# Hear Ye:

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Thornton in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at The Thornton Central School in said Thornton on Tuesday, the Eleventh day of March, next at 10:00 in the morning, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. Shall we adopt the provision of RSA 72:37 for the exemption for the blind from property tax? This statute provides that every inhabitant who is legally blind shall be exempt each year from the property tax on a residence to the value of \$15,000.00. (By Petition).
  - All Articles with the exception of Article 1 & 2 will be taken up at 7:00 p.m. Polls will close at 7:00 p.m. Absentee Ballots will be cast at 11:00 a.m. The business meeting will start at 7:00 p.m.
- 3. To consider the Budget as posted and appropriate the necessary sums to satisfy it.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.
- 5. To see if the Town will no longer allow a discount on taxes.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer Tax Liens and convey property acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's Deed by Public Auction (or advertised bid) or in such other manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from State, Federal or any other Governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95b.

- 8. To set a Contingency Fund of \$1,000.00 to meet unanticipated expenses RSA 31:4.
- 9. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to act as the Agents to carry out the purposes of the Capital Reserve Funds.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Tax Collector to accept payment of taxes in advance of semi-annual or annual Warrant being issued.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to cost-share with landowners the expense of them hiring a professional forester to oversee timber harvests on their lands within the Town. Said cost-share amount shall be determined by the Selectmen, and shall not exceed 10% of the actual timber yield tax revenues paid by the landowner to the Town: and further to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$700.00 for this purpose.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$100.00 from Howard & Barbara Clement for lots 14 and 6 in Mad River Cemetery for Perpetual Care.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote that the proceeds from the sale of Cemetery lots be placed in the hands of the Trustee of Trust Funds and the interest therefrom to be used for the General care of Cemeteries. This is to make valid the vote of March 11, 1969, Thornton, N.H. Town Meeting. By request of the Attorney General, State of N.H.
- 14. To see if the Town will approve a charge for Building Permits. The amount to be set by the Board of Selectmen. The monies used to hire and pay a Town Building Inspector to insure all construction conforms to State Building Codes.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following Ordinance pursuant to RSA 156:
  - Section 1. The Selectmen shall annually appoint an Inspector of Buildings to carry out the provisions of this ordinance.
  - Section 2. No person, firm or corporation shall erect, construct, enlarge, alter, repair, improve, move or demolish any building or structure within the Town of Thornton without first obtaining a separate Building Permit for each building or structure from Building Permit Officer (Board of Selectmen or Building Inspector).
  - Section 3. Any person, firm or corporation violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to a fine of One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) and each day's neglect to obtain such a permit shall constitute

- a separate offense. The fine for any single violation not to exceed Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00).
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate Twelve Thousand, Two Hundred Dollars (\$12,200.00) for the purchase of a Police Cruiser, and authorize the withdrawal of Six Thousand, Two Hundred Dollars (\$6,200.00) for this purpose from Federal Revenue Sharing Fund with the balance to be raised by taxation.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to accept for use as Town Road, Amory Leland Drive, off Upper Mad River Road, being 5,000 feet more or less in the Salmon Run Subdivision, as built to TRA Standard, to be deeded to the Town by Warranty Deed free and clear upon approval of the Selectmen and Road Agent. At present there are 25 lots with two houses under construction.
- 18. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the operation of a Fast Squad as part of the Campton-Thornton Fire Dept. This Article is contingent upon the same Article being voted in the affirmative by the Town of Campton. The total amount for all Fire Dept. purposes to be appropriated \$14,300.00 which includes the sum for the Fast Squad.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to have the taxable property assessed at 100% valuation this tax year 1986 by an outside appraisal firm.
- 20. To see if the Town of Thornton will vote to raise (\$64,000.00) Sixty Four Thousand Dollars, which amount represents (\$40.08) Forty Dollars and Eight Cents per parcel, to employ an outside Assessment Firm to satisfy Article 19. This amount not included in the Budget.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to have the Board of Selectmen assess all taxable property at 100% valuation this tax year 1986.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to employ help in assessing and appropriate \$6,000.00 for the same.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to pave the road as far as Lotus Drive in the 175 Estates Development.
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to have the Moderator appoint a Committee of five to work with the Selectmen in making a study of the cost of a new Town Office Building, Vault, and necessary furnishings. A future report to be made to the Townspeople.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to have Part Time Police (½ week) as well as Full Time Police, to come under the State Retirement Plan For Police Officers.

