THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Acworth in the County of Sullivan in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Acworth on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects.

Art. 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

Art. 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

Art. 3. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Highways and Bridges.

Art. 4. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for breaking roads.

Art. 5. To see what action the Town wishes to take in regard to breaking unnecessary roads in heavy storms.

Art. 6. To see if the Town will accept State aid for construction of the Class II road known as East Acworth from Honey brook corner and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum required by law, or will accept State Aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum required.

Art. 7. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of Town Poor.

Art. 8. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Lights.

Art. 9. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Debt and Interest.

Art. 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow on notes on credit of the Town such sums as may be needed to meet current expenses in anticipation of taxes.

Art. 11. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the observance of Old Home Day.

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the support of Silsby Free Public Library.

Art. 13. To see what action the Town will take in regard to property bought by the Town for taxes.

Art. 14. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal budget act.

Art. 15. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate money to repair the mill dam at South Acworth.

Art. 16. To see if the Town will vote to close subject to gates and bars the road from Black North school house to the Roswell Walker farm so called.

Art. 17. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to issue serial notes of the Town to an amount not exceeding \$6,600.00 for the purpose of refunding outstanding indebtedness of a like amount as authorized by Chapter 48 of the Laws of 1935.

Art. 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$100.00 for the use of the Cemetery Association.

Art. 19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Acworth School Board:

I herewith submit my sixth annual report as your superintendent of schools.

We have but three schools in town with fifty-one pupils doing work in the six lower grades. Miss Maude Moody at the Center and Miss Ruth Lane at the East are continuing their excellent work this year. In Acworth the ability and success of these teachers are well known. Miss Gertrude Cloud who is teaching at the South School came to us highly recommended by the officials of the Hopkinton Union where she taught six years. Her work has been very satisfactory.

The senior and junior high school pupils attend Alstead High School for the second year. This year has proved without doubt that Alstead High School has established itself among the best high schools of New Hampshire. It is giving the boys and girls of Acworth great advantages. I hope that each one will make the most of these opportunities.

In 1928-29 the high school costs were, tuitions for six pupils \$517.65, local high school \$1,078.54, total \$1,586.09. In 1930-31 the cost of a four year high school was \$1,630.44 with an income of \$391.50 for tuitions. The net cost was \$1,238.94 for eleven local high school pupils. In 1933-34 the last year we had a local high school the net cost to Acworth was slightly over \$1,000.00 for nineteen local pupils. In 1935-36 we expect thirty-one pupils with a cost of tuition, \$2,170.00, transportation \$500.00, total \$2,670.00. The cost of transportation varies with the number of pupils.

The South and Center buildings are in good condition, but a few minor repairs will be needed at the East building.

The school debt will be reduced to \$2,500.00 this year.

Again I wish to thank the Acworth School Board, the teachers, and citizens for their loyalty and help.
