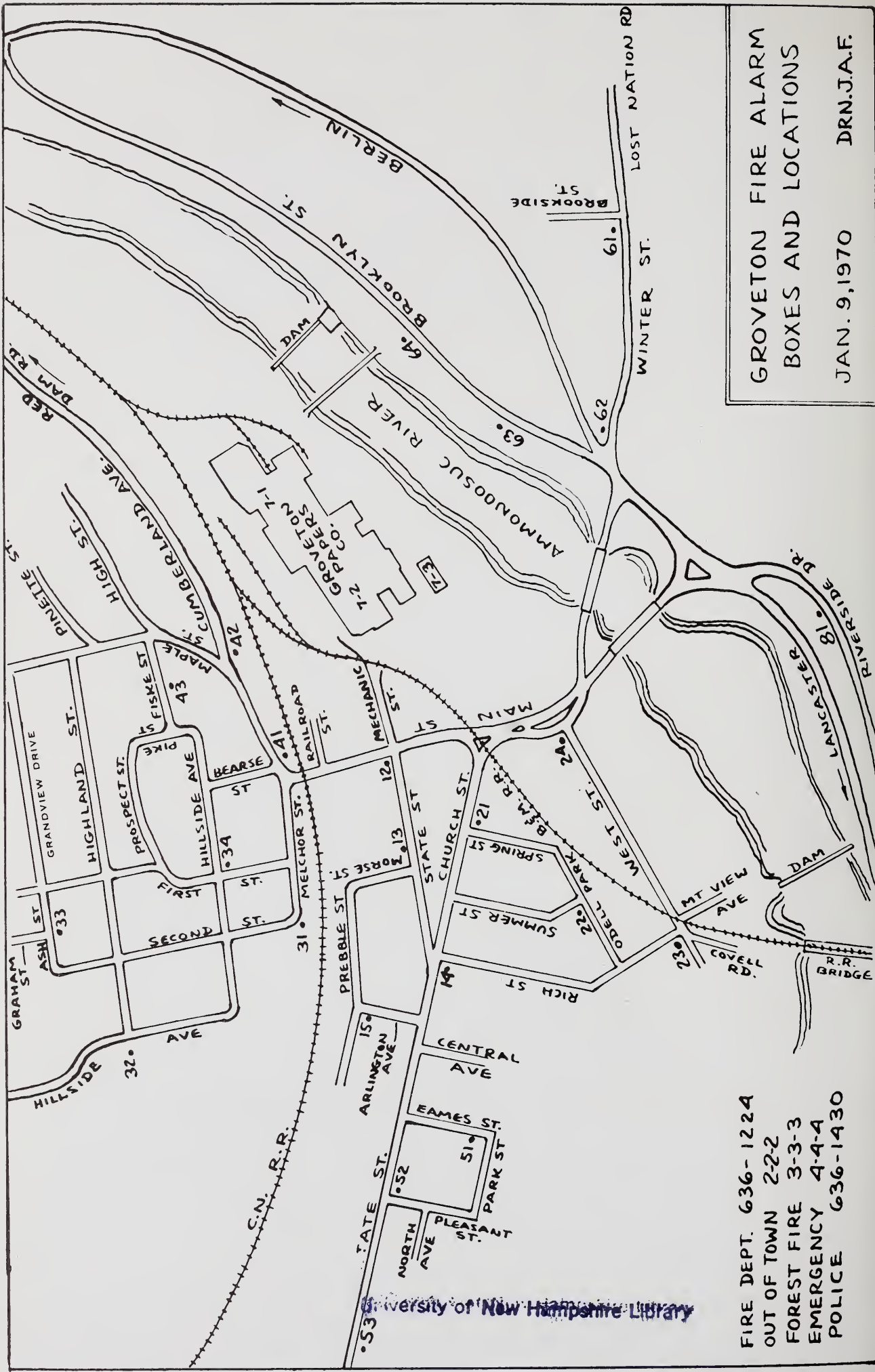

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

1978 saw our Senior Citizen housing completed and occupied. Named Melcher Court in honor of the Melcher hotel that stood in that location when our town was young, it is almost fully occupied.

