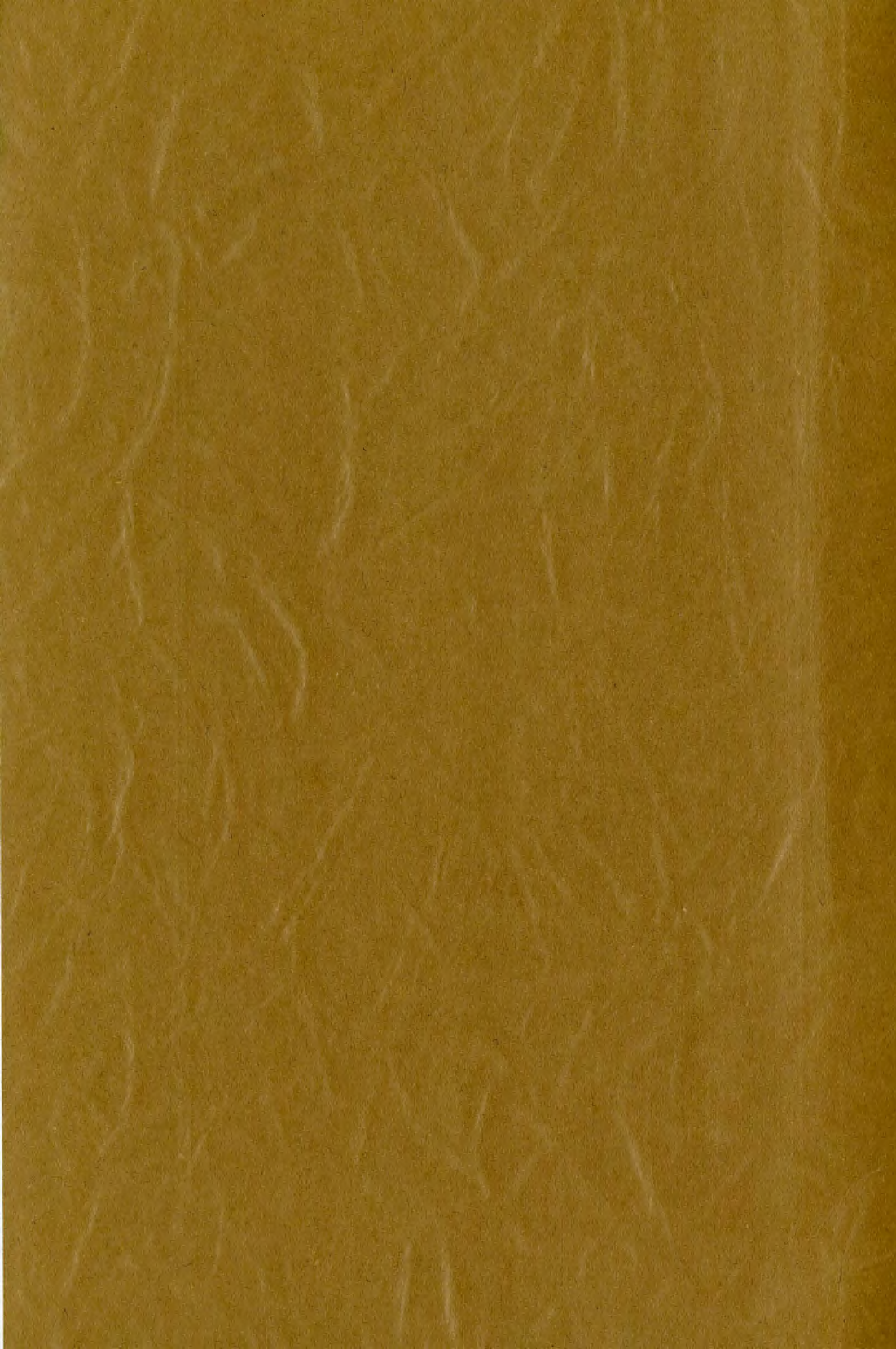

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Windsor, in the County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Woodrow residence in said Town on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1 To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3 To hear reports of Auditor and Agents heretofore chosen and to pass any vote in relation thereto.
- 4 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for repairing highways and bridges.
- 5 To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid on its highways, and raise and appropriate \$25.35 as the town's share.
- 6 To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 7 To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax collector deeds.
- 8 To see what action the town will take on receiving the school house deed and raise and appropriate such sum as necessary.

9 To transact any other business that may lawfully come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Windsor:

I hereby submit my first annual report as superintendent of schools.

ORGANIZATION

School Board: Neil Woodrow, chairman; Charles Nelson, Harold Duefield.

Superintendent of Schools: Howard F. Mason, Hillsboro, N. H.

Transporter: Neil Woodrow.

PUPIL DATA

Six pupils attended the Dole school last year: Caroline, Daniel and Marshall Strickland and Gloria, Lilla and Sally Woodrow. The same six pupils are in attendance this year. Hazel Woodrow started work at Hillsboro High last year and is still in attendance there.

The following pupils maintained perfect attendance for the number of terms indicated during the school year 1941-'42. The school year is divided into four terms for this purpose: Sally Woodrow, two; Lilla Woodrow, one.

GENERAL REPORT

In many ways Windsor is fortunate in regard to the manner in which they educate their children. They do not have to worry about the hiring of teachers, buying of supplies, and obtaining janitors. I realize that many would like to have a word in some of these matters, but there are some advantages in not having to worry about them.

These are troublesome times. It is becoming increasingly difficult to obtain good teachers and maintain satisfactory schools. This is particularly true in rural areas. You may rest assured that your superintendent will try to maintain, under the limitations of existing conditions, the best school situation that is possible.

I would like to make a plea for unity among ourselves. The world is fighting. Let us try to have peace and accord at home. Nerves are strained, bodies are weary, minds are troubled. Let us not add to the difficulties by creating unnecessary dissension here at home.
