THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

TOWN WARRANT

To the inhabitants of the Town of Troy in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the 10th day of March next at 7:30 P.M. in the evening to act upon the following subjects:

The polls for the election of officers for the coming year will open at 11:00 A.M., and will close not earlier than 6 P.M. on the above date.

Article 1. To choose a town clerk, one selectman for three years, and all other town officers.

Article 2. To see what action the town will take upon the recommended budget submitted by the budget committee.

Article 3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray the following expenditures for the ensuing year:

- a. Town officers' salaries.
- b. Town officers' expenses.
- c. Election and registration.
- d. Town Hall and other buildings.
- e. Parks and playgrounds.
- f. Legal fees and vital statistics.
- g. Motor vehicle permits.
- h. Insurance.
- i. Employees retirement and social security.
- j. Interest on temporary loans.
- k. County tax.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for snow removal, salting and sanding.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for necessary highway oiling.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for general highway maintenance.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$341.95, to which the State will contribute \$2,279.64 if voted and accepted for the construction and maintenance of Class 5 roads.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200.00 for the purchase of a power tail-gate spreader for the town truck.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to discontinue, subject to gates and bars, the highway starting at the Lloyd corner so-called to a point approximately 200 feet north of the Lowe Farm so-called.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to allow a discount on all taxes excepting poll and head taxes, paid on or before dates designated at this meeting.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for street lighting.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the support of the fire department.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the police department.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to elect the members of the budget committee rather than appoint, to take effect at the annual meeting of 1960 if passed, electing three members at each successive town meeting, maintaining the present committee of nine members.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the maintenance and operation of the Water Works, the amount requested by the water commission as being \$4,000.00.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote the sum of \$4,000.00 for payment of the water bonds, and \$1,395.00 for interest thereon.

Article 17. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to extend the present water system from the residence of Roland Frazier, north to the residence of Joseph Hornichak, with necessary hydrants etc., or take any action relating thereto.

Article 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to extend the present water system from the residence of Roland Frazier, north on route No. 12 as far as the New England Tel. & Tel. Co. pole No. 347½, which is just northwest of the Bowers store, with necessary hydrants etc., or take any action relating thereto.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the employment of a district nurse.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$835.00 toward the operating cost of the Elliot Community Hospital.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care of the town dump.

Article 22. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the observance of Memorial Day.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the continuation of the War Memorial Program.

Article 24. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the support of the library.

Article 25. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the care and improvement of cemeteries.

Article 26. To see if the town will vote to authorize the cemetery committee to negotiate for the purchase of a piece of property for a cemetery, the committee to act in the best interest of the town.

Article 27. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to purchase land for sewerage disposal beds, and if necessary to purchase to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed one thousand dollars, or take any action relating thereto.

Article 28. To see if the town will raise the sum of \$200.00 to the Monadnock Regional Association.

Article 29. To see if the town will vote to instruct the selectmen to borrow money to pay the necessary town charges.

Article 30. To hear the reports of agents, officers or committees, heretofore chosen, and take any action relating thereto.

TROY WAR MEMORIAL PROGRAM COMMITTEE REPORT

The 1958 season at the Sand Dam had several innovations. First and most important was the participation of the Fitzwilliam children in the program on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. The Town of Fitzwilliam paid \$300.00 for the use of the area and coverage by our waterfront and athletic instructors. During the noon lunch period the Fitzwilliam youngsters were chaperoned by adults from Fitzwilliam. The greatest problem in this respect was our own Troy youngsters who were at the Sand Dam during the noon hour and had no supervision at this time.

Participation of the Fitzwilliam youngsters in our program added no appreciable problem to our director and the extra children present made it much easier to have many events which could not have been done with a smaller number of children.

The next biggest item was the digging of a well and the installation of a bubbler for drinking water. This had been necessary ever since the program started and was much appreciated by all who used the Sand Dam. The water was tested by both the health officer in Keene and by the State Health Department and was found to be acceptable.

A third major capital improvement was the resurfacing of the tennis courts which improved them considerably and sealed them so it would have been possible to build a lip and flood them for ice skating during the winter. However, it was found on surveying that one corner of the tennis court was about 19-20 inches lower than the rest and the building of a lip to contain water would have required a major construction dike.

