**TOWN WARRANT**  
**THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE**

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(L. S.)

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hampstead in the County of Rockingham in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said town on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

3. Is it expedient to revise the Constitution?

4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to keep the unimproved roads and bridges in repair.

5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate to meet the expenses of the public library the ensuing year.

6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial day, and what method they will adopt to expend the same.

7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the care of cemeteries the ensuing year.

8. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to hire money for the use of the town in anticipation of taxes.

9. To hear reports of auditors and committees, and to act thereon.

10. To see if the town will accept state aid for construction of the road known as the Farm Road, and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$1233.00; or will accept state aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$134.97.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate, if any, to repair the Brown Hill Road, so called. (By request).

12. To see if the town will vote to give Benjamin and Pauline Clow a \$100.00 in addition to the \$500 paid for the athletic field. (By request).

13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate to repair the road leading by the ball field. (By request).

14. To see if the town will vote to accept the report of the Selectmen on the Ball Park and raise and appropriate money for same if they request it.

15. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to sell the piece of land adjoining Benjamin Symonds on the corner of Westville and East Hampstead road.

16. To see if the town will take any action in regard to purchasing a new furnace for the town Hall and what method would be adopted to pay for the same.

17. To see if the town will vote to remove the platforms and steps in the Town Hall, and to raise or appropriate money for the same. (By petition).

18. To see if the town will vote to extend the kitchen to the back of the Town Hall, build a shed and toilets and to lower the kitchen floor and to raise or appropriate money for the same. (By petition).

19. To see if the town will vote to purchase one hundred and fifty chairs for use in the Town Hall, and to raise or appropriate money for the same. (By petition).

20. To see if the town will vote to close the Putnam road (so called) by gates or bars.

21. To see what action the town will take to dispose of the old hearse and repairing or disposing of the hearse house.

22. Shall Beverages be sold in this town under permits granted by the State Liquor Commission under provision of Chapter 99 of 1933 and amendments thereof? (By petition).

23. To see if the town will vote to pay their portion with Derry and Atkinson of \$1000.00 to dredge the bogs in Island Pond providing the state pays \$2000.00. (By petition).

24. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Hampstead:

I herewith present my annual report as Superintendent of your schools.

The statistical report is for the school year ending June 30, 1936. Following this report will be found reports by the Music Supervisor and the School Nurse.

There has been but one change in the teaching force. Miss Bernice Devine was elected to a teaching position at Lowell, Massachusetts. Her position was taken by Miss Katherine Kearns.

The enrollment for the year covered by this report was 181, which was three more than during the previous year. The school attendance averaged 96.79% of the membership. The average for the state was 94.75%.

Twenty-two boys and girls completed the work of the eighth grade last June. All but one of these entered the Senior High School. The Good Citizenship medal was awarded to Raymond Durkee.

As usual, detailed information about the Hampstead High School will be found in the Headmaster's report. I again attest that the school is truly progressive; its conduct and morale are high; its teaching force is competent; and it ranks well among the high schools of the state.

The new heating plant at the High School has greatly improved conditions in this building. There is now an abundance of heat and at an even temperature.

The Parent-Teacher Association continues to be a vital factor in public education in Hampstead. Its help is very much appreciated. I believe that credit is due not only to those that have taken a part in the regular work of the association, but also to Mr. Levi Duston for the generous use of his bus for transportation to the meetings.

A school citizenship mark has been added to our new report cards this year. This mark is based upon consideration of the following character traits; co-operation, self-control, perseverance, courage, promptness, orderliness, and health habits. We have attempted to teach each child the importance and necessity of these character traits, which will make of him a good citizen.

Worthy use of leisure time is being stressed in our classrooms by planning and providing suitable library reading for the children. Our aim is to encourage children to read library books for enjoyment and thus establish the reading habit. Clubs can be used to good advantage in school. The club work so well started last year is being continued.

