# TOWN WARRANT

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## State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Hillsborough, County of Hillsborough, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet in Child's Opera House in said town on Tuesday, the Eleventh day of March next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

Article 1. To choose one Selectman for three years, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Highway Agent, Town Clerk and Chief of Police for one year, Trustee of the Fuller Public Library for two years, Trustee of Trust Funds for three years and all other necessary town officers or agents for the ensuing year.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the town officers to the auditors, the reports of the auditors, agents, committees or other town officers heretofore chosen or appointed and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for town officers' salaries, town officers' expenses, Community Building, appropriations for street lights and all current expenses of the town and such amounts as may be necessary to apply upon the principal and interest of the town debt.

Article 4. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the building and repairing of highways, bridges and culverts.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 for Memorial Day purposes.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$750 to be applied upon the salary of the District Nurse.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to instruct and empower the Selectmen to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet current expenses of the town and in anticipation of taxes.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the support of band concerts for the coming season.

Article 9. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the purpose of co-operating with the State and Federal governments in the control of the White Pine Blister Rust or act in relation thereto.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum equal to not more than one one-hundredth of one per cent ( $1/100$  of 1%) of the assessed valuation based upon assessment of 1940 for the purpose of advertising the attractions and resources of the town, in connection with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.

Article 11. To see if the Town will appropriate and raise a sum not in excess of \$4,500.00 for the purchase of a tractor and snow plow; or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 12. To see if the Town will appropriate and raise a sum not in excess of Two Hundred Fifty Dollars for the maintenance of the necessary equipment and instruction at the swimming pool on the Beard Road, so-called; or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to petition the State Tax Commission to have an audit made by the Municipal Accounting Division and to make an appropriation to cover the expense of such audit.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 for an observance of the 200th Anniversary of the Settlement of Hillsborough.

Article 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## WHITE PINE BLISTER RUST CONTROL

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White Pine Blister Rust control as conducted in this town during 1940 by the State Forestry & Recreation Department and the Federal Bureau of Entomology was a part of a nation-wide program of protecting white pine growth from a bark disease, which, though not spectacular, represents a very serious menace to this tree if not controlled. Throughout the northeastern states, where white pine is especially important, counties, towns, cities and individual owners have cooperated with State and Federal agencies. In the Far West, upon the National Forests and holdings of large lumber companies, Blister Rust control is recognized as a necessary practice in growing white pine. Recently, the Federal Government reaffirmed and emphasized the need of White Pine Blister Rust control by the passage of an act authorizing financial assistance to such states as are carrying on control measures. All towns and their citizens are strongly urged to cooperate with the State and Federal governments in their efforts to maintain control of this destructive disease.

The following financial statement shows expenditures made in this town during 1940 for Blister Rust control by the agencies indicated. Persons interested in the detail of control work and the life history of Blister Rust may receive a circular by applying to the State Forester, Concord, N. H.

### General Discussion

One of our problems this year has been that of furnishing water for drinking and washing purposes to the schools. I have had the water of the town well at the Center, and that of the well in the field just below the school at the Lower Village, analyzed by the state chemist. Both were not recommended for use in their present condition. A thorough cleaning of the wells would render the water in question safe according to the reports received. The neighbors help out at the Lower Village. The teacher brings water from home for the Center school. At the Upper Village we stopped getting water from a nearby house. We now get it from a well in a field on the Washington road, a short distance from the school. The Merrill school is supplied by a well in a nearby field. The Flat school gets its water from a neighboring house. The school board and I have given some thought to this matter. Nothing definite has been done. We should be glad to have this question properly discussed at the next annual meeting of the school district. An interested public and some appropriations would without question help solve the problem.

Another situation which we must face and do something about is the toilets. They do not meet modern standards of sanitation. Many one-room schools throughout the state use septic toilets which carry no odors, and do not freeze in the winter. When once installed all the care which septic toilets need is the pouring in of a pail of water a day. Such toilets have been installed in the West Deering school. I have observed them for two years, and I feel safe in recommending them.

Th problems discussed are as old as the New Hampshire rural school. The water and toilet situations in

ninety per cent of the one room schools in New Hampshire are not any better than ours. The time is now ripe for school districts to take progressive measures to remedy conditions which present day standards have outgrown.

In other respects the schools are in very good condition for the school board have faithfully maintained them in good repair, and satisfactory sanitation.

The schools are doing more than just teaching fundamentals. A great deal is being accomplished in the way of citizenship, health, child guidance, games and appreciation of religious and patriotic holidays. and for the social life of the schools, all aiming at laying a truly American cultural background and way of life.

We estimate the required amount for the school year, July 1, 1941 to June 30, 1942, to be \$30,289.98, details of the amount to be found in the proposed budget of the Hills-

boro Special School District. This is approximately the same as in preceding years. We expect receipts of about \$4,000. This leaves a balance of \$26,289.98 to be raised by taxation.

In the past year several improvements have been made, especially much needed ones at the high school. A hot water system has been installed by Mr. Matthews, supplying hot water to the Home Economics room, teachers' room, manual arts room and to three new showers in the boys' basement and one in the girls' basement.

With the cooperation of Mr. Beard of the Public Service Co. a street light was installed in front of the high school and new indirect lighting in the gymnasium. Several new typewriter desks were purchased for the Commercial Dept.

At the elementary school the painting program has been completed by Mr. Mosley at a considerable saving to the district. The tops of the desks in one room were planed and refinished.

We wish to express our gratitude to the Superintendent and members of the teaching staff for their cooperation during the year.