As anticipated last year, the reservoir fence is complete.

Our Town Crew is to be saluted in that the dump has met the approval of the EPA and the State without the expenditure of \$10,000 or \$15,000, the amount we had been advised would be necessary. They also installed part of the storm drain system on State Street doing the job for \$2000 less than anticipated by the Anderson-Nichols engineer. The cooperation of Bob and Edna Styles granting an easement across their property also helped to reduce the cost of the project. Our sincere thanks to them.

The Lost Nation chlorinator was constructed, a new sidewalk made in front of Melcher Court, and a police cruiser purchased. The incinerator and garbage collection are going well as people are cooperating much better on separation.

Two projects were delayed. Roaring Brook flood control was held over because of lack of bids and the repair of the railroad crossings on Church and Main Streets delayed because the paper work was not completed in time so work could be done while the weather was good. Both are slated for 1979.

The Moose Club purchased and presented to the Town "Resusci Annie" a working model to be used by our ambulance crew in their rescue work. We have a dedicated group of people and the Town is most grateful to them remembering not everyone can do that sort of work.

A contract was signed with the firm of Whitman & Howard to do the water study required by law. A meeting was held with members of the Water Supply & Pollution Control Commission, Anderson-Nichols and the Board of Selectmen for revision of Phase II plans which entailed the rewriting of the contract for those plans. The Board felt that the solution offered for Northumberland as too expensive and requested the meeting. The plans and contract are yet to be finalized.

At this time we wish to thank Diamond Internationasl for the new park which adds to our "green spot" at the corners of State and Main Streets. Benches were donated by the estate of Alice Mayberry and the Bicentennial Committee made a donation towards its completion as part of its on-going plans formulated in 1976. A new sidewalk, put in by our Town Crew, made the picture complete.

Our town continues to grow and move ahead. Proof of the fact is that fourteen building permits were issued for new homes, two permits for new barns and an extenstion on the mill. We can again report that the Town is in good financial condition, a fact to which not many towns can lay claim.

M E M O F R O M T H E O F F I C E O F
T O W N C L E R K & T A X C O L L E C T O R

My office hours will be changed to coincide with those of the Town Manager and Selectmen's Secretary. As of April 1st the hours will be 9:00 to 12:00 AM and 1:00 to 4:00 PM, Monday thru Friday.

To renew a registration you must have a copy of your current registration with you, your current year's resident tax must be paid and you may obtain the renewal only during your month of birth - not before. This year the state is issuing new reflectorized plates at a cost of \$1.00 per plate to you. If you wish to retain your same number you may do so at a cost of \$5.00 more. Commercial initial plates are no longer available upon renewal. On transfers you are charged according to the months left until your registration expiration date. This means when purchasing a new vehicle try and pick it up so that your twenty-day temporary plates will take you into the first of the next month - you can save from \$3.00 to \$10.00 in town tax fees. If you plan on buying a vehicle out of state or from a private sale there are forms available at my office that may make the transaction easier for you. Vehicles older than 1969 no longer require a title.

Dog tags are now available for 1979. Please bring in last year's license, or a copy of the current rabies certificate and a spayed or neutered certification.

The Bureau of Vital Statistics has closed the birth, marriage and death records to the public. Records open to the public are, birth records prior to 1901, and marriage and death records prior to 1938. Closed records can only be obtained by showing an immediate family relationship.

Marriage intention regulations have also been changed. To obtain a marriage license both parties must appear in person, have a valid blood test, proof of age, and copies of death records or divorce decrees if applicable. Most important is the five day waiting period which can not be avoided without going before the County Probate Officer.

Absentee voting is available at all elections. If you wish to vote absentee - please notify this office and I will see that you receive an application and ballot. All absentee ballots must be back in the office by 5:00 PM the day preceding the election.

Voter registration forms are available with me if you are not yet on the check-list. You must appear in person to fill this form out.

Property taxes can be paid in advance at anytime - in any amount.