Standardized tests given during the year show that good progress have been made in the fundamentals.

For a number of years Hampstead has sufficiently recognized the value of music instruction to employ a special teacher of this subject to make the instructional work of the schools more effective. With children these days hearing so much music that appeals solely to the most elemental emotions, which need to be controlled rather than stimulated, it is of the highest importance that children be taught to appreciate and demand the kind of music that elevates. "Music Appreciation" records for use on a portable orthophonic phonograph have been used. Schools equipped with radios have made use of the Damrosch Music Appreciation Broadcasts.

Since buildings constitute one of the important features in the educational life of our children, it is necessary that they should be clean, sanitary and warm. Our janitor succeeds in keeping our school plants in this condition. Pupils are taught to do their share in caring for the upkeep and appearance of the buildings by orderly disposal of wraps, use of hand washing facilities, and observation of other regulations.

The function of education is the development of character. Education is not a course of training for life at some future time. It is good living now. Education is not confined to the hours in the schoolroom, nor to a stated age. It is a continuous process throughout life. Therefore, it is necessary for teachers, school officials, pupils, parents and citizens to have a clear idea of education, a theory that considers the maximum development of the individual as of the greatest importance. Such a development involves adequate teacher background and preparation, right attitude of girls and boys, co-operation of parents, and an intelligent and active interest in education by all citizens.

In conclusion I wish to express my appreciation of the fine spirit of co-operation on the part of the School Board, teachers, local organizations, and the local community.

The above data is based on the registration of the present school year. The enrollment in seventh and eighth grades is practically the same as that of last year but a gain of 21.4% is shown in senior high school. Through careful planning, room has been

made for the additional numbers but more class rooms will be absolutely necessary if the enrollment continues to increase.

The "Distribution by Curricula" needs some explanation as the totals are rather misleading because they merely indicate the number of people taking a majority of courses in the various curricula. The courses of one curricula may be elective in another so the following data gives the enrollment by subjects.

Concentration to a certain extent depends on comfort so the installation of heating and water systems has done much toward increasing the efficiency of the school. The Manual Arts shop has been made more comfortable by applying building paper to the outside and by installing a circulating coal heater. The interior of the main building begins to show the need of paint and varnish. After this has been done and after poor ceilings have been repaired, the entire plant will be in unusually good condition. The faithful, interested work of the janitor is to be commended.

There is a possibility that Hampstead is the first or one of the first high schools in the state to make use of puppet shows as a teaching device. Much interest has been shown in all the grades in this work. The school is indebted to Mr. Cornwell and his manual arts boys for an excellent puppet theatre. The same department has also made a sand table and a ping pong table for school use.

Fifty-four wood working projects have been completed in manual arts. Several pieces of new power machinery have been added and Mr. Heddemon has very kindly loaned a motor for shop use. Considerable interest is shown in metal work which has been added this year to the regular wood work.

Work has gone on in home economics as usual. Hot cocoa was served in both schools during 1935-1936. This year, at their own suggestion, the eighth grade girls have organized their work, taken orders, shopped economically, and served hot lunches to about twenty pupils each noon. A group showing such initiative and willingness to take responsibility deserves much commendation. The accomplishments in home economics are as follows:

Social activities are similar to those of previous years. The number of group parties and class socials has increased. The entire school has derived pleasure and help from the P. T. A. dancing classes. The annual operetta, "Up in the Air", was presented under the direction of music supervisor, Mrs. Thompson. Mr. Cornwell had charge of the senior play, "Clover Time". The graduating class last June enjoyed a trip to Provincetown, a trip that is becoming an annual event.

Athletics are valuable from both social and physical standpoints. Much pleasure is gained from entertaining and serving refreshments to visiting teams. Poise and self-assurance result from thus meeting strangers and taking the responsibility for their welfare. A majority of the pupils participate in some form of athletics. Organized exercises are carried on efficiently at recess periods.
