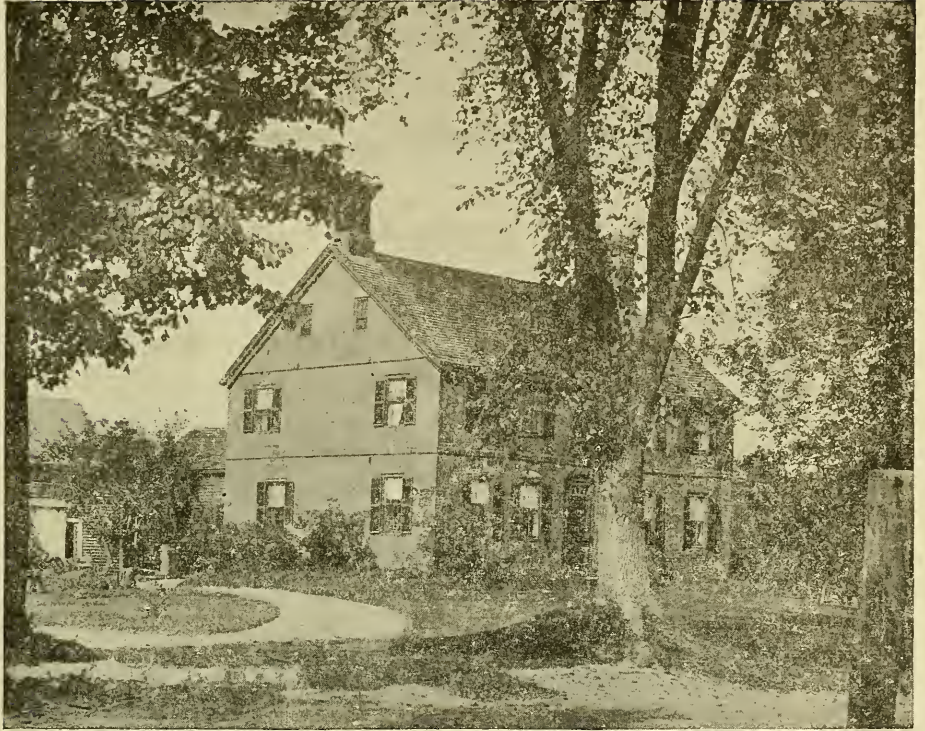

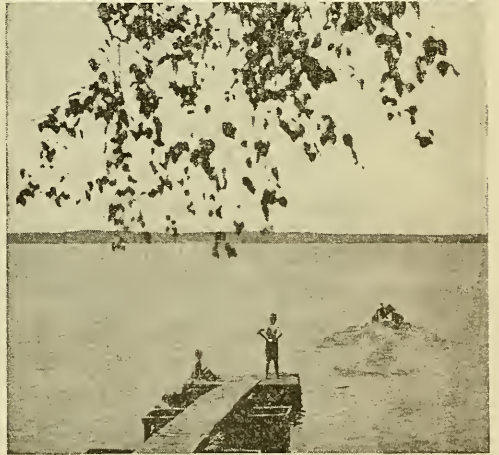

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

(L. S.)

To the inhabitants of the town of Greenland in the county of Rockingham and state of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in town affairs:-

You are hereby notified to meet at the Assembly Hall (Stone School) in Greenland on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at seven of the clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for same.
3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the repairs of highways and bridges.
4. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for construction of Class V. roads and raise and appropriate the sum of \$94.61 for said purpose.
5. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of the Weeks Public Library.
6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$125.00 for the care of cemeteries.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the care of the park.

8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the issuance and distribution of printed matter calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the town, in cooperation with other towns coordinated in the Seacoast Regional Development Association, the sum of \$50.00.

9. To see if the voters of the town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money on short term notes in anticipation of taxes.

10. To see if the town will vote to accept and try for one year the Building Ordinance as submitted by the Town Planning Board, and on file with the Town Clerk.

11. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to sell the town tractor and snow plow.

12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25.00 for the maintenance of the town dump.

13. To see if the town will vote to give the selectmen authority to appoint two members to work with them to form a water board, with the authority to said board to handle the water situation.

14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$450.00 for the purpose of spraying the elm trees along the highways in town.

