# Warrant for Annual Meeting

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## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Milford in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 10th day of March next, at eight of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation of the same.

3. To act upon the reports of all town officers, agents and committees, and raise and appropriate any money relative thereto.

4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the amount of money necessary to secure State aid for permanent improvement of highways under law passed at January session, 1905.

5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for town officers' salaries, town officers' expenses, election and registration expenses, municipal court expenses, repairs and supplies for town house, police protection, fire protection, moth extermination, health department, vital statistics, state aid maintenance of highways, general expense of highway department, street lighting, Milford Free Library, town poor, Memorial day, parks and playgrounds, cemeteries, interest on temporary loans, interest on bonded debt, interest on serial notes, interest on trust funds, town construction of highways, sewer construction, payments on principal of debts, state taxes and county taxes.

6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes, if necessary, as provided by law of 1907.

7. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate toward maintaining a series of band concerts the coming year.

8. To see if the town will vote to lay sewer on Dearborn Street and raise and appropriate money for the same.

9. To see if the town will vote to lay sewer on East Union, Smith and Oak streets and raise and appropriate money for the same.

10. To see if the town will vote to lay sewer on Spaulding Street and raise and appropriate money for the same.

11. To see if the town will vote to lay sewer on Farley Street and raise and appropriate money for the same.

12. To see if the town will vote to purchase a road roller and raise and appropriate money for the same.

13. To see what action the town will take in regard to the purchase of a combination road machine and snow-plow for the highway department, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

14. To see if the town will vote to purchase a truck for the highway department instead of horses, and raise and appropriate the money for the same.

15. To see what action the town will take in regard to removing the snow from the roads, and raise and appropriate the money for the same.

16. To see what action the town will take as to the collection and disposal of garbage and whether they will appropriate money for the same.

17. To see if the town will vote to appoint a Recreation Commission under provisions of Section 5, Chapter 86 of the Laws of 1917, to invest the appointment of such commission under provisions of this Act with the Board of Selectmen, and to make the necessary appropriations for support of Parks and Playgrounds under this Article.

18. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Se-

lectmen to purchase the land necessary for the construction of a street connecting the easterly end of Knight Street with the westerly end of Cherry Street and raise and appropriate money for the same. The land to be used as a public dump until in the opinion of the Selectmen it is ready for the construction of the street.

19. To see if the town will vote to extend its water system from Union Street to a point near the house of Wilfred M. Davis on the Mason road and raise and appropriate money for the same.

20. To see what action the town will take in regard to making the necessary improvements at the Pumping Station and raise and appropriate money for the same.

21. To see if the town will build a receiving tomb at Riverside Cemetery and raise and appropriate money for the same.

22. To see what sum, if any, the town will appropriate to contest the proposed discontinuance of the Manchester and Keene Railroad and a part of the Peterborough Railroad.

# Warrant for School Meeting

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## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Milford qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said District on the 10th day of March, 1925, at 3 o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing fiscal year beginning July 1, 1925.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agents of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors, Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see if the District will vote to make any alteration in the amount of money required to be assessed for the ensuing year for the support of public schools and the payment of the statutory obligations of the District, as determined by the School Board in its annual report.
9. To see how much money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for special repairs and alterations of school buildings and grounds; for new equipment, furnishings and replacements; for insurance on school property; and for payment of interest on notes or bonds or both.



10. To see what action the District will take relative to the unexpended balance of \$336.31 of the \$500 raised and appropriated at the 1923 annual district meeting for the expenses of the Investigating Committee.

11. To see if the District will vote to appropriate not exceeding \$115,000 for the purpose of constructing, furnishing and equipping an elementary school building and for the purpose of raising \$40,000 of said amount to authorize the District Treasurer with the approval of the School Board to prepare, issue and sell notes or bonds to the amount of \$40,000 outside the debt limit under authority of an Act of 1925 already enacted entitled "An Act Empowering the School District of Milford to Exceed its Statutory Limit of Bonded Indebtedness", and for the purpose of raising \$75,000 of said amount to authorize the Treasurer with the approval of the School Board to issue notes or bonds to the amount of \$75,000 inside the debt limit under Laws of 1917, Chapter 129 and amendments or additions thereto, or take any action in relation thereto.

12. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to sell the White School building, so called, when not required for school purposes or take any action in relation thereto.

13. To see if the District will authorize the School Board to purchase the Cahill lot and buildings, so called, located south of the present White School building and now owned by Fred E. Cooley and raise and appropriate money for the same; and if purchased, to authorize the School Board to sell or otherwise dispose of the buildings **thereon.**

14. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

## Report of Selectmen

FOR YEAR ENDING JANUARY 31, 1925.

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There is an ever increasing demand for better roads and better walks.

The problem before your selectmen is not how good a road may be built but rather how much good road may be built for a given sum of money. It has been our endeavor to expend such sums of money as have been entrusted to us to the best possible advantage.

On the Brookline road (State Aid Construction) we have built an oil bound macadam road at a very little excess in cost over the water bound macadam road built last year.

We firmly believe that this road is a much better and cheaper road and recommend that the remainder of the road be built oil bound and that the road be finished this year. This will necessitate accepting State Aid for 1925 and 1926 and raising and appropriating money this year to complete the road, in anticipation of State money for year 1926.

We believe it cheaper to finish this road in one year than to be two years.

The Wilton road, Federal Aid Construction has been completed as per contract and while the road construction is satisfactory, the grade and other conditions might be improved. Obstacles over which we had little or no control were encountered and original grades changed to the detriment of the road. We are assured by the State Highway Department that permanent railings and fences will be put in place in the early Spring.

The entire appropriation for Town Maintenance was expended on the upkeep of town roads, and while

we consider our roads compare favorably with other town roads, there is a continual cry for better roads.

A good road of twenty years ago is considered an unsafe road today.

Highland Avenue was in a very bad condition this spring and something was to be done. Gravel on this hill we considered a waste of time and money. We graded and built this road oil bound macadam, and we think that we have a good road for years to come. The cost of this road is the difference between our appropriation and our expenditures for maintenance.

There is a demand for better roads in the winter time. We ask your consideration for the ploughing of snow from our highways, not only for the convenience of automobiles, but for the better protection of our property against loss by fire. Our fire truck is practically useless in winter.

There are continual demands for new sewers and justly so. Milford faces at this time a serious sewer problem. Our sewer mains in many cases have practically reached their capacity.

