Avenue in said North Hampton on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, 1963, at one o'clock in the afternoon; Business meeting to begin at 7:30 P.M.; Polls not to close before 7:30 P.M.; To act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE I. To choose one Selectman for three years, one Town Clerk, one Town Treasurer, one Collector of Taxes, and all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE II. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

ARTICLE III. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

ARTICLE IV. On petition of William P. Fowler and thirteen other legal voters: To see if the Town will vote to purchase, as an addition to the Center Cemetery, 3.49 acres of pasture land from the estate of Fred C. Leavitt, adjoining the south side of said cemetery, and to appropriate the sum of two thousand eight hundred dollars (\$2,800.00) for that purpose, and to authorize the Trustees of Trust Funds and Cemeteries to take all necessary action, and to make all incidental arrange-

ments to effect the same and for the maintenance, use or lease of said land until required for cemetery purposes. (Recommended by Budget Committee).

ARTICLE V. To see if the Town will vote to participate in the Urban Planning Assistance Program and raise and appropriate the sum of Thirty-Five Hundred (\$3,500.00) Dollars as the Town's share of the total cost. (Without recommendation of Budget Committee).

ARTICLE VI. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance as adopted on March 17, 1946, and amended at later Town Meetings, as follows:

1. By striking out the first paragraph under Section VIII, which reads as follows: "Except within the Little Boar's Head Zoning District, where enforcement shall be by the zoning officers of Little Boar's Head District and under the provisions of its Zoning Ordinance this ordinance shall be enforced as follows:" and substituting therefor the following: "The enforcement of this Zoning Ordinance shall be administered for the Town of North Hampton, including Little Boar's Head District, by the appropriate officials and shall be enforced as follows:".

2. By striking out all of Section III and inserting in place thereof the following: "Any use that is prohibited in the Rural Zoning District shall not be permitted in the Little Boar's Head Zoning District:".

3. Amend Section XII of the Zoning Ordinance by adding the following sentence: "The provisions of this Section shall apply to all Sections of the Town of North Hampton including the Little Boar's Head Zoning District."

ARTICLE VII. To see if the Town will vote to add to Section 4 "Rural Zoning District Uses," and to be known as "E" of this Section of the North Hampton Zoning Ordinance. "No further permits to be issued



for a Quarry, Gravel Pit, Sand Pit or for any similar use, or for the removal of loam except upon application to and at the option of the Planning Board. Permits to be issued if in their opinion it is not injurious or detrimental to the neighborhood." This article to become effective on passing.

ARTICLE VIII. To see if the Town will vote to add to Section 4 "Rural Zoning District Uses," of the North Hampton Zoning Ordinance, and to be known as "F" of this Section. "All Quarries, Gravel Pits, Sand Pits or Loam Fields now open must have a permit to operate as such and this permit to be issued by the Planning Board for an initial period of not more than one year and to be subject to renewal upon application to and at the option of the Planning Board for successive periods of not more than one year, and said permit or any renewal thereof may specify the depth, distance from adjoining property and bank angle to which the gravel or other material may be removed." This to become effective on passing.

ARTICLE IX. To see if the Town will vote to add to Section 4 "Rural Zoning District Uses," of the North Hampton Zoning Ordinance, and to be known as "G" of this section. "On and after March 13, 1963, no sand, gravel, loam or any other type of Natural fill is to be removed from said Town of North Hampton unless in the opinion of the Planning Board it causes a hardship on said owner of the sand, gravel, loam or other Natural fill. This is to be left to the judgement of the Planning Board and for which Special permits must be issued." This to become effective on passing.

ARTICLE X. To see if the Town, as recommended by the Planning Board, will vote to allocate numbers to all houses in the Town and to empower the Planning Board to make all necessary arrangements including Size, Style and Location for such numbering of houses;

this to include places of business and numbering of vacant land on existing streets; owners and/or builders to be responsible for such numbering; the Board to be given power to appoint a Committee to assist in the numbering.

ARTICLE XI. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred and Fifty (\$750.00) Dollars from the principal and accumulated interest of the Capital Reserve Fund No. 1 for the construction and reconstruction of town buildings; and to authorize the Trustees of Trust Funds to make such payment from Capital Reserve Fund to the Library Trustees for expenses incurred as a vote of the Town to finish off a room in the basement of the library for general use. (Recommended by Budget Committee).

ARTICLE XII. To see if the Town will vote to discontinue and abandon that portion of Moore's Lane, so-called, as described and designated on the Town Map by the dotted line, said land being abutted by land of Carl W. and Marion H. Fehrs and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sign and execute a deed transferring title to said road to said Carl W. and Marion H. Fehrs in consideration of the sum of One Dollar (\$1.00)

ARTICLE XIII. To see if the Town will vote to establish Capital Reserve Fund #4 for the purpose of purchasing a new Police Cruiser for the Town and to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Hundred and Fifty (\$750.00) Dollars to be placed in said Fund for said purpose. (Recommended by Budget Committee).

