At a meeting of Carroll County delegation duly notified and holden at the State House, Room No. 11, Feb. 1, 1893, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon :

1st. The delegation was called to order by Benjamin F. Clark, chairman.

2d. The Clerk being absent Aldo M. Rumery of Ossipee was chosen Clerk, pro tempore.

3d. Voted to raise the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2000) for the year 1894 for the purpose of putting a system of steam heat into the County Almshouse at Ossipee, and the same or as much thereof as is necessary is appropriated for that purpose.

4th. Voted to raise the sum of twelve hundred dollars (\$1200) for the year 1894 for the purpose of furnishing water supply for the County buildings at Ossipee, and the same be and is appropriated for that purpose.

5th. Voted to raise the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000) to defray the expenses of the county for the year 1894.

6th. Voted to raise the sum of twenty-three thousand dollars (\$23,000) to defray the expenses of the county for the year 1895.

7th. Voted to adjourn subject to the call of chairman.

COMMISSIONER'S REPORT.

To the Citizens of Carroll County:

In accordance with the requirements of law, the Commissioners of Carroll County respectfully submit the following report, together with reports of the other County officers :

FINANCIAL CONDITION OF THE COUNTY.

It will be noticed that the value of the personal property at the farm is greater than the County debt. In 1893, the County Convention voted to raise \$23,200 for 1894, and \$23,000 for 1895. Court expenses for 1894 have been large, owing to the trial and conviction of Ladd and Gouchee for horse stealing, proceedings which public safety demanded. The costs in these cases amounted to about \$1100. The Commissioner's fees have been larger than usual on account of inspecting property throughout the county, which occupied nearly a month of time. We trust our report to the State Board of Equalization will be of service to them in equalizing taxes in this county,

In January, 1894, we were able to take up \$15,000 in bonds, thus saving \$600 in interest to the taxpayers of the county. With the reduction of \$7,078 86 in the debt this year, when the appropriation has been smaller than in former years, with interest continually growing less,

and with no cases of importance now existing to which the county is a party, we shall recommend to the County Convention the raising of \$16,000 for 1896 and 1897, respectively, believing this to be ample for the economical administration of county affairs. With the debt liquidated after Jan. 1896, the taxpayers may look for lower taxes, and justly appreciate their condition when they recollect that only ten years ago our county debt was approximately \$100,000.

The expense of supporting paupers at the farm, and also away from the farm, is less than last year, while aid to indigent soldiers and families is also less.

We have secured the services of Mr. and Mrs. Manson as superintendent and matron for another year, the new board of Commissioners concurring in the contract. We again congratulate the county in having the able and efficient management of Mr. and Mrs. Manson to attend to the needs of the unfortunates under their control. Everything necessary for the comfort and welfare of the inmates of the almshouse is supplied at low expense, and this condition can only be attained by the exercise of care and economy.

At the April term of Court there was one criminal jury trial resulting in the conviction of respondent on two indictments. These were the cases in which the state failed to obtain a verdict at the April term, 1893, as shown in last report. Respondent sent to State Prison for five years.

At the October term there was one criminal jury trial in which the state obtained a verdict, and respondent was sent to State Prison for seven years.

Fine and costs have been paid in some of the liquor cases, *capias* issued in two, and the others marked "not to go forward during good behavior." A *nonle prosecute* was entered in one case, three marked not to forward during good behavior, and the others continued.

The county has been a party to no civil cases in Court during the past year, so that my services have not been required in this respect.

PHYSICIAN'S REPORT.

To the Commissioners of Carroll County:

As physician to Carroll County Almshouse, I would submit the following report for the year ending December 31, 1894:

There have been few cases of continued sickness during the past year. Most of the cases requiring the services of a physician have been either chronic troubles or slight ailments. The deaths, with the exception of a child of two and one-half years, have been among the aged. I believe the aggregate sickness among the inmates of this institution is less than in the same number outside in the various avocations of life. This is partly due to the good sanitary conditions and the fact that the inmates are properly clothed and fed, and not exposed to the inclemency of the weather.
