# WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING, MARCH 14, 1922

### (L. S.) STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hampton, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Hampton on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at Ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects.

Article 1. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To choose one Selectman for three years.

Article 3. To choose Treasurer, Collector of Taxes, Trustee of Trust Funds, Auditors, Library Trustee and all the necessary Officers for the ensuing year.

Article 4. To raise or appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for Town Officers' salaries, Town officers' Expenses, Election and Registration, Municipal Court, Care and Supplies for Town Hall, Po-

lice Department, Fire Department, Moth Department, Health Department, Red Cross, Highways and Bridges, Street Lights, Library, Town Poor, Memorial Day, Parks and Playgrounds, Cemetery, Sewer Department, Interest, Sidewalks, Comfort Station, Breakwater, Town Notes, Street Railway Department, Hampton Beach and all other necessary charges arising within the Town.

Article 5. To see if the Town will give the Selectmen power to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and to renew or refund the Town notes.

Article 6. To see if the Town will take any action in regard to operating the Electric Road bought by the Town, and to see if they will give the Selectmen power to vote the stock of the Corporation, or to choose a committee to vote it; also to take action in regard to an issue of any more bonds for the permanent improvement of the road.

The following three articles by request of Charles E. Greenman:

Article 7. To see what action the Town will take to authorize the reduction of the amount of stock of the Exeter, Hampton and Amesbury Street Railway subject to the approval of the Public Service Commission.

Article 8. To see what action the Town will take to ratify the application of \$3,278.75 obtained by sale of 30,500 pounds of copper to improvements to the property of the Exeter, Hampton and Amesbury Street Railway.

Article 9. To see what action the Town will take to provide funds for a working capital and for improvements to the property of the Exeter, Hampton and Amesbury Street Railway.

Article 10. To hear the reports of Agents or committees heretofore chosen.

Article 11. (On petition of J. S. Dudley and fifteen other legal voters). To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to expend the balance of money

Municipal Court, Care and Supplies for Town Hall, Povoted for Breakwater at Beach at Town Meeting, March 9, 1920, in building a jetty of loose rocks, starting at foot of Exeter Avenue and extending toward Town Rocks, using all broken cement wall, rocks, etc., lying around in that section, in construction of same.

# REPORT OF THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING, HELD MARCH 14, 1922

Agreeably to the foregoing warrant the legal voters of the Town of Hampton assembled at the time and place specified in said warrant and were called to order at twenty-eight minutes past ten o'clock in the forenoon, by the Moderator, Byron E. Redman, who read the warrant.

Prayer was offered by Rev. George W. Clark.

Chose—Warren H. Hobbs, Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

Chose—Harry D. Munsey, Selectman for the ensuing three years.

Chose—Chester G. Marston, Treasurer for the ensuing year.

Chose—Ernest G. Cole, Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year.

Chose—Abbott L. Joplin, Trustee of Trust Funds for the ensuing three years.

Chose—Simeon A. Shaw, Charles F. Adams and Howell M. Lamprey Auditors for the ensuing year.

Chose—Eugene M. Leavitt, Road Agent for the ensuing year.

Chose—Sarah M. Lane, Member of the Library Committee for the ensuing three years.

Voted—To suspend action on Article 4 until later in the meeting.

Voted—To suspend action on Article 5 until later in the meeting.

Voted—To take up Articles 6 and 10 jointly and Herbert L. Tobey reported for the Railway Committee.

Voted—That the report of the Railway Committee be accepted and a new committee consisting of six members be elected by ballot, with all the powers heretofore vested in said Railway Committee. Said committee to serve until such time as the Town shall otherwise direct.

The following names were placed in nomination and were elected by ballot. Howard G. Lane, Irvin E. Leavitt, Harry D. Munsey, George Ashworth, Charles E. Greenman and Herbert L. Tobey.

Voted—To consider Articles 7, 8 and 9 together.

Voted—That the Railway Committee have the capital stock of the Exeter, Hampton and Amesbury Street Railway reduced to \$5,000, subject to the approval of the Public Service Commission or others having authority over such matters.