A discount is offered on a minimum payment of \$100.00 only: 3% by June 1st, 2% by August 1st, and 1% by October 1st. The annual tax sale on delinquent property taxes, as set by state law, will be held in May. To avoid extra cost to you - please keep this in mind. Part payments will help keep the interest down. If real estate property has changed, or is changing ownership, the state holds the owner as of April 1st responsible for the entire year's levy. The entire year being April 1st of the current year to March 31st of the following year.

Delinquent resident tax accounts will be processed through small claims court at the individual's expense in July as usual. A husband is, by law, liable for his wife.

Water and sewer accounts are payable quarterly, semi-annually or annually, however you prefer, in those due amounts. Those accounts overdue from 1978 will be shut off at the owner's expense in May or June.

Mobile home owners have increased greatly in our town and are required by law to report to the town their presence. Copies of these laws are available at your park supervisor's office.

Any comments or suggestions as to whether this is of interest or informative and should become part of the annual town report will be greatly appreciated.

1979 INVENTORIES

RSA 74-7a requires the timely filing of a complete inventory. Failure to do so will result in a fine not less than \$10 or more than \$50. The right to appeal any taxes or exemptions is lost if the inventory is not on file in the Selectmen's office. Due date is April 15, 1979.

1979 will see the start of a new policy by the Selectmen to receive inventories. COMPLETED inventories will be accepted at the Town office during regular working hours. For those who have questions and feel they need help, the Selectmen at a later date will post hours they will sit to assist.

It is essential that these forms be COMPLETELY filled out and SIGNED. Please note in preparation there is a section for Veterans, Elderly and Blind exemptions. This also must be SIGNED. Under Current Use, the same applies.

Information from these forms helps determine the Town's share of revenues from different sources and these in turn effect our tax rate.

For more than 80 years, a cooperative effort between the State of New Hampshire and local forest fire authorities has created a forest fire prevention and suppression program that is recognized as superior throughout the United States.

Since the first forest fire laws were written in 1895, the state and local community governments have worked together to prevent and combat forest fires.

Today, 249 forest fire wardens and more than 1,800 deputy wardens are appointed every three years by the State Forester to work with the members of the State Forest Fire staff in this effort. State funds are used to pay one-half the cost of forest fire suppression costs incurred by local forest fire organizations, within pay rates established by the Governor and Council. State funds matched by local funds are used to purchase hand tools to suppress forest fires, to train local forest fire crews and in forest fire prevention work.

All outside burning, when the ground is not covered with snow, is permitted only after obtaining a written fire permit from your local Forest Fire Warden. Penalty for burning without a permit when one is required is a misdemeanor punishable by a fine up to \$1,000 or a jail term of up to one year or both.

GROVETON FOUNDATION

The Groveton Foundation meals program is operated by volunteers and the Retired Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP). During 1978 over 3000 meals were served with attendance falling off during the winter months. The meals are prepared six times during the year by the Home Economics Class of Groveton High School taught by Mrs. Sue Buteau, a service which is much appreciated by the Foundation.

Trips are planned during the year and in July sixteen Senior Citizens visited the Heritage House in Glen and on October 27th Bruce Sloat demonstrated the workings of his cider mill in Lost Nation to twenty interested visitors.

Courses were offered but not enough interest was shown to obtain someone to teach them. However, Joy Keddy and Lorraine Merrow held classes for Hallowe'en, Thanksgiving and Christmas, interest was shown in the Colonial weaving class and Patricia Gregory of Lancaster gave lessons in sandpainting in November.

The RSVP program started in June of 1977 and there are eighteen active members, fifteen of which are under the age of 60. Recognition Day was held for these members at the Spalding Inn in Whitefield in October.

The fourth anniversary of the Foundation was in October 1978. A great deal more could be done for the Seniors if enough interest was shown by them to take part in the programs offered.

GROVETON TOWN FOREST ACTIVITY

This past summer, the Groveton town forest was one of the several sites in the county to be used as a training site for a CETA funded Timber Stand Improvement team. The project, which was funded by the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA), was sponsored by the County Conservation District and supervised by the Coos County Extension forester.

The project goal was to train individuals in the techniques of performing Timber Stand Improvement (TSI) work such as weeding and thinning in immature stands of timber. On the town forest, the team completed about 30 acres of TSI in immature stands of hardwood. Undesirable poor quality stems that were crowding or over-topping future high quality crop trees were either cut or girdled thus releasing the better trees to improved growing conditions.

