To the Inhabitants of the Town of Tamworth in the County of Carroll in said State qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in the Tamworth School House on Tuesday, March twelfth (12) next. The meeting will be in two parts:

1. In order that all necessary town officers may be elected for the ensuing year, you are hereby notified that the polls will be open for this purpose from 2 P. M. of the clock on said Tuesday, the twelfth of March until the close of part 2.

2. The meeting will reconvene at 7 p. m. in said School House to see what time to close the polls and to raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and to see what sums of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the following purposes:

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Article 14. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,600 as first payment on a steel floor on the Tamworth Village bridge. The remainder to be raised over a 5-year period as follows:

1964—	\$1,280	plus interest of	\$192.00
1965—	1,280	plus interest of	153.60
1966—	1,280	plus interest of	115.20
1967—	1,280	plus interest of	76.80
1968—	1,280	plus interest of	38.40

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to establish a committee to study and evaluate the existing resources within the Town and to suggest projects which will create better employment and cultural opportunities for its citizens.

Such a committee would (1) cooperate with the programs of federal, state, and local organizations which are concerned with the overall development of this area and would see that the interests of the Town are safeguarded; (2) study those aspects of the so-called "Tamworth Lake Project" wherein the interests of the Town are involved and would make appropriate reports to the Town from time to time; (3) supervise the work of the committee now engaged in constructing a map of the Town so that all property lines may be more accurately located.

It is recommended that such a Committee (1) be appointed by the selectmen and be set up for one year only; (2) that one member of the committee be a selectman with the president of the Chamber of Commerce as a member ex-officio.

It is further recommended that members of said committee serve without compensation from Town funds, that the chairman be elected by the committee and that the findings of the group be reported back to the Town Meeting of 1964.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute inventory blanks on **April 1st.**

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to dispose of any property acquired through tax collector's deeds.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to change back to three road agents, one for each section of town.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to have the Selectmen appoint a man in each section of town to clean driveways instead of the road agent.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to list all taxable properties, and the amount of assessment, every three years, in the Town of Tamworth Annual Report.

Article 22. We request that the Town of Tamworth appropriate the sum of \$600.00 to purchase a resuscitator and Scott Air Pack for live saving such as heart attacks, smoke inhalation, electric shock, water submersion, etc.

Article 23. To transact any other business which may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE

The Tamworth Finance Committee is composed of nine members, appointed by the Selectmen. Their function is advisory only, and they are not paid. They are usually picked so as to represent all sections of the town geographically and socially. The usefulness of this committee depends entirely on each member's degree of thought and participation. If they really hash things out with the Selectmen, then the phrase "approved by the Finance Committee" is not a rubber stamp, but an indication that the feasibility of the articles in the Warrant have been considered seriously by twelve people of varying interests and backgrounds. On the other hand, this approval does not preclude further discussion. It is a fingerpost in a certain direction, but the Meeting has frequently not followed it which is as it should be if the democratic process is to hold good.

This year's finance meeting took place on January 23, 1963 with all members present and contributing to the discussion. A matter of supreme importance is the bridge in Tamworth Village. With the heavy traffic of huge delivery vans and lumber trucks which go over it daily, replanking the top almost every year is almost a necessity with a complete replanking job every three or four years. This latter costs about \$1,000 on the present market. Consequently the Selectmen and Mr. Streeter, Road Agent, felt it might be more sensible to put on a steel floor which would be permanent. This was discussed at considerable length and it was the unanimous opinion that such a move would be in the best interests of the Town. The cost of the operation would be roughly \$8,000 which could be spread over a five year period.

Approval was given to tarring the White Lake road built last summer. Because of the expense of moving the Town "Dozer" it is often cheaper to hire the Evans machine. The Road Agent recommended our thinking about a trailer bed as he felt it would save money in the long run. The Committee suggested asking the Tamworth Foundation to consider getting one. The General Fund was increased to take care of some needed repairs on the Town "Dozer."

A good deal of discussion centered around the Town Fire Department's need for more money because of added equipment and increasing costs. \$500 was approved.

Three bridges were repaired or replaced on last summer's appropriation with the addition of the Duncan Fund. Considering what had been done without any special appropriation, the Committee felt the small deficit of around \$200 was most satisfactory. Winter was very expensive, which needs no explanation, and at this writing, is continuing to be.

REPORT OF THE MAP COMMITTEE

A map Committee of nine members whose names are listed below was appointed by your Selectmen in March, 1962. This committee was instructed to commence the preparation of a Town Map, the base map to be traced from aerial photographs which were taken in 1954 by the Federal Government. Funds in the amount of \$300.00 were donated by the Tamworth Foundation for the purpose of purchasing the aerial photographs, constructing a drafting table and map cabinets, and purchasing drafting equipment.

The citizens of Tamworth had been requested to give or loan to the Committee maps and descriptions of their property. The response to this request was, in general, very satisfactory, but a great deal of additional information on property lines will be required before the map project can be completed. Next spring, certain of the committee members will be assigned to assist in the collection of field information, consisting principally of data showing the location of property lines in relation to certain physical features which are recognizable on the aerial photographs.

The maps are being prepared on plastic tracing cloth on a scale of 660 feet to the inch. In the more congested areas of Tamworth and Chocorua, the scale will be 400 feet to the inch. There will probably be ten sheets to cover the entire town. If so desired, prints can be made, and these prints can be sold to the public.

At the end of the first year, the voluntary efforts

of the committee have resulted in the completion of base maps on five sheets in the eastern and central sections of the town, and the entry of a considerable number of property lines, including those of the White Lake State Park, and the right of way of the Public Service Co, of N. H.