Voted—That the Railway Committee be directed to apply \$3,278.75, received for copper wire sold, to permanent improvements to the Railway property.

Voted—That \$12,000 in bonds be issued by the Town authorities and the receipts therefrom be turned over to the Treasurer of the Railway Committee, said money to be used for permanent improvements to the Railway property.

Voted—To refer back to Article 4.

Voted—To take up each item separately.

Voted—That we raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 for Town Officers' salaries.

Voted—That we raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for Town Officers' expenses.

Voted—That we raise and appropriate the sum of \$250 for election and registration.

Voted—That we raise and appropriate the sum of \$150 for Municipal Court expenses.

Voted—That we raise and appropriate the sum of \$400-for care and supplies of the Town Hall.

Voted—That we raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,500 for the Police Department.

Voted—That we raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,200 for the Fire Department.

Voted—That we raise and appropriate the sum of \$400 for Moth Extermination.

Voted—That we raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500 for the Health Department.

Voted—That we raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for the Red Cross expense in Town.

Voted—That we raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000 to be expended on the road from Whittier's corner, so called, to the Beach, and that the Moderator appoint a committee to confer with the State authorities to that end.

Committee: Walter W. Goss, Thomas Cogger, Lemuel C. Ring, Edwin L. Batchelder, William T. Ross and Eugene M. Leavitt.

Voted—That we raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,000 for highways and bridges.

Voted—That we raise and appropriate the sum of  $\$4,\!500$  for street lighting.

Voted—That we raise and appropriate the sum of \$800 for Town libraries.

Voted—That we raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for the Town poor.

Voted—That we raise and appropriate the sum of \$150 for Memorial Day.

Voted—That we raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for Parks and Playgrounds.

Voted—That we raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 for cemeteries.

Voted—That we raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500 for sewer maintenance.

Voted—That we raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,725 for interest on loans, bonds, etc.

Voted—That we raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for cement sidewalks on the burnt district at the Beach.

Voted—That we raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 for the Comfort Station.

Voted—That we raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000 for Breakwaters.

Voted—That we raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,500 for temporary loans and long term notes.

Voted—That we raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 for the Street Railway Department.

Voted—That we raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 for the Law Department.

Voted—That we raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for the school house drain.

Voted—That the Selectmen be given power to borrow money in anticipation of taxes and to renew or refund the Town notes.

Voted—To issue bonds of the Town of the par value of Seventy Thousand (\$70,000) Dollars, under the provision of the "Municipal Bonds act 1895" as amended by Chapter 129 of the Session Laws of 1917, to refund the outstanding notes of the Town at a rate of interest not exceeding five per cent, payable serially in fifteen annual payments, the first payment to be July 1, 1923.

Voted—That the Selectmen be empowered to secure a Government expert's opinion about any proposed jetty or breakwater.

Voted—That a committee of six be appointed by the Moderator to investigate as to the cost of a Fire Pump for the Beach Department and to report at an adjourned meeting to be held April 11, 1922, at 7:30 P. M. The Committee as appointed were: Alexander H. Brown, Charles E. Greenman, Atwood Rowe, George Ashworth, Kenneth N. Ross, Abbott L. Joplin.

Voted—That Article 13 be laid on the table until the adjourned meeting.

RECORD OF PRIMARY ELECTION HELD SEPTEMBER 5, 1922.

In conformity with a notice posted at the Town Hall, the Post Office and the Branch Post Office at the

Beach, the Direct Primary for the Nomination for the following office;—Governor, Representative in Congress, Councilor, Senator, Sheriff, Solicitor, County Treasurer, Register of Deeds, Register of Probate, 3 County Commissioners, Representative to the General Court, Supervisors of Checklist, Moderator, and Delegate to the State Convention (Election), was called to order at the Town Hall at Ten-Thirty o'clock in the forenoon of September 5, 1922 by the Moderator of the Town.

# Warrant for Annual Town Meeting

#### (L.S.) THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Hampton, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs.