In certain places surface water cannot be turned into our sewers as the mains cannot care for it. It is possible that a system of surface sewer would solve the problem for a time. As per vote of the town, we commenced a sewer on Dearborn Street, and were not entirely surprised to encounter ledge. At a depth of about fourteen feet we found five or six feet of solid ledge and having expended our appropriation we abandoned the job for the year having laid pipe in about  $\frac{1}{2}$  the length of the street. This job can be completed but should be contracted out to parties having the necessary equipment.

### SIDEWALKS

Your Selectmen this year departed from the regular method of edge stone and concrete for sidewalks, and

caused to be built about 900 feet of cement walk.

By agreement the abutters were to pay one half of the cost of walk.

The cost of these cement walks is not in excess of the cost of edgestone alone and we believe that a much more permanent walk is secured at a much lower cost to both town and property owner.

Our expenditure of money on sidewalk, over our appropriation, is explained largely, by the town paying for sidewalk construction and charging the property owners their share of expense which has or will appear in Town Treasurer's report.

We hereby recommend the further building of these sidewalks.

## Report of Highway Agent

---

The permanent road construction consists of 900 ft. of oil bound crushed granite macadam on Highland Ave., completing the street with an oiled surface.

Tonella and Sons furnished the stone, 300 tons, at \$1.50 per ton at the crusher. Hauling cost 80 cts. per ton.

Fourteen hundred dollars were spent on this street not including the asphaltum.

We used 55 barrels of binder B in one coat penetration method and covered about 1750 square yards.

State Aid Construction consists of 1500 ft. on the Brookline road just beyond the stone watering trough, and connecting with the section built in 1923.

This was built with crushed granite from the town crusher at Kittredge quarries and bound with one coat of binder B. asphaltum. About 800 tons of stone were used. There remains on the Brookline road one half mile of dirt road to be rebuilt to connect with the State aid road at Colburn's corner.

The replanking of the steel bridge at Jones' crossing has been completed and a light coating of tarvia concrete added to help protect the plank.

A long section of cement concrete sidewalk has been built on Prospect Street, also one on Highland Avenue.

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Miscellaneous Report: Lodgers cared for at station, 418; Street lights out and reported, 44; All lights left burning by mistake put out or reported; doors found open, 62; Automobile accidents, 23.

In the year 1922 there were 40 auto accidents, in 1923 there were 26 auto accidents and in 1924 there were 23 auto accidents.

It is a well known fact that the automobile traffic has about doubled in the past few years and judging from the decrease in number of accidents indicated by above figures, it is fair to assume that the placing of traffic signs and the adoption of local traffic regulations with strict police supervision has had a very beneficial effect in promoting safety and convenience for the public.

Other Police Departments have co-operated with this department by both rendering and receiving assistance in locating lost persons, runaway children and stolen property; this department located and recovered in Milford two stolen automobiles for out of town people.

Cases investigated and handled and other instances where valuable service was rendered by the Police Department of which no records are kept are multitudinous and varied.

In submitting this report, I wish to call attention to the fact that the ever changing conditions causing a demand for a more adequate and increased police service, with the automobile traffic having doubled, the appropriations for police work have not increased in any way proportional to the needs of the department.

In my report a year ago, I recommended that provisions be made for a more adequate police force and more suitable arrangements for Police Headquarters, and again I reiterate that you give this matter your most careful consideration.

I am not making the above recommendations with any selfish motive in view but solely for the purpose of promoting the safety, convenience and public welfare of Milford and its citizens. The secret of a successful working police department is not in the detection

of crime, but, in the work of preventing crime and the preservation of law and order.

# Report of Water Commissioners

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## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF WATER WORKS

To the Honorable Board of Water Commissioners,  
Gentlemen:

I herewith submit by report for the year ending January 31, 1925.

We have extended the 6 in. main 1700 ft. on Nashua St., and installed two new hydrants on same. We have and installed two new hydrants on the same. We have added 27 new services and 3 hydrants to the system this year.

The consumption is steadily gaining. We have pumped this year a daily average of 187,000 gallons against 131,000 gallons in the year 1917.

The lack of rain in the late summer and the fall had a serious effect on our wells. For the past three months we have had hardly enough water to supply the needs. The wells are so low that we had to lower the filter pumps into the cellar in order to get any water. We also had to extend the pumping time, making two shifts, and pumping the stand-pipe full, four times a day.

It will be necessary in the near future to do something to enlarge our water supply, and we have employed F. A. Barbour as engineer to look into this matter.

The problem of an auxiliary power unit will be brought to your attention this year, and we hope to install a Diesel oil engine direct connected to an electric generator.

Our steam plant is very much out of repair and the system has out-grown it so that it would be practically

useless in a large fire. As the steam plant has been in use 38 years, I would not advise the expenditure of much money on repairs.

We have had a good year financially. We have paid our notes and interest and have a good balance. We also have over \$500. in unpaid bills.

## Soldiers' Memorial Committee

---

At the annual meeting in March, 1922, the Town of Milford authorized a special committee to be appointed by the Moderator consisting of three members to recommend a suitable memorial to the men of Milford who gave their lives in the defense of their country in the World War, and other previous wars in which this country has been engaged, and to secure the services of a competent architect to make plans, estimate costs, and to report at the annual Town Meeting in March, 1924, and that the sum of \$500 be raised for the expenses of said committee.

Moderator Charles S. Emerson appointed the following members of this committee: B. F. Prescott, P. R. Woodman, E. D. Heald.

Your committee has had several meetings and private interviews with many of the citizens of this town. Numerous projects were discussed at the meetings of your committee.

Your committee finally decided that the most appropriate memorial, taking all factors into consideration was a Memorial Athletic Field to be developed on Endicott Park, and, incidentally, to have an artistic gateway as an entrance and proper approach to the Field; the gateway to be constructed of Milford granite.

Your committee thereupon employed the services of a firm of architects and civil engineers, Larson & Wells of Hanover, New Hampshire, who have had much experience in laying out and developing athletic fields, and designing other memorials. Mr. Wells came here last Fall and made a personal examination of the Park and of the most feasible and proper location for an entrance.

In the improvement and development of Endicott Park your committee and the architects were greatly assisted by a former survey and carefully executed plan of development made by another firm of civil engineers and landscape gardeners when the development of the Park was formerly considered in 1916. The present proposition of development is not as extensive as that formerly recommended for consideration of the town.

The present plan is to leave the layout of the baseball field practically as it is at the present time, extending the outfield as far as possible, thoroughly grading both the outfield and infield, and putting the surface in first class condition, also to enlarge the seating capacity by more and better seats on the natural bank on the third-base side of the diamond.

