TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Harrisville in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Eagle Hall in said Harrisville on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next at ninethirty of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$107.00 (1/100th of 1% of the valuation of the Town) to the Monadnock Region Association of Southern New Hampshire for issuance and distribution of printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, and by other means calling attention to the resources and natural advantages of the Town, in cooperation with the other thirty-seven towns of the Monadnock Region.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$5,000.00 to repair the dam at Russell Reservoir.
- 5. To see if the Town will accept the extension of the East Side Silver Lake Road as laid out by the Selectmen on September 24th 1948 and to see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 to build part of this road this year.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Division of Municipal Accounting.

- 7. To see if the Town will vote to observe Old Home Day and vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the same.
- 8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$920.00 for a Road Maintenance.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$423.00 toward support of the Elliot Community Hospital of Keene, N. H., to help reduce a yearly deficit of approximately \$50,000.00 in cooperation with other towns being served by this hospital.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to tar Willard Hill.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$403.64 for T. R. A. work if the state will contribute \$1,614.55.
- 13. To see what the Town will give the Chief of Fire Department and the firemen for their services.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to build a bathing beach.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,500.00 to build a sand shed.
- 16. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Submitted herewith is the report of the annual audit of the accounts of the Town of Harrisville covering the fiscal year ended December 31, 1948, which was made by this Division in accordance with the vote of the town.

SCOPE OF AUDIT

Included in the examination and audit were the accounts and records of the Board of Selectmen, Treasurer, Tax Collector, Town Clerk and Trustees of Trust Funds.

FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Balance Sheets—December 31, 1947—December 31, 1948: (Exhibit A-1)

Comparative Balance Sheets as of December 31, 1947 and December 31, 1948, are presented in Exhibit A-1. As indicated therein the Net Debt increased by \$110.84 during the year.

Analysis of Change in Financial Condition: (Exhibt A-2)

An analysis of the change in financial condition during the year is made in Exhibit A-2, with the factors which caused the change indicated therein.

Comparative Statements of Appropriations and Expenditures— Estimated and Actual Revenues: (Exhibits A-3 & A-4)

Comparative statements of appropriations and expenditures, estimated and actual revenues for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1948, are presented in Exhibits A-3 and A-4. As

indicated by the budget summary (Exhibit A-4), a net overdraft of appropriations of \$542.02, less a net revenue surplus of \$496.75, resulted in a net budget deficit of \$45.27.

Summary of Receipts and Expenditures: (Exhibit B-1)

A summary of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ended December 31, 1948, made up in accordance with the uniform classification of accounts, is included in Exhibit B-1. Proof of the Treasurer's balance as of December 31, 1948, is indicated in Exhibit B-1.

AUDIT PROCEDURE

The accounts and records of all town officials charged with the custody, receipt and disbursement of public funds were examined and audited. Vouchers and cancelled checks were compared with supporting invoices and payrolls as well as entries in the books of record. Receipts were checked by source insofar as possible and totals of receipts and expenditures verified. Book balances were verified by comparison with reconciled bank balances made from statements obtained from depositary banks. Verification of uncollected taxes was made by mailing notices to delinquent taxpayers as indicated by the collector's records.

GENERAL COMMENTS

The accounts and records of all town officials were found in good condition, and the accounting procedure conformed to the uniform system prescribed by this Division.

The provisions of Section 31, Chapter 211, of the Laws of 1939, require that this report or a summary of its essential features shall be published in the next annual town report.

We extend our thanks to the officials of the Town of Harrisville for their assistance during the course of the audit.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Harrisville:

I herein submit my sixth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

The expanding role of public education emphasizes the need for many revisions in our rural school programs. The proposed new school in Harrisville will lessen the chasm between "the schools we have" and "the kind of school we have said we want."

