# TOWN WARRANT

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## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Springfield, in the County of Sullivan, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Springfield, on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

Article 3. To see if the voters of the Town will accept the Selectmen's estimate of expenditures of the year ensuing and act thereon.

Article 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the maintenance of highways and bridges and make appropriations for the same.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$675.00 for State Aid Construction provided the state furnishes the sum of \$1,350.00, also to see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to meet any other amount which the State or Federal Government might allow in excess of the above amount.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the necessary money needed for oiling of the road in Springfield Village.

Article 7. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the road from the Town Hall to the Four Corners and make any necessary appropriations.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$150.00 for Library purposes.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for observance of Memorial Day.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$50.00 for hydrant service at Twin Lake Villa.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the salary of District Nurse.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 for Cemetery work.

Article 13. By request of Lake Sunapee Regional Association: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$35.00 for the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Regional Association.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 a year for a period not to exceed four years for rent of land for Timber Salvage, said sum of money to be spent only if the Town of Grantham appropriates the same.

Article 15. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to grant easements to the New Hampshire Electric Cooperative, Inc., on Town properties.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20.00 for fire tools provided the State furnish the same.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum, not to exceed \$1,000.00, for a portable pump and hose.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for Blister Rust Control.

Article 19. To see what action the Town will take in regard to a skating rink and make any necessary appropriations.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for laying tile at Willow Bridge, with the State furnishing the tile.

Article 21. To see what action the Town will take in regard to purchasing a truck and passing any vote thereto.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through Tax Collector's Deeds.

Article 23. To see what action the Town will take in regard to repairing the cemetery wall and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 24. To see what action the Town will take in regard to travelers and pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 25. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

### Clinics and Conferences with Nurse in Attendance:

Sept. 13, 1938, eye examination in Center and Maxfield schools by Dr. Mansfield, optometrist, of Newport, N. H. This clinic was not sponsored by the Lions Club as in previous years. Mrs. Kezar's room, 20 examined, 8 found defective; Mrs. Howard's room, 11 examined, 4 defective; Maxfield, 13 examined, 2 defective.

Nov. 9, 1938, the annual dental clinic sponsored by the S. N. A. was held in the town hall. Dr. Keane of Newport was in

charge, assisted by the local committee. Eighteen school-age students treated, 3 pre-school and one adult.

May 24, 1939, Dr. Kerr's State Tuberculosis Clinic was held at New London. Three Springfield patients attended for examination and chest x-rays. (All negative).

July 19, 1939, State Annual Pre-School Child Health and Toxoid Clinic was held at the town hall. Twenty-three children were examined, 7 receiving life immunity from diphtheria toxoid. Dr. William Prince of Newport was examiner, assisted by Miss E. Carriel, C. P. H. N., and cooperative local agencies as represented through the Child Health Conference Committee.

Others of school age children attended out of town clinics for tonsil and adenoid care and orthopedic treatments in Manchester.

Patients were transported through the year to local doctors and hospitals for medical or surgical attention, treatments, or x-rays, including Hanover, Manchester, New London, Enfield, Newport, Unity, Sunapee and Lebanon.

May I take this opportunity to express my gratitude and appreciation to my committee for their cooperation and kindnesses to me during this year; also to the townspeople who have helped my committee or me in any way to keep our association a thriving unit?

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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To the Springfield School Board:

I herewith submit the annual report of the Superintendent of Schools.

This year it was necessary to secure two new teachers. Mrs. Yvonne M. Kezar, who taught the primary room at the Center School for nine years, resigned. Her place was taken by Miss Elsie A. Smith, of Canaan, N. H., who formerly taught in the Morgan School in Springfield. Mrs. Marion A. Heath, who has taught the Maxfield School for 14 years, was granted a leave of absence. This school is now taught by Mrs. Charlotte L. Keysar of Colebrook, N. H. She is a graduate of Plymouth Normal School and attended summer school at Keene last summer.

The town is fortunate to have had for so long a period the loyal and effective service of Mrs. Kezar and Mrs. Heath. A stable corps of good teachers makes possible a well-organized and effective school system. Mrs. Howard has also rendered excellent service in our schools for a long period (9 years).

### Teachers' Meetings

A series of teachers' meetings was held during the fall term to consider better speech. These meetings were conducted by Prof. Edmund A. Cortez of New Hampshire University through the cooperation of the Division of University Extension. Prof. Cortez most interestingly and effectively described the technique of developing better speech habits.

The Center School was repainted inside and outside last summer, adding much to the appearance of the school. One side of the roof was shingled, too. This building now is in very good condition.

There are four pupils in the eighth grade this year, all in the Maxfield School. Last year there were five in the Center School and none at Maxfield.

The Center School unfortunately was afflicted by an epidemic of whooping cough which necessitated closing the school

the last two weeks in March. This time was made up by omitting the usual April vacation and going an extra week in June. This sickness also lowered the attendance record.

I appreciate the hearty cooperation of the school board, teachers and others, which has made the work of the year both pleasant and successful.