The field on the upper level will be graded and made into an absolutely smooth field. On this field it is proposed to lay out a cinder running track and tennis courts inside of the track, with other places for jumps and track sports. If, at any future time, our High School maintained a football team the space inside the track could be used for a football field.

The contemplated entrance has been located at the suggestion of the architects at a point between the east entrance to the High School building and the present entrance to the Park, which emerges on the street near the Cabinet office. At the entrance would be located an artistic gateway upon which the proper inscriptions would be made and possibly the names of all men who served in the various wars, but especially those who gave their lives should be inscribed; a plan and sketch of which is submitted for your inspection.

A new driveway is contemplated to be built from the entrance following the shore of the river to a point near the baseball field. This driveway would be wide enough for vehicles going in either direction.

The estimated expense for the erection of a suitable gateway should not exceed the sum of \$10,000. The cost of grading and developing the Park in accordance with the plans previously suggested has been estimated not to exceed the sum of \$15,000. These estimates have been given us by the firm of architects and engineers which we employed.

In considering the numerous suggestions for a suitable memorial your committee came to the conclusion hereby submitted for the reason that Milford is extremely fortunate in having within a stone's throw of the center of its village a natural park so well adapted to the development of a modern and improved athletic field which will serve for the youth of this town for all time to come. In the proposed development the natural beauties of the park will not be disturbed, but rather would be improved. The principal changes will be in the grading and smoothing of the two present levels and the setting of such trees as may be desirable.

Wherefore your committee recommends the adoption of this report; that a sum not exceeding \$25,000 be raised and appropriated for the erection of a gateway and the development of the park; that this sum be raised by an issue of serial notes with interest not to exceed 5%, to be paid in equal annual payments in such amounts that the final payment shall be made not later than 1934; and, that a committee of three be appointed by the selectmen to carry out the provisions of this report.

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## REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF MILFORD FREE LIBRARY

To the Citizens of the Town of Milford:

The Trustees of the Milford Free Library herewith submit their report of the 56th annual meeting, together with the report of the librarian.

The annual meeting of the Board of Trustees was held at the library on March 26th, 1924. Emory D. Heald was re-elected chairman, Benjamin F. Prescott, treasurer and Ruth M. McIntire, secretary.

The needs of the library were discussed with the librarian for the year 1924. The librarian reported the need of a new book case, and the trustees authorized her to investigate and purchase such a rack as was advisable for the use of the library, which was later done. It was also voted to buy six small chairs for the children's reading room. Mr. Heald consented to repair the old ones.

Miss Annabel C. Secombe was re-elected librarian and Miss Ruth D. French was elected assistant librarian. The trustees voted to grant a small increase in salary to the librarian, making her salary \$80. per month, and also voted to pay the assistant librarian \$50. per month.

The reading committee was appointed at this meeting consisting of Miss Ella M. Powers, Mrs. Harriet W. Hutchinson and Mrs. Louise A. Broughton.

On account of the additional salaries granted, and the ever increasing cost of books and supplies, your

committee recommends that the Town appropriate \$2500.

## REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN

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To the Trustees of the Milford Free Library:

I herewith submit the annual report of the Milford Free Library for the year ending January 31, 1925.

The library has been open 305 days for eight hours a day. The circulation has been the largest in the history of the library, 40,890.

When the inventory was taken in the fall many books were discarded as they were obsolete and simply occupying shelf room which was needed for other works. Therefore, there was a decrease rather than increase in the number of bound volumes during the year. A steel stack was added to our equipment the first of the year, which also has reduced the congestion in the stack room.

Your librarian attended a neighborhood meeting at Nashua and the annual meeting of the New Hampshire Library Association at Manchester in September.

## REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

---

The Milford schools have been conducted during the past year with the same splendid cooperation of Superintendent, Headmaster and teachers, and have fully maintained the high level of efficiency as set in the past.

During the summer the usual repairs and cleaning were carried out. The room used as a laboratory was enlarged to use as a class room and has been a decided help in solving the seating question in the high school. The high school building and the Mechanic Arts extension were painted on the outside.

New typewriters were added to the equipment of the Commercial course. The electric bells in the high school building have been replaced with a new system.

All buildings have been equipped with pressure locks on exit doors in conformity with the state law.

At the White and Brick only absolutely necessary repairs were made. The new fence erected at the White School is a decided improvement to the lot.

Our plan in trying to furnish better transportation has resulted not only in better service but in saving as well.

The new savings bank system which is conducted by means of a stamp vending machine has been very successful. The Souhegan Bank reports that during the period from October 8, 1924 to January 31, 1925 the sum of \$732.91 was deposited by the pupils of the High, White and Brick schools.

We would recommend that during the coming summer a steel ceiling be placed over the boiler in the High School building, not only as a matter of economy but also of safety.

Six new typewriters should be added to the Commercial department. These are replacements and by

doing it this year we can take advantage of the long exchange rates.

We also have the problem of providing room for our growing Commercial department.

It seems as though there should be something done in regard to the matter of providing a fireproof record filing case for the records of the schools. Should we be so unfortunate as to have a fire in the office where they are kept we would be without a single record or voucher.

