TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Henniker, in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

(L.S.)

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town's Meeting House in said Henniker on Tuesday, the Tenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation for the same.

3. To hear and act upon the reports of Town Officers, Library Trustees, Trustees of Trust Funds and other committees.

4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for repair of highways and bridges.

5. To see what action the town will take in regard to the Public Health Nursing Association, raise money for the same, or take any action relative thereto.

6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise or appropriate, to defray the expense of observing Memorial Day.

7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise, in addition to that required by law, for the support of Tucker Free Library.

8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the maintenance of the Fire Department, or take any action relative thereto.

9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise, or appropriate, for the purpose of defraying the cost and expense during the ensuing year of providing and maintaining hydrant service for the extinguishing of fires.

10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to reinsure the town buildings and town trucks.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for lighting streets for the ensuing year.

12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise toward paying its indebtedness.

13. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

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14. To see if the town will vote to accept from Hannah B. Chase the sum of one hundred dollars, the income of which is to be used for the perpetual care of the lot of John M. Chase in the Goss Cemetery.

15. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid for construction of Class II Road known as the Warner road and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$2,025.00: or will accept State Aid for the construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside the sum of \$1,009.45.

16. To see if the town will vote to approve the action of the Selectmen in transferring the balance of the appropriation for the State Aid Bridge to the general funds of the town.

17. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to issue serial notes or bonds of the town to an amount not exceeding \$3,500.00 for the purpose of refunding outstanding indebtedness of a like amount, as authorized by Chapter 48 of the Laws of 1935.

18. To see if the town will vote to raise and apporpriate the sum of one thousand eight hundred dollars the same being necessary to secure State Aid for the construction of the new bridges on the Bradford road, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 131, New Hampshire Session Laws of 1929, amending Section 2 of Chapter 83 of the Public Laws of New Hampshire.

19. To transact any other business that may properly come before said meeting.

REPORT OF HENNIKER

PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING SERVICE

To The Selectmen and Citizens:

I hereby submit my annual report covering the period from Feb. 1, 1935 to Feb. 1, 1936.

The aim of the Nursing Service has been :---

(1) To give bedside care to those who are ill.

(2) To instruct those caring for the sick the importance of cleanliness, protection of others in the home, and to teach the simple procedures involved in giving nursing care in the absence of the nurse.

(3) To find through an annual physical inspection of each school child such symptoms as will tend to retard his progress in school, to notify parents of such defects, and to assist needy children to secure corrections.

(4) For protection of the school to exclude pupils showing symptoms of any communicable disease and to assist parents to correct the condition so the child may return to school promptly.

(5) To teach mothers, whenever opportunity is presented, the importance of correct principles of child care.

GIFTS

We have been the recipient of some very beautiful and interesting gifts in the year past. These are listed in the order received, but they should be seen to be appreciated:

The first silver spoon used in Henniker: Lieutenant Levi Colby had it made from a silver dollar and presented it to his wife, and in time it became the property of Mr. A. C. Flint of Billerica, Mass., who presented it to Tucker Free Library.

Mr. John C. Clark of Beverly, Mass., formerly of this town, presented the following:

(1) Piece of olive wood, cut from first olive tree in America brought from Spain.

(2) Piece of wood cut from the big tree in California, thro' which road is cut.

(3) Piece of redwood, where wood peckers had deposited acorns and tree had grown over the acorns, nearly covering them. (4) Piece of wood from battleship Kearsarge, lumber for which was taken from Kearsarge Mountain.

(5) Piece of pear tree grafted in April, 1775, on Pickering Estate in Salem, Mass.

(6) Knife carried by Imri Ball, through the Civil War.

(7) Bullet and shell from battle of Gettysburg.

(8) Cannon ball fired at the British at the battle of Bunker Hill; found in Charles River.

(9) An Indian woman's shoe, over one hundred years old.

(10) Piece of the elm tree formerly standing in Cambridge, Mass., under which George Washington took command of the American Army. This Souvenir was sent to the donor of these articles on April, 1934 on the exact anniversary of the occasion.

Mr. A. D. Huntoon presented a large sponge taken from the fishing grounds off the shores of Florida.

Mrs. Frank Andrews of Hopkinton, N. H., presented a town history of the town of Francestown, N. H.; also many pictures and descriptions of the Perkins Institute for the Blind, in Watertown, Mass.

Mr. and Mrs. Clarence A. Vincent gave the book "Edwardian Era", by Maurios Andre. Mr. Arthur G. Preston: The records of the incorporation of the Henniker Academy and the clerks records of proceedings beginning 1836 to the close, 1921.

From the above table it may be noted:

1. That only 2.7 half-days sessions were lost during the year. Two schools did not lose any time.

2. The number of pupils and average membership have some what increased.

3. A gain was made in percent of attendance.

4. The amount of tardiness per pupil is much too high. Every effort should be made to get pupils to school on time.

5. The outstanding record of the Brick school with no absence or tardiness for the fourth consecutive year.

The total number of different pupils enrolled in the public schools of the district was 315 of whom 14 were high school tuition pupils from other districts as follows: Bradford, 7; Newbury, 4; Canterbury, 1; Sutton, 1; New York, 1.

There were accordingly 301 pupils residing in the district and attending public schools.

Health

The report of the annual inspection of pupils conducted by Miss Ruth Nichols, school nurse, shows 58 pupils 10% or more underweight, of whom 30 were receiving treatment or had defects corrected. Of the 16 having defective vision 13 had the defects corrected. Fifty-five of the 188 cases of defective teeth were corrected, and 11 of the 37 cases of diseased tonsils and adenoids. By means of funds received from the Child Recovery Program 5 tonsils and adenoid operations were performed, 2 were fitted to glasses, and 3 received complete dental care.

Nursery School

A nursery school u nder the direction of F. E. E. P. was held in one room of the Central building from December to the clase of schools in June. Nearly 25 pupils under regular school age were enrolled. The work of the nursery school has been found to be a considerable advantage to those of the group who entered Grade I last September. We would have been glad to have the school continued this year, but owing to Fderal requirements concerning the economic status of teachers we were unable to find more than one of the three people required to carry on the work of the school.

Debating

A series of debates between the high schools of Henniker, Hopkinton and Warner took place in March. The series was won by Hopkinton which sent its team to take part in the Interscholastic debates sponsored by Bates College at Lewiston, Me. The same plan will be followed in arranging debates for this year.

Other activities of the year included the annual concert of the Kearsarge Festival Orchestra in May, and the annual spelling match for eighth grade pupils of supervisory union No. 26.

Conclusion

We wish to thank the School Board, teachers and parents for their assistance and support in our endeavors to forward the educational interests of the district.
