To the Inhabitants of the Town of Danville, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 8th day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

- 12. To bring in your ballots for Delegates at Large, Alternate Delegates at Large, Delegates and Alternate Delegates to the National Convention.
- 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Danville:

I am privileged herewith to present my fifth annual report as Superintendent of Schools. A group of questions recently submitted to parents and citizens with regard to what they like to know about their schools showed they were most interested in these topics: Pupil Progress and Achievement, Methods of Instruction, Health, Courses of Study, and Extra-Curricular Activities. These will therefore constitute the basis of my report.

PUPIL PROGRESS AND ACHIEVEMENT

Probably we can best illustrate this progress by summarizing the results of the tests given last May to the pupils of grades 4 to 8. The 8th grade was tested separately with a test called Standard Graduation Examination. The other grades were tested together with the Otis Classification Test. The results of the two groups follow:

These results are entirely satisfactory and commendatory. In either group a good majority of your pupils got a higher total score than the score of the middle pupil in each grade of the whole Union. Normally we would expect only one-half above the median and one-half below. The median score of the Union in each case indicates that that pupil was well advanced in his grade in comparison with hundreds of others all over the country. In short, the above proves that educational progress has been made. Two reasons for this achievement are evident, namely, capable pupils and good teaching.

METHODS AND COURSE OF STUDY

Like every activity of the modern world, the course of study and methods to meet it have changed. A large group of material in one place or another has become of no value today because of the replacement of these items by a bit of modern machinery. The real justification for any course on the program is social utility. "If the younger generation is to achieve participation in our social life, the emphasis in curriculum construction and in teaching must be placed on social outlook, on reflective consideration of what constitutes a good life in the social order." Our aim is just this. Its realization is the joint responsibility of home, school and church. Our course of study calls for emphasis on the utility of the subject to the community.

I cannot explain here every change that has taken place but invite your attention to the new Program of Studies placed in your schools last year. The outline of studies and suggestions for their expansion into learning represent the last word in curriculum building. It is designed to meet a changed world with up-to-date material. I am sure the teachers will welcome your inspection of their copies.

HEALTH

The School Nurse's Report embodied in Table VII which follows shows you exactly the condition of the health of the children and the corrections she was able to obtain. Your own individual cases were reported to you personally and your cooperation in correction has been commendable. I hope we may continue working for that common goal for every child—A sound mind in a sound body.

EXTRA-CURRICULA ACTIVITIES

These activities which take place outside of the regular school subjects and which are extremely important and valuable have not been over emphasized. In the main each school has held its own Hallowe'en and Christmas parties and Education Week Program. This fall both Eaton schools were very successful during the Education Week and both won the Union prizes for best attendance of visitors. At the last graduation a change was made from the entertainment side to a further emphasis on the graduates. On account of the size of the class and in order to insure a program moderate in length, other material was used. I am sure you will appreciate and approve the changes.

With grateful acknowledgement of the support of the School Board, the cooperation of a loyal group of teachers and the help of your citizenry for the pleasant and beneficial year, I beg to present this report and the tables which follow.