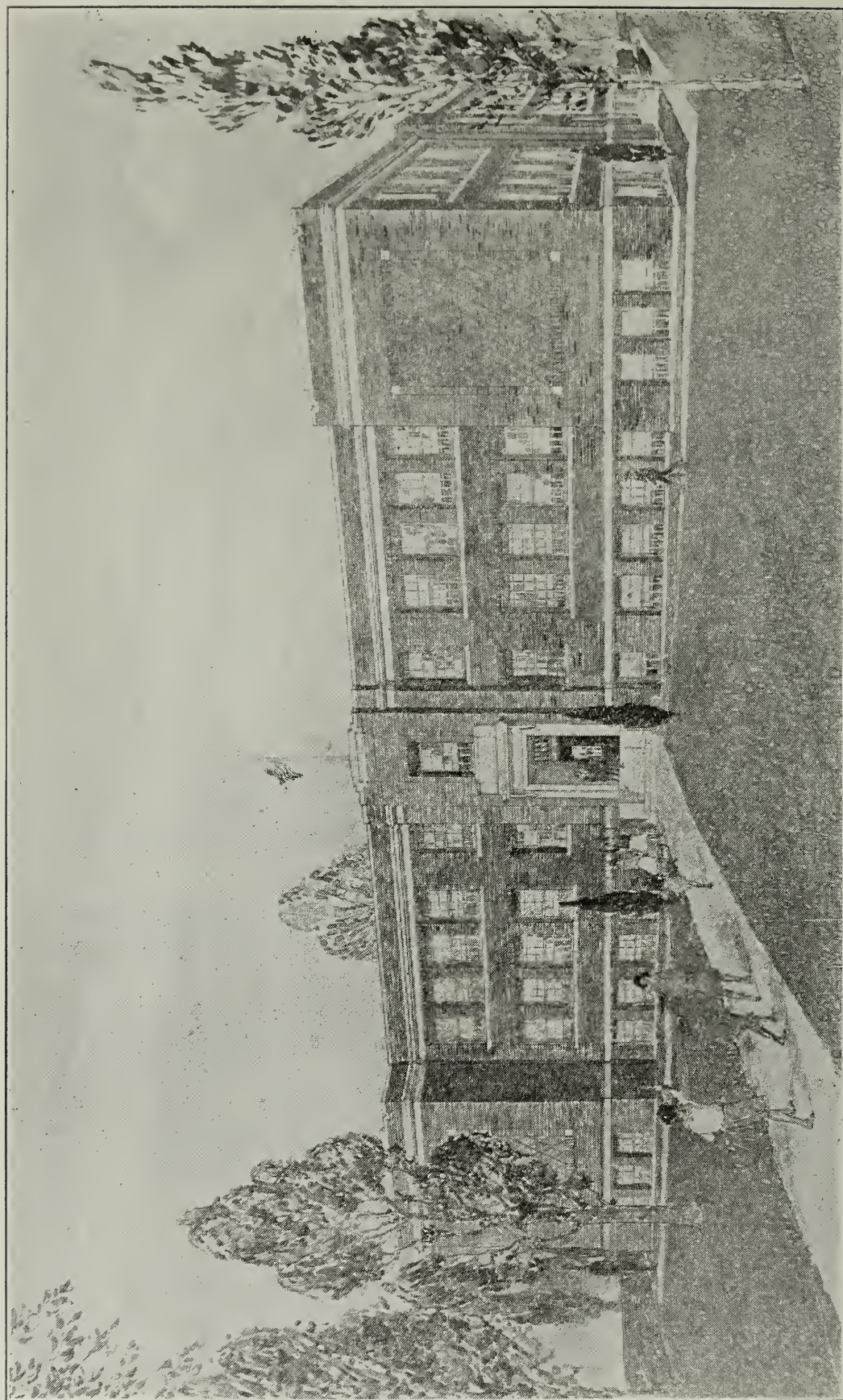

## REPORT OF BUILDING COMMITTEE

---

At the School District meeting in March, 1924, the following resolution was passed:

“Resolved—That the Milford School District build a school house suitable for the grade schools in the village, the same to be built during the year 1925; that a committee be appointed by the Moderator consisting of four citizens, one of whom shall be a woman, who, together with the School Board, shall constitute a committee to secure a site, prepare and furnish a plan, secure bids for the construction, arrange for the financing, and report at the annual School Meeting in March, 1925, said Committee to superintend the building and construction of said school house unless otherwise ordered by the District and that the sum of \$5000 be raised and appropriated for the expenses of the above committee, any unexpended balance of the same to be applied to the expenses of construction of said school building.

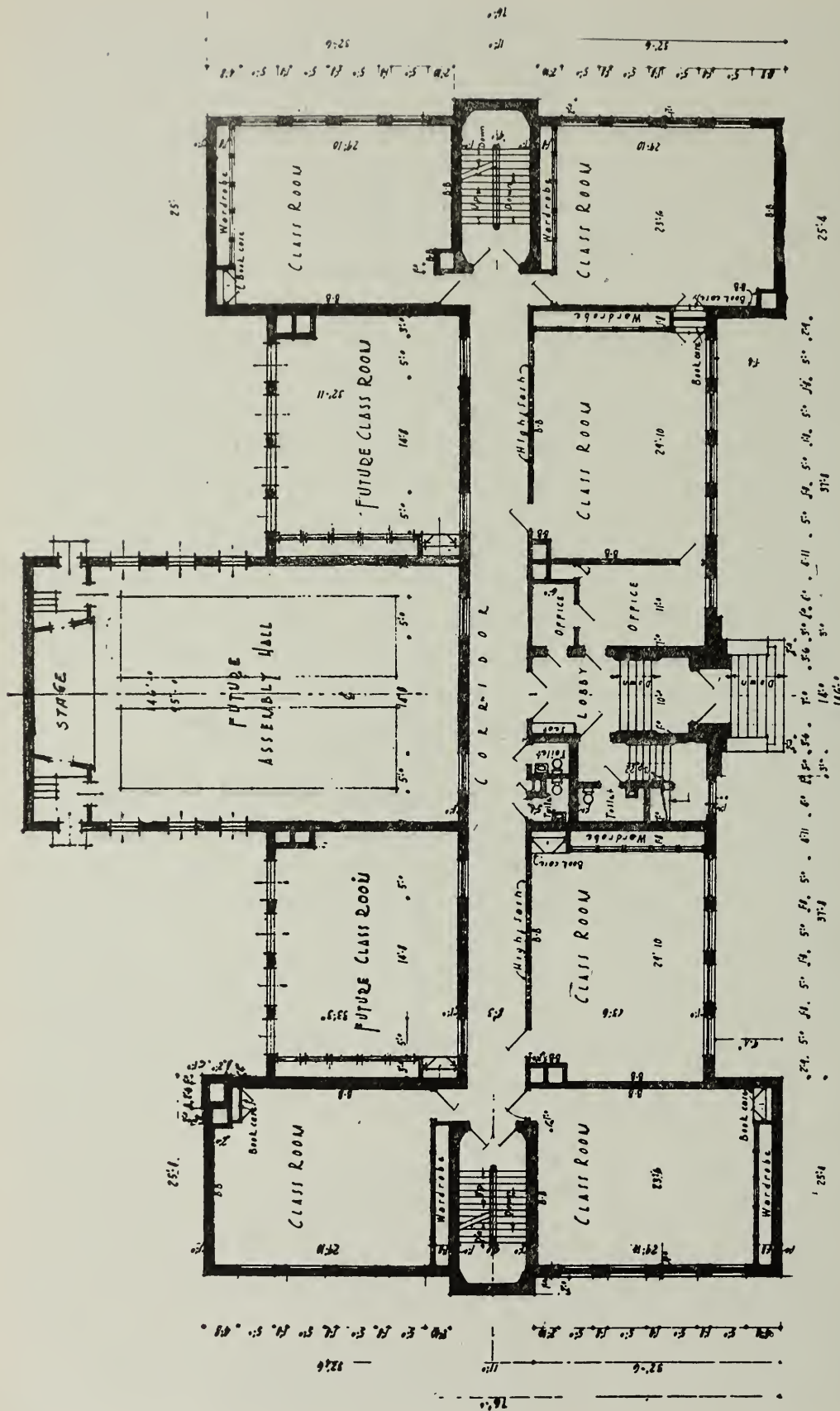
“The School Board are hereby instructed to insert in the warrant for the annual school meeting to be held in 1925, a proper article under which the School District may vote an issue of bonds to finance the erection of said building.”