ARTICLE XIV. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars to be used for the purpose of mosquito control. (Recommended by Budget Committee).

ARTICLE XV. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Fire Department to employ its

trucks, hose, and other equipment, in other towns in the Seacoast area under the "mutual aid" system.

ARTICLE XVI. To see what action the Town wishes to take on a participation basis for the proposed development of a general aviation airport in the Seacoast Area to be constructed in the Pine Hill Section of Stratham and North Hampton.

ARTICLE XVII. To see what action the Town will take regarding a discount on taxes paid on or before a date which the Selectmen shall designate.

ARTICLE XVIII. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

**WATER COMMISSIONERS' REPORT**1962

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There were two official meetings held this year by the Commission. The first was held on April 23, 1962. It was the unanimous decision that the present needs should be paid off before any more money be borrowed for extension of water in North Hampton.

There are other improvements that will benefit the Town water supply and service in the making and will be made known as soon as the complete plans are made for public release.

We should like to make it known that any petition for Water that is to be acted on at the regular Town Meeting should be in the hands of the Water Commission by November previous to the following year so as to allow time for proper action to be taken.

## INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE REPORT

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The Industrial Development Committee met once during the year at which time the possibilities of attracting industry to North Hampton were discussed with Mr. Allen P. Chase, Industrial Agent, Office of Industrial Development, Department of Resources & Economic Development, State of New Hampshire, Concord, N. H.

Members of the Committee present were, Edgar Hobby, Byron Kirby, Harry Loughlin and Laurence Martin. An interested resident, Capt. Kirke LaShelle also attended the meeting. The overall picture was discussed at length and it was decided that our Committee was not in a position to advance North Hampton's attractiveness to industry through advertising or brochures, because we had no budget for such items.

At the present time it is felt that North Hampton is not attractive to industry, the biggest stumbling block being the lack of Town Water on U. S. Route #1, where the commercially zoned land for industrial development is located.

Recently, the Town Planning Board has been making some surveys, etc., which the Industrial Development is going to wait and see what develops, so as not to duplicate any of the Planning Board's work. The present Committee consists of Edgar Hobby, Byron Kirby, Harry Loughlin, Kendall Chevalier and Laurence Martin.

The future activities of the Industrial Development Committee may necessarily be curtailed somewhat until



such time as the overall Plan of the Town is known and the work of the Planning Board is further along. At that time we will have more information to go on and know what direction we are supposed to be taking. The present Industrial Development Committee is made up of interested, unpaid citizens of the Town, who operate without any budget. It is felt that more progress will be made in the future after the Planning Board completes its present study.

## REPORT OF LIBRARY TRUSTEES

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The Trustees appreciate the many gifts of books and periodicals which have been received during the past year. It is necessary to be selective when we accept collections of used books as the shelves are crowded and we try to keep only those books which will go into circulation.

New window shades were installed throughout the building which has made it possible to show films and slides during the day. Mr. Ellsworth Frye has kindly loaned his projector numerous times over the past three years so we could take advantage of the free film service provided by the State Library.

A room was finished off in the basement for storage, a meeting place for trustees and librarian, and a work room.

The library won a book award for the third consecutive year in the contest, sponsored by the State Library, for the observance of National Library Week. Special events included a program of Book Reviews by Mrs. Marion Rudkins, sponsored by the Friends; coffee hours, sponsored by the Women's Fellowship and Ladies' Union, the Home Demonstration Group, the Bush and Bud Garden Club and the Senior Woman's Club and a program for parents of pre-school children, under the direction of the Junior Woman's Club. There was a contest for school children and a local "Bookmobile" made several visits to homes. There will be a full program again in 1963. We call your attention to the dates: NATIONAL LIBRARY WEEK, April 21 through April 27.

The "Friends of the Library" group continued to be active. Members met each month to work at the library. They sponsored a series of story hours for pre-school children, two film programs for children, the fourth annual tour of Colonial Houses and a sale of old books and magazines.

During the Christmas Holidays the Women's Club provided an outdoor Christmas tree and the Bush and Bud Garden Club decorated the reading rooms.

The trustees were given an opportunity to apply for a State Aid Grant to the State Library Commission. Our library was awarded \$150.00 which was used for a special project, namely, "How To Do It Books" for adults.

The librarian and one or more trustees attended district meetings in Exeter, sponsored by the State Library and the annual meeting of the New Hampshire Library Association, held in Manchester.

