Town Meeting Warrant (As known February 1, 1937)

- Article 1. To hear reports of committees and agents and act on same and to choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- Article 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the year ensuing and to make appropriations for the same.
- Article 3. To see how much money the town will raise and appropriate for the Abbie Greenleaf Library, for the salary of the librarian, for the maintenance of highways and bridges and for lighting our streets for the year ensuing.
- Article 4. To see how much money the town will raise and appropriate for Memorial Day and to choose an agent to expend same.
- Article 5. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to apply for State Aid for our highways for the ensuing year and to raise and appropriate money for same.
- Article 6. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to allow a discount for early payment of taxes.
- Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise \$1510.00 to meet the State's \$1510.00 to expend on Butter Hill Road; also to raise \$100.00 for land damage to Robert P. Peckett, on the same property.
- Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money not to exceed \$50.00 to place a sign on the triangle at the intersection of the Butter Hill and Twin Mountain roads.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money to pay the note on the fire-pumper due July 23, 1937.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money to eradicate the Pine Blister Rust.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum not to exceed \$2500.00 for completion of the Gymnasium.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$500.00 for advertising and promoting winter sports.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money to complete the bridge over Glover Brook on the Wells Road.

Article 14. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds.

Article 15. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the budget act.

Article 17. To see if the town will approve the acquisition by the United States Government of approximately 480 acres of land situated in the town, forming an additional purchase unit of the White Mt. National Forest, and described as follows: Starting at the southeast corner of Lot 11, Range 3, which is also a point in the proclaimed Forest Boundary; thence westerly along the south line of Lot 11, Range 3 to the southwest corner of said Lot; thence northerly along the west lines of Lot 11, Ranges 3, 2 and 1 to the northeast corner of Lot 11, Range 1, which is also

a point in the Franconia-Bethlehem town line; thence easterly along the Franconia-Bethlehem town line to the northeast corner of Lot 11, Range 1, which is also a point in the proclaimed Forest Boundary; thence southerly along the proclaimed Forest Boundary to the point of beginning; containing 480 acres, more or less.

Article 18. To see what action the town will take to acquire the Post Office Building, so-called, together with necessary land and to construct a town building, not to exceed \$25,000.

Article 19. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Report of the Superintendent of Schools

To the School Board and Citizens of Franconia:

The enrollment in your schools last year was 142, the average membership 128.18, and the percent of attendance 94.66. This year the enrollment is 146, distributed as follows: grades 1 and 2, 27; grades 3 and 4, 25; grades 5 and 6, 28; grades 7 and 8, 22; high school, 44. There are twelve tuition pupils in the high school and 18 in the elementary grades.

There were two changes in the teaching staff of your schools this year. Miss Dorris Hamlin of Milan replaced Miss Florence Bartlett as teacher of home economics and junior high subjects. Miss Hamlin is a graduate of Nasson Teachers' College and has had several years of experience as a teacher in both Maine and New Hampshire. Miss Elizabeth Massie resigned her position to accept a position as teacher of English in Gorham High School. Miss Madeleine Amsden of Brookfield, Mass., was elected to replace Miss Massie. She is a graduate of Bridgewater State Teachers' College and has had a year of graduate study in history at Clark University. Miss Amsden is supervising the music in grades 1, 2, 5, and 6. Instruction in manual training has been continued in the junior high school this year, under the direction of Mr. E. M. Blodgett.

Last spring extensive repairs were made on the sewer system of the Academy. During the summer several new radiators were placed in the chemistry laboratory. This has made it possible to heat this room at all times during the winter.

Among the repairs which should be considered for next year are the following: The desks throughout the building are marred and worn and ought to be sanded and refinished. A removable partition which could be placed across the main entrance of the building, converting it into a storm entry, would help to keep the building warm during the winter months.

Franconia is one of the few towns in the state which does not have a school or district nurse. I think it would be both possible and desirable for Franconia to unite with some of the surrounding towns and have a part-time school nurse.

The ladies of the Greenleaf Civics Club have again made it possible this winter to serve hot dishes for those pupils who must remain at school for lunch.

I have especially attempted for the past few years to improve the teaching of reading, arithmetic, and spelling; and I feel that much progress has been made in the teaching of these subjects. Standard achievement tests are given in nearly all subjects in grades 1 to 8 in May. These tests enable us to compare the progress of our pupils with those throughout the country. The results show that Franconia pupils are doing average or better-than-average work.

We expect to again close the school year with a small balance. The Academy Trustees expect to be able to contribute more to the support of your schools in the future, and when this becomes an accomplished fact, it will be possible to reduce the amount of your appropriation.

I wish to thank the members of the School Board and the teachers for their cooperation.