The Moderator appointed a Committee as follows: E. S. Heald, L. L. Junkins, Mrs. A. R. Webster, J. P. Cassidy, which, with the School Board J. Thorne Young, Mrs. Blanche A. Bruce, and Harry N. Thomas, proceeded at once to organize and do the work before them.

Mr. H. L. Patterson, a resident of Mt. Vernon and who is an official of the Boston School Building Department, has been untiring in his efforts to assist the Committee in their work and his advice and counsel have been much appreciated.

The first matter of importance to come before the

Committee was the selection of a site and it was unanimously voted that school lot No. 9 on Garden and Cottage Street was the best for the purpose within the limits of the village. This lot being 312 x 189 gives adequate space for the building and playgrounds.

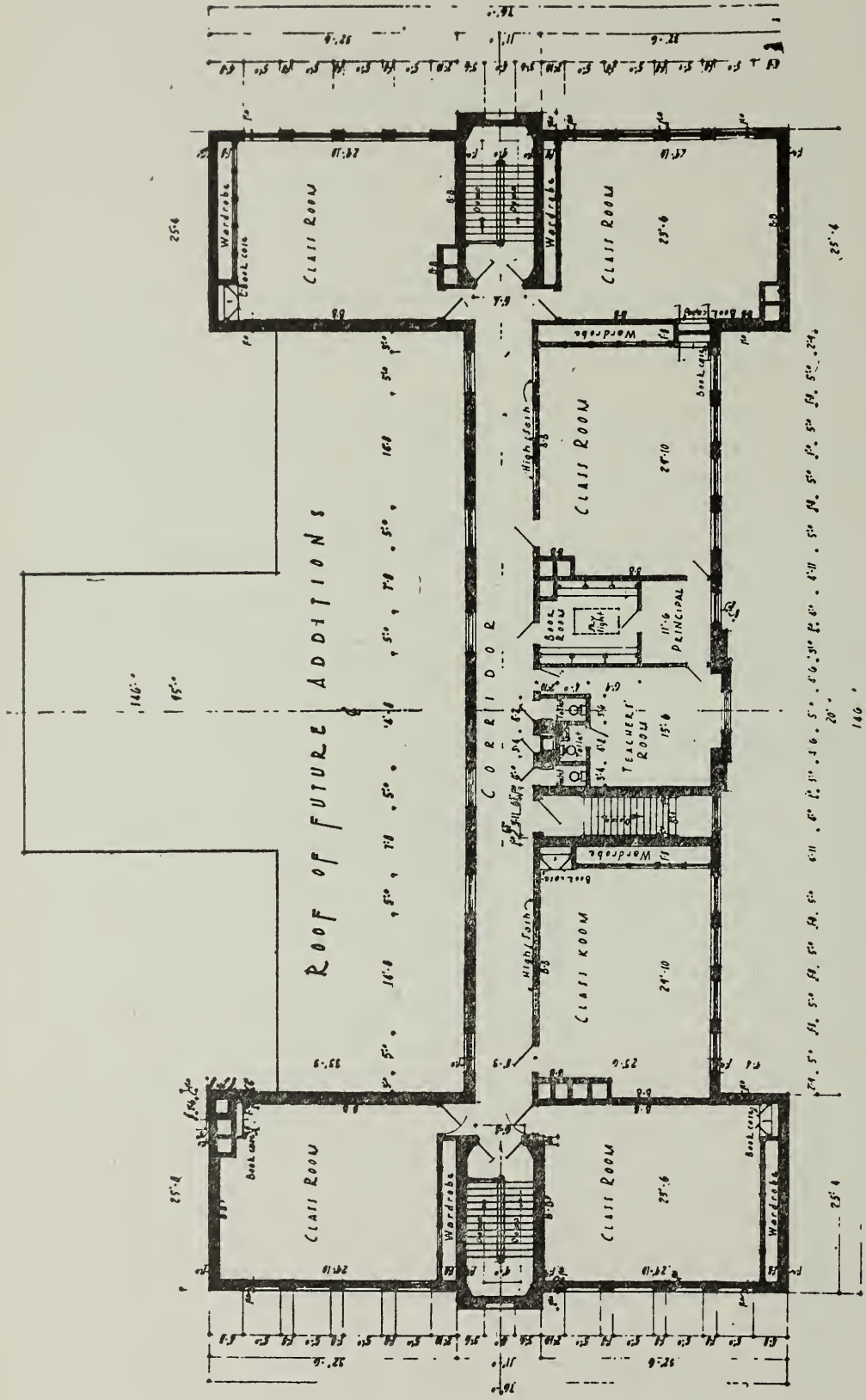
The Committee then inspected school buildings in our vicinity and made trips to Massachusetts towns where new and modern school buildings had recently been erected.

Twelve architects were asked to submit sketches such as the Committee determined should be built here and finally the sketch made by Mulhall & Holmes, of 33 Newbury Street, Boston, Massachusetts, was chosen by the Committee as most desirable and two months ago that firm was commissioned to make detailed plans and specifications. Drawings of the floor plans and elevations have been made and approved and printed in this report.

This building provides for twelve class-rooms with the opportunity for enlargement. It embodies the very best in modern ideas school construction and will take care of all Milford pupils from the first to sixth grades besides providing the best accommodations in place of the present unsatisfactory rooms and will accomplish considerable economy in operating costs. The new building is estimated to cost \$100,000. Some of the equipment in the old buildings can be used.

The building is to be constructed of New Hampshire red brick with Milford granite trim consisting of base, steps and doorways, window sills, trims, headers and 2 courses of coping. The floor will be timbered construction with three fireproof stairways, one of which, for the purpose of fire protection, will have no connection with the basement.