Extra lights were installed so there is now a total of 2500 watts of light on the tennis courts. It was felt that this would help the ice skating but because of the above mentioned diffi-

culty it was impossible to have the tennis courts fixed for flooding.

Finally, a donation of a very lage target, bows and arrows from Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Tuuri gave us a very complete line of archery equipment and contributed much to this part of the program.

The clothes racks on the beach were repaired, oil stained and all three buildings and the pier were oil stained this year.

Capital improvements on the area were done by transferring part of the town appropriation to a special committee bank account and payments made from this. Thus it is not necessary to raise funds for improvements on the area as was done in the past.

At the final meeting of the season by the War Memorial committee several matters were brought up for discussion. They were: 1. It was felt that the present season we were over-staffed and the next season will not require so many to run the program adequately. Mr. Silander agreed with this point. 2. The morning program was not utilized as much as it should be, because of continued cold which appears to be a frequent complaint in the morning as well as three churches in town having summer school of periods of two weeks each. This is a total period of six weeks, during which at least 60 to as many 90 youngsters in town cannot make the program.

Along with the difficulty the noon period makes when there is no coverage of the waterfront, the committee felt it might be wise to run the coming season from 1 to 5 in the afternoon only and then keep the area open two evenings a week from 6 to 8 to or 6:30 to 8 or 8:30 depending on the use of the area by family groups.

During the ten years the program has been running, habits definitely have changed. Traveling is much easier, cars seem to be more available and family groups seem to be working together and so find it easier to get out together. Also considerable tennis equipment is now available and it seems that there could be much more participation in this sport by all age groups than has been done in the past; especially now that lights are available for other purposes and did get a great deal of use during the evenings in the fall by basketball enthusiasts who

made good use of the portable basketball backstops.

One final recommendation of the committee was that the committee could be enlarged with more female representation, possible husband and wife teams so that some of the various activities could be directly in charge of a small group on the committee.

At this meeting Dr. Paul made known his plans for retirement as chairman of the committee and he expressed regret that pressure of work was making it impossible for him to take on any extra-curricula activities.

Youngsters participating in the organized swimming classes developed rapidly. Although the total of 68 youngsters isn't as large a group as I had hoped for it, nevertheless, is surprisingly large considering the cool, wet summer that we had (the rainiest in 12 years). Approximately 30 additional youngsters took lessons at one time or another, but didn't qual-

ify for certificates because they either dropped out or didn't attend a sufficient number of classes.

A concentrated effort should be made in the coming year to acquaint more parents and youngsters in the importance of enrolling in swimming lessons. We should have over a hundred local youngsters in the swimming classes instead of the 42 we had. In 1958 we didn't have any youngsters enrolled in the Senior Life Saving Classes and only 5 Troy youngsters in the Junior Life Saving class, however, the 5 Troy youngsters (Carole, Margaret and Deborah Cumings, Rickey Oman and Bobby Tucker) demonstrated outstanding ability by the end of the course and should be definite assets to future swimming programs. These youngsters are capable of assisting in the waterfront program in future years.

Special Events

1. Junior Olympics: 6-7 year group, winner: Buff Witham, 15 points; 8-9 year group, winner: Herby Silander, 28 points; 10-11 year group, winner: Ed Saari, 16 $\frac{1}{3}$ points; 12 year group, winner: Chris Congdon, 23 $\frac{1}{2}$ points. (Events: broad jump, high jump, sack dress race, shot put, discus, 50 yard dash, 75 yard dash, 220 yard dash).

2. Swimming meet at Peterborough: won by Troy.

3. Bicycle trip to Rhododendron State Park (very successful).

4. Capture the Flag War at Gap Mountain. (This activity proved to be very exciting for boys between the ages of 7 and 14. A strict set of rules were formulated, deviations from the normal game were made to stimulate more interest and we believe that we have "hit" upon a recreation group activity that requires very little equipment, no money and allows participation by an unlimited number of youngsters.)

5. Swimming meet vs. Rindge . . . won by Troy.

6. Archery tournaments: (weekly) Outstanding archers: Walter Maki and Billy Jacobson.

7. Swimming meet at Troy against Peterborough . . . won by Troy.

8. Renewal of Capture the Flag War at Oak Tree Lot between the White and Blue armies.

9. Basketball game held in August at Sand Dam between the Peterborough Playground Team and the Troy War Memorial Team . . . won by Troy 31-29. This game received publicity as the only official basketball game played in the county in 90 degree heat during the month of August. Basketball should not be considered as a seasonal sport, especially in New Hampshire, as it is an activity that offers the participating youngsters more good than probably any other sport. Thanks to the fine workmanship of Mr. Girouard we now possess basketball backboards at Sand Dam.