- 26. To see if the Town will accept from Carleton & Mary Ham the amount of \$1,000.00 for Clayton S. Ham Trust. The money (Principal) to stay in Trust. The interest to be used for Library Books.
- 27. To see if the Town will adopt the Flood Insurance Boundary shown on Map Index of the Town of Thornton community number 330075B. Revisions March 25, 1977 and Roto Map effective April 2, 1986 and to follow Rules and Regulations as set forth under Part V of the Federal Emergency Management Agency: Final Rule.
- 28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen on behalf of the Town to enter into a cooperative agreement, pursuant to RSA Chapter 53A for the purpose of joining together towns in a joint and cooperative effort for Police Dispatching in a manner which will meet Federal and State regulations. The cooperative to be formed under the cooperative agreement will be designated the Pemi-Valley Regional Dispatch Center. A copy of the current draft of the proposed cooperative agreement is posted with the Warrant and is available at the Town Offices during normal business hours. The Board of Selectmen is specifically authorized on behalf of the Town (a) to execute and deliver the Cooperative Agreement (with such changes therein from the posted agreement as the Board of Selectmen shall approve, such approval to be conclusively evidenced by the Board of Selectmen's execution thereof) and such other instruments, documents and agreements as the Board of Selectmen may deem necessary or desirable in furtherance of the purpose of the cooperative agreement (b) to cause to be performed all obligations which may from time to time be required pursuant to the terms of the cooperative and (c) to take any other action relative thereto.
- 29. To transact any other business which may legally come before said Meeting.

### THORNTON PUBLIC LIBRARY ANNUAL REPORT

The Thornton Public Library Trustees organized after town elections in March with Ethel DeGrace as Chairman, Kathy Uhlman as Treasurer and Ann Hoey as Secretary.

Mrs. Debra Fraser, librarian, reports that with more and more people moving into the area, both the number of users and the number of books circulated continue to increase. Over 3,500 books were circulated during the year. The expanded hours offer both the school and the public more opportunity to make use of the library resources which are so well-organized and attractively displayed. We thank Mrs. Fraser for her excellent work.

The book allotment this year was used for both the juvenile and adult collections, increasing our number of books by about 370 books. We continue to belong to the Doubleday Book Club. Our book collection has grown so much that we must soon add some shelving to the adult section.

We continue to make use of the Trust Funds, most of which were used for books and book supplies this year. We greatly appreciate the trusts and the many books, magazines, and other media which have been donated to us by all the Thornton residents. This year that includes a telephone which was a gift to us from Dr. Elgert. We thank all of you for your generosity and support.

During the summer Mrs. Fraser ran a Reading Rainbow program for the community youngsters again. More recently she has introduced a project called "Design a Jacket." She has taken badly worn, but popular books from the shelf and the child who has selected and read one of these books has designed a new jacket cover. Over these original designs she puts a dust cover with a card containing the name of the child who designed the jacket. This project is proving very popular. The elementary children continue to make good use of the library during the school year. On Friday morning from 10 to 12 a story hour is provided for Kindergarten through Grade 4. This gives them a special time to use the library and to select books of interest to them. All students and the public have ready access as they need or want to use the library. All are welcome.

#### CAMPTON-THORNTON FIRE DEPARTMENT REPORT FOR 1985

Can't believe that another year has rolled around and time for another report.

Chief Robert Mardin has a report on fire calls listed elsewhere, as well as Fast Squad Director David Mack has a report on his calls. You will also find our fact sheet with receipts and expenditures. You will also notice that we were forced by Mainly Insurance Co. and their rates to raise the Fire Dept. Budget. The Commissioners are very proud that we have been able to hold the line with our budget request for the last few years. Yet we feel we have a good working Volunteer Fire Department and Fast Squad and both are growing at a reasonable rate.

Our two main causes for increase of budget this year is the raise in insurance cost and the raise in our Fire Dispatch Service. Yet, these are both badly needed and we can not operate without either one of them.

Both Campton and Thornton are growing towns and we have a lot more real estate to protect on many new roads and many new developments.

We are still trying to keep up with the State's changes in requirements. It looks like it will never end.

We still have need for another tanker and the Commissioners are looking for a good buy. These vehicles are what we need up here in the country. Mutual Aid is a great thing and helps us all in this regard.

The Commissioners on behalf of the Fire Dept. and Fast Squad want to thank all the people of Campton-Thornton for their help over the year. We really owe a lot of credit to the Women's Auxiliary of the Fire Dept. as they have worked hard and given freely to both departments of their cash. We would not have such a fine organization without their help.