Finished floors throughout the building are to be of maple. Standing finish is to be of hard pine. The en-

tire building is framed to eliminate shrinkage of plaster. All walls and ceilings are to be lathed with metal lathe.

The first floor has six class rooms, public office, private office, and emergency toilets for boys and girls.

The second floor consists of six class rooms with book room, principal's office, teachers' room, teachers' toilet and emergency toilets for boys and girls.

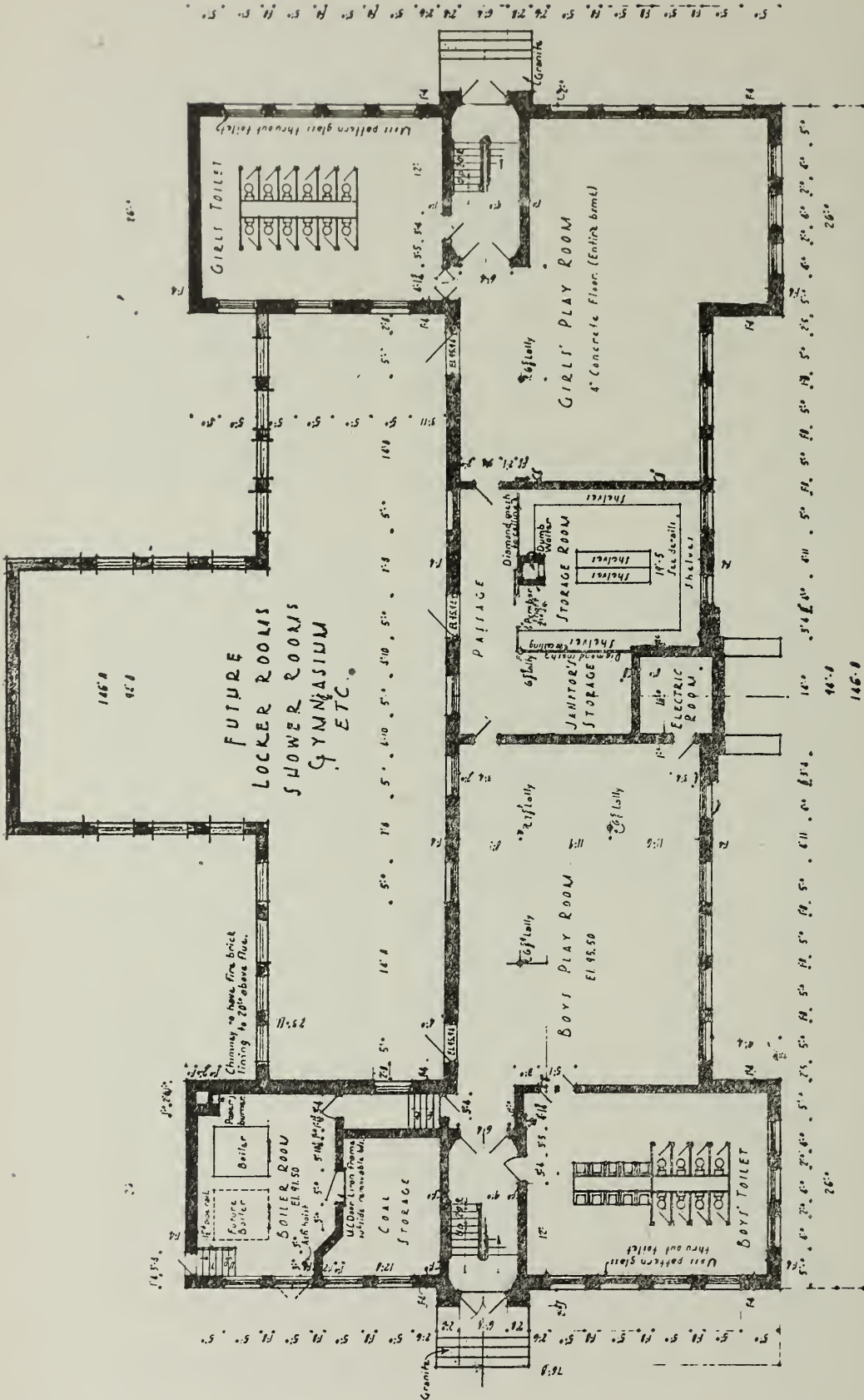
The basement consists of boys' large play room with ample toilet accommodations connected; girls' playroom with ample toilet accommodations connected, general storage room connected with floors above by dumb-waiter; janitor's storage, electric room; boiler room and coal bunkers.

All class rooms are modern in every respect. Unilateral lighting is used, with wardrobes at the rear of each room. All wardrobes are to be ventilated by forced draft thereby assuring cleanliness and dry clothing. Ample vent flues change the air of the class rooms continually, maintaining a healthy atmosphere at all times. Ample blackboard space is provided on front and right sides of each room. All walls of class rooms, corridors, offices, etc., are dadoed to the height of six and a half feet with burlap, thereby insuring a very tough and sanitary surface. Class rooms are 23 x 29 feet in the open, with seatings for 42 pupils in each.

A first-class steam heating and plumbing system is to be installed. The plans now call for one boiler, with provision for a second if the additions to the building should be made and more heating needed for the gymnasium, auditorium and extra class rooms which can be built if needed in the future. All plumbing fixtures will be of either porcelain or vitreous china. Drinking fountains are to be located throughout the building for both teachers and pupils. Every toilet will be ventilated by suction fans at roof.

The building will be lighted with the latest type of

fixtures, five to each room. Six fire alarm stations are to be provided in the building with fire gongs and fire bells. There will be a standpipe on each floor, with sufficient fire hose to reach any part of the building.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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To the School Board of Milford:

I herewith submit my sixth annual report which is also the twentieth in the series of such reports. Since the question of a new elementary building has been the chief matter before the District during the past year and since this subject has been fully covered in the reports of the Building Committee appointed in 1924, my report will be concerned chiefly with such statistical material as should become of permanent record.

### **Organization of Supervisory Union No. 40**

The grouping of school districts is the same as arranged in 1919 when this union was formed. Apportionment of joint expenses has been changed to be as follows: Amherst, one-fourth; Brookline, one-tenth, (was one-sixth); Milford, six-tenths, (was one-half); Mont Vernon, one-twentieth, (was one-twelfth.)

