# TOWN WARRANT

#### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

#### To the Inhabitants of the Town of Francestown, in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Francestown, on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next, at 10.00 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see how much the town will vote to raise and appropriate for highways.

4. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid and raise and appropriate \$763.50 to procure same for construction of class 2 road, the State to grant \$1526.00; or will vote to accept State Aid for construction of class 5 roads and raise and appropriate \$702.32 to procure same, the State to grant \$2809.28; or see if the town will vote to use the T. R. A. funds to continue construction of the Bennington Road.

5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to maintain the class 2 road beginning at the Bennington line.

6. To see if the town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the municipal accounting division and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1000 to pay serial note for tractor due April 10, 1941 and raise and appropriate an additional \$500 to pay serial note No. 3 due July 1, 1941, for fire equipment.

8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to make additional repairs at the cemeteries. 9. To see how much the town will raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.

10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to pay interest on borrowed sums.

11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money for the library.

12. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow a sufficient sum of money to defray current expenses in anticipation of taxes.

13. To see if the town will vote authority to the Selectmen to dispose of property acquired by the town, said vote to stand until otherwise disposed of.

14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$50.00 (1/100th of 1 per cent of the assessed valuation) to the Monadnock Region Association of Southern New Hampshire for the issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns in the Monadnock Region.

15. To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$400.00 for the control of white pine blister rust.

16. To see what action the town will take relative to the zoning ordinance.

17. To see if the town will vote to reimburse Mrs. Alison B. Hill for repairs made on the library.

18. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors and Committees heretofore chosen and take action on same.

19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD AND CITIZENS OF FRANCESTOWN:

I respectfully submit my seventh annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

#### SUPERVISION

In the last several annual reports I have attempted to set forth what we are doing in the primary grades with the important subject of reading. This emphasis is constantly being held, and is extended to the succeeding grades year by year. The pupils who were in Grade One when we began this special drive are now in Grade Four, except those who have had to proceed more slowly in order to receive the greatest benefit from the reading instruction.

As one observes the instruction in these grades, one sees many evidences of the superiority of modern methods in the teaching of reading. The interest of the children is more keen and real; their confidence in their own ability is greater; the progress of the timid child and of those who are by nature slower than the average is more sure and steady, because they are not forced to try to keep the pace of the faster workers.

More concrete evidences of gains in reading ability in the various grades should appear as time passes, for results in the standardized tests used should reveal what gains may be in reading and in the other subjects. Already there is some evidence of the improvement of the pupils in the upper grades, who did not have this reading program while in the primary grades but have had the benefit of the increased attention teachers have given to reading in the middle and upper grades. The average gains of pupils in these grades, as indicated by the scores they made in the reading tests of the Stanford Achievement Tests in successive years, is shown in the following table.

This study includes all of the pupils in the eight towns of this Supervisory Union.

In this table, a normal growth or gain for a full year is represented by 1.00. The pupils of Grade V in October, 1938, had gained .85 of a normal year's growth since taking the test in October, 1937, when they were in Grade IV; but in October, 1939, when they were in Grade VI, they had gained 1.11 in a year; when they had reached Grade VII (in October, 1940) they had made a gain of 1.31 in that year.

A similar study of the pupils in Grade IV in October, 1940, shows that they gained 1.25 from the time they were tested in Grade III in October, 1939. This measure may not be so reliable as those set forth in the table, however, due to the fact that we use the Metropolitan Test in Grade III and the Stanford in Grade IV, and the scores are not quite comparable.

#### BUDGET

Most of the items in the budget estimates prepared by the School Board for 1941-1942 do not differ materially from the budget of preceding years. There is however, a slight increase in the estimated cost of textbooks due to the fact that there will be an unusually large sixth grade next year and additional books in the sixth grade subjects will be needed to the amount of \$40 to \$50. The increase in the cost of fuel for the new building was to be expected because of the substitution of steam heat for the stoves in the old building. Based on the oil consumption to the present time, we do not think it safe to allow for less than 3500 gallons of fuel oil which will cost approximately \$250. There is a decrease of \$120 in the estimated cost of high school tuition and a slight decrease in the per capita tax.

The payment of \$500 on the debt for the new building and \$85 interest on the same with insurance cost of \$75 must of course be taken into account, and these items account for practically the entire increase of \$673 in the total amount of the School Board's budget, as compared with last year. This increase, together with a decrease of approximately \$162 in state aid, accounts for the increase of \$835.13 in the amount required to be assessed. It does not now appear that there will be any unexpended cash balance at the close of the current year.