10. Closing Day Program. Scores of pies donated by the mothers of Troy and Fitzwilliam; swimming demonstrations, paddle board rescue demonstration, pie eating contest, doll carriage parade (one of the highlights of the season), crowning of Sand Dam freckle champion best tan champ, and youngsters with the nicest smile.

***Special thanks to Mr. Wilpas Saari for his many thrilling and outstanding pictures of the events and for Dr. Paul and his light meter for judging the Best Tan Champions, and also to the fine people who acted as judges and contributed pies and candy for the festivities.

To the inhabitants of the school district in the town of Troy qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 10th day of March 1959 at 11 o'clock in the forenoon to bring in your votes for the election of the following officials:

1. A moderator for the coming year.
A clerk for the ensuing year.
A member of the school board for the ensuing three years.
A treasurer for the ensuing year.
Two auditors for the ensuing year.

You are hereby further notified to meet at the Town Hall in the said district on March 10, 1959 at 8:00 P. M. to act upon the following: (Polls will open not later than 11 A. M. nor close earlier than 6 P. M. on said date).

2. To determine and appoint the salaries of school board members and the truant officer, and to fix the compensation of any other officer or agents of the district.

3. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

4. To choose agents, auditors and committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

5. To see what sum of money the district will vote to raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers, auditors and agents, for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of any sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund, together with

other income, the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

6. To see if the district will raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred fifty-eight thousand eight hundred forty-two dollars (\$158,842.00)* for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund, together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

*(Note: The construction and operation of the school **with a new addition and the payment of bonds and interest on the new addition** will require an assessment of \$126,640 upon local taxes; while operation of the present school on a two-session basis from 8 A. M. to 6 P. M., will require a local property tax assessment of \$129,262 or \$2,600 more than the cost of new construction.)

7. To see if the district will raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred thirty-seven thousand five hundred (\$137,500) for the construction and equipment of an addition to the present school building and for making necessary alterations, all of a permanent nature and lasting character, and in order to provide such funds to authorize the school board to issue bonds or notes in the name of and on the credit of the district, under provisions of the Municipal Bonds statute of New Hampshire RSA 33 or any amendments thereto; and to delegate to the school board authority to fix the time and place of payment of principal and interest of said bonds or notes, the interest thereon, and the principal amount of each bond or note and to take such other action as may be necessary or advisable.

8. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven hundred (\$700) to be used as matching funds for Federal aid provided under the National Education Defense

Act for the purchase of equipment and materials in science and mathematics.

9. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to accept and use funds which may become available from Federal or state funds for the construction or maintenance of the local school.

10. To see if the district will raise and appropriate the sum of one thousand (\$1,000) to provide for an enriched program of instruction offered in addition to the regular school program, for gifted pupils.

11. To see if the district will raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand four hundred dollars (\$2,400) as a deficit appropriation caused by the necessity of employing additional teacher help to assist with an extra large grade one enrollment and for additional shop teacher time.

12. To see if the district will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of two hundred fifty dollars (\$250) as the districts share of the supervisory union contribution to the support of educational TV channel WENH.

13. To see if the district wishes the school board to continue to include the road on West Hill from Edwards Corner to Patria's as a part of the school bus route for the duration of the new bus contract.

14. To see if the Troy school district will change the number of members on the school board from three to six, to become effective at the 1960 election.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL OF THE TROY HIGH SCHOOL

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I hereby submit my second annual report as Principal of the Troy School System.

The intent of this report is to better acquaint the tax payers of Troy with the inherent strength and weaknesses of their school. It is my belief that a well informed public is better able to assist the school in its endeavor to guide and educate each child toward his ultimate goal of becoming a useful citizen.

Faculty

Once again I am happy to report that the faculty of the Troy Schools is one that I am justly proud of. There have been only minor changes in the staff.

Science—Mr. Robert Nims, replaced by Mr. Harry Peach in January 1959.

English and Social Studies—Mr. Robert Bellavance (a new addition to the staff).

Social Studies—Mr. George Whitham—replaced Mr. William Carey who became principal of the Chesterfield School.

