TOWN MEETING WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Littleton, qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall and Police Court Room, in the Town Building, on the 12th day of March next, being the second Tuesday of March, at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Town Clerk, one Selectman for the term of three years, a Town Treasurer, an Auditor, a Collector of Taxes, an Overseer of the Poor, an Agent to prosecute violations of the liquor law, three members of the Board of Trustees of the Public Library, each for the term of three years, one Trustee of Trust Funds and a Constable.

ARTICLE 2. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary for the laying out, construction and repairing of highways and bridges, for the payment of the town debt and interest, for the maintenance of the poor, for the public library, for the recreation commission, for free hospital beds, toward the maintenance of a District Nurse, for observance of Memorial Day, for band concerts, and for all other town charges.

ARTICLE 3. To see what action the town will take for the purpose of securing State aid for trunk line construction of highways in this town under the provisions of an act to provide State aid and for the expenditure of other public moneys in the construction of main highways throughout the State in accordance with Chap. 84 of the Laws of New Hampshire.

ARTICLE 4. To see what action the town will take for the purpose of securing State aid for trunk line maintenance of highways in this town, in accordance with Chap. 84 of the Laws of New Hampshire.

- ARTICLE 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money, and if so, how much, to be expended under the direction of the Selectmen, in co-operation with the State Forester, in the work of preventing the spread of the disease, commonly known as White Pine Blister Rust.
- ARTICLE 6. To see what action the town will take relative to highway construction on the Monroe and Gilman-North Littleton roads, so-called, and to pay for the same, by appropriation or by authorizing the Selectmen to borrow on the credit of the town, and issue its notes or bonds, for the same.
- ARTICLE 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate money for the construction of a foot-bridge at South Littleton, to replace the wooden highway bridge at that point, which was destroyed some years ago.
- ARTICLE 8. To see if the town will vote to instruct its Selectmen to appoint a Collector of Taxes and a Constable, in accordance with Sect. 41, Chap. 47 of the Laws of New Hampshire.
- ARTICLE 9. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money from time to time during the current year, on the credit of the town, to pay current indebtedness, in anticipation of taxes.
- ARTICLE 10. To see what action the town will take with reference to the matter of authorizing the Selectmen to give any druggist, doing business in this town, a prescription permit to sell pure spirituous and malt liquor for medicinal, sacramental, mechanical and scientific purposes, as provided in Chap. 147 of the Laws of New Hampshire.
- ARTICLE_11. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
- ARTICLE 12. To choose any other necessary town officers for the year ensuing and to choose or elect any agents or committees which may be necessary to carry into effect any vote that may be passed under this warrant.

ARTICLE 13. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

The School Board hereby submits its annual report for your consideration and approval. Nearly at the close of a successful and harmonious year, in the month of May, 1928, our schools suffered a great loss with the passing of our superintendent, Orin M. Holman. HEADMASTER'S REPORT

To G. H. Barrett, Superintendent of Schools:

I hereby submit my seventh annual report as Headmaster of Littleton High School. While I know that the financial report of the school will cover the period from July 1, 1927 to July 1, 1928, I assume that towns-people will be more interested in the current year's work and consequently my report will cover the period from February 1, 1928 to February 1, 1929 inclusive.

Building and Equipment

The condition of the new high school is a testimonial to the good work of Mr. West and the fine spirit on the whole of the two hundred and over boys and girls which occupy it. It is increasingly evident however that the repair work, cleaning, sweeping, firing, etc., that two large buildings require, demands more time than it is right to ask one man to give. In this connection it might be well to consider the advisability of oil heat not only because of its vast saving of labor but on account of its greatly increased efficiency. That the building may be kept in as fine a condition as possible, a yearly appropriation for minor repairs should be made. In this connection it should be said that equipment such as cooking utensils, saws, machine knives, typewriters, etc., are constantly wearing out or losing their efficiency. Consequently, a policy of exchange should be adopted. I would suggest in the case of typewriters which seem to be the most expensive item on the list that they be exchanged so as to retain no machine over three or possibly four years. At the present time we have three machines that are five years old; one that is four years old, and five that are three years old. All of these machines should go within a short period of time, if we are to maintain the high standard set in this course. This department also needs typing chairs of the right type, filing equipment, as well as equipment to teach filing.