The librarian and trustees met with Mr. Emil Allen, Jr., Assistant State Librarian, to discuss the future physical needs of the library. The trustees hope to work out a suitable plan for expansion with the Town Planning Board.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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In this, my second report to School Board Members and voters of Supervisory Union No. 21, an attempt is being made to cover three points:

### District Membership and Staff

### Space Requirements for Increasing Student Membership

### Some Recommendations of Interim Commission on Education

The first topic, "Student Membership and Staff" is included as background information which is requisite for an understanding of the business of this Supervisory Union.

Supervisory Union No. 21 continues to include eight school districts, namely: Hampton, Hampton Falls, New Castle, North Hampton, Rye, Seabrook, South Hampton, and Winnacunnet Cooperative. In December of 1962 there were in these eight districts 3,519 pupils in grades K-12 attending schools and a total of two hundred forty-one school district personnel including administrators, teachers, nurses, secretaries, cafeteria staff, and custodians — an increase of two hundred pupils over the previous year and a total of twelve additional staff members.

Charts which follow show the distribution of pupils by districts and by grades and the number of employees in the several categories in each district.

The second topic, "Space Requirements for Increasing Student Membership" is presented as a union-wide problem. It may be very desirable to propose and examine solutions which cross individual school district boundary lines in an effort to find the best possible plan. Board members in several districts will remember the school year 1962-1963 as a year of much study regarding space needs and possible building programs.

In Hampton a \$475,000.00 addition is well on its way toward completion. Mr. Irving Hersey, of Durham, New Hampshire, is the architect of this addition which provides 11 general classrooms, 2 science rooms, a cafeteria, music room, library, physical education room, and boys' and girls' shower and locker areas. Mr. Winston Titus, of Laconia, New Hampshire, is the general con-

tractor and it is expected that the second story classrooms will be occupied during this school year.

In Hampton Falls School Board members are giving thought to how best to provide for their elementary pupils. The problem in Hampton Falls, as in many other such communities, is that the gradual increase in pupils is reaching the point where a separate teacher and a separate classroom should be provided for each grade level. Six teachers and six classrooms are needed, and only five of each are available. Board members are interested in exploring all possibilities, including the extension of the Winnacunnet Cooperative to include all twelve grades or sharing facilities with other districts on a tuition basis. It could well be that study committees, composed of citizens from several communities, may find solutions which are not now conspicuous.

New Castle is the only district without a school building problem. The Maude H. Trefethen School houses grades 1-6 inclusive, with students in grades 7-12 attending the Portsmouth Schools on a tuition basis.

In North Hampton a study is just getting underway as a result of the completion of this year's membership projection which projection clearly requires serious attention be given to space needs in the near future for this fast growing community.

The Rye School District rejected a plan for an addition to the Junior High School at the March 1962 School District Meeting. The Board has worked diligently and effectively to improve last year's proposal and has a plan which seems to overcome objections voiced last year. One may expect that the action of voters regarding this issue will serve to identify the 1962-1963 school year, and in the interest of quality education I urge support of the Board's proposal.

Seabrook School District may, if the voters support the Board's thinking, have a committee appointed to study the future space needs. School population charts

have been studied and the Seabrook School Board considers that a committee is needed to thoroughly investigate this matter.

In South Hampton the distribution of pupils at each grade level is such that another teacher is needed and this would require another classroom. Fortunately some preliminary thought has been given to anticipate this need and it is hoped that a way can be found to provide the additional space without undue delay.

Winnacunnet school building needs will be covered more comprehensively in a separate report to voters of the Winnacunnet Cooperative School District. However, it is apparent that the addition needed should be such that the total school can accommodate 1200 students. Conservative estimates give evidence of this need.

With seven of the eight districts having a space problem, our thinking should include the possibility of cooperative action, and it is for this reason that this presentation crosses district lines.

The third and final topic to be presented, "Some Recommendations of the Interim Committee on Education", has been very much in the news and will, I expect, be of continuing interest.

From the time the joint resolution was adopted and the fifteen member commission named, school men have held high hopes for the outcome of such a comprehensive study—here would be outstandingly competent lay people investigating, in a positive setting, the total educational function within our State.

The three major areas of investigation included (1) the organization and grouping of public school districts into supervisory unions. (2) post secondary education, and (3) public school finance.

The recommendations have been quoted from the Preliminary Report of the Interim Commission dated December 20, 1962 and can be found following this report. I trust these recommendations made to the General Court will be of interest to voters.

I sincerely appreciate the cooperation and many kindnesses which have been extended me as Superintendent of Supervisory Union No. 21. I pledge my best efforts to the responsibilities and duties of this office.

## REPORT OF SUBCOMMITTEE ON PUBLIC SCHOOLS

1. It is recommended that the existing 48 supervisory unions be organized into 34 supervisory districts, in accordance with a Master Plan for educational organization.