The Groveton Ambulance Corp was very active in 1978. The Corp provided emergency care to patients on 111 emergency calls and 22 transfer calls. Among the emergencies treated were injuries ranging from suspected fractures to multiple fractures, burns, coronaries, overdoses, and automobile injuries. The Corp maintains a 24 hour, seven day-a-week service with 12 fulltime crew members and 8 parttime members. All crew members are licensed by the State of New Hampshire.

Our ambulance corp, which is directed by Mr. Wilfred Dumas, has passed all state inspections and maintains equipment above that which is required. Among the pieces of equipment are the Life-Pac, which is used when necessary on heart attack victims; a Porta-Power, which provides efficient extrication of patients from automobiles; a Build-A-Board, which is used for a combination of leg, back, neck and head injuries; and a chair stretcher which facilitates the safe and efficient removal of patients in upstairs and compact dwellings where is it virtually impossible to use a stretcher.

Our Corp was allowed to purchase a "Resusci-Anne" by funds generously donated by the Groveton Moose Club. A "Resusci-Baby" was purchased by funds earned by the ambulance corp. The "Resusci-Anne" and "Resusci-Baby" are used for classes and practice by crew members to become and remain qualified in CPR (Cardi-Pulmonary Resuscitation).

We would like to extend an invitation to individuals who are qualified and would like to become a crew member. Your services will be welcome and are needed.

We wish to thank all crew members, Dr. Robert Hinkley, and the townspeople for their continued support throughout this year.

NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL, INC.

REPORT FOR 1978

In Northumberland, North Country Council assisted in preparing a HUD community development preapplication and full application for needed storm drainage improvements. Coordinated a meeting with FMHA on Water Supply.

The North Country Council continued to make substantial progress in 1978 by providing services in the following areas:

Planning Services: Providing local technical assistance to member communities continued to consume a good amount of Council time. Areas of assistance include: master planning, subdivision regulations, zoning, reviewing development proposals, mobile homes, grantsmanship, etc. Through a grant from the Farmers Home Administration, NCC will have the services of a project planner and planning engineer to further assist communities in water supply, solid waste and review of development proposals.

Economic Development: NCC updated its Overall Economic Development Program, a requirement which entitles the North Country to EDA grants and loans. The Council also completed a Wood Energy Study and a Downtown Improvement Program for one town. Through the resources of the University of New Hampshire, a business counseling program is being developed. Federal and state agencies use the Council's work as a guide for future public investments.

Preparation of Regional Plans: In 1978, the Council adopted and published both the Land Use Element and the Housing Element. Both of these documents provide a broad framework for action in these two areas. In the area of solid waste, the Council has coordinated a number of meetings with the NH Air Pollution Control Commission, Division of Public Health and sponsored a meeting on solid waste disposal in January 1979. The Council has continued to make progress in the Public Transportation Program. NCC also coordinated with the NH Department of Public Works and Highways in the annual meeting to receive local input on needed highway improvements. Much of the Council's time is spent responding to request from Selectmen on various planning matters. Fact sheets have been prepared on soils and community planning, wetlands, and master planning. Other educational documents will be prepared in 1979.

North Country Perspective: NCC continues to respond to opportunities to provide a North Country perspective to federal and state policies. NCC represented the area in a 3-day workshop as part of the Farmers Home Administration's national assessment of rural community facilities. Council members represent the North Country on the State's "208" Water Quality Program, solid waste program and other areas. The Council testified before the NH House subcommittee on Growth.

Education and Information: For the third consecutive year, the North Country Council co-sponsored the six municipal law lectures. A special workshop was held on the development of small hydro sites. NCC also sponsored a North Country meeting of bankers, real estate agents, local officials, and other development interests to inform them of the opportunities under the NH Housing Finance Agency's mortgage program. With the advent of Planning Profiles, the Council's monthly newsletter, NCC is making an effort to keep local officials and interested persons up-to-date on Council programs and other related planning activities.

In a further effort to solicit local input on planning projects, the Council has been holding a series of subregional meetings around the North Country.

