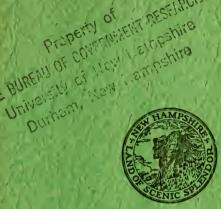
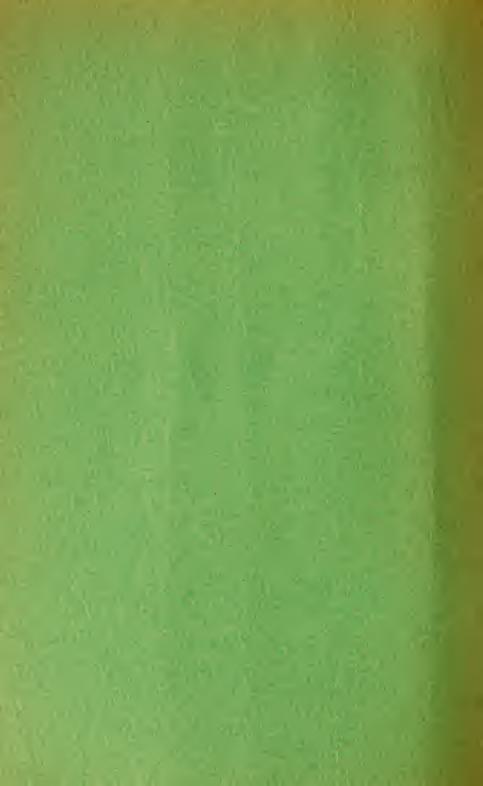

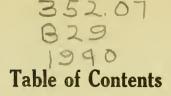

TOWN WARRANT

STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE CARROLL SS. To the inhabitants of the Town of Bartlett in the County of Carroll in said State qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said Bartlett on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and to make appropriations for the same.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sums of money called for in the budget as prepared by the Selectmen and the Budget Committee.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred dollars for blister rust control.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid Construction and will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,492.50 for the same.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to continue W. P. A. projects, and will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 for the same.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$98.00 as its share of the White Mountains Region Association advertising. Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$402.00 for business and recreational inducements.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow necessary sums in anticipation of taxes.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to distribute the blank inventories at the time they examine and appraise the property to be taxed.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town through tax collector's deeds

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125.00, to install a culvert at Kearsarge corner, on the land of Alfred Gardner; agreeable to a petition signed by Alfred Gardner and others.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to negotiate with the State of New Hampshire, or its agencies, to enable them to continue to develop its wood industries..

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money on the credit of the Town, in amounts not to exceed \$25,000 for purposes specified in Article No. 13.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire on the credit of the Town, if necessary, sufficient amounts to tar such roads as, in their opinion, may require it.

Article 16. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

# **Report of Superintendent**

#### To the School Board and Citizens of Bartlett:

This report will be confined entirely to a discussion of district finances. A deficiency appropriation should have been made at the last school meeting. This year it is impossible to avoid or postpone the necessity.

The superintendent has no primary responsibility in the matter of the district's finances but it is his duty to advise and to give information which the school officers and the voters should have in order to conduct the school business The superintendent knows from personal examination that all accounts have been properly kept and audited. The deficit which appears certain when the current fiscal year ends on June 30, 1940, is due to three facts.

1. The expected revenue from the sale of the three old schoolhouses has not been realized because at this writing the old schoolhouses have not been sold.

2. There have been some emergency expenses.

3. Underestimates in determining the amounts to be raised on ordinary items of the budget.

It will be recalled that the Public Works Administration waived their demand for demolition of the old schoolhouses on condition that the proceeds from the sales be applied to the expense of equipping the new Lower Bartlett school.

About \$200 was expended last fall as an emergency measure to build a culvert and do some grading at the Lower Bartlett school. Further the Public Works Administration had refused on a technicality to approve and participate in the cost of furniture for this school. This was a loss of \$450 for which the sale of the old schoolhouses was expected to compensate. This loss was taken last year out of regular school funds. There were also considerable items of interest on notes not taken up promptly on account of lack of funds.

At the last March meeting \$16,411 was raised for the current year. By oversight no money was included for an insurance premium of \$360. For the last two years, insufficient amounts have been raised for fuel, and the cost of electric lights at the new school exceeded all estimates. Due also from the increase of the high school from fifty to seventy-five pupils there has been a small but necessary over-expenditure for books. It is clear that it is impossible in March to make with complete accuracy a budget for the purpose of assessing taxes for the expenses of a school year which ends a year after the following June 30.

In the fiscal year ending in June, 1938, \$11,000 in bonds were issued for the district's share in the Lower Bartlett school, and \$8,000 was borrowed to take up the old indebtedness in the form of notes held by the Whitefield bank and by individuals. The last of these notes for \$3500 was taken up this year. The indebtedness on the bonds is now \$9,000 and on the loan \$6,000. The district is obligated to take up \$1000 on each account each year.

