#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Allenstown, in the County of Merrimack in the said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the New Opera House in said Allenstown on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- Article 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- ARTICLE 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same. Voted to raise \$6,250.00.
- ARTICLE 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy-five dollars for the purpose of securing the services of the Suncook Union Cornet Band for a series of free concerts. Adopted.
- ARTICLE 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the necessary amount of money to secure State aid for the permanent improvement of main Highways. Adopted.
- ARTICLE 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars for the maintenance of State Highways. Adopted.

- ARTICLE 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of six hundred dollars for the maintenance of State Highways, the same to be applied to trunk line maintenance. Adopted.
- ARTICLE 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred fifty dollars for the completion of the sidewalk extending from the residence of William Drought to that of John Martel. Adopted.
- Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise the night Officer's salary from three to three-fifty dollars per night. Adopted.
- Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty-five dollars for the observance of Memorial Day. Adopted.
- ARTICLE 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred fifty dollars for repairs on Bartlett Street. Adopted.
- ARTICLE 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred dollars for the purchase of hose and other supplies for the Fire Department. Voted to raise \$100.00.
- ARTICLE 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred dollars for the control of the White Pine Blister Rust in town. Adopted
- Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars for repairing Canal Street. Dismissed.

- ARTICLE 14. To see if the town will vote to build a side-walk on School Street from the house of Benjamin Wood to the railroad crossing, and raise and appropriate money therefor. Adopted. Voted to raise \$600.
- ARTICLE 15. To see if the town will vote to accept as a public highway that part of Cross Street, so called, extending from the house of Peter Durant to Pine Street.
- ARTICLE 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred dollars for the extension of the concrete sidewalk on the East side of Main Street. Adopted.
- ARTICLE 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of sixty-five dollars for the purchase of a check writer and protector, to safeguard the checks of the town from fraudulent alteration and forgery. Adopted.
- ARTICLE 18. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees, or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- ARTICLE 19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

We have carefully examined the books of the Selectmen of Allenstown and find the same to be properly cast and correctly vouched, and that the notes due from the town amount to \$10,500.00. The amount due from former town clerk, Albert G. Raymond is \$431.69.

Your attention is called to the fact that in 1921, by vote of the town the sum of \$2,500.00 was raised towards building a fire station. This money was not expended for the purpose for which it was raised, but was used for ordinary expenses of the town. This sum has now been set aside from the current revenue of the year and it is on deposit in the savings department of the Suncook Bank where it should remain until such time as the voters see fit to raise a sum sufficient to erect a building suitable to the needs of the town.

Your attention is further drawn to the reduction in the town debt of \$1,000.00.

#### SCHOOL REPORT

# REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens:

I herewith submit my thirteenth annual report of the schools of Allenstown.

There were maintained during the year, three schools for a school-year of 36 weeks with no change in the teaching force.

The school enrollment was 67, (38 boys and 29 girls), with a daily average attendance of 94.19 per cent, a gain of 1.56 per cent over last year.

The schools were in session on an average 344.66 half-days.

This improvement leads us to hope that an average daily attendance of 98 per cent, and yearly average sessions of 350 half-days may reasonably be attained.

The schools are making a wholesome growth, are well supplied with text-books and scholars' supplies and are taught by industrious and faithful teachers.

The various standardized tests given throughout the year show that our schools are up to the standard attainment of similar schools over the country.

The school board is keeping the building in good repair and in a sanitary condition, thereby helping to keep the school free from epidemic diseases.

#### Domestic Science and Manual Training

These branches of educational work have been well taught by Edna Benware as instructor of domestic science, and graduates of the Concord Training School as instructors of manual training.

For detailed information of the work accomplished in domestic science your attention is called to the report which follows:

#### MANUAL TRAINING

Manual training, which has gone forward so rapidly during the last decade in schools, offers opportunities for the development of the power of application and the formation of habits of precision and accuracy which has won for it a place in the program of studies.

The industries and the professions have received more willing and worthy workers because of the training received in the manual training rooms.

#### HEALTH INSPECTION

Health inspection has been conducted as in former years; defects noted and cards sent to the parents, who, in a few cases, have had these defects corrected, helping the child both in health and in class standing.

A number of parents take no heed of these cards, and the children return with adenoids, decayed teeth, enlarged tonsils, and without properly fitted glasses.

The school authorities have employed a district nurse for part of the coming year with the hope that she may be able to interest the parents more fully in the health, welfare, and health habits of their children.

#### TEACHERS' MEETINGS

Several teachers' meetings were held during the year and were well attended by the teachers.

