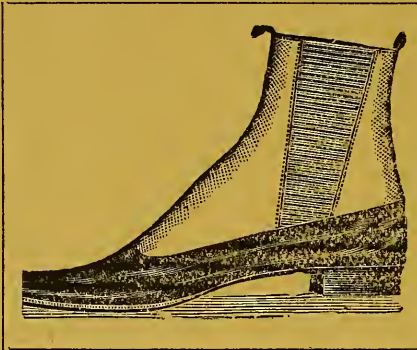

You are hereby notified to meet at the town house, in said Fremont, on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next, at 10 of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects :

1. To choose a town clerk.
2. To choose three selectmen, treasurer, auditor, one or more highway agents, and one library commissioner.
3. To choose all other necessary officers.
4. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the following purposes : To defray town charges, for repairs of highways and bridges, for support of schools, and for Memorial Day.
5. To see if the town will vote to paint the outside of the town house, and raise and appropriate such a sum of money as may be necessary for the same.
6. To see if the town will vote to purchase a road-machine, and raise and appropriate such a sum of money as may be necessary for the same.
7. To see if the town will vote to build a lock-up, and raise and appropriate such a sum of money as may be necessary for the same.
8. To choose agents, auditors, or committees in relation to any subjects embraced in this warrant, and transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

CONDITION OF SCHOOLS.

To the Citizens of Fremont:

Again it becomes our duty to report to you the condition and progress of your schools the past year.

NO. 1, HOOKE.

Miss Abbie L. Robinson, who has taught this school for the past two years, still retains the good will of the scholars and the united support of their parents, both of which every teacher should have, and must have, in order to make a school what it should be. The school is in a very flourishing condition. Miss Robinson taught both spring and fall terms.

NO. 2, VILLAGE.

Both spring and fall terms were taught by Miss Mary O. Caverly, a teacher of considerable experience. Miss Caverly went to work in earnest from the start, and it was not long before every pupil knew what was to be expected of him or her, and all went to work with a will. The school was well disciplined and very satisfactory to all concerned. The examination at the close of both terms showed that the scholars were quite thorough in their work.

NO. 3, ERICK.

Miss Florence M. Jones taught both spring and fall terms. Miss Jones is also an experienced teacher and the work done throughout the year was very satisfactory.

NO. 4, PINES.

The spring term was taught by Miss Annie M. French and was in some respects satisfactory. The discipline, however, was not what it should have been.

Mr. Elmer H. Rollins taught the fall term. Mr. Rollins very soon won the respect of his scholars, and good progress was the result. Your committee was unable to visit the school at the close, but learned from those interested that the term's work was very satisfactory.

We are very glad to be able to make such a good report of your schools. It is our opinion that they have been a little above the average, and we hope by employing and retaining good teachers that they may continue to grow nearer and nearer to perfection year by year.

The schools in Nos. 1 and 2 were closed for one and two weeks respectively during the fall term on account of scarlet fever breaking out. Quite a number of scholars were kept out on this account after the schools were resumed. This necessarily brought the average attendance, "which up to that time was very good," down below what it would have been.

One of your committee, at the beginning of the spring term, offered a present to every scholar who was neither absent nor tardy during the year in his district. As a result eight received a present. Their names will be found elsewhere. It would be money well spent if the town would raise twenty-five dollars and give the same either in cash or presents for perfect attendance.

Parents should interest themselves more in the welfare of their children's education. They should visit the schools more, as we have said in previous reports. It encourages the scholars as well as the teacher to have their parents come in and see how much they have learned during the term. They should also see that their children go directly to the schoolhouse and not loiter on the way and come in late, as it disturbs the whole school.

Our town is now well provided with good school buildings, all of which are pleasantly located. Two new schoolhouses have been built during the past two years, one to replace the old No. 1, which has been sold at auction, the other near the No. 2, which will accommodate a part of the fifty or more scholars in this district. The district will be divided into two classes, viz., primary and intermediate, or grammar. This fills a long-felt want.