### **Teachers and Enrollment**

Changes in the teaching staff have been very few indeed during the last year, the greatest turnover coming in the rural schools, an occurrence that is only too common in every district. The remedy in general is to make rural schoolhouses and surroundings so comfortable and attractive and salaries so good that teachers will make rural school work an end in itself and not merely a stepping stone to something else. In Milford the one room buildings have been put into excellent condition through a remodelling program now practically completed. The remaining factor, adequate salaries, is then the determining factor. We should plan to pay enough to make the one room school as good as those in the village.

In the High School, Mr. Bernard M. Davis replaces Mr. Collieson and serves as Submaster. Mr. Davis is

a graduate of New Hampshire University and has taught in Warner and Contoocook. Miss Winifred Watts of Enfield has charge of Domestic Arts. Miss Watts took the three year course at Keene Normal and has had experience in Milford as Assistant and later as Domestic Arts teacher in Ashland. Miss Helen Burnham of Henniker, a graduate of N. H. University, conducts the Latin department and has part of the English work.

In the village buildings but one change was made, Miss Dorothy Wilder of Newton replacing Miss Tebbets. Miss Wilder was released from her contract in December and her place taken by Miss Adah Rudolf.

In the rural schools the situation is as follows: Mrs. Jennison continues for the fourth year at the North, Federal Hill is closed, Miss Marie Shea of Hancock teaches at the Laurel, Miss Mary E. M. Mack returns to Milford as teacher at the Osgood School, and Mrs. Angela Berube of Wilton, accepted appointment at Pine Valley. All rural teachers have both training and experience.

In the Music department, Miss Gertrude M. Quigley of North Chelmsford, Mass., completed  $2\frac{1}{2}$  years of successful work in June and was replaced by Mr. Harry W. Davis of Keene. Mr. Davis carries out the same plan of visiting each rural school once in two weeks and all other schools each week. In addition to this routine schedule for vocal music, he has organized an orchestra group which meets once a week for practice after school hours. For three years past pupils of the elementary schools have presented a public musical entertainment. This has involved a great deal of time and effort on the part of teachers and pupils. It has been thought best to omit this affair this year and in its place let the High School work be emphasized through some public presentation between now and June.

### Calendar

Beginning with 1920-1921 the school year has been divided into four terms, one term from September to Christmas and three terms of about seven weeks each after the Christmas vacation. This plan has in general met with favor and will be continued. For the next school year (1925-1926) the School Board has adopted the following as a tentative calendar:

### Instruction

A program of study is best put into effect when teachers themselves study the program of study with the Superintendent. Each year at least one subject is selected and an intensive examination made of textbooks and supplementary materials, as well as a thorough study of method. This results in defining clearly the work of each grade and in solving any difficulties of classroom instruction which a teacher may have encountered.

Standard tests have now become very reliable in all of the fundamental subjects in elementary and high school work. It is planned to make use of such material this spring and again in the fall, especially to test and improve the ability of high school pupils in the fundamentals, ability which becomes latent if not used constantly.

A professional library is maintained in the Superintendent's office and is regularly used by many of the teachers. The State Teachers Association meeting in October, the Merrimack Valley Teachers Association meeting in May, and one or more Teachers' Institutes conducted by the State Board of Education during the year give us all opportunity to keep in touch with the educational progress of the times.

### Costs

Certain figures compiled by Deputy Commissioner Pringle for the school year 1923-1924 indicate that the cost of public education in Milford is well within the average for the State. For example, the cost per pupil of average membership in Milford High School was \$102.55 against \$133.64 for the State. Similarly, for elementary school the figures are \$51.38 for Milford and \$69.57 for the State. The total current cost of public education per \$1000 of equalized valuation varies from \$25.06 to \$1.21 in the one hundred eighty six districts



in the State. Milford stands ninetieth in the list with a figure of \$10.70.

### **Education Week**

In November, each year, a special week is set apart to emphasize schools throughout our country. This last November we were fortunate in having the Women's Club of Milford cooperate most heartily by providing speakers for practically every school in town. The program was so arranged that special exercises came on different days at different schools. The messages brought to the teachers and children were interesting and stimulating, and the speakers and visitors in many instances were pleasantly surprised with the conditions which they found.

In conclusion, I wish to express my sincere appreciation of the splendid cooperation and support I have received from the School Board, teachers, and citizens of Milford.

## REPORT OF HEADMASTER OF HIGH SCHOOL

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To Harold Bales, Supt. of Schools, Milford, N. H.

The following is my second report as Headmaster of Milford High School. Since my report last year covered many topics that do not change from year to year I have omitted them from this report. These topics are admission, curricula, promotion and program of studies of Milford High School.

### Enrollment

The total registration so far this year is 215, while the actual membership on January 31, 1925 was 201. Of this number 94 are boys and 107 are girls, who are distributed in the different curricula as follows:

Academic Course—Seniors 5 boys, 8 girls; Juniors 7 boys, 13 girls; Sophomores 8 girls, 7 boys; Freshmen 22 boys, 8 girls; Post Graduate 2 boys; Total, 44 boys, 36 girls.

Commercial Course—Seniors 3 boys, 12 girls; Juniors 2 boys, 13 girls; Sophomores 6 boys, 12 girls; Freshmen 8 boys, 24 girls; Post Graduates 1 girl; Total 19 boys, 62 girls.

Mechanic Arts Course (all boys)—Seniors 4; Juniors 8; Sophomores 10; Freshmen 8; Total 30.

Domestic Arts Course (all girls)—Seniors 3, Juniors 2; Sophomores 5; Freshmen 0; Total 10.

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From the total registration and the actual membership on January 31, you will find that 14 pupils, 10 girls

and 4 boys, have left school since September 3. Two from the senior class, two from the junior class, three from the sophomore class and seven from the freshman class.

There are 42 non-resident pupils whose registration by school districts is as follows: Amherst 9, Bedford 3, Bennington 4, Frankestown 2, Greenfield 11, Greenville 2, Lyndeboro 6 and Mont Vernon 5.

The following table shows the registration of the pupils by classes for the past eight years. It also shows that the enrollment in the high school is increasing, although not in large numbers.

#### Maintenance of Standards

The requirements in the different departments have been met. Special emphasis is being placed on the fundamental subjects, namely, arithmetic, place geography, spelling, English grammar, handwriting and silent reading. The reason for this is not because the pupils entering high school are poorly prepared but because of the fact that high school pupils do not use their fundamental subjects to any extend and consequently this knowledge acquired in the elementary school becomes latent.