Costs of suppressing carelessly set outdoor fires in New Hampshire in 1962 cost the persons responsible \$5,545. In the same period, the cost to the cities and towns for control of such fires for which no responsibility could be placed cost another \$24,634.

What utter waste of tax money and what shameful and needless loss of timber and esthetic values in the 2200 acres burned. Residences, farms, and other business places were threatened with possible total destruction.

Carelessly set man caused fires can be prevented if every citizen remembers his responsibility in regard to any source of fires in the open. We can help to keep our fire loss low by remembering these simple rules.

1. Dispose of burnable waste at the town dump.
2. If waste or brush is to be burned on the premises, obtain a permit from the forest fire warden. Seasonal permits may be issued for approved incinerators and sites.

3. Burn safely by picking a clean site, avoiding dry windy weather and preferably burning late in the day.

4. Have something to keep the fire under control —pails of water, garden hose, sprinkling can, broom for grass fires or shovel will help.

5. Be sure your fire is dead out before you leave it.

6. If the fire gets out of control or if you see a fire out of control, report promptly to your warden or fire department. Continue to fight it until help arrives.

There is potential danger when matches fall into the hands of children. It is never too early for parents to install in the child's mind a respect for fire.

Keep our town safe from fire.

In 1962 we had 5 fires.

We burned 20 acres.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Tamworth:

I submit my second report as Superintendent of Schools of Union No. 36. The following list indicates the administrative activities for the period from January 1, 1962 to December 31, 1962:

On November 18, 1962 Dr. Charles F. Ritch, Jr., Commissioner of Education, visited all of the schools in Union 36 with Superintendent Thomas.

During the school year 1961-62 the teachers in the Tamworth School were: Grade 1, Miss Julia Carlson; Grade 2, Mrs. Dorothy Remick; Grade 3, Miss Margaret King; Grade 4, Mrs. Beatrice Wendell; Grade 5, Mrs. Helen Davison; Grade 6, Mr. Wilfred Crowley; Grade 7, Mr. Clarence Blanchette; Grade 8 and Principal, Mr. Ronald Corkum. Music Supervisor Mrs. Eleanor Tripp.

At the opening of the school year in September

1962, Miss Carlson was succeeded by Miss Roberta Giddings in grade 1. Mr. Crowley succeeded Mr. Corkum as principal.

The school health program is under the supervision of Mrs. Thelma Roberts, R. N., with the annual physical examinations by Dr. Edwin C. Remick.

The school lunch program continues under the supervision of Mrs. Stella Jeffers.

Never before has education received as much public attention and publicity as it has in recent years. Newspapers, magazines, television, radio—all instruments of mass communication have probably devoted more space and time to education in a single year than they have for the past fifteen years put together. This is good! It shows that people are interested in what the schools are doing and that they want to assist in helping the schools do an even better job.

When school administrators are questioned about matters of importance to them, the improvement of instruction usually is given considerable attention and weight. The primary function of superintendents of schools is conceived to be the creation of conditions that are conducive to effective teaching so that maximum pupil learning will result.

The curriculum is, or should be, in a constant state of change. One only has to look around in this scientific age to recognize the changes taking place. There has been a growing concern about the development of programs in the public schools, which would meet the needs of all youth. Some changes have taken place in our schools with the cooperation of our principals and

teachers in developing plans of programs for Reading and Mathematics with results which, at present, appear to be very excellent. Following a two-day Math Workshop in September 1962, 80% of the teachers of Union 36 participated in an extension course under the auspices of the University of New Hampshire. This training has enabled our teachers to teach the new mathematic concepts which is being taught in our schools now.

Our school system has its problems the same as any other business. However, they are not insolvable. With confidence and forth-right approach to the solution of these problems we can continue to have an outstanding educational program, one that will be a credit to our young people as well as to our community.

Dr. James B. Conant makes this comment, "It is impossible to evaluate an educational system apart from the society which it both reflects and serves. Much of the argument over education today is coming from people who are not really interested in facing problems as they exist."

Herein lies our responsibility—to know our problems—to solve them to the best of our abilities.

During the past year the school districts of Freedom, Madison and Tamworth solved their secondary school problems by joining our sister Union No. 9 in Conway by signing a twenty-year contract. The school districts of Brookfield, Effingham, Ossipee and Wakefield have been in a Regional 1 through 12 school study with our sister Union 49 comprising the school districts of Alton, New Durham, Tuftonboro and Wolfeboro which would solve their school problems. The

Middleton school district continues to tuition all their students to Farmington.

Also, much work was done during the summer of 1962 to improve our own schools. Madison created a new classroom, a complete new heating system was installed and another member was added to the teaching staff due to a large enrollment in grades 1-3. Ossipee created a new classroom, health room, library and principal's office. Ossipee also added a new member to the teaching staff due to the large enrollment in the first grade. Effingham, Freedom, Tamworth and Wakefield had the usual summer repairs and cleaning of their buildings.

The Parent-Teacher Associations have been most helpful and cooperative, as have other civic and social organizations. Many thanks go to the Whittier Lions Club for their generous contributions to all our schools.

I wish to extend to the School Boards my sincere appreciation for their fine cooperation, their encouragement, and sincere devotion to their task of formulating and carrying through their policy-making responsibilities with foresight and conviction in what is good for the school children, school personnel, and citizens of their communities.

I also want to commend all the school personnel for their devotion to education and the assistance they have given me.