15. To transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board of Greenland, New Hampshire :

I take pleasure in submitting my annual report as Superintendent of Schools, the thirteenth in the series.

The school population of Greenland continues to grow, being now in total enrollment, more than forty percent larger than three years ago. If all new pupils in the school should remain permanently in Greenland, the capacity of the school would be very severely taxed. Many families, however, come and go quickly. Undoubtedly this condition will prevail until the war is over and defense workers are not required to move so frequently from one plant to another. Greenland can be credited with doing its extra share during the present emergency in providing good schooling for those who come to the town. It can also be credited with furnishing a meeting place for all those who must plan the town's many varied activities. The war increases the demand for such accommodations, of course, and the taxpayers will expect to pay the cost. Greenland is obligated by law as a school district, to maintain its schools at certain standards of efficiency for a certain length of time each year. This obligation the town is cheerfully meeting. The facilities of the school building at other times should be used in whatever way the district votes.

As in other years, our teachers have made full use of standardized tests to measure progress of pupils and efficiency of management. We are justified in the conclusion that the work of the class rooms is efficient and that, in general, satisfactory progress is being made. A casual visitor to the schools will find a happy lot of pupils enthusiastic in school affairs. Since last September Miss Stone has been teaching all the English in the four upper grades and Mr. Shuff all the arithmetic. This arrangement is resulting in more effective instruction of all the pupils in

those two subjects. I expect that the public appearances of the pupils will show an improvement in oral English. Music, under Mrs. Coombs' experienced direction, continues to be a very much worth while subject; it brings pleasure as well as excellent training to the pupils. As in former years, the health of the school receives faithful attention from Mrs. Sheehy; I commend her report to your notice.

Since a year ago the schoolhouse has been very much more in use evenings than in any year since I have known it. All of the extra work involved, together with the ordinary care of the building, is ably done by Mrs. Sturtevant.

All public schools are confronted this year with an entirely new situation caused by the National Civilian Defense Program. This requires that those in charge of the schools provide for the care and safety of school children during school hours in case of whatever emergency may arise. Plans for their protection are developing everywhere and in Greenland we shall keep fully informed and carry out the suggestions and demands of school and defense officials.

For many years the American public school has been recognized as one of the most important foundation stones in the beautiful temple of democracy. The wise men who planned and laid this foundation very many years ago realized that universal compulsory education at public expense was so necessary and precious an instrument in the creation of a free people that it should have the greatest support and attention of all citizens. Throughout all the years of our nation's life, the American people have sacrificed time, energy and money in order that the American public school might not only live but become increasingly a greater and greater factor in the training of good, democratic citizens.

Whenever the need of general sacrifice has been greatest our people have made the greatest response. Now that

the world faces the gravest crisis of all they will not fail in guaranteeing that the present standard of education shall be maintained throughout the war, that schools shall be well taught by trained teachers and that the future citizenry shall be competent to handle the stupendous responsibility of the peace to come. Recent reports from England indicate that wherever the wholesome influence of the schools has been suspended by closure or made less effective by inferior management, juvenile delinquency and other baneful factors contributing to adult crime have developed. The United States is advised not to repeat the mistakes of England.

Those in immediate charge of the schools thank you for your interest in their work. They wish to share in the extra duties of war time and they pledge their best efforts in the work of training boys and girls to be loyal and useful future citizens.

THE ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

There were 125 children examined with 92 more or less serious conditions found. Of these, 80 were definitely corrected during the year through the cooperation of parents, family physicians or clinics. The Dental Clinic was held as usual, 42 children receiving treatment. Thirty children received dental care from their own dentist. Two children have been taken to Dr. Jone's clinics in Manchester several times. Hot lunches were served by Miss Mabel Thaxter. These were enjoyed by the children and twelve children who were underweight came up to normal weight. The following organizations have given substantial help to this project: The Red Cross, Woman's Alliance and Grange. The audiometer, which was given to this section of the state by the American Legion Auxiliary, was used in the school to test the hearing of children. 89 children were tested. Two defects were found. 124 children are vaccinated against small pox. 98 children have had the diphtheria anti-toxin treatment. Forty-three visits were made to the school.

I wish to thank our Superintendent, Mr. Towle, the School Board, teachers, Red Cross, Woman's Alliance, Miss Thaxter, Grange and parents for their splendid cooperation with my work.