With the above information it is easy to see that our faculty is stable, with little turnover in personnel. This I believe to be a good sign in any school system.

During the year we lost Mrs. Lillian Dahl who taught in grade six for eleven and one-half years. During this time she served faithfully and diligently. Mrs. Dahl will be missed by the entire community. Mr. Thomas Huskie took over her position.

Elementary School

In grade one the children are at the very beginning of their formal education. Everyone realizes the importance of this

first year of school where the main objective is a good reading foundation. This is accomplished by (1) dividing the class into groups where each child is working with and at his own level, and by (2) using both the sight reading and phonics method of teaching reading skills.

Children are given an opportunity to use these skills in social studies, arithmetic, science, etc. The importance of this first year of school can not be over emphasized, thus the decision to employ Mrs. Marion Starkey on a part time basis to assist Mrs. Powers with a first grade enrollment of thirty-eight pupils.

In the second grade reading is also the most important subject.

Arithmetic is stressed more at this level. It is a continuation of addition and subtraction combinations started in the first grade. Oral work is stressed now to encourage sight recognition of the number facts through the combinations of ten. Combinations from ten to twenty are developed and used in written work. Many teaching aids are used.

Spelling is introduced in the second grade. It is correlated with phonics and reading.

Science has come forward on our list of important subjects. Present day current events has stimulated adults and children alike in this field. Our program is growing and interest is high with both girls and boys.

Teachers of grades one through five are taking a course in Elementary Science, at Marlboro High School. More science, with experiments is being taught in the elementary grades. Mr. Russell, helping teacher for the union has been a great help to the teachers in the teaching of science.

Due to the large enrollment in grade three, most of the time has been spent in reading (including phonics), arithmetic, spelling and writing. The first nine weeks there was a practice teacher from Keene Teachers College, Miss Patti Piper. Miss Piper worked hard and was a great help to us.

Mrs. Hildreth, French teacher in the High School will start some simple French lessons at the third grade level in the near future.

Since the beginning of the school year Grade 4 pupils have

been receiving French lessons under the instruction of Mrs. Hildreth. Great interest and progress has been shown in this experiment. Parents are urged to observe these lessons.

The pupils of Grades 4, 5 and 6 are being retested in reading by Mrs. Rawding and the teachers of these grades have held discussions and meetings with Mr. Damon Russell, the Helping Teacher, for the purpose of working out plans to adopt the Joplen Reading Plan.

The School Safety Patrol, under the direction of the fifth and sixth grade teachers has been of great assistance.

The Christmas program this year was presented at the P. T. A. meeting in the evening, a great number of parents were able to see the program.

A Physical education program has been started in the intermediate grades, they have one period a week under the direction of Mr. Silander.

The sixth grade is busy studying the rock and mineral collection that belongs to the school union. This is being done in accordance with the bi-monthly nature study program presented by Mrs. Hester Underhill. Mrs. Underhill recently, introduced "classes of rocks" and the children seem to enjoy doing their own comparisons.

This should aid them for their spring trip to the outdoor education camp. They are looking forward to making the trip and all want to help earn the necessary money. (\$630)

SECONDARY SCHOOL

Last year I listed some of the departments with objectives and recommendations for the coming year. This seemed to meet with approval.

During this school year many of the staff members have met with a committee formed by the P. T. A. composed of Mr. John Callahan, Mr. John Verbury, and Mr. George Lloyd, for the purpose of explaining and examining areas of instruction at the secondary level.

BUSINESS DEPARTMENT

The business department of Troy High School has two main objectives—one in regard to business subjects for personal use and the other, for vocation use.

The general objective is to provide opportunity for all students to develop an understanding of the business and economic system of the nation and his part as a consumer, citizen, and working member of society. In addition, the student becomes familiar with skills which are common and basic to all personal and occupational activities.

The vocational objective is to provide interested students with training in the skills, understandings, attitudes, and responsibilities needed to enter a business occupation. It is not enough that a student is competent in a skill, he must also possess other qualities if he wishes to acquire and hold a business position. Troy High School has a reputation of graduating efficient office workers and we hope to keep it that way by stressing high standards.

INDUSTRIAL DEPARTMENT

The Industrial Education Department of Troy High School has this year as in past years offered the following courses: Mechanical Drawing, Woodworking, Cabinet Making, Electricity and Driver Education.