2. It is recommended that the Authorized Regional Enrollment Area concept be adopted.

3. It is recommended that tuition charges by A. R. E. A. schools be fixed at the following levels:

Elementary	\$260.00
Junior High	324.00
High School	440.00

4. It is recommended that state incentive aid be awarded to A. R. E. A. schools on the basis of each average daily memberships crossing town lines, as follows:

Elementary	\$ 45.00
Junior High	60.00
High School	75.00

## REPORT OF SUBCOMMITTEE ON PUBLIC SCHOOL FINANCE

1. The Commission recommends that New Hampshire adopt the goal of assuming at state level *at least* twenty per cent of the costs of local public school education within the next ten years or by the end of the fiscal year 1971-1972.

2. The Commission recommends that this goal be accomplished by a gradual increase in state assistance during the next decade keeping the ratio at all times at approximately 60% equalization grant and 40% flat grant. As more money becomes available for equalization grants in the years ahead, favorable consideration should be given to reducing the present standard for required local effort now set at 14 mills and, in order to keep flat grants at the recommended 40%, to adopting the State Board of Education's plan for transportation aid and other reasonable flat grant plans.

3. The commission recommends against attempting to reach this goal in any one or two bienniums, believing that the projected state assistance should only be increased gradually over the next decade, hand in hand, with improvements in local school district organization, in other words, that reorganization should keep pace with such increased assistance, the legislature to be the judge of this pace. Money alone will not solve the problem; there must be a willingness to see that it is put to productive use.

4. The Commission recommends a substantial program of state "reorganization aid" to assist local school districts in attaining better area grouping, as recommended in another part of this report. There will be in the long run substantial economics through such reorganization, as well as better schools.

5. The Commission recommends a substantial program of state appropriations to implement its recommendations in the field of higher education as set forth in another part of this report.

6. For the next biennium, new revenue will have to be raised to implement the recommendations of this Commission. However, such needed new revenue can clearly be raised by reasonable increases in the rates

of several existing state taxes (as the Commission recommends in the body of its report), and tax revision in the form of new broad base taxation is not needed if our recommendations for the next biennium are the sole requirement for us to consider (as we have decided).

The Commission has not attempted to prejudge the financial situation of the state beyond the next biennium but has included in its report useful statistical information concerning the yields of a number of different taxes now in use in other states, for the information of the legislature and the chief executive.

Public finance must keep pace with the needs of our public schools and colleges. It is now evident that our public school and college system cannot give an adequate training for "the age of automation and space", unless it is supported by a broader revenue base than the basic property tax which dates from "the age of the horse and buggy". Twenty per cent of the population is now enrolled in the public school system, a large enterprise, which deserves no less than our best in public support, as an "investment" in the future of this state and its communities.

The above recommendations have obviously been taken directly from the Interim Report and are presented here to make them permanently available to the voters of this Supervisory Union.

## REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

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To the Superintendent of Schools and the School Board of North Hampton:

All pupils have been weighed, measured and given eye screening tests. Twenty-four pupils were found who needed complete eye exams. They were all seen by an eye doctor and the condition corrected.

Hearing tests were done on students of the first, third, fifth, and seventh grades. Two were found who had a hearing problem. Both were seen and treated by an otologist.

Classrooms were visited regularly and health problems discussed.

Tuberculin patch testing was done on pupils of all first, fourth and seventh grades. Nearly all of the students took advantage of this opportunity.

Fourth and seventh grades and all boys who participated in sports were given physical examinations by the school physician, Dr. Charles B. Bailey.

A pre-school clinic was held in May for the purpose of a doctor's exam and for school registration. Two were referred to their family physician for minor treatment. They were weighed and measured, eyes and ears were screened and health records were begun on them.

An evening Salk Polio Clinic was held at the North Hampton Town Hall on March 6th. This was for the benefit of both children and adults.

Sabin Oral Polio Clinics were held at the Rye Elementary School on six Sundays from 9:00 a.m.-4:00 p.m. These clinics were well attended by pupils and parents

from North Hampton. Much time was spent in planning for these clinics and I would like to thank all those who gave of their time and assistance.

The weekly itinerary speech program was carried on throughout the school year with fifteen pupils receiving speech therapy.

Many thanks to the Hampton Lions Club for their help during the past year.

Two hundred and fifty-three home contacts were made by me in 1962.

### STATE FIRE REGULATION

No person shall kindle a fire or burn any material in or near woodlands, pasture, brush, sprout, waste or cut over lands, or where the fire may be communicated to such land, except when the ground is covered with snow, without the written permission of the Forest Fire Warden or the presence of the warden or person designated to superintend such burning.

Any person, firm or corporation causing or kindling a fire without a permit, when a permit is required and also any person by whose negligence or the negligence of his agents any fire shall be caused, is liable to the town for all expenses incurred in attending or extinguishing such fire.