Two weeks before the report cards are issued, each teacher hands in to the office the names of those pupils whose work is just passing or below passing. Letters are sent to their parents informing them of their son's

or daughter's standing and asking them to call at the school in order that they may fully understand the situation. About 40 per-cent of the parents receiving these warning letters respond either by making a personal call at the school, telephoning or by writing a personal note and only in a few cases do such pupils fail to bring their rank above passing.

At this point I wish to express my appreciation to the parents for their cooperation and also to urge more parents to visit school, to become better acquainted with its work and its teachers. The pupil benefits and gains the most from teachers when there exists a spirit of co-operation between parents, teachers and pupils.

### Sophomore Prize Speaknig Contest

Through the generosity of General Kaley we have been able to secure special training for the pupils in public speaking. Since the Seniors have their class play and graduation exercises, the Juniors their Junior Prom, the Freshmen we feel need their time for their school work and to acquaint themselves with high school ways, therefore the Sophomore class seemed to be the logical class to receive this special training. Each member of this class receives the training and is expected to learn a short selection to be spoken at a preliminary contest held in the assembly hall, from which four boys and four girls are selected to compete for prizes in a public speaking contest. Last year the first prize of \$10.00 was won by Isobel Boutelle, second prize of \$5.00 by Charles Woodward. The other members of the contest were Katherine Lawrence, Flora Abbiatti, Evelyn Wilkins, Edward Wolf, Frank Bernard, Albert Prior, each receiving a prize of \$2.50.

### Prizes

The third award of the clsas of 1921 Prize of \$5.00 was won by Helen Walter. The title of her essay was, "Milford's Memorial to Her Soldiers."

Pearl Mason won a prize of \$15.00 in a nation wide essay contest conducted by the Open Road Magazine. The title of her essay was "Who should be our next President."

Leah Hill and Katherine Lawrence have won prizes of \$3.00 in the "Short Story Contest" conducted by the Boston Traveler.

### Athletics

The pupils are showing much interest in basketball. Last fall every boy and girl who wished to play basketball had a chance to play on one of his class teams. Two basketball courts were made in the field back of the

school and here many interesting inter-class games were played.

Last fall the Monadnock Inter-Scholastic Basketball League was organized. The schools in this league are Jaffrey, Hancock, Marlboro, Milford, Peterboro, Wilton.

Our intra-school and inter-school athletic contests of all kinds are most worthy parts of our school work, but their wholesomeness and permanence depend on their being kept under the control of their proper educational aims. I believe these aims to be three:

1. To promote better health and physical development.
2. To promote training in group activity. To this aim there are several phases: (a) Training in sportsmanship in which playing the game is more important than winning the game; (b) Training in cooperation in the narrower sense of team work; (c) The fostering of school spirit, or cooperation in a larger sense. Inter school contests are the best possible means of making a school conscious of itself as a social group through common aims and interests.
3. To promote wholesome leisure-time recreation. This refers to those who play the game and those who watch it.

## REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

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To Mr. Harold C. Bales, Superintendent of Schools, Milford, N. H.:

The following is my second report of the health work in the Milford Schools, it being the seventh year of this work.

The medical inspection was carried on this fall by Dr. Hinds and myself. A change was made in the regular routine which caused the examination to last over a longer period than previously. This year the doctor substituted a chest examination in place of the eye and ear examination which was done later by the nurse. In this way, each pupil was given a more thorough examination which is a big step ahead in our school health work. There was a noticeable improvement in the condition of the teeth of those pupils who entered the contest at the White School last year. Much credit is due the teachers for stressing the importance of sound teeth and again this year they are working to get 100 per cent perfect teeth for the White School.

This year, our health officer made a firm stand on the enforcement of the vaccination law. As a result, there are at this time no pupils attending school are unvaccinated unless they have presented an excuse acceptable to the Health officer.

This fall, an effort has been made to provide milk at recess for those pupils who need it. The experiment is being tried out at the White School through the cooperation of the teachers. The children order and pay for their milk a week in advance.

At present the cost is eighteen cents a school week for a half pint of milk with a straw and one graham cracker daily. Many of the children need some nourishment at the morning recess and we feel that the milk

is much better than candy and pastry. We may later extend the milk service to the Brick School if enough of the parents are interested in providing it for their children.

We have indeed been fortunate this year in avoiding so far an epidemic of scarlet fever which has been prevalent in neighboring towns. We have had a few scattered cases but through the efforts of our health officer, school doctor, and parents, an epidemic has been prevented.

The report of Dr. Hinds gives a tabulated account of the medical inspection.

Of the deaths in town in 1924 22 were carried out of town for burial: Fitchburg, Mass., 1; Quincy, Mass., 1; Groton, Mass. 1; Manchester, N. H., 2; and the others to other towns of N.H.

Fourteen were brought from away for burial. Some were long ago residents. Of the 55 deaths recorded 3 were between 90 and 100; 7 between 80 and 90; 12 between 70 and 80; 12 between 60 and 70; 5 between 50 and 60; 5 between 40 and 50; 3 between 30 and 40; and 8 under 16. Of these deaths 31 were male and 24 female. One or both parents of 20 were born in other countries.

The Vital Statistics of a town are one of its most important records, not merely for today but for generations to come. If everyone would see to it that the records of their own families were correctly and fully filled out on Marriage, Birth and Death certificates when handed in, it might be of great use to them and their descendants at some future day, and a great help to us in making out the records of today.

## REPORT OF TOWN FOREST COMMITTEE

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In accordance with the resolution adopted at the last annual town meeting, requesting the selectmen to "appoint a committee to investigate the merits of the Town Forest proposition and report at the next town meeting" the committee submits the following:

The proposition submitted with the various plans suggested for developing it has been carefully examined from every possible angle, and is approved as a matter of considerable value and importance to the town.

Its early value will be largely educational. A tract of waste land, even a few acres, properly planted and cared for would be an object lesson and a stimulating influence to individual land owners to plant trees and reforest their cut-off lots and care for the other sections where natural seeding has occurred.

A Town Forest should be readily accessible, although not necessarily near a village. Realizing this diligent search has been made, but the committee is not yet able to make any definite recommendation as to purchase or acquirement. But we believe such a piece of land will be found at no very distant date and therefore recommend that a committee for the purpose of continuing this work be appointed by the selectmen until the idea is successfully developed and demonstrated.

There is abundant evidence both in this country and in Europe to prove that the Town Forest idea is economically sound and capable of furnishing substantial money returns, besides the advantages of opportunities for recreation in many forms.
