THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Pittsburg in County of Coos in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Pittsburg on Tuesday, the 13th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget and raise money for same.
- 2. To see if the Town will give to the Selectmen authority to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to distribute the blank inventories at the time they examine and appraise the property to be taxed.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to give the Selectmen authority to assess a sum not exceeding 10 cents per \$1000. valuation of the assessed valuation of the Town for 1945, said sum to be turned over to the White Mountain Regional Association for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town together with other Towns in the Region.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to increase the basic rate of pay for Town Employees ten cents per hour.

- 6. To see if the Town will vote to support United States membership in a general system of international cooperation, such as that proposed at the Dumbarton Oaks Conference, having police power to maintain the peace of the world.
- 7. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.
- 8. To choose all necessary Town Officers.

- 8. To see if the district will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the district, as determined by the school board in its annual report.
- 9. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to sell the Indian Stream School.
- 10. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of the Pittsburg School District:

FOREWORD

Children are shaped by the entire community. Within the neighborhood or community are hundreds of forces which impinge upon them. Some of these forces are controlled and approved but many are not. There are, in every community of any size, blind spots so far as constructive control and influence are concerned which if neglected can only result in continuing delinquency.

The greater the need for concentrating on the battle front, the greater the necessity of strengthening here at home all that justifies its sacrifice. The more war disrupts our lives, the more responsibility we have to those upon whom its burden falls most heavily. These include not only the men and women plunged into military service or uprooted from their home to serve in war industries but also the children.

The prevention of juvenile delinquency is one of our home front problems. The home, the school and the community each have a responsibility. Neglect along the line is resulting in too many of our youth being crippled in mind and heart—tragic casualities of war time living.

Yet these are the citizens of tomorrow. And tomorrows soon come. In our hands, as parents and citizens of today, rests the obligation to see that on the home front, the foundations of morality, religion and culture are strengthened, not weakened.

Teachers

There have been several changes in the District

since the last report. In the High School, Marian Kelly, Salem State Teachers College, was selected to fill the Commercial vacancy and Marie LaFontana, Lowell State Teachers College was chosen for the Music vacancy.

Due to a decreased enrollment Junie Aldrich was employed for grades one to five at the Danforth and Hope Danielson was transferred to the Village Primary. The upper room at Danforth was closed.

Buildings and Equipment

The Village School building was completely redecorated inside and the woodwork painted outside during the summer vacation. The woodshed roof was painted. The Danforth School furnace pipes for the second floor were removed, a new slate blackboard was installed, desks sanded and varnished and new screens installed on the East Side.

The buildings are at the present time in the best condition they have been in for several years.

Enrollment and Attendance

The total enrollment of the District is 107, as compared with 126 last year. The enrollment four years ago was 177. This represents a drop of 70 within the four year period.

There are in the High School four from Clarksville and we have six from Pittsburg attending school at West Stewartstown and one at Canaan High.

Health

A brief report of the work of the School Nurse between February 1, 1944 and February 1, 1945 follows:

School inspections 939, home calls 271, treatments at school 68; physical defects: teeth 67 corrections 25,

tonsils 7 corrections 2, vision 30 corrections 23; surgical operations 4, anesthetics 3, skin diseases 6, contagious diseases 27, orthopedic cases 3, malnutrition 4, anemia 2, epilepsy 1, pupils to hospital 5, pupils to doctor 9, pupils to dentist 12, injuries 6, medical cases 43.

Notes on the Budget

The school board's total budget for 1945-1946 totals \$25,289.00 as compared with \$24,225.75 for last year. The estimated income is \$160.00 and the requested appropriation \$25,129.00. The appropriation last March was \$24,025.75. The increase is due to anticipated higher costs for salaries and supplies. There is a slight reduction in the estimated income.

Heating

Due to the increased cost of labor reflected in higher wood costs, the school board, as an experiment, is using coal to heat the village building. On the basis of a half-year heating season it seems safe to predict a saving in the fuel costs.

Statistics

The total equalized valuation of any district is made up of the Assessed Evaluation, Savings Bank Interest, Railroad Tax and Soldiers Exemptions. The equalized valuation of the Pittsburg School District is \$2,489,428.00. Current cost of public education per \$1,000.00 to the local district are \$5.50 and the latest per pupil elementary cost is \$160.56. The net cost per pupil for the local high school is \$122.92.

Conclusion

The schools are the community's opportunity for reaching all the children of all the people. It is our duty to provide their education, not education merely in terms of books, credits and diplomas, but education in terms of preparation for living and earning. I take this opportunity to express my appreciation to the members of the school board, parents, teachers and citizens for their support in our common effort to maintain good schools.

ANOTHER ENEMY TO CONQUER

Here is a home front fight that everyone can get into. Last year in this State 558 brush and forest fires burned over 4,648 acres of land, of which 2,788 acres were valuable timber and young growth. With available manpower the lowest of any year since the war started, you can help to keep this loss down by preventing these fires from starting.

Keep in mind these simple rules:

- 1. Always get a permit from your forest fire warden before starting any fires in the open. Burning under certain conditions is permitted.
- 2. Never burn unless you have enough help to control your fire—a permit does not excuse you of negligence in case it gets away.
- 3. Always report any uncontrolled fire promptly to your forest fire warden. Minutes lost are acres lost.
- 4. Be especially careful with cigarettes, matches and pipes. Smokers caused most of our fires.
- 5. Never leave a fire unless it is dead out. You can't feel safe while there is a spark left.