Street Lights, Library, Town Poor, Memorial Day, Parks and Playgrounds, Cemetery, Sewer Department, Interest, Sidewalks, Comfort Station, Breakwater, Town Notes, Hampton Beach, and all other necessary charges arising within the Town.

Article 6. To see if the Town will give the Selectmen power to borrow money in anticipation of Taxes, and to renew or refund the Town Notes.

Article 7. To take action in regard to building a drain and sewer at Plaice Cove, North Shore, and sewer at Plantation and appropriate money for same.

On Petition of Fred Lorenz and five others the following five articles:

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$1500 for rent for fire quarters in new building owned by A. H. Brown at Beach for purpose of housing apparatus and men.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate money to hire 4 men, A. H. Brown as Chief at \$35 and three others at \$25 per week, for maintenance of Fire Department at Beach.

# REPORT OF THE WORK OF THE HAMPTON RED CROSS BRANCH FOR 1922

The work for the year has been entirely "Welfare Work."

A Community and School Nurse has been maintained the whole year.

A "Health Center" and "First Aid Room" has been opened in the new school building and equipped by the School Board, Nursing Committee, and donations from interested friends.

Any of the town's people who have not visited this room, would be well repaid for their trouble if they would take the time to do so. During the year the nurse has treated one hundred and twelve individual cases, involving three hundred and twenty-four calls, and also one hundred, eighty-five school visits.

There is an average of forty school children reporting to the nurse each month.

From July first to September fifteenth a "Health Center" and "First Aid Room" was kept open at the Beach Comfort Station, with the nurse in attendance every day from ten o'clock a. m. to five o'clock p. m. On Wednesdays, Fridays and Sundays she stayed until eleven o'clock p. m.

There were one hundred, thirty-five cases of First Aid Treatments during the season, with a total number of six hundred, five cases treated, while at the Beach.

Of course it has taken money to carry on all this

work and the nursing committee wish to thank all who have so kindly aided with donations. We received from the Town \$1,000; from the Annual Roll Call, 168; as a prize for the Red Cross Float on Carnival Week, \$10. All the rest came in the form of gifts from the several clubs and from friends in town, with a few dollars from fees collected by the nurse.

The regulation fee for day calls by the nurse is fifty cents and transportation. Calls after seven o'clock p. m., one dollar and transportation, and for an emergency call at night, five dollars. This is in cases where the parties calling can afford to pay. In other cases there has been no charge.

# The Street Railway

### PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the Stockholders of the Exeter, Hampton and Amesbury Street Railway:

Your Directors submit herewith General Balance Sheet, showing assets and liabilities as of December 31, 1922, also railway operating income and expense for the year 1922.

The plant and equipment have been increased by a net figure of \$4,494.39. This item covers the amounts expended for a new one-man car and a part of the new neating plant, less the credit realized from the dismantling and sale of the cross country feeder line.

The year has been a most unfavorable one for transportation companies depending for their revenue primarily upon summer travel, our own company included. The months of June and July were unusually stormy and especially so on week ends when travel is ordinarily the heaviest.

The reports of the Company show the following decreases in revenue as compared with last year—June, \$1,908.42; July, \$1,339.05; August, \$1,344.28; September, \$923.81; a total in the four months of \$5,515.16. The other eight months show a decrease of \$1,953.22, a total decrease for the year of \$7,468.78.

No doubt the general business depression and the prevalence of strikes in this section during the period has had some effect on the revenue of the road but weather conditions are primarily responsible.

Not only did the Company suffer a loss of revenue

principally due to a rainy summer but this was preceded by a severe and stormy winter, and again in December it cost over \$800.00 for removal of snow and ice involving altogether an expenditure of \$2,780.74, an increase of \$1,912.12 over the preceding year, to say nothing of the repairs to electrical equipment necessitated by these conditions.

All these factors together result in a deficit for the year of \$5,916.40 and in order to keep it at this figure it has been necessary to discontinue, temporarily, setting aside the usual percentage of earnings for an accident reserve, and in addition \$1,117.77 has been withdrawn from the sum previously accumulated in this account. \$331.02 of this has been credited to balance of the deficit of 1921.

