#### TOWN WARRANT

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Bradford, in the County of Merrimack, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

(L. S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Bradford on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same. (The raising of money and other articles in the warrant will be taken up at 1 o'clock P. M.)
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept State Aid for new construction, and if so to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,063.50 for same. In accordance with provisions of Chapter 59, New Hampshire Laws of 1933, amending Section 24, of Chapter 84, of the Public Laws of New Hampshire. If State Aid Construction is applied for as above, such joint funds must be expended on: Center Road.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to dispose of the old snow rollers, also the roller shed at the Center, or raise and appropriate money for the repair of said shed.

- 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money for currant bills, in anticipation of taxes.
- 6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, and other Officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 7. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Your attention is called to the Laws of 1933, Chapter 99 Section 22 which, in part, is as follows.

Local Option. A Town at its next regular town meeting unless a special town meeting called for the purpose is sooner held shall include in the warrant an article "To see whether beer or other lawful alcoholic beverages shall be manufactured or sold locally as permitted under this act."

Vote on bottom of official ballot.

If any school is in session on any of these days, it may close that number of days earlier than scheduled in June. If other days are lost they must be made up. The day for Hopkinton Fair is allowed on condition that at least 50 per cent of the pupils of a school attend the fair on that day.

**Teachers' salaries** will be paid in ten equal installments: one during the week following the first Saturday of the month.

The regular hours of school are 8:45—12:00 a. m. and 1:00—3:45 p. m.

Pupils in grades I and II may be dismissed 30 minutes earlier than the pupils of the higher grades in the forenoon and in the afternoon. Care must be taken to see that they do not get into mischief during this time.

In all schools teachers are to remain at the school during the noon intermission. Organized plays and games should be planned for the pupils with the cooperation of the pupils.

Teachers are to be in their respective rooms, or on the playgrounds to look after their pupils not less than 20 minutes before the school time in the morning. Much trouble will thus be avoided.

### REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Citizens of Bradford:

This is my first report as your superintendent. It deals with the following topics:

- (1) Our reorganized supervisory union.
- (2) Statistics of our schools.
- (3) Health of school children.
- (4) Age of entrance to first grade.

### Our Reorganized Supervisory Union

In accordance with an economy measure enacted into law at the last session of the General Court, the school districts of the State have been rearranged, for purposes of school supervision, into larger unions, in order to dispense with the services of five superintendents.

The Warner Union, No. 61, of which Bradford was a part, was one of the smaller unions in the State, and was dissolved last July by action of the State Board of Education. Bradford is included in the Hopkinton union, No. 26, which now comprises six districts—Hopkinton, Henniker, Bradford, Dunbarton, Newbury and Sutton.

The foregoing table shows that Bradford's record of attendance last year was somewhat below the State average. The principal reason for this was the epidemic of whooping cough last spring.

Our record of tardiness shows almost twice as many as the average of the State, in spite of the fact that the Center school has very few tardinesses.

Enrollment for the present year in the primary room at the village is much larger than usual, and it has been necessary to provide some assistance for Miss Cilley. Mr. Philip Dodge has been employed to serve as assistant at this school.

### Health of School Children

Health is one of the most important factors conditioning the success of pupils in school work. Our school physician makes an annual examination of the health of school children and reports needed corrections of eyes, teeth, etc., to the parents. Dr. Oliver is to be commended for securing a fair percentage of corrections through his efforts. For a short time this winter, a school nurse, Miss Rachel Wilson, has been working here, paid by the Civil Works Administration. She has been of some assistance in cases that the physican has not found time to follow up. She also gave an audiometer test in all the schools. This is an accurate method of determining how well a child can hear. A few defective ears were found, and steps are being taken to correct these wherever possible.

It is hoped that before the close of the year we may have the benefit of a dental clinic in Bradford. Dr. Oliver has generously offered the use of his office and dental chair for this purpose.

### Age of Entrance to First Grade

Each year, parents request the privilege of sending to school some children who are too young to do well the work of the first grade. These parents made the mistake of thinking that if the child gets an early start, his chances of progress through the school course will be improved. The opposite is likely to be the case; for the child usually finds new tasks coming to him from year to year that are just a little too hard for one of his age to grasp, while the more mature members of his grade can learn them easily. The result is frequently a failure to be promoted at some point in the course, with resulting discouragement; or more often a case of being just a little behind the others all the way along, and

barely making the grade. If no pupil entered school until after he had passed his sixth birthday, the chances of success by all would be improved; in fact, a child would seldom if ever lose by it, if he should wait until he were seven years old before entering.

### Conclusion

The short time that I have been working in Bradford has been very enjoyable. Our schools owe much to the leadership and effective work of my predecessor, Mr. Sinclair. The earnest efforts of the teachers, and the willing co-operation of parents and citizens, deserve gratitude. Let us continue to work together for the good of the children.
