# REPORT OF SUP'T SCHOOLS.

*To the Selectmen of the Town of Gilford :*

GENTLEMEN : Having been elected as Superintendent of the schools of the town, at your March election in 1874, and as by an act of the Legislature of the State, passed at its session in June, I have been disannexed from the town of Gilford and annexed to the town of Laconia with School District Number Four, my superintendence of the schools continued for a single term, at the close of which time the books and papers pertaining to the office were turned over to my successor in office, Rev. H. S. Kimball, who will complete this report and give you the general statistics of the schools for the current year.

The teachers selected for the Spring term of schools may justly be styled as an efficient corps, comparing favorably with the same number of teachers in any town of the State. With one solitary exception the schools were well conducted and successful, and the want of success in this one exception arose more from the want of discipline at home, and influences outside the school room, than from lack of ability and effort on the part of the teacher. The discipline of every school depends greatly upon the home training of children. The pupil is almost wholly what parents and teachers make him. The difficulties which arise between teachers and pupils almost universally spring from the circumstances of the scholar's surroundings and training outside of school. Will parents heed this truth and govern themselves accordingly. Justice to yourselves, to your children, and to the spirit of the age in which we live, require at your hands a better provision for the wants and comfort of your children in the school room. True, you have here and there a cozy little school house, but others are miserable apologies, dilapidated specimens of antiquity, which fire has failed to burn, water to quench, or tempests to destroy for "Lo these many years." Say! *Isn't it time to arise and build?*

In a country and under a government like ours, where every man is a sovereign, and laws are made for the general good and by men of our own election, it would seem both wise and prudent for public officers to regard such laws, especially where the disbursements of funds are concerned. And yet truth and regard for the best interest of the town, and especially for gentle-

men who so generously elected me to office, compel me to say that every dollar paid out for instruction during the Spring term of the schools of the town, with the exception of money paid to Miss A. A. Gilman, a teacher in School District Number Thirteen, was paid out in direct violation of the plain statute law of the State, and in most cases on the part of both payor and payee, with a knowledge of this truth and the published statute in their hands. Now, if laws are of no consequence, repeal them, if salutary enforce them, otherwise by your example, both as parents and teachers, you educate your children in a school that will eventually prove disastrous to the best interest of our State and nation. Let your schools be conducted for the general good of all classes. Let not partisanship, sectarianism, or bigoted pomposity find a place to set its foot or raise its head in the management of your children, and then may you confidently anticipate a genuine success in your common schools.

With thanks for the kindness shown on the part of teachers and scholars during my term of office, and kind regards to townsmen for their confidence and respect in the past, hoping that our association may be for our mutual good and the best interests of the cause of education, I am, gentlemen,

## FALL AND WINTER SCHOOLS.

DISTRICT No. 1. (Intervale.) Miss Eliza A. Doe in teaching this term, had her usual good success. She is an experienced, capable teacher, and in her care this was an excellent school. The scholars deserve mention for their general good bearing.

DISTRICT No. 2. (Carr's.) The teacher, Miss Hattie E. Smith, and scholars labored earnestly to have a good term of school, and succeeded. Remarks of former Committees in regard to house might be repeated here.

DISTRICT No. 3. (Mooney's.) Miss Emma A. Goss seemed qualified to teach this school, and we think did quite well. The withdrawal of certain scholars, we judge, was rather hasty.

DISTRICT No. 4. (Laconia.) Removed out of town.

DISTRICT No. 5. (Thyng's.) This school was, under the

instruction of Miss Alice J. Gilman. We were sorry an examination was prevented by sickness of teacher, but our first visit, with inquiries during and after the school, satisfy us that this was more than an ordinary successful term.

DISTRICT No. 6. (Pond.) Miss N. E. Wilkerson is a pleasant, patient teacher, yet maintains discipline. Teacher, scholars and parents were in harmony, and the result was a good school.

DISTRICT No. 7. (White Oaks.) In the management of this school Miss Enima J. Lane proved herself worthy a place among first-class teachers. It was a profitable term; would have been more so had certain scholars attended more regularly.

DISTRICT No. 8. (Gilford Village.) Mr. Cyrus A. Sanborn, Teacher. This district employs only the best teachers, and has schools of the first quality. This term was no exception in any respect.

DISTRICT No. 9. (Under the Mountain.) No. 10. (Liberty Hill.) Miss E. D. Sanborn, the teacher of both schools, is a superior teacher. The scholars in each district took a deep interest in their studies, and made marked progress.

DISTRICT No. 11. (Back of Mountain.) Under the judicious management of Miss Sarah A. Ball this school took its position among the best. The examination was creditable alike to teacher and scholars.

DISTRICT No. 12. (Morrill's) We found a first class teacher, Miss Sadie R. Hibbard, conducting a very profitable school in the best school house in town.

DISTRICT No. 13. (Lake Village.) The different departments were conducted by teachers as follows: Grammar, second and third terms, Miss Annie A. Gilman. Intermediate, second term, Mrs. S. A. Davis. Primary, second term, Mrs. E. J. Saunders. Intermediate and Primary, united, third term, Mrs. E. J. Saunders. These three experienced, superior teachers did a grand work in their respective schools. The district has every reason to be more than satisfied with each teacher and the results of their untiring efforts for the welfare of the scholars. Miss Abbie Ellsworth's instructions in vocal music have been very profitable. Subjoined is a statistical table compiled from teachers' reports.