More pupils each year are taking these vocational courses with a constantly increasing demand for more and more modern equipment; such as an additional lathe for the Manual Training Department. A lathe such as is necessary for this work costs from \$400 to \$500. In the offices there is felt very keenly by all the absolute need of a safe for valuable papers and records.

In the Music Department the piano which we now have has served us for more than ten years; while this might not be a long time in the home, it is a long period of time in a school where it must be moved from place to place, and where so many different people are using it. Our present piano should be replaced by a new one.

Teachers

The present staff of teachers has, with three exceptions, been with us since our entrance into the new building. This has been especially beneficial and condusive to the best kind of discipline and care of school property. Mr. Welch and Mr. Cooney are now on their sixth year of service; Miss Ricker on her fourth; Miss Gale and Miss Doherty on their third. Miss Bronson is giving her twenty-sixth year of service in the town of Littleton. It is extremely gratifying to hold good teachers, and my hope is, through the same fine treatment, and by such increases of salary as may be merited, we may continue to hold such teachers as these. It does not seem too much to ask that we should pay a teacher of seven or eight years' experience \$1500, \$1600, or even \$1800, when from that department come girls who earn within one or two years of graduation, and without further training from \$1000 to \$1200.

Financial Report of Special Activities

The financial accounts of the special activities of the high school have been continued on the same basis as last year with very pleasing results. It is surprising to note that over \$3500, has passed through the hands of Miss Craigie, as high school treasurer. These books are actually kept by members of the

Senior Commercial Department, and affords actual practice in bookkeeping. All of this money has been raised by teachers and pupils, none has come by way of the school appropriation. A trial balance of the high school books is given below. This will show all of the different organizations involved and their financial condition. With the exception of the Record and the Athletic Association, there are no outstanding bills. Both of these organizations are, however, in good condition and have an excess of credits over debits.

Music

For a long time a need for the teaching of instrumental music has been felt in the high school. This year at the instigation and interest of Mrs. Jones and the cooperation of parents, we have had the services of a Mr. Wentworth, a teacher of instrumental music in Lancaster, Groveton, Berlin and Gorham. Some twenty-five pupils have had the benefit of one lesson a week which has been paid for by their parents. An orchestra of twenty-seven pieces has been organized and gives promise of doing exceptionally well. The High School, through the reserve fund, has paid Mr. Wentworth to date. This condition, however, cannot continue and if we are to continue the orchestra, as we most emphatically believe that we should, the expense of instruction should be taken care of by the town under the heading of Teaching Expense.

A Boys' and Girls' Glee Club has been continued this year as formerly. An operetta, "The Yokahama Maid," was given last spring. This year, "The Gypsy Rover," will be given in April.

Manual Training

I wish to go into some detail in a report of this department. The remarkable growth here has necessitated what has seemed to be a large expense. I am listing some of the expenses chargeable to this department, in order that we may here analyze them. We are charged with:

Cement	\$192	75
Lumber for incidentals	18	00
Gravel, sand, etc.	89	75
Electric fixtures	12	00
Making a total of	\$302	50

This material was used on three large projects namely, an apron on the west side of the high school and Kilburn building, play ground apparatus, and the new lumber room. Two hundred and seventy-nine square yards of cement were laid in the

form of walls, aprons and floors. Before laying the floors it was necessary to remove over one hundred cubic yards of dirt. The contract price per yard for cement work and the removal of dirt would have totaled \$627.75. This \$627.75 should be credited to the Manual Training Department, and repairs and buildings should be debited with the \$302.50.

