REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARDS.

TOWN SCHOOL-DISTRICT.

During the past year there have been twenty-three weeks of school in each of the several districts, in nearly all of which we are pleased to be able to report satisfactory results. We were fortunate in securing the services of experienced teachers in nearly all of our schools, who entered upon their work with earnestness, and whose efforts to interest and instruct have done much for the advancement of the pupils under their charge. Very notably has this been seen where the labors of the teacher have been met with a like effort on the part of the scholars.

It would be economy to place charts in our schools to aid the teachers in instructing pupils who are too young to take up regular studies. Although somewhat expensive, they would amply repay the outlay in the extra amount of time the teacher would be able to give to the more advanced scholars.

It has never appeared expedient to consolidate any of our schools, neither does it seem probable that we will be obliged to abandon any of the school-houses now in use. In view of these facts, our school-rooms ought to be made respectable and comfortable, that we may receive the greatest possible benefit from them. We trust that the question of school-houses will receive the consideration it justly deserves.

The usual term of high school was taught by Mr. J. M. Barton, a senior in Dartmouth college, who gave good satisfaction, and proved himself a man fit for the place. The value of this extra term cannot be over-estimated.