It has been necessary beginning June 30, 1936, to close our books at the end of the fiscal year with outstanding obligations unpaid because the town has been unable to pay over the full amount of the school money for use during the school year for which it was assessed-

At the end of the fiscal year, June 30, 1938, the town owed the district \$7331. At the end of the following year the amount of arrears still due had been reduced to \$2696. For this reason our bookkeeping has been complicated by the necessity of paying some of our obligations in the fiscal year after they were incurred.

For the purpose of applying for state aid a very careful budget was made in October of expenses for the current year. The total income in sight including the arrears of \$2696 for previous appropriations is \$23,293. The total of expected payments is \$25,350. The apparent deficit is over \$2000. Included in the payments made this year is the amount of the \$3500 note with interest. About \$700 of this deficit is for the year ending June 30, 1939. The financial report last June listed \$564 of unpaid bills and there were other small unlisted bills aggregating \$150.

Making a different approach to the problem of determining the amount of the deficit, we may add these items.

On account of decrease of revenue from high school tuition amounting to \$180, a reasonable approximation of the amount which should be raised for the deficit is \$2200.

This is not pertinent to the present situation but it will be recalled that at the March meeting in 1938 the assessment for schools was reduced \$2000 on the assumption that the entire amount due from the town would be paid during the following fiscal year and be available for school expenditures. The school board acted in good faith in reducing this assessment and believed that it could give the taxpayers a credit of \$2000 against the assessment of the following year. This optimism was not justified.

It has required a great deal of labor on the part of your superintendent to reexamine the financial records and to make or try to make a brief and clear story of the financial situation. There is no disposition to blame anyone as no one is particularly at fault. It is true, however, in financial matters that if payments are not made when due, and if business is not attended to promptly, a situation develops which complicates bookkeeping and makes impossible keeping each year's business within itself. For this reason the superintendent has devoted his entire report in an effort to be helpful in making the situation clear.

The amount of state aid expected to be paid next December is \$3834. This is a large amount of money but the payment is always contingent upon the maintenance of approved school facilities and good financial management.

Your attention is called to the report of the headmaster which is made a part of the report of the superintendent.

I appreciate the cooperation of the school officers, teachers, parents and citizens in our common effort to provide good schools for the children in Bartlett.

I submit herewith at your request a short report of the High School:

In connection with the above it is necessary in a small school to organize as many alternating courses as possible. Just as soon as the French courses are fully alternating, there will be opportunity to add another, that of Consumer Education, to our permanent curriculum. This course was tried out last year with excellent results.

I desire to refer briefly to several matters in this report:

1. Lack of space and improper facilities for athletic sports. Every high school needs room for beforeschool and noon-day activities. The only space in the building for such recreation is the narrow hallway. Seventy pupils can not be properly accommodated in two average sized and one small room. The best work can not be done in such quarters and it is sincerely to be hoped that in time the town may be able to correct this condition. In this connection it is desirable to keep in mind that any worthy effort to correct this difficulty will of necessity take into consideration the dire need for showers and dressing rooms to be used in connection with our basketball and other athletic activities. With these improvements valuable additions can be made to our physical training activities.

2. Special efforts have been made during the past year to reduce absences in our school. Because of the fact that many students live at great distances and also for other reasons, our absence record has been very poor. It has been and still is more or less of a custom to consider that pupils may be kept from school for minor activities such as an occasional chance to work, home duties and trips. People who are familiar with membership in any organization are sure to realize that absence is the chief reason for lack of interest. In order to be interested in any activity, we must attend to it and not allow ourselves to be diverted by other matters which in themselves may be of importance. I am happy

to state that the school is improving in this respect. Our record of attendance this year shows a very marked improvement and it is hoped that parents will more and more realize the importance of regular attendance on the part of their children.

3. An interesting and valuable activity has been started this year in our school, that of a school savings bank. While the primary purpose of this bank is to save money for the Washington Trip, it is becoming nevertheless an agency for the development of the habit of saving. Already over \$200.00 have been saved, mostly in nickels, dimes, and quarters.

4. The Washington trip. The annual trip to Washington on the part of the Senior class has become an institution in our town and steps should be taken to put it upon a more workable basis. It can not fail to be seen by anyone who is familiar with high school work that the time spent raising money for the yearly Washington trip in a community the size of Bartlett seriously detracts from the legitimate work of the school. A Washington trip well conducted is a valuable part of the High School curriculum. To many pupils of the school it is a trip which they may never take again and it can be made a most valuable laboratory experience in connection with our course in United States History and Government. It would therefore seem entirely right and proper that this trip should be recognized and subsidized by the committee as soon as possible. This could be done by a small annual contribution contingent on adequate savings on the part of the pupils.

5. I am pleased to state that an increasing number of our graduates are pursuing their studies in other institutions. At the present time six graduates of the school are studying at the New Hampshire State University, one is at Hampton Institute, and four are taking business courses in various schools. In closing I wish to thank you, the members of the School Committee and the teachers at the school for your constant support and generous cooperation in the work of the school.
