



STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Newmarket qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Tuesday, the eighth day of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

- Art. 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- Art. 2. To elect by ballot one trustee, one for the term of three years as required by Chapter 162 of the Laws of 1915, being an act in relation to trust funds held by cities and towns.
- Art. 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriation for the same. That is to say: To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for General Government, including town officers' salaries, town officers' expenses, election and registration, and town hall; for Protection of Persons and Property, including the police department, the fire department, moth extermination and the extermination of the white pine blister rust; for Health and Sanitation, including the health department, vital statistics, sewer maintenance; for Highways and Bridges, including state aid maintenance, town maintenance, sidewalks, street lighting and general expenses of the department; for Education, including the public library; for Charities, including the town poor; for Patriotic Purposes, including decoration of soldiers' graves; for Recreation, including band concerts; for Public Service Enterprises, including water utility; for Cemeteries; for Interest; for New Construction and Improvements, including state aid and town construction; for Indebtedness Payments, including the payment of notes and bonds; for Payments to Other Governmental Divisions, including state and county taxes; and to pay all other necessary charges arising within the town.
- Art. 4. To see if the town will vote and appropriate the sum of \$4,600 now due on the Mead-Morrison Tractor.
 - Art. 5. To see if the town will vote to adopt the caucus law.
- Art. 6. To see if the town will vote to extend the State Road from its present terminus near the residence of Daniel J. Brady towards Wadley's Falls to the Lee line, and raise and appropriate money therefor.
- Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to extend the Water Works from Durell's Corner to the Plains Corner, and raise and appropriate the money therefor.
- Art. 8. To see if the town will vote to continue the State road from the top of Young's hill so-called, on the Epping road to Four Corners.

Your buildings, on the whole, are in good condition and you have reason to be proud of your high school building. There are some changes or repairs that must be made. The new fence around the primary playground is something that will relieve the anxiety of parents who have pupils attending the primary schools.

I wish to urge attention to the necessity for provision for athletic activities for the high school pupils. Steps are being taken to screen the windows and lights of the auditorium. This will make possible practice in basket ball, but the room is too small for regular games and some other place would make this form of activity more satisfactory. Work was begun on the baseball field, and a satisfactory diamond will no doubt be available in the spring.

One other matter I wish to urge upon the attention of some of the citizens; the importance of at least a high school education for every boy and girl. There are many just waiting until they are sixteen, or are able to pass the eighth grade, in order to leave school and go to work. Experience has taught us that the four years of study in the high school will more than double a person's earning capacity. This from the economic standpoint proves that it pays from the standpoint of dollars and cents to get a high school education.

I wish to thank you for your cordial welcome, and for the help you have given me in my work in your schools.
