To the Inhabitants of the Town of East Kingston in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said East Kingston on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Old Age Assistance.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$75.00 for Memorial Day purposes.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for Public Library.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.67 against the State appropriation of \$602.67 for Class V road assistance.

No Town may receive both Class V and State Aid in same year.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$481.50 against the State appropriation of \$1,000.00 for State Aid Construction; this sum to be expended on South Road.

9. To see if the Town will vote to take from the Town Maintenance appropriation money to tar roads that need to be tarred this year.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Defense.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to provide for additional fire protection due to war emergency.

12. To transact any other business that may legally come before this meeting.

Art. 5. Motion by Robert W. Baldwin and seconded that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 for the Library. Voted.

Art. 6. Motion by E. Warren Barnes and seconded we raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for forest fire equipment; the State to match by equal amount. Voted.

Art. 7. Motion by Robert Baldwin and seconded we pass over Article 7. Voted.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board of East Kingston, New Hampshire:

I take pleasure in submitting my first annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

I know that you will be interested in the precise and concrete information contained in the statistical tables which are incorporated in this report and I hope that these tables will serve to give parents and all interested citizens a clear picture of the facts concerning the schooling of East Kingston's children. Table I shows the distribution of pupils in the various grades on January 1 of this year; Tables II and III, the size and accomplishments of the schools of last year and their growth in the recent past, and Tables IV, V, and VI, East Kingston's school business as compared with that of the other districts in this Union. Table VII is self explanatory and automatically calls for our commendation of the combined determination of parents and children to make the most of school opportunities.

Mrs. Cooper's account of the results of her activities accompanies this report. Her careful supervision of the physical condition of our pupils assures good health in our schools.

The public musical performance of the pupils is the best evidence not only that Miss Beaton herself had a successful year last year but also that the teachers were faithful in the work assigned weekly to them by the supervisor. This happy condition continues this year. Mrs. Philbrick and Mrs. Merrick carry on the same efficient and praiseworthy work as they have done for so long a time and the school buildings are most competently cared for by Mr. Baldwin.

Procedures demanded of all public schools by the National Defense Program in the world wide present emergency continue to develop; we shall plan and practice cooperation in such matters to the limit of our ability.

For many years the American public school has been recognized as one of the most important foundation stones in the beautiful temple of democracy. The wise men who planned and laid this foundation very many years ago realized that universal compulsory education at public expense was so necessary and precious an instrument in the creation of a free people that it should have the greatest support and closest attention of all citizens. Throughout all the years of our nation's life, the American people have sacrificed time, energy and money in order that the American public school might not only live but become increasingly a greater and greater factor in the training of good, democratic citizens.

Whenever the need for general sacrifice has been greatest our people have made the greatest response. Now that the world faces the gravest crisis of all they will not fail in guaranteeing that the present standard of education shall be maintained throughout the war, that schools shall be well taught by trained teachers and that the future citizenry shall be competent to handle the stupendous responsibility of the peace to come. Recent reports from England indicate that wherever the wholesome influence of the schools has been suspended by closure or made less effective by inferior management, juvenile delinquency and other baneful factors contributing to adult crime have developed. The United States is advised not to repeat the mistakes of England.

I am sure that I speak for all those immediately concerned with the operation of the schools when I say that we realize and appreciate the deep interest of those who pay the cost of the schools, furnish the pupils, and serve as school district officers. We pledge our best service in our common inspiring work.