## 1985 REPORT FROM THE PEMI-BAKER HOME HEALTH AGENCY

During the 1985 calendar year the Pemi-Baker Home Health Agency continued to play a vital role in providing home health care services to the residents of Thornton. During this year a total of 436 home visits were made. These services can be broken down as follows:

Skilled Nursing Visits in the Home:	158
Physical Therapy:	6
Professional Home Health Aide Visits:	134
Trained Homemaker Visits:	138

In 1985 the Agency added two new services. The first is the maternal and infant early discharge program that is available through Blue Cross/Blue Shield and is for mothers and babies who leave the hospital within twenty-four hours after delivery. Skilled nursing and homemaker services are available to them through the agency. The second service is I.V. therapy. Doctors can order this therapy and the Pemi-Baker nurses have been trained to establish and monitor this procedure in the home.

Infant and toddler seats continue to be available to Thornton residents in need of infant or toddler seats to safely transport their children in the automobile.

Skilled nursing is performed in the home by registered nurses under orders from a physician. Other services in the home health program under a physician's orders include physical therapy delivered by a registered physical therapist, speech therapy delivered by a registered speech pathologist, and occupational therapy by a registered occupational therapist.

Also available to Thornton residents is personal care of the patient delivered by trained home health aides. Trained homemakers are sent when needed to do light housekeeping, errands, shopping and/or to provide supportive emotional help to the lonely.

The Pemi-Baker Home Health Agency looks forward to serving the residents of the town of Thornton in 1986. If you should be in need of any of the above mentioned services or require any additional information please call the Pemi-Baker Home Health Agency at 536-2232.

## REPORT OF THE GRAFTON COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

We appreciate the opportunity to submit the following report in our continuing effort to directly communicate with our constituents.

Because of current favorable cash status and appreciable fund balance, Grafton County maintained a level tax requirement this fiscal year, actually reducing the tax requirement by \$200, and we anticipate an even better tax climate in the next fiscal year. However, due to the apportionment process of tax assessment by equalized valuation, some towns did see a slight increase in the county portion of taxes for 1985, though the majority of towns realized a decrease. The unusual fund balance is due to a combination of factors, including unused surplus in the previous budget, conscientious budget management by all departments, transfer of court expenses to the State, increased Nursing Home reimbursements, favorable returns on investments, increased Register of Deeds revenues and continued Revenue Sharing.

Along with saving the County approximately \$300,000 in expenditures with the shift of liability for court activities to the State, we also anticipate receiving \$100,000 + annually in rent on space occupied by the court system.

Grafton County is experiencing the same problems as your local government in the insurance market. Costs are rising dramatically and in some cases insurance coverage is unobtainable. We have retained a consultant to review county insurance needs and available coverage with the hopes of procuring one total package. Because of the current unstable insurance market, we do not yet have any report or recommendation.

In cooperation with your local government and State, we are striving for a smooth transition to the new system of welfare service delivery under Senate Bill 1. Settlement for assistance determination has been eliminated and towns and cities are now liable for all general assistance to needy persons in their towns, including transients. However, liability for expenses of all juvenile services and for persons assisted under the categorical grant programs will now be shared by the State and counties, removing town liability. Under Senate Bill 1 and the ensuing partnership between counties and the state Dept. of Children and Youth Services, the Commissioners note a new direction for juveniles, including the development of new alternative programs to out of home placements.

Energy conservation programs at the nursing home and courthouse have realized a considerable savings with the decrease in fuel and electric consumption, cutting consumption and dollar cost in half for courthouse fuel alone. In our letter to you in 1983 we noted litigation in a retirement buyback suit where a negative decision would result in cost of \$70,000 plus legal fees with a potential domino effect on local governments. We are pleased to note that the County prevailed in this issue.

The Commissioners have changed weekly meetings to Wednesdays. We encourage public attendance at all meetings. The county budget recommendations are processed in May and June. We welcome input and strongly recommend public attendance at the public hearings usually held in June.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE 1985

I am pleased to submit my annual report as school nurse at Thornton Central School. The school nurse is at Thornton School two half days per week.

All students at the Thornton School have been fully immunized in compliance with the State of New Hampshire requirements against the following diseases: tetanus, diptheria, whooping cough, measles, mumps, polio, and rubella. Several students had chicken pox at the end of the year. The Pemi-Baker home health agency provides free immunizations at clinics and we are able to inform parents of the requirements at preschool registration.

Students with parental permission in first grade through fifth are brushing and flossing their teeth daily and using a fluoride rinse once a week. This program is sponsored by the New Hampshire Department of Dental Health but it is the effort of the classroom teachers that makes the program work.

The second grade participates in a weekly health check of their hands, hair, teeth and nails in an effort to establish lifelong health habits.

Grade five students and those new to the school this fall had physical exams conducted by Dr. Steve Elgert. Once again, he found the students to be generally in excellent health. The fifth grade is learning about health each week in a class with Mr. Carter and myself.

