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Commissioners' Report.

TO THE CITIZENS OF SULLIVAN COUNTY:—

We herewith submit a report of the financial condition and business affairs of the County, which are under the supervision of the County Commissioners, together with the reports of the respective County Officers for the year ending Dec. 31, 1895.

FINANCIAL CONDITION.

The County Convention voted to raise for the year 1895, \$30,000, the amount recommended by the commissioners. The expenses have been larger than we anticipated and the amount remaining in the treasury Jan. 1, 1896, was \$703.08, which is \$3,374.72 less than Jan. 1, 1895. The cost of supporting the poor was \$4,297.85 more in 1895 than in 1894. This is due partly to the fact that the time of holding the fall term of court was changed this year, so the bills were paid to the first Tuesday in November, making thirteen months' bills instead of twelve. There has also been more sickness among the outside poor than usual. The change in the law in regard to keeping children at the county farm has made an increase in the expense and will make a still larger increase in the future as the law did not go into effect until July 1. The amount of taxes to be raised in 1896 is \$28,150.00

PROBATE OFFICE.

The County Convention voted "That a sum not to exceed five hundred dollars be raised, to be expended under the direction of the County Commissioners, Register of Probate and Judge of Probate for improvements and rearranging in the probate office—the said sum to be added to the appropriations for 1896." It was thought best to put in the new fixtures the past summer, so that the work of refiling and indexing in the office could be commenced; under the old system of filing the vault would very soon have to be enlarged. There will now be room for several years to come, besides the increased convenience. When the refiling and indexing are completed any

document in the office can be found at a moment's notice. The expense of the fixtures was \$445.13, which amount has been paid from the appropriation of 1895.

THE COUNTY FARM AND ALMS HOUSE.

The horse barn, that was authorized by the last County Convention, has been built and is convenient and commodious. It is 40 by 50 feet, clapboarded and painted. The roof is slated and there is a cellar under the whole, facing the south, with a floor of concrete. It was thought best not to build on the old foundation but to build farther south in order to have the barn detached from the other buildings, on account of sanitary conditions and also on account of the risk from fire. It has been thought for some time that there should be telephone connection with the alms house, as it is in such an isolated situation; in case of an emergency a telephone might be needed very much and also that it would be a great convenience at all times. The Telephone Co. have constructed the line the past summer, the county paid one half the expense of construction and are to pay an annual rental hereafter. The expenses of the county farm were increased the past year by reason of losing nearly all the hogs last winter by disease. There has always been quite an income from the sale of young pigs and of pork, but the last season we have had to buy quite a large amount. The hogs now are in good condition. There were Jan. 1, forty-four on the farm.

We have been fortunate in being able to retain the services of Mr. and Mrs. Willard as superintendent and matron, who have well sustained their former enviable reputation by their careful, considerate and courteous treatment of the unfortunate people under their care and by their endeavor to make them as comfortable as possible. We wish to thank them and their assistants for their interest in and kindness shown to those under their charge.

We are convinced that there are quite a number of poor people being cared for by the county at their own homes who would be more comfortable and better cared for at the almshouse and at much less expense to the county. We shall therefore endeavor to have all such as can be moved consistently, taken to the almshouse.

TO THE COMMISSIONERS OF SULLIVAN COUNTY:—

We have had more cases of illness at the county farm the past year than have been usual since my acquaintance with the institution. Nine people have died during the year, nearly all of them quite old, and for some time had been in feeble health. It is my belief that all has been done that could be for the comfort of those needing special care. You can easily understand that with a hospital apartment and a trained nurse to give all her time and attention to the care of the sick and feeble, more could be done than can be under the present circumstances. The time is not far distant when more room will be a necessity, and then will be a good time to consider some plan for separate accommodations for the sick and very aged.

TO THE COMMISSIONERS OF SULLIVAN COUNTY:—

Service is held every alternate Sunday afternoon from four to five. The service consists of Scripture reading with short comments, prayer, and praise service in which Gospel Hymns No. 5 are used with organ accompaniment, and all are free to give out hymns to which there is a hearty response. The meeting is then open for testimonies which a few improve, but all enjoy the music. If any are unable to be present the chaplain visits them in their rooms. They also have weekday visits if necessary. The inmates always appear pleased with these visits. I have attended two deaths. The chaplain has always received the kindest attention from the overseer and matron, who are at considerable trouble in preparing the inmates for the chapel service.

TO THE COMMISSIONERS OF SULLIVAN COUNTY:—

At the last term of court there were a larger number of indictments found than at any term since I have been solicitor; but only two came to trial and in both cases the respondent was found guilty. The suit brought by the county against the town of Unity to recover pay for the support of an insane pauper also came to trial at the last term of court and was decided in favor of the county on the ground that he had a residence in the town of Unity. At present there is no suit in which the county is a party. I have received no moneys belonging to the county and have expended but little for postage and legal blanks.