Your Directors are naturally disappointed at this showing but it is obvious, granting that the loss of revenue during the summer was due to inclement weather, and that the expense incurred for removal of snow and ice has been abnormal, that a return of these items to anywhere near average as shown over a period of years would bring the deficit down to moderate proportions. In other words these two items together have adversely affected the showing for the year of rising \$7,000.00

On the constructive side a further reduction in expenses has been effected from 31.9 cents per car mile in 1921 to 29.2 cents for 1922, a saving of 2.7 cents per car mile. Applying this saving to the number of car miles operated, viz. 207,248, has meant a saving of \$5,595.69 as compared with the cost of operation for the previous year. And this has been accomplished in spite of the heavy snow expense and increase in cost of power. In 1920 the cost of operation per car mile was 38.8 cents.

The physical condition of the property is being maintained and gradually improved and as a result of the work done in the past eighteen months the main line from Hampton to Exeter is considered by the meu

operating over it to be in better condition than at any time during the past five years. On other parts of the line expenditures have been necessarily limited to maintaining the line in a safe condition for operation.

A new one-man car has been purchased and is giving satisfactory service and apparently is well liked by the travelling public.

Due to the improvement in the roadbed and the new car it has been possible to give a better service and under normal conditions the cars are operating on much better time than a year ago.

The towns of Hampton Falls and Seabrook at their annual meetings last March voted a subsidy of \$500 each thus bringing all the towns served by the company into co-operation with the town of Hampton.

This added income has been of material assistance to the Company.

Up to the present the efforts of the management have been devoted principally to an improvement of the physical condition of the property and working out more economical methods of operation. These matters are gradually lining up and the next problem is to increase the revenue through an increase in riding.

The management of the Massachusetts Northeastern Street Railway Company have expressed a willingness to co-operate to inaugurate a through service between Newburyport and Exeter via Hampton thus el'in inating the change of cars at Smithtown. Some arrangement of this kind should be of benefit to both companies and give the public a more dependable service. This involves, however, the purchase of another one-man car and your Directors are not prepared to recommend this additional outlay pending more favorable results from operation.

### AUDITORS' REPORT

We, the undersigned, acting as auditors for the Street Raiwlay, hereby certify that we have carefully examined the accounts of the said street railway and find them well cast, the disbursements well vouched and the receipts substantially agreeing with the varied, and in some cases intricate, sources from which they are drawn. In checking the receipts from passenger revenue we find in some instances the car register reading falling below the actual cash received, which is explained by the non-working of the register. In the future such discrepancies will be eliminated. We find that the deficit of \$5,331.02, which existed January 1, 1922, has been paid by a town grant of \$5,000 and the transfer of \$331.02 from the accident reserve fund. We find the total revenue for the 12 months ending January 1, 1923 to be \$54,731.51 and the total disbursements to be \$60. 647.91, leaving an operating deficit of \$5,916.40.

# REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS To the Hampton School Board and the

Board of Trustees, Hampton Academy:

I am pleased to submit my fourth annual report as Superintendent of Schools. I also transmit to you the reports of the Headmaster of the Academy, the Principal of the Center School, your Supervisor of Music, and your School Physician, together with the tabulation of the customary School Statistics.

### TEACHERS

We were fortunate this year to retain the same corps of teachers we had last year with three exceptions. Miss Adeline Marston, who had previously served us so excellently, was elected to take Miss Cutts place, who gave up teaching to get married; Miss Mary Gookin, a graduate of Keene Normal, having had one year successful teaching was elected to take Miss Brown's school; Miss Marion Dexter, a graduate of Plymouth Normal in the Domestic Arts Course was elected to take Miss Hannington's place and Miss Hazel Drew, a graduate of Colby College, was elected as an extra teacher for the Junior and Senior High. All our teachers are doing good, faithful work. I believe the time has come

for Hampton to insist on having teachers professionally trained for their work and with at least one or more years of successful teaching after graduation from Normal School or college before beginning their service with us. We must hold those teachers for a period of several years that have proved their worth, rather than to permit them to be enticed away by a little larger salary to some other town. It is poor policy to allow our schools to be mere training schools for other towns no better able to pay than our own town.