Believing that Industrial Arts in the Junior High School should be an exploratory course, the eighth grade this year will have eighteen weeks of woodworking, nine (9) weeks of basic electricity and nine (9) weeks of mechanical Drawing.

Because of inadequate space our high school boys are unable to have a number of experiences that we would like to offer. If space permitted we could offer auto mechanics, basic electronics, art metals, and machine shop.

MATHEMATICS DEPARTMENT

With a revised curriculum now in full operation we feel that we have improved the calibre of student that we are producing. All areas of our High School College Preparatory Mathematics are, at this time, ahead of last years classes. We feel that continuity of presentation and emphasis on understanding are primarily responsible for this. Next year we will definitely see whether our opinions are correct.

Starting with the year '59-'60 we will no longer alternate courses, due to increased enrollment. All courses will be offered each year. This will benefit the students greatly.

Our senior math course will start next year. This course will encompass the areas of trigonometry, solid geometry, and advanced algebra. The program, as it now stands is in direct agreement with national curriculum revision committee suggestions. All criticisms and suggestions for the improvement of the program and others at the secondary school level will gladly be received.

HOME ECONOMICS DEPARTMENT

The Home Economics Department of Troy High School is justly proud of the "new look" which is ours this year. The kitchen section of the room has been renovated by installing three of the anticipated four unit kitchens, each of which is designed to accommodate four girls. Our appreciation goes to the Public Service Company of Jaffrey for their contribution of four new General Electric Ranges, on a loan basis. These stoves are also serviced by them at no expense to the district. The warm brown and cheery yellow color scheme makes the entire room a pleasant place in which to work.

The curtains, which were made by the girls in the Clothing and Textiles class adds a pleasant finishing touch. These girls are learning much which gives them a sense of satisfaction and achievement as they make garments for themselves and other members of their families in addition to the knowledge and skills which they acquire.

The junior and senior girls in the Family Course are being given an opportunity to study Home Nursing, including diets for members of the family who may be ill, as well as the many other phases of family living such as the care of children.

The courses of the Home Economics Department are all planned and developed with the express purpose of helping these girls, who are our future home-makers and mothers, to become as efficient and as intelligent as possible in that most noteworthy career, "Homemaking."

FOREIGN LANGUAGE

Many educators believe that the ability to learn to speak a second language reaches its peak at about the age of 10. The Troy fourth graders have received instruction in oral French about fifteen minutes daily since October, and their enthusiasm

has certainly shown that young children enjoy learning to speak a foreign language. These boys and girls can say simple rhymes, sing songs, play games, and participate in some simple dialogues in French. No grammar, reading, or writing is taught at this level. Soon this instruction will be offered to a third grade group.

With the increasing emphasis on foreign language recommended by our state department of Education and the Conant report, it is hoped that this program will be extended to help lay the ground work for high school foreign language study. For college preparatory students, preferably beginning in the Sophomore year three years of a foreign language are recommended for the high school. Two years of one language are required by many colleges now and will be an entrance requirement for Liberal Arts student at the University of New Hampshire beginning Sept. 1961.

ART PROGRAM

The Art Program at Troy is geared to give all grades an art experience in which it is hoped to unfold a sensitivity to and appreciation of art. We want to provide every opportunity for creative expression and to teach the fundamentals and techniques by which this art expression is achieved. We try to correlate art with other areas of the curriculum and to develop the relationship of contemporary art and daily living.

It is important to bring out satisfying avocational interests as well as to seek out the talented and provide counseling in the choosing of a vocation. Finally, we hope to have a gradual transition from pre-adolescent art training to art education suiting the needs and interests of adolescents with the provision for social experiences and opportunities for the wholesome activities for all. With these aims and objectives we have hope for the development of well integrated yet individual personalities.

It is impossible to give this total experience without a room in which we have available, running water, a sink, working spaces and proper storage space for equipment, materials and projects or drawings on which the children are working. There are numerous experiences that unfortunately cannot be provided because of the lack of these facilities.

MUSIC EDUCATION

The main objective of the Music Program in the school is to give a basic knowledge of rote songs, note reading, rhythm, ensemble singing and the appreciation of many different types of music.

A progressive course begins in the first grade and continues through the eighth grade as a required subject. Through the four years of high school, chorus and music appreciation are elective and give one fourth credit for meeting twice each week.