In 1979, the Council expects to provide more services to local officials to help them carry out the goals of their own towns. The newly-funded Area Development Assistance Program will provide greater assistance to communities. NCC will be working on an energy program to determine the practicality of developing indigenous energy resources. Requests for community planning services will increase.

Membership in the Council over the last five years has increased from five members in 1973 to forty active members in 1978. A good deal of service has been provided in that period and it is hoped that more can be provided in the years ahead. Ideas on how the Council can be of greater assistance to towns are welcomed. The Board of Directors and all the members of the North Country Council greatly appreciate the support received from the towns. This support has enabled the Council to provide its planning services for the region and local communities.

I N F O R M A T I O N P E R T A I N I N G T O
K E E P E R S O F D O G S

Every keeper of a dog three months old or over shall annually, on or before April thirtieth license their dog in the office of the Town Clerk. A tag will be furnished which shall be worn by the dog. Before a license is issued, the keeper of the dog shall furnish to the clerk a certification that said dog has been vaccinated against rabies. The fee for a license for a year shall be \$3.50 for a neutered male or spayed female dog: \$6.00 for an unneutered male and \$6.50 for an unspayed female dog. If said dog has been neutered or spayed a certificate from the person performing the operation must be furnished to the clerk. Kennel licenses are also available for keepers of 5 or more dogs, with proportionate fees. There is an additional fee of a dollar for each month's delay in licensing a dog after June 1st. The selectmen of each town annually within ten days of June 1st., issues a warrant to the police department directing them to proceed forthwith either to collect the fees due or cause to be killed all dogs not licensed.

A dog will be deemed a nuisance if it barks for sustained periods of time, or during the night hours as to disturb the peace and quiet of a neighborhood area; if it digs, scratches or excretes or causes waste or garbage to be scattered on the property of other than its owner; if it is permitted to run at large or to be off the premises of the owner; and if in heat it is used for hunting. A dog shall be deemed a menace if it growls, snaps at, runs after or chases any person, bicycle, motor vehicle, motorcycle or other vehicle being driven, pulled or pushed on the streets, highways or public ways. A dog shall be deemed vicious, if, whether alone or in a pack with other dogs, it bites, attacks or preys on game animals, domestic animals, fowl or human beings. The fines for these offenses are: nuisance \$10.00, menace \$15.00 or vicious \$25.00. Notices of offenses are given by the police department, payable at the office of the town clerk within 4 days of the given notice.

TOWN WARRANT

TOWN OF NORTHUMBERLAND
THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the inhabitants of the Town of Northumberland qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Groveton High School Auditorium in said Town on the Second Tuesday in March next, March 13, 1979, to act upon the subjects hereinafter mentioned. You are hereby warned that on said date and place the polls will be opened at 10:00 o'clock in the forenoon and will remain open until 6:00 o'clock in the afternoon for the reception of your ballots under the Non-Partisan Ballot System, (Articles 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6). You are also hereby warned that on said date and place at 7:00 o'clock in the evening the matter of appropriations and such other business properly coming before said meeting will be taken up for your consideration and action.

ARTICLE 1. To choose by ballot the following Town Officers for the ensuing two years: one Auditor.

ARTICLE 2. To choose by ballot the following Town Officers for the ensuing three years: one Selectman, one Trustee of the Trust Funds, and one Library Trustee.

ARTICLE 3. To choose by ballot the following Town Officers for the ensuing five years: one Supervisor of the Check Lists.

ARTICLE 4. To choose by ballot a Representative to the General Court to fulfill a vacancy caused by resignation.

ARTICLE 5. To vote by ballot to see if the Town will continue the Town Manager plan. (Inserted by petition of 29 voters)

ARTICLE 6. To vote by ballot to see if the Town will introduce flourides into the public water system. (Inserted by petition of 110 voters)

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will appropriate \$2878 of Federal Anti-Recession funds to help maintain present level of employment for snow removal.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate up to \$6000 of Federal Anti-Recession funds which may be received for the purpose of maintaining or increasing employment for services delivered under budget heading "Summer Maintenance."