"School authorities agree that adequate educational opportunity can be had only when elementary schools bring sufficient number of children together so that there is one teacher provided for each grade. The present rural school district organization in New Hampshire has too few pupils and too little taxable wealth in back of each pupil to provide good schools on an economical basis." It appears that the Harrisville School District should consider in detail the idea of a cooperative school district and consult with neighboring school districts concerning the feasibility of such a plan prior to the construction of the proposed new school. The Cooperative School District Law, passed by the legislature, provides the means for well organized schools in rural areas.

REPORT OF HARRISVILLE SCHOOL BUILDING COMMITTEE

Feb. 3, 1949.

Since the Harrisville Town Meeting of March, 1948 the Harrisville School Building committee has met in several conferences with our architect, Mr. Randlett, and the donor, Mr. Wells.

Due to the high cost of building the committee thought it advisable to submit a complete report to all the taxpayers of Harrisville at a time of the year when it would be possible for the summer residents to express their opinions on the question.

Consequently a full report was drawn up by Atty. Gardner C. Turner, counsel for the committee, and duly mailed to all taxpayers of the town. Following this an open meeting was held in August for the purpose of discussing whether or not the town should appropriate the additional money necessary to build at this time.

At this open meeting in August the general sense of opinion, at least as expressed, seemed to be in favor of going ahead with final plans and specifications, with firm bids from contractors, to be submitted and acted upon at the regular March, 1949, town meeting.

The committee then held a series of meetings with the architect to work out these final plans. The original objective of a three class-room building with auditorium then had to be set aside due to architect's and contractors' estimates of present cost as being over \$120,000. Because this was so much higher than the maximum figures discussed at the general public meeting the committee then discarded this general plan and instructed the architect to draw up a plan in which an activities room was substituted for an auditorium. Such a plan, according to the State Board advisers, would be adequate to meet the needs of the school children, with a substantial folding partition between the activities room and an adjoining class-room to provide space for large meetings.

Sketches of such a plan have been drawn by the architect and generally agreed upon by the committee as being the best

type of building that the town can afford due to present high building costs.

However, at this point it was very strongly suggested by the New Hampshire State Commissioner of Education, that the town consider a broader educational plan whereby Harrisville would join with several other small adjacent towns to build a larger consolidated school governed by a consolidated school district for the purpose of achieving greater educational advantages for the children of the town. Such a plan to be in line with the broad educational program for consolidating small school districts strongly recommended by the State Board of Education. An open meeting to discuss this plan addressed by Hilton C. Buley, Commissioner of Education, is planned for February 11, 1949, too late for this report.

The future action of the town regarding the new school, will depend on the results of this meeting. In the event that the town does not wish to consider this broader plan for a larger area school, the Committee will raise an additional thirty-five thousand dollars which, added to funds already available for the new school, would give a total of eighty thousand dollars, enough to complete a school according to the plans discussed above. That is a three room school with activities room to serve the town of Harrisville only. It is further the plan of the Building Committee to move that the District School Meeting be recessed until an as yet undetermined date in the spring when the town can take definite action on plans for the new school.





REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Your local organization to prevent and extinguish brush and woods fires is glad to report a good year of forest protection in 1948. In spite of danger conditions nearly equalling at times those of 1947 when great losses were suffered in New Hampshire and New England, fire damage and loss this year have been gratifyingly low.

With the continuing cooperation of all the people, we can hope to have another successful year in 1949. Let us remember that in any year, over 90% of all fires are caused by carelessness and that all of these man-caused fires are preventable.

Today, we have more slash and uncut grassland than for many years in the past. Smokers, campers and tourists who use our outdoors are also more numerous than ever before. We must therefore be ready for fires which might occur but, above all, prevention by everyone is the greatest need.

A few simple precautions taken by every citizen will help, as follows:

- Always get a written permit from the warden before kindling a fire outdoors when the ground it not covered with snow.
- (2) If you smoke, always extinguish matches and tobacco before dropping or throwing them down. In automobiles, always use the ash trays.
- (3) Report fires and smokes to the warden without delay.

The observance of these and other simple rules will go far to insure safety from fire damage and your cooperation in this way is earnestly solicited.