The speakers at these meetings were Commissioner E. W. Butterfield, Superintendent L. J. Rundlett of Concord, Superintendent F. E. Pitkin of Epping, Miss Phila Griffin,

State Agent for Rural Schools of New Hampshire, and Miss Bernice Batchelder of Massachusetts.

The teachers have been deeply interested in these meetings, and have expressed thmselves as being greatly benefitted by them.

The school board and citizens are cordially invited to attend these meetings.

#### THE FUNCTION OF THE SCHOOL

At the present time when every conceivable subject seems to be knocking at the door of the school asking, or demanding admittance, it is important to have a true knowledge of the function of the school, and a clear conception of the work which it should do.

Most of these demands are for objects which are desirable and beneficial, but are not legitimate demands upon the school.

The school is but one of the five great social organizations, whose duty is to help the people, each in its own particular way, and the best results are obtained when each performs its own distinctive duty.

Delinquent parents expect of the school work which is the legitimate duty for the home.

The church, whose duty is the spread of righteousness in the world, makes illogical demands of the school.

Business demands a degree of skill and proficiency which is not the function of the school to confer or develop.

The state demands of the school that it shall send forth law-abiding, public spirited citizens.

Unquestionably the school has an obligation here, but it is too much to demand such results of the school in the face of law-breaking practices in the home, dishonest business methods in the markets and graft and misrule in state and nation.

These five institutions must mutually reenforce one another.

The work of school does and will count in all the others, but it will count more freely when it is free to do its own work in the most effective way and is not burdened with demands which are not its province to render.

The one distinctive function of the school is development of the entire child, physically, mentally and morally; to train so that the child may develop the power of clear thinking which will give mastery over his conduct and ability of adjustment in the varying changes of life.

Whatever tends to enlarge development of the child; art, music, health exercises, manual training, etc., has place and should be considered as important school work.

Parents and citizens are cordially invited to visit the schools frequently.

In conclusion I express my appreciation for your cooperation and assistance.

#### DOMESTIC SCIENCE

MR HENRY S. ROBERTS, Superintendent of Schools.

Dear Sir:

I herewith submit my second annual report of the work done in the Domestic Science course of the Allenstown School.

The new girls covered practically the same work done by the girls the year before. In cooking, they took up the fundamental principles of first year cookery. In sewing, they learned the standard stitches and applied them to their projects. They made aprons, caps, towels, bags, underwear and simple blouses. The second year girls continued their first year work by applying their knowledge to more difficult recipes. They had some practice in rolling out doughs, preparing meat substitutes, the cooking of meat and the serving of food. At the close of the school year, they gave a little party to the teachers of the school. This they did on their own accord. Also they prepared the food and served it with very little help from me.

In sewing, they made dresses, underwear, aprons, learned to make buttonholes, and remodelled clothing. For graduation, they made one curtain and dyed and remodelled the other for the "Poster Play." Also they made some of the costumes used in the operetta.

Before submitting this report, I want to express my appreciation of the splendid corps of teachers, each of whom is a music lover, and who have contributed so largely to the success of the work in music. To the members of the school board who have shown so much interest in the work, my thanks are due. And lastly let me tell you that I am grateful to you for permission to work out some new ideas and for your valuable assistance.

The primary object of any kind of an education is to fit us to live fuller and richer lives, and surely in teaching our boys and girls to appreciate and love beautiful music, they will the more readily acquire a taste for all that is beautiful and lovely in life.

A few new phonograph records, added to our list have added to the interest in this study. Musical Memory Tests that were formerly given only to grades 6, 7 and 8 were two years ago given to grades 4 and 5, and last year were extended down into grade 2 with very good results.

A small orchestra was organized, consisting of two violins, drum and piano, and played on several occasions, including graduation. It is to be sincerely hoped that additions to the orchestra will be forthcoming and perhaps a band started. Many a boy has been kept away from the myriad temptations that beset the age of adolescence by playing in an orchestra or band. Co-ordination of fingers, tongue, ear, eyes, and lungs with brain is cultivated thereby. The care of an instrument and meeting the requirements of playing a part correctly with others, develops pride and a sense of responsibility. Many physicians agree that the deep breathing and erect position necessary in playing certain wind instruments correctly are beneficial to the health and will change a stoop-shouldered, flat-chested fellow into an erect full-chested youngster.

An operetta "Poster Folks" given at graduation was an innovation in which the music, manual training, domestic arts and other departments co-operated. Much executive ability in the pupils in rehearsing and staging this operetta was discovered and encouraged, and quite a little histrionic talent had a chance for expression.