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$106,109.25, together with any interest accrued thereon, from the separate water and sewer account (said sum being the remainder of the amount of the net settlement received from EPA on the Town's Sewage Abatement Project) for use by the Selectmen toward the expense of study, planning or construction, or any combination thereof, of the storm drainage and sewer systems for Groveton Village, the sewage disposal system for Northumberland Village and the water system for Northumberland Village, and further, if appropriate, to use said sum as matching

funds for any monies obtainable for such purposes from any state or federal source, the Selectmen being hereby authorized to make application for funds for such purposes to any state or federal agency.

ARTICLE 10. To see what sums of money the Town will vote to raise and appropriate to defray the following Town charges for the ensuing year: (1) Town Officers' Salaries; (2) Town Officers' Expenses; (3) Election and Registration; (4) Municipal Court; (5) Town Hall & Other Buildings; (6) Police Department; (7) Fire, including Forest Fire; (8) Blister Rust and Care of Trees; (9) Planning & Zoning; (10) Insurance; (11) Civil Defense; (12) Health Department: Hospital, Mental Health, Ambulance & Nursing Services; (13) Dump Maintenance; (14) Town Road Aid; (15) Town Maintenance - Summer; (16) Town Maintenance - Winter; (17) Street Lighting; (18) General Expense Highway Department; (19) Gasoline Purchases/Sales; (20) Street Maintenance; (21) Railroad Crossings; (22) Sidewalk Maintenance; (23) Library; (24) Town Poor; (25) Old Age Assistance; (26) Aid to Permanent and Totally Disabled; (27) Memorial Day; (28) Parks & Playgrounds; (29) Sewer Department (Fees); (30) Water Department (Fees); (31) Cemeteries; (32) Damage & Legal Expenses; (33) Advertising & Regional Assns.; (34) Retirement and Social Security; (35) Senior Citizens; (36) No. Country Council & Alpha House; (37) Principal on Sewer Bonds; (38) Interest on Sewer Bonds.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to administer and dispose of any real estate acquired by Tax Collector's Deeds at private sale, as the Selectmen, in their sole discretion, deem equitable and just. (RSA 80:42 (I and III))

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to establish a Capital Reserve fund for replacing the bridge between Northumberland and Guildhall and to raise and appropriate the sum of \$36,000 for deposit in such fund.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, in their sole discretion, to discontinue the use of, or demolish, the old Town Garage so called.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the second ambulance, proceeds received from such sale to be applied against the ambulance appropriation.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from the Revenue Sharing Fund the sum of \$18,000 to purchase a two ton truck and sander for Town use, the old truck and sander to be sold by sealed bid and the proceeds to be paid into the General Fund.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$750 for the Whitefield Regional Airport as requested by the Airport Commission in their estimated revenues for 1979. (Inserted by petition of 12 voters)

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6.45 per month plus fuel adjustment charge for a street light to be placed on the corner of Wemyss Drive and Route 110. (Inserted by petition of 12 voters)

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5000 to purchase and install a Chlorinator on the Northumberland Village Water System, and provide necessary accessories for same, such sum to be withdrawn from the Capital Reserve Fund.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will vote to establish a scale of discounts for the prepayment of real estate taxes. The scale of discounts to be as follows: 3% if paid on or before June 1, 1979; 2% if paid on or before August 1, 1979; and 1% if paid on or before October 1, 1979. Discount will be allowed on \$100 minimum payment.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to appoint all other Officers as required by law.

ARTICLE 21. To hear reports of agents, auditors, committees, or other officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 22. To transact any other business that may be legally brought before said meeting.

S U P E R I N T E N D E N T ' S R E P O R T

As the 1978-1979 school year began, students and staff members encountered some significant changes in the school buildings which ranged from minor remodeling projects to the completion of the new wing at the high school.

The Elementary School had blackboards, floor tiles, and ceilings replaced in several locations. A major plan for updating the entire kitchen facility was approved for 100% federal and state funding, amounting to over \$23,000 in modern, efficient, high-volume food service equipment. The design for the kitchen called for a relocation of the dry storage area to the cul-de-sac in the lower corridor by the rear kitchen entrance. This not only provides for a well lit, clean, and easily accessible storage location for the kitchen, but the construction of the new storage room has significantly improved the visible appearance of a former problem area of the basement corridor.