I wish especially to commend the excellent results our Music Supervisor, Mrs. Esther Coombs is getting in every school. This report would, moreover, be incomplete if I failed to mention how much I appreciate the excellent service of our janitor, Mr. Charles M. Batchelder at the Center School. I only wish I could say that all the other janitors under my supervision were as painstaking and took as much pride in keeping their buildings, etc., looking "spic and span" as he does. He is ever thoughtful of the best welfare of pupils and teachers with whom he has to co-operate.

# WORK OF THE YEAR

A careful diagnosis of the scores made in the Standard Tests, which were given in the fundamental subjects last spring, shows normal to high scores in general in all grades, in rate of Reading, Comprehension and the four fundamentals of Arithmetic. High averages resulted in Spelling in every grade. Low scores occurred in Writing in every grade and also in Composition except in grade three, the average of which was about the standard. I am in hopes that the use of the new Houston System of Writing, which the Board adopted this fall, will enable us to make a much better record in the tests in this subject this year. The teachers report that the writing of most of the pupils is steadily improving and from a superficial inspection of many of their papers, I should judge this is true. Evidently all our teachers from the third grade up need to give much more drill in that all important subject, written Composition. in oral composition, they are trained to have something to say and are taught how to say it, so they must be trained to have something in mind they wish to write and taught how to organize their thoughts in well constructed sentences and paragraphs.

From a comparison of the tables of Promotion and Retardation for the last two years we find fewer failed of promotion last year than in the previous year. This shows a gain in the right direction as it is a great discouragement to pupils to have to repeat work already attempted, to say nothing of the increase in the cost of education to the school district.

In the Academy and Junior High school last year our teachers completed all the work as outlined in the State Program in every course but one and I believe we will meet the necessary standards in practically every course this present year.

### ATTENDANCE

The per cent of attendance, 90.8 last year was just a little less than for the year before, or 92.9. The number of cases of tardiness last year was 410 or 230 less than during the previous year, a great improvement.

Good regular attendance and punctuality on the part of all pupils is a fairly good barometer of the kind of work any school is doing. When pupils are in their places promptly, one may be reasonably sure their attitude toward the school is business-like and the work of the school will be promptly and more efficiently done. The co-operation of parents will do much to make this condition possible.

# SCHOOL COSTS

I believe it will be interesting to you to compare the costs of schools in the different districts of this union for last year. I have computed the same on the basis of cost per pupil of average membership.

These figures were obtained by omitting extraordinary payments, such as for repairs, remodeling, high school tuition etc., and counting only the necessary current expenses of the schools. You will note the cost per pupil for Hampton (grades) was \$48.64 or \$5.41 more than for the previous year, when it was \$43.23; chiefly since your payments for the same items last year were about \$700 more than in the year before, while your average membership in the grades was practically the same.

# HEALTH SUPERVISION

A study of the report of the School Physician as compared with his report of the previous year shows fairly good results from the medical inspection. The total number of defects found last year was 590 whereas the previous year, 718 cases were found. Thus, making no allowance for pupils leaving or entering our schools

during the year, approximately 123 cases received medical treatment. Of course much good must have been obtained from this medical attention but the percentage of cases treated should have been larger. The physical welfare of our children should be the first care of every thoughtful parent. I am especially pleased to note that there were many less cases of the following defects: defective vision and hearing, defective teeth, adanoids, breathing, enlarged glands and tuberculosis, since several of these defects are particularly harmful to the physical and educational growth of our boys and girls. On the other hand I am surprised to learn that there was a considerable increase found in the number of the following defects: malnutrition, pulmonary defects and hypertrophied tonsils. Evidently the services of our community and school nurse are still much needed for "follow-up work" in the homes