In addition to this we believe that in the sheathing, studding, hanging of doors, wiring, etc., for the lumber room (which is 52 x 27 x 7 and which was badly needed) this department made a saving of at least twelve days of labor, at \$5.00 a day or a further saving of at least \$60. Moreover, during the past year the department has made for the school, eleven drafting tables at an actual cost of \$55.00, which to buy would have amounted to \$165.00, three tables for \$9.00 which would have cost \$24.00, 18 shingling brackets for \$10.00 which would have cost \$45.00, these brackets to be used in repair work for the school during the summer. These are some of the larger jobs that this department has completed for the school at an actual saving of \$500.00 or more. Further than this, there is a constant stream of repair work such as repairs on tables, chairs, furniture of all kinds, doors and electric wiring; in fact, all the small items that are constantly appearing in a business that employs 600 people and maintains five or six buildings, with a valuation of several hundred thousand dollars, I am sure should we be forced to hire this work done that it would come to several hundred dollars more. Furthermore, during this period the boys in this department have made five toboggans which would sell for \$40.00 at a cost of \$20.00, two dozen baseball bats which would sell for \$40.00 at a cost of \$10.00, three dog sleds which would sell for \$60.00 at a cost of \$15.00. These are only a few of the many articles built here at proportional savings. In fact, all of our school activities regularly save on their properties for public shows. etc.

Annual Prizes, Gifts, Etc.

The annual prize offered by the American Legion and the Auxiliary for leadership to the boy and girl in the graduating class went to Raymond Allard and Sarah Burnham. The Andrew Bingham Jr. cup went to Louis Delisle and the Lincoln Medal to Naomi Blodgett Tefft.

In conclusion, I wish to express my appreciation of the fine spirit of co-operation manifested both within and without the school. I want to express my appreciation of the loyal support and help given me by the School Board, Superintendent, by the teaching staff and by Miss Craigie in the office.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board of Littleton:

I have the honor to submit a few observations and suggestions on the Littleton schools since July 1, 1928.

Thanks to your excellent organization, I found the work of the previous year fully and satisfactorily completed and everything of major importance in readiness for the current year.

The high school organization, building and equipment are exceptionally well adapted for up to date secondary school work in all departments and branches. This means that the children of our community can in a large measure prepare themselves for efficient and happy living right here in their home town. While the cost of these very great and significant improvements is large, it is well for all of us to look upon it not as mere expense but as insurance against loss by ignorance, crime and poverty.

Times have changed very greatly during the past 25 years and it requires no special prophetic vision to see that things are going to continue to change even in a larger measure in the next few decades. Therefore we may confidently expect greater developments in education especially along vocational lines. (See Headmaster's report of recent achievements in this field.)

The number of pupils enrolled in all schools for the year ending June 30, 1928 was 631, an increase of 31 over the preceding year. The enrollment for the current year has already passed this figure and will increase still further before the end of the year. Without doubt, as the work on the Connecticut River Power project continues to expand we shall have a much larger enrollment within the next two or three years. That will necessitate considerable expansion of the present organization with a consequent increase in the yearly expenditure. There is no immediate prospect of larger numbers than can be

handled with the present organization for the school year beginning July 1, 1929. Without doubt \$500 to \$1000 will take care of such extra pupils as we may naturally expect under present conditions.

I have been able with only minor changes to carry on plans recently mapped out by my friend and fellow worker, Superintendent Holman, in arithmetic, spelling, geography and elementary reading. Changes in methods and emphasis are being made from time to time in every progressive community while the subject matter taught remains about the same. The work in general has been so well handled in the past that I see no need for any important change either in plans or procedure, rather do I prefer to follow a progressive policy that will meet the present and future needs of a progressive community.

School costs are always an important subject. The financial report gives a very good idea of the way in which school money was spent. It also indicates very clearly the great variety of materials and equipment demanded by a modern school. For the financial year covered by this report the average total cost per pupil including payments on debt and interest on the same, for the whole state was \$111.02. On the same basis the total average cost per pupil in Littleton was \$119.84, which is \$8.82 above the state average. Considering the cost apart from the payments on debt and interest, the state average per pupil was \$97.40, while Littleton's average cost on an equal basis was \$92.08. This is \$5.32 below the state average. I am sure that it is plainly evident to all that Littleton's total cost per pupil, while a little higher than the average in the state, guarantees to our children advantages out of all proportion to the small extra expense involved.

In closing I wish to express my appreciation for the sympathetic helpfulness of the School Board, of Headmaster Vaughan and of all the teachers and of Miss Craigie, Mr. West and Mr. Clark who have labored early and late to keep everything in order and running harmoniously. All this added to an ex-

ceptionally fine community and fraternal spirit has made my work here a very real pleasure. Thank you one and all.