Additional space changes were made possible with the closure of the Experimental Schools Project which vacated a third floor room. The room has been converted to a teachers' lounge and work room, allowing for a four-fold increase in their facility. The old teachers' room in the basement, with the addition of partitions and appropriate plumbing, was converted into a very adequate nurse's room and speech therapist's station. A small, unused storage room off the cafeteria was cleaned out, refinished, and sound-controlled, and now serves as a music lesson room which does not interfere acoustically with academic instruction in the classrooms. A privacy unit was also constructed around the lavatory in the special education room which assists the teachers in providing personal care for the children. By converting the former nurse's room on the second floor to a resource room for the special education program, a room at the Methodist Church was able to be vacated.

The Title I program, a federally funded project for thirty children in grades 1-6, provides tutoring for students in reading, language arts, and mathematics. The children, who are selected for the program on teacher recommendation, classroom performance, and test results, receive about a half hour per day of individual and small group tutoring in areas in which improvement of skills is desirable. The program is constantly changing to reflect the needs of the children. Parents, teachers, and Title I staff are members of an advisory committee which continually monitors the project and provide direction for its future development.

The major addition to the Groveton High School begun in December of 1977, has been completed and is now in full use by the students. The addition includes a variety of much needed facilities to upgrade the standards and services of the overall high school program. The wood shop was relocated in the new wing in a spacious, modern facility designed ultimately to accommodate a full industrial arts program, including woodworking, metalworking, small engine repair, welding, plastics, electronics, and other facets of industrial applications.

The old shop area was refitted to include the library and appropriate reading areas, which increased the library's space to over eight times its previous facility.

Included also in the new wing is a special education classroom and specially fitted lavatories for the handicapped. The rear of the music room saw the construction of individual, sound-proof practice rooms, which eliminated the need for students to practice in the open corridor. Locker rooms were increased in size and improved to accommodate more students, and to eliminate the former over-crowded conditions which existed for visiting teams during sporting events. The former study hall and library were converted into classroom spaces on the second floor, which allowed for the expansion of the home economics classroom into an adjacent space which was previously used as a classroom.

One of the most significant changes brought about by the addition was the inclusion of a cafeteria. This facility eliminated the need for students to leave school grounds during the day for lunch, and provided the building with additional large-group study and meeting space. Since the cafeteria can feed one third of the school at a time, and since flexibility in scheduling resulted from a closed-campus lunch program, the school day was able to be shortened without cutting down on instructional time. The kitchen was equipped with federal and state funds separate from the Public Works funding for the rest of the addition. In all, over \$19,000 in equipment was provided, 75% of which was funded through the State Food and Nutrition office. Mrs. Faye Young and her staff have made commendable progress in organizing and operating a kitchen which has a 75% participation daily (the national average for high school lunch participation is below 50%).

Enrollments for both schools has not changed significantly from last year, and has been relatively stable for the past five years. Future projections indicate that little change, up or down, is expected within the next few years. The current enrollments by grade are:

Kindergarten - 44; Gr. 1 - 39; Gr. 2 - 49; Gr. 3 - 53;
Gr. 4 - 51; Gr. 5 - 48; Gr. 6 - 49; Gr. 7 - 62; Gr. 8 -
72; Gr. 9 - 73; Gr. 10 - 55; Gr. 11 - 64; Gr. 12 - 55.

Another factor affecting both schools this year has been the state mandated accountability plan. To implement this plan, which would establish learning outcome and achievement goals at grades 4, 8, and 12 in the disciplines of Mathematics, Language Arts, and U.S. and N.H. History and Government, a committee of teachers, parents, students, citizens, school board members, and administrators has been working on the timetables and guidelines. The plan, which will be using a standardized test to determine the achievement of the goals and objectives, is designed to report progress to the community on a periodic basis and to continually update, through an agreed upon management plan, those goals and other priorities of the accountability unit. The State Department of Education has established an "accountability unit" to assist school districts in their planning, and several school district representatives took part in a three-day workshop designed to prepare administrators for the changes and requirements under the state plan.