### ORGANIZATION AND ADMINISTRATION

As was voted at the last district meeting, we began our work in the new Central School the first of last May organizing the work as follows: Miss Brown with grades 1 and 2: Miss Cutts, with grade 3 and a part of grade 4; Miss Chase, with a part of grade 4 and a part of grade 5; Miss Jordan, with a part of grade 5 and all of grade 6, and Mr. Donald, with grades 7 and 8. fall, due to changes in the distribution of pupils among the different grades we found we could improve the eificiency of our teaching by a re-organization of the work as follows: Miss Gookin, grade 1; Miss Marston, grades 2 and 3; Miss Chase, grade 4 and part of grade 5 and Miss Jordan part of grade 5 and all of grade 6. grouping has made it possible for Miss Gookin to give an especially good start to grade one and also assist Miss Marston by taking a slower group of grade 2 for special drill after excusing grade one the latter part of each session.

As Mr. Teague has pointed out in his report the taking over of grade 9 from the Academy, by the School Board at the request of the Board of Trustees, has relieved the congested conditions there very much. The departmentalization of the work together with the fact that no longer large classes from the Junior High school have to go back and forth between the two schools, has improved the efficiency in traching, discipline and administration of both schools greatly. However, the loss of time due to the necessity of teachers, who have classes in both schools, changing from one to the other and the result that some rooms are without supervision for from 6 to 12 minutes on the average furnishes a new problem.

Two solutions to the problem are possible, one to employ another teacher so there need be no passing and the other, to transfer the remaining three grades to the Central School. A study of our enrollment for the four years, 1918-22 shows only an increase of 34 percent in the first eight grades, whereas in the high school

or the last four grades, the increase was nearly 63 percent for the same period. Moreover, the peak of our enrolment in the first eight grades was reached in the years 1919-22, but has this year dropped to just about the same as it was in 1918. From this study it would appear that the new Central School would accommodate all our pupils, both elementary and secondary, i. e., high school pupils, for many years to come. Therefore, because of the above study and the many reasons I cited in my report last year, to which I refer you for further consideration, and the fact that we are now utilizing only about 60 per cent of a \$90,000 investment, in my opinion, the latter solution is by far the one to be chosen.

I know there is some opposition to this idea on account of sentiment chiefly for the old Academy, I believe, which doubtless is very praiseworthy, however, when it comes to a question of the physical and educational welfare of our children, it seems to me that we should all wish to take that step, which will promote their welfare to the greatest degree. Especially should we do this when not only greater efficiency in teaching, discipline and administration will result, but also when there will be economy in both time and money.

If we must continue to use the old Academy building, surely several improvements should be made this summer, besides rather extensive repairs are necessary. At least new, modern toilets should be installed in the basement as the present toilet facilities are deplorable.

In closing, I wish to thank you for your advice and loyal support and the parents and teachers for their cooperation in making a successful school year.

## REPORT OF HEADMASTER, HAMPTON ACADEMY 1922-1923

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I submit the following report which covers the Spring term of 1922, Fall term of 1922 and the winter term of 1923.

The spring term is always a busy one and that of 1922 proved no exception. The athletic activities were set in motion early in the term and continued to the year. Our only organized sport, baseball, received our heartiest support and consumed the major part of the time and money which could be devoted to that. The outlook for next spring's team is bad as we lost several of our team by graduation and removal.

Senior class parts were assigned and preparations for graduation were soon in evidence. There were twelve in the class and it seemed advisable to excuse some from speaking and thus shorten the program. But a surprising thing happened. With the exception of two, who were unable to take speaking parts on account of ill health, all the others desired to deliver their essays

and did so in a creditable manner.

At the beginning of the fall term we were relieved from the crowded condition of last year by the removal

of the 9th grade to the new building.

Last year the large number of students in the Academy and the coming up of the 7th and 8th grades for Domestic Arts, French and Manuel training made many difficulties in administration, instruction and discipline. The removal of these classes to the Centre School relieves the congestion and at the same time simplifies many matters. But new difficulties have arisen due to the fact that our teachers have classes in both buildings and in passing there is a loss of time. Also pupils are left, in a few instances, alone in class rooms for ten or more minutes without a teacher. We are trying to cultivate in the boys and girls self respect and self control that will enable them to bridge these gaps and maintain good order but the situation is not an ideal one.