Screening tests are conducted on all students. Tests include vision, hearing, height and weight. Color vision is checked on incoming students. Blood pressure and posture are checked in students in grades 5-8. Referrals are made and followed up. In some cases, funding is made available by state and local agencies.

The school nurse is also responsible for administering the free and reduced lunch program which is federally funded. The school lunch program headed by June Grace provides nutritious and excellent meals. A recent implementation is the availability of juice at snacktime.

Preschool hearing and vision are checked at a clinic held at Plymouth AREA School. Preschool registration held at the Thornton Central School involves the kindergarten teacher, the speech pathologist, the resource room teacher and myself.

Films and filmstrips about health and safety are presented throughout the year to all age levels. Some of the topics presented this year were: fitness,

growth and development, and nutrition.

Much of my time is spent with individual students checking medical problems, treating injuries and discussing health matters. I am available as a resource person in the school and to parents. My job is enhanced by the cooperation of all parents, school personnel and physicians whom I wish to thank.

The enrollment of Thornton Central School as of December 31, 1985 was 108 students.

This year we have added three more programs to our curriculum. They are instrumental music Grades 5-8; mini courses Grades 5-8, which feature activities in career education, computers, arts and crafts and organized games, such as chess; and a guidance program which employs a 30% time guidance counselor.

The addition of a guidance counselor has been a big plus for our school. With the ever present problems in today's society, children seem to need more support outside of the home. The public school is now expected to provide psychological, emotional, social and medical assistance to its students. With the addition of a guidance counselor we are able to provide some of that much needed support.

#### REPORT FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

The past year has been one of extraordinary challenge in School Administrative Unit #48.

Administrative changes within the SAU have affected schools as well as the SAU office itself. New building principals have been hired during the past year in Campton Elementary, Plymouth Elementary, Plymouth AREA High School, and the Russell Elementary School. A new Vocational Director for Plymouth AREA High School was hired, and the superintendency became vacant with the resignation of Dr. Cabral. The SAU office also lost one of its two bookkeepers and a secretary.

In addition, SAU #48 felt the effects of the current teacher shortage to a greater degree than in past years, having fewer certified candidates for the twenty-two positions that required filling. Fortunately, certified persons were hired in all but one position, but the process has become more demanding in terms of recruitment, selection, and hiring.

Another situation which has demanded attention is a growing population in the area. At least three of the area school buildings need additional space, and because of added programs another two schools could utilize more classroom space as well. At the time of the writing, two districts have formed Building Needs Study Committees and others will most probably be formed soon.

Despite these many changes, the personnel employed by our seven districts have continued, with renewed vigor, to provide a sound educational experience for each child. Specific programs that have been reviewed during the year at the elementary level were reading, mathematics, and computer literacy. At Plymouth AREA High School, the science curriculum was extensively reviewed. As a result of this review, course guides have been rewritten in science and a plan to upgrade the physical facilities at Plymouth AREA High School computer lab has also been upgraded to implement the new New Hampshire Minimum Standards.

SAU #48 has not sought to dwell on the uncertainty which change brings but rather has seized the opportunities it brings to create within its schools a sense of community, shared responsibility, and commitment to excellence. As Superintendent of School Administrative Unit #48, I am proud of our schools and pledge myself to continue to work with our administrators, teachers, and school boards to establish an outstanding educational system for our area schools.

# EXPLANATION OF SUPERINTENDENT'S AND ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT'S SALARY FOR 1984-1985

Chapter 189, Section 48 Revised Statutes Annotated of the State of New Hampshire, requires that the school district annual report show the total amount paid to the Superintendent of Schools as per the following quotation: "Reports. Each Superintendent of a School Administrative Unit shall annually prepare a report of the total salary paid to the superintendent, showing in detail the amount paid by the state and each local school district and their share of same . . . Said report shall be included in the annual report of the respective school district as a separate entry. A like report and entry shall be made for each assistant superintendent, teacher consultant, and business administrator if any is in service in the unit."

One-half of the School Administrative Unit expenses is prorated among the several school districts of the unit on the basis of adjusted valuations. One-half is pro-rated on the basis of average daily membership in the school for the previous school year ending June 30th. The salary of \$40,582 which was received by the Superintendent of Schools of School Administrative Unit #48 during 1984-1985 was prorated among the school districts comprising the School Administrative Unit. Allowance for \$2,400 travel within the Unit was also prorated as stated above.

The salary of \$33,543 for the Assistant Superintendent during 1984-1985 and travel allowance within the Unit of \$1,900 was prorated as stated above.