Allied to the board concept of accountability, although not a part of the state's mandated program, is the upcoming voluntary evaluation of the Groveton High School by the New England Association of Schools and Colleges. This evaluation, done every ten years for member schools, is a thorough examination of the school's program of instruction, physical facilities, curriculum, staff organizational qualifications, philosophy, student activities, and all other operational components of the school. The staff, administration, and students are currently preparing for the evaluation by performing the necessary committee work prior to the visit by the on-site team of evaluators next fall. A successful evaluation will result in an extension of the school's accreditation status with New England Association of Schools and Colleges. Results of this study will be made available once the process has been completed.

An evaluation - mandated by the State Special Education Department - took place this fall of the district's special education program. Because of the early start in providing for special education children, a number of commendations were cited for staff and administrators for having programs that are in compliance with the spirit as well as the letter of Public Law 94-142, the "Education for all Handicapped" act.

The school board and teaching staff negotiated a contractual agreement and salary schedule for a two year period, with the assistance of a professional mediator. The negotiations process will not resume until autumn of 1981, for any contractual adjustments contemplated for the 1982-83 school year and beyond.

The administration is gratified with the support and assistance shown by the community in the operation and management of the school district this past year. The partnership between the community and the schools is aimed at achieving the very best education for the young people that we can provide, and with your continued support, interest, participation, and help, we will endeavor to achieve that goal for these youngsters and their future.

SUMMARY OF ESP ACTIVITIES 1978
(JANUARY-JUNE)

When funded by the National Institute of Education (NIE) the local Experimental Schools (ES) project was charged with the development of a community centered school which:

- a. utilizes available human and natural resources to foster positive attitudes toward learning;
- b. provides individuals with the basic psychomotor skills which will enable them to realize personal goals; and
- c. utilizes community resource facilities as a basis for lifetime learning opportunities.

NIE funding of the local ES project terminated as of July 1st, 1978.

In 1978 the onus was upon Union 58 schools to infuse ES project activities and programs into local curricula. The project's sole responsibility in 1978 was to monitor and document this on-going process of infusions; to determine how local schools best utilize opportunities for change which are made available to them.

CAREER/VOCATIONAL EDUCATION

From 1973-1978 the project staff and local teachers developed a total of 114 Career Awareness Program (CAP) QUICK CARDS. These lessons and units provided the basis for K-12 students' career awareness - exploration - skills development.

Instructional materials were purchased and placed in classrooms and in resource room facilities established by ESP at the several schools. These materials are available for teacher/student use on a continuous basis.

Community resource people have gone into Union 58 classrooms as guest speakers - to discuss their careers and occupations with students.

Community resource sites have been used as student skills development worksites and for field trips. Resource people have taught mini courses and supervised students' training at worksites.

LANGUAGE ARTS

The ES project purchased the Scott, Foresman leveled reading series which become the basis of the K-6 reading program.

The ES project developed basic communications skills list which was revised at Groveton Elementary School and is being used as the basis for a continuous, integrated, and sequential curriculum.

Instructional materials were purchased and placed in classrooms and in resource room facilities established by ESP at the several schools.

Three issues of Kid's Corner were published from January - May 1978. The January issue displayed the creative talents of grades one through three students at the Stark Village School, the March issue was for Groveton Elementary School students alone, and the May issue was done by K-6 students at the Stratford School.

ENVIRONMENTAL/OUTDOOR EDUCATION

From 1973-1978 the project staff and local teachers developed a total of one hundred and twenty-five Student Environmental Awareness (SEA) QUICK CARDS. These lessons and units provided the basis for K-12 students' awareness and exploration of the life space environment.

Instructional materials were purchased and placed in classrooms and in resource room facilities established by ESP at the several schools.

Weekend camping and hiking equipment was purchased by ESP and turned over to the high school outing clubs for their use.

Students have been taken on field trips for purposes of exposure to the community environment. Resource people have visited classrooms as guest speakers.

REPORTS

From January-June 1978 several reports were developed for the Superintendent of Schools, the ESP COUNCIL, and the several district school boards.

These reports have provided information re: how to infuse career education and environmental education into the curriculum.