There are two solutions at least to the difficulty. One, to have teachers enough so there need he no passing. The other is to move our three upper grades to the Centre building and occupy those four large rooms on the second floor which, with their practically unused

newness, brightness and warmth are just calling to be put to their fullest use.

I know there is a sentiment connected with the old Academy which is laudable and worthy of emulation and which makes it difficult to foresake its nalls. May we never forget our Alma Mater no matter how poor and ragged she may become! But when it is a question of the welfare of the children we should put our influence and our money where it will bring the largest re-

turns, not in dollars and cents but in efficiency.

My last topic concerns us all in a  $\operatorname{ver}_V$  vital way. Students who are absent or tardy for slight reasons come in a class of whom the Master said "the poor you have with vou always" and for that reason we must not cease to cry out continually, "Be present every day. Be sure to start in time for school in order that you may not be late." If we do not insist that our children be faithful and punctual in attendance at school we shall allow them to become bound with the cords of a habit that will unfit them for holding down worth-while positions in life.

In addition to the effect of tardiness on the individual the certification of our school depends in a large measure upon the cleanness of our records. We ask the

co-operation of the parents in this matter.

In conclusion we thank all the friends, both officially connected with the school and otherwise, for the hearty support which they have rendered in the many calls made on them for advice, materials or money.

### REPORT OF PRINCIPAL OF CENTER SCHOOL

Mr. C. H. Walker, Supt. of Schools:-

We commenced work in our new, commodious and up-to-date building in September with an enrollment of 138 in the six grades and 88 in the three Junior High School classes. Since then the g ades have practically maintained their initial enrollment and the Junior High has dropped to 78, owing to permanent and winter removals.

When good weather comes I wish we might have a space a hundred yards square, behind the building, rolled or graded so that it would be level enough for athletics. We have an enthusiastic group of baseball

and football players but the ground is tricky and dangerous as I proved to my own dissatisfaction last fall by

stepping into one of the many noies.

The instruction in the Junior High School has been so provided for that the children are maving the advantage of departmental teaching. This plan not only makes the instructors more entitled by reducing each one's range of subjects but gives the pupil a variety of interest which tends to inspress his work.

interest which tends to improve his work.

Aside from the superintendent and school board members, there has been little or no visiting by the parents. I wish we might have more opportunity of letting the fathers and mothers see just what is being done in the classroom. Helpful criticism and general supervision by the people who support the schools financially are bound to have their effect on both pupils and teaching force.

### REPORT OF MUSIC SUPERVISOR

Mr. C. H. Walker, Supt. of Schools:—

I submit to you the following, my second annual report of the work in music at Hampton.

We are carrying on our work very much as last year, with the added advantages which the new Center

School building gives to us.

The following outline will give an idea of what is being done. In the first grade we are centering our attention on the rote song. Many of the little people start their school life win no musical experience whatever, while most of them have a meagre experience at best. We endeavor to bring to them songs that are simple, melodious, interesting and artistic. Before the year is over they will know between thirty and forty rote songs, will have learned to sing the scale, and will also read very simple notation.

This same work is carried on in grades two and three, the rote song holding first place. Vocal drills are introduced to aid in producing a light, sweet singing tone, and are continued through the grades. Simple melodies are sung by note in these lower grades, and

first problems of time introduced.

In grades four and five two part songs are taught, while three part songs are introduced, in grade six. The material is varied and of the best. The best songs of

the past and present are put before the pupils. Interpretation and Appreciation are stressed. Chorus work is now possible for primary and intermediate gardes together and is extremely beneficial. We derive great pleasure and profit from meeting as a body in the assembly hall, from time to time, and singing in chorus.

We have a splendid Junior High Chords. The pupils sing well in three parts and, best of all, they enjoy

singing.

The chorus in the Academy is still unbalanced, owing to our continued lack of tenor and alto voices. We have splendid soprano and bass voices, however, and are making a very creditable showing with them.

I thank you, and also the members of the school committee, for your hearty support of my work. It has been a pleasure to work with the parents and teachers.

I also appreciate their interest and co-operation.