To make the music program more effective we definitely need an adequate place for music instruction. The crowded condition of the school is a serious handicap to the quality of music that we would like to provide.

JOPLIN READING PLAN

Arrangements are underway to place the children of Grades 4, 5 and 6 in Troy in a system of readings adapted to local needs from the so called Joplin Reading Plan.

The Reading Plan of Joplin, Mo. was explained in Readers Digest January 1958 (Johnnie can read in Joplin). Simply put, the students in the above mentioned grades were grouped into divisions determined by standardized reading tests which established actual reading grade level. Reading for the entire group is scheduled for the same period for a specified length of time.

Using a uniform basic reader series the teacher teaches two sections of a grade level instead of the existing four or five, within her grade. (Example 3-2 second half grade 3 and 4-1 first half fourth grade.) Thus the children in each section get more time per pupil for instruction, motivation and actual drill or experience in oral reading while the other section works on silent reading, skills or comprehension. Then there comes the reversal.

Time is also allotted for Library or reading from choice, to meet book report requirement, required supplementary reading, or when this has been done, for pure enjoyment alone. This requires a carefully chosen book shelf.

The grouping is flexible and the scholar is moved ahead as fast as he can go or at least at half year intervals.

Here the additional testing has been completed and will be kept up to date with comparison to regular achievement test results.

PROPOSED BUILDING PROGRAM

The taxpayers and voters of Troy must face the issue of a building addition to the present Troy School. I have faith in the citizen of Troy in that they will consider all of the facts and vote accordingly. It is hoped that emotion will be left out and voting will be done on the basis of considering the educational aim and objective of our young people in the community.

The proposed building addition will provide the following benefits.

1. The use of a room for a library which we had to do away with last year.
2. Space for improved instruction in art, music and remedial reading.
3. The elimination of study hall pupils in the back of classrooms by providing adequate space for study halls.
4. More Fitzwilliam tuition pupils due to a broader curriculum and more reasonable class sizes which in turn provides more tuition revenue.
5. The elimination of alternating courses which will help transfer students and provide a more logical sequence in our program of studies.
6. Adequate facilities for a **science laboratory**. The present science room passes only as a lecture and demonstration room at best, with no facilities for individual pupil participation.
7. The present shop is much too small in area. The addition of new facilities would allow for an increase in the curriculum for the Industrial Arts Department.

In conclusion I feel certain that your children are continuing to receive an above average education as evidenced by the success of our graduates going on to college.

Education should be the concern of the whole community throughout the entire year. Our children and their education is certainly our most precious natural resource.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

This year the citizens of Troy have a most important decision to make. This decision is necessary because a steadily increasing school population has finally filled the present building to capacity.

Next year the school will either have to operate on a two-session day starting at about 8 A. M. and continuing until 6 P. M. **OR** additional rooms will be necessary.

A two-session day will probably result in the loss of most of the tuition pupils from Fitzwilliam who now contribute \$10,000 in tuition funds toward the operation of the Troy school.

A two-session day will mean that Troy will have to spend \$2,600 more than will be required to operate a regular session day and pay for the new construction.

Failure to provide adequate science, laboratory, shop, library and commercial areas will seriously handicap the education of Troy pupils and may ultimately lead to the loss of our status as an approved high school.

I know of no other way to satisfactorily meet this problem,—which will remain a permanent one—unless met by additional construction.

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YOU CAN HELP PREVENT FOREST FIRES

Twenty-five percent of all forest fires in New Hampshire are caused from careless debris burning—brush, paper, leaves, grass, etc. Most of them are started without the required permit from the local forest fire warden. The cost of extinguishing these fires annually runs into large sums of money.

According to law, responsible parties must pay the cost of putting them out. In addition, violators may be subject to court prosecution with fines running as high as (\$200) two-hundred dollars. This includes setting any fires at the dump without permit.

In the interest of fire prevention why not eliminate burning at home? Use your town dump. It has been set up for your personal convenience. It provides a suitable place for the disposal of dangerous inflammable waste material and other useless items which accumulate around the home and local stores; brush, etc. cut on your property. Eliminate the hazard of burning yourself. It will be easier for you—personally and financially.

If, however, you do burn on your premises:

1. Secure a permit from your local forest fire warden—the law requires it.
2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning. Don't leave it.
3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.
